# IS ARE FIGHTING WITH ENERGY OF DESPAIR: GIANT EFFORTS TO STEM THE TIDE OF BATTLE

## Important Enemy Retreat Is **Expected Before Long**

Germans Putting In Their General Reserves, Including Best Troops, In Desperate Attempt To Hold Allies-Frankfurt Gazette Admits "Great Danger Along Whole Western Front" - Allied Forces Make Local Gains of Great Importance

London, Oct. 4 News from all sectors of the western Stirring Story of War Comes front tells of giant efforts by the enemy to stem the daily advancing tide of battle. The Germans are putting in their best

troops, and, according to all correspondents, are fighting with the energy of despair.

Still there is no sign of any great retreat, except the withdrawal in the Flanders sector, where the British have occupied Man Swam Across to German Armentieres and Lens and are closely pressing the retiring enemy. The recapture of the great French coal region affords great satisfaction here.

In the Sequehart-Bony sector, the Allied breach in the Hindenburg system was extended today and the fighting reached the outskirts of Mont Brehain, where Australian

units, with tanks, are operating.

The importance Germans attach to the retention of this portion of the line is indicated by the Frankfurt Gazette, which tates that, in order to prevent a frontal break through between Cambrai and St. Quentin, Genera Von Boehn's army has

Cambrai and St. Quentin, Genera Von Boehn's army has been made so strong that it is equivalent to a complete army group. The Gazette declares "there is great danger along the whole western front."

It cannot be long before an important enemy retreat from the Hindenburg line is bound to happen, according to the universal military opinion here.

Interesting news come from Eastern Europe. Austria has withdrawn her troops in Albania, and the Italians have recaptured Berat. It is learned in official quarters that German residents of Sofia and Constantinople, including officers and their families, are leaving hastily and going through Roumania to Germany.

Allies Continue To Gain

Paris, Oct. 4—Germany is now throwing in general reserves into the battle on the St. Quentin front. This accounts for the stiffening resistance there and also along the German left flank and marks the beginning of the last phase of the great battle.

French Quarters in France, Oct. 8-(Reuter's)-The capture of Challerange, northwest of the Argonne Forest, means that the enemy's second line of resistance which he was wise enough to pre-

British, American and Italian Vessels Hit The Austrians a Smashing Blow-Our Entire German Positions North and South of St. Losses Nothing

Rome, Oct. 4—British, American and Italian warships have destroyed the Austrian naval base at Durazzo and the warships anchored there, according to an amountement made by Premier Orlando.

The attack conserved at noon on Wednesday, when Italian and British cruisers, protected by Italian and Allied torpedo boats and American submarines, succeeded in making their way through mine fields and avoiding attacks by submarines, got into Durazzo harbor.

An intense bombardment followed until the base and the Austrian ships anchored there were completely destroyed.

Italian sailors, in the teeth of a hot enemy fire, torpedoed an Austrian destroyer and a steamer. Another vessel, which was recognized as a hospital ship, was allowed to withdraw.

British and Italian airplanes go-operated in the work. Other Italian and Allied warships were drawn up in order of battle outside the harbor to deal with any enemy warships coming up to the assistance of the port.





It is estimated that somewhere between 90,000,000 and 100,000,000 pounds of cod should be available for export this year if shipped fresh or frozen, and between 50,000,000 and 55,000,000 pounds if cured.



Dark Picture Of Life In Russia

Dr. Angus Campbell, New Yorker, Back From Russia, Says Conditions Are Beyond Imagination

Among Americans returning from Among Americans returning from Russia last week was Dr. Angus Campbell of New York, who has made eight trips to northern Europe since the war started in 1914, and left Moscow three weeks ago. He traveled by train to Petrograd, which took forty-eight hours instead of twelve under normal conditions, and thence by steambest to

"The conditions existing in Russia at the present time," Dr. Campbell said, "are so bad that they cannot be imagined, except by those who have been there. The Bolsheviki hold full sway and are a band of adventurers, assembled from all parts of the world. I did not see Trotzky, but I often met Lenine and heard him address meetings. He is a fanatic out and out and very dangerous.

This will release an equal acreage now used in truck gardening for the production of other foodstuffs more important for war purposes. It will also relieve transportation congestion through home consumption of home produced foodstuffs.

3. Fifty thousand teachers have received valuable instruction in gardening through the garden leaflets written by experts in this office and distributed

4. Boards of education and other civic organizations have been influenced to give financial and moral support to the school and home garden movement and to pay extra salaries for supervision and

5. Hundreds of thousands of parents have become interested in the garden movement and are working with their children in home gardens. In Salt Lake City alone 5,200 mothers representing 62 parental associations are actively supporting food production in the schools. 6. Thousands of civic, commercial and patriotic organizations have become interested in the movement and are giving it hearty support.


consideration.



### GERMANS AND THEIR ALLIES OLD RELIABLE FALL BACK ON EVERY FRONT

New York, Oct. 3—The Associated Press, tonight, issued the following: Lens, the heart of the great coal region in northern France and Armentieres, almost equally important as a manufacturing center, have been evacuated by the Germans; the German fortified positions between Cambrai and St. Quentin have been definitely smashed and the Austro-Hungarians in Albania, foresaken by their former allies, the Bulgarians, are in full retreat northward toward their border fom the Adiatic Sea to Lake Ochrida.

Of the reconquering of invaded Belgium and the progress of the French and Franco-American forces respectively north of Rheims and eastward in Champagne to the vicinity of Verdun the tale remains the same—the Germans slowly, but surely, are being forced everywhere to give ground and their vital defences daily continue to be eaten into, notwithstanding the strong resistance that the enemy is imposing to make null the efforts of the Allies to close in on all sides of the great battle arc from the North Sea to the Swiss border and compel the German high command to re construct its fighting line. 
