



Mgr. McGarvey was born in this city on Aug. 14, 1861, the son of Roman Catholic parents. When a young man he was ordained priest in the Episcopal church and resolved to devote his life to work among the poor. He held several curacies, and eventually became head of the Episcopal monastic order of the Companions of the Most Holy Saviour, the headquarters of which was at the clergy house connected with St. Elisabeth's church, Philadelphia. About a dozen celibate priests were associated with him in the order.

Father McGarvey, who was a powerful preacher, conducted missions in many Episcopal churches of the United States and Canada, and wrote many books and pamphlets upholding the Catholic position of the Church of England and the Episcopal church in this country.

About 15 years ago the general tri-

About 15 years ago the general triennial convention of the Episcopal church adopted a canon permitting clergymen not of the church to speak from Episcopal pulpits upon written consent of the bishop of the diocese. The entire Catholic party in the church fought against the innovation, particularly as it permitted Unitarians to some within the law, with the Episcopal consent. The upshot of a bitter controversy over the issue resulted in Father McGarvey, most of his associates, and other clergymen—about 25 in all—abandoning the Episcopal church and going over to the Roman Catholic communion.

Father McGarvey continued his missionary activities in the latter church, and in 1921 the late Pope Benedict appointed him a domestic prelate. While in the Episcopal church he was offered a bishopric several times in high church dioceses of the west, but declined.




Women's Institute of Newcastle Against Its Use in Canada

Unite For Lower Express Rates

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 29.—Premier Oliver yesterday moved to rally all the western provinces of Canada in the fight for lower western express rates. He had secured the assurance of the Saskatchewan Government that it would stand with British Columbia in its efforts, and it is expected that the other prairie provinces will do so.

"A MARITIME PROBLEM"

This is What the Montreal Gazette Calls Our Demand That Markime Ports be Used Instead of U. S. Ports to Export Freight Carried by Canadian National Railway — Canadian Merchant Marine Using Port of New London to Carry Canadian

Shall Canadian or American ports be used by the Canadian National Railway—owned by the people of Canada—for the export of Canadian products?

That is what The Montreal Gazette terms "A Maritime Prob-

It is not only a Maritime problem, it is a Canadian problem.

The Maritime Provinces are as much a part of Canada as Ontario and Quebec and the West, and the use of our ports to carry Canadian goods in and out of Canada is just as necessary as the use of the canals to carry freight from the prairie country to Montard

treal.

The Canadian Government is spending nearly a hundred million dollars to make transportation easier and cheaper to Montreal by the widening and deepening of the Welland Canal.

A further sum of \$5,000,000 is being spent at Vancouver and not long ago \$70,000,000 was invested in vessels of the Merchant Marine, some of which are now going to American ports to load products shipped out of Canada by the Canadian National Railways.

An editorial article from The Montreal Gozette is reproduced below as well as a despatch from New London, Conn., showing how the freight steamers owned by the Canadian people are co-operating with the Canadian National, also owned by the Canadian people, to use an American port to take exports from Canada.

A MARITIME PROBLEM

The St. John Telegraph-Journal is disturbed over the employment of the Canadian National Railway in the export of grain through Portland instead of through a Canadian port. In the last three months the C. N. R. carried 6,631,294 bushels of grain to the American port, as compared with 454,168 bushels to St. John and not a single bushel to Halifax, which leads the Telegraph-Journal

not a single bushel to Halifax, which leads the Telegraph-Journa to remark:—

"The Maritime Provinces are co-owners in the Canadian Na"lonal Railway, just as they are shareholders in all of the other "national undertakings of Canada. We are here, ready and wait"ling for business, and expect it from railroads in which we are "shareholders. We are not getting it. But a United States port "is benefitting not only by the money expended by the vessels at "the port of shipment, but by the labor employed in loading cargoes and by the distribution of money for supplies and for "labor in unloading cargoes, for none of the ships which carry "Canadian grain out of Portland, Me., come to that port with"out a cargo, sometimes composed of goods for Canadian busi"ness houses and sometimes immigrants who, if the vessels "came to Canadian ports, would in all probability come into "Canadian territory to settle."

DISSATISFACTION IS CAUSED.

DISSATISFACTION IS CAUSED.

The prevailing condition of things causes great dissatisfaction in the Maritime Provinces, yet it is a condition foreseen when the policy of nationalization was entered upon. It is no new thing for the Grand Trunk section of the C. N. R. to carry grain to Portland. On the contrary, much of the profitable freight traffic of that road down to the present day has consisted of grain carried from one part of the United States to another through Canada.

So long as the Grand Trunk was privately owned, so long as the property belonged to British shareholders, no protest was made against its engaging in American traffic, but the moment the road passed into possession of the Canadian People a new

the read passed into possession of the Canadian People a new condition was created.

What is the position now? It is ownership and operation of lines in a foreign country by the Government of Canada, an anomaly fraught with constant danger. If the Portland section of the C. N. R. is not to be abandoned it surely is the part of prudence to make its operation profitable, and making its operation profitable perpetuates Maritime Province discontent. That is the practical delimma.

The St. John Telegraph-Journal asks "whose fault is it that Canadian grain is seeking an outlet from Canada through an American port?" And replies by placing the responsibility upon the railway management. That is scarcely fair. Sir Henry Thornton is merely carrying out his instructions, which are to operate the C. N. R. on business lines, without fear, favor or affection of politicians, and in thus shaping his policy he properly goes after the most profitable traffic. No grain would be carried to Portland if it could be carried over the C. N. R. to St. John at less cost; and if St. John is to get the trade irrespective of cost it means that the people of Canada at large would shoulder the loss in order—not to advantage the grain grower but to minister to a local interest.

CANADIAN FREIGHT IS TAKEN.

New London, Conn., Feb. 28—Arriving here from Halifax at daybreak Wednesday the freight steamer Canadian Spinner operated by the Canadian Merchant Marine will take on the third cargo of automobiles and automobile parts consigned to New Zealand and Australian ports which have gone out of this port this win-

By April two more vessels of the same line will have sailed from here making a total of five spilings to have carried Canadian freight to foreign ports from the port of New London, this winter.

The aggregate tonnage of the winter's sailings will, by the end of the season, have reached approximately 25,000 tons, all the cangoes being made up of American-manufactured automobiles. parts and machinery.

NEW LONDON IS CHOSEN.

New London was chosen for the shipping point of these products for reasons of financial economy. The General Motor Co. automobile products and cars made by the Ford Motor Co. are the principal shippers through this port to the Antipodes.

The greater portion of the automobile parts are made in the factories in this country. From the factory they are shipped just over the Canadian border, knocked down. Being parts rather than set-up machines the duty is greatly less.

At the Canadian branches, only a short distance over the United States line, although in the Canadian dominion, the parts are assembled. There, also, they are crated and made teady for shipment.

From four to five months in the year the St. Lawrence River is closed by ice and transportation along it is impractical. Ten days or so is saved, therefore, in shipping these cars by rail to New London. Crated, the cars are shipped in bond for New Zelaand and Australian ports.

The match will be at 1,500 points, played in three blocks of 500 points, played in three blocks of 500 points each. Definite announcement that the players had agreed upon the terms and dates for the match was made by Thomas A. Dwyer, an official of the Brunswick-Balkline-Collender Company. Hoppe attended the conference and his terms for the match were approved by the representative of Horemans.

The players will receive a special cash prize from the billiard promoters as well as receiving the net gate receipts, which will be divided on the basis of 60 per cent. to the winner and 40 per cent. to the loser. The \$1,000 diamond medal, which is held by Hoppe at present, also will go to the winner. Under the rules the winner of the tournament must defend it successfully for one year against each man who took part in the international tourney in order to gain permanent possession of it. Hoppe posted \$500 and Horemans did likewise. The \$1,000, which takes the form of a side wager, will go to the winner.

The Hoppe-Horemans match probably will make the end of the challenge matches in 18.2 billiards for the year. The rules state that the champion must defend his title every sixty days, but will not be called upon to play from May until September. This means that with the completion of the coming match that the sixty days allotment would bring the next challenge match into June.





Sooner Russia and Rags Than Prosperity in America Without Him.

New York, Feb. 29-Russia and rags with her husband is preferable to the United States and affluence without him, Mme. Vere Lavrovia, Russian singer, declared. She was told she could enter the United States as an' artist, but that her war-maimed and impoverished husband, Baron Royce

The couple arrived on the Antonia of the Cunard line, from South Africa, where the concert business barely enabled them to book third-class passage to the United States.

Before the war, the name Royce Garrett was said to be synonymous in Russia with wealth, position and power. The baron claims to be a descendant from an English ancestor who went to Russia in the days of Peter the Great and was elevated to the nobility by that monarch. While fighting with the white army, he lost position, wealth and his left leg.

Mme. Lavrovia is the daughter of a grand opera singer and a member of the first Duma, of 1905. She is young, in her early twenties, slight and blonde. They are now at Ellis Island, although Mme. Lavrovia is at liberty to go where she pleases.

"We shall wait here," she said, "whatever we do, we shall do it together."

DANCE ORCHESTRAS

Eight Men From Toronto Leave for Old Country Engagement.

Toronto, Feb. 29.—Canada has opened up a new line of export trade. She is now exporting orchestras.

Last night eight young men left Toronto for London, England, where they go on a year's contract—the first purely Canadian orchestra to play an engagement in that city.

W. F. Mitchell, formerly a Canadian and a native of Guelph, now controls several exclusive dance halls and clubs in London, and he conceived the idea of taking a Canadian orchestra over there for one of his halls. He sent his representative, Sam Laschiver, to Canada to select the band. The latter listened to many musicians in Montreal, Ottawa, Hamilton and other centres and finally decided that the men he wanted were in Toronto. None of the organized dance orchestras he heard suited him so he picked the individual performers, and gave them the name of the Toronto Orchestra.

The eight young men have formed themselves into a club and undertake to look after one another in case of illness or misfortune.

It is likely that they will be playing dance music for the Prince of Wales, for he frequently dances at some of the places controlled by Mr. Mitchell.

The personnel of the orchestra is: Harold Swain, (leader) saxophone; Leslie Allen, saxophone; William Hall, trombone; Alfred Noakes, trumpet; Frank Walsh, pianist; Randall Garrison, sousaphone; Dave Caplan, banjo, and "Ken" Kenney, drums.


