MANITOBA EXPECTS \$144,500 DEFICIT

Greater Income Tax Exemption, But Higher Gasoline Levy is

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 3.—Manitoba's budget was brought down last night in the legislature by Premier Bracken, Provincial Treasurer, estimating expenditure for 1925-26 at \$10,-608,412.04; revenue \$10,463,904; deficit \$144,508.04. For the eight months ending April 30, 1925 he estimates an expenditure of \$7,283,179.11; revenue \$7,-15,350.50; book deficits \$167,828.61.

On income tax, the Premier outlined a proposal raising exemption for children from \$300 to \$500 each and producing for exemption for dependents. A further reduction of the supplementary revenue tax is expected, of \$400,000 er \$500,000. A reduction is also proposed in automobile tax, but an increase is forewere present on the occasion.

Hastings County Has Rough Passage Across

Three members of the crew of the steamer Hastings County were injured and narrowly escaped being swept from the deck to their death during a terrific storm on January 21. The vessel was also damaged. Alf Olsen, boatswain; Neils Forde, ship's carpenter, and William Irke, seaman, all had to be taken to the hospital here on the vessel's arrival yesterday.

The Hastings County left Hamburg on January 6 and the Tyne River on January 14 and ran into the terrific hurricane on January 20, this being the same storm which swept overboard two members of the crew of the Welland County, of the same company, which arrived here last week. The vessel battled the winds and waves for more than 48 hours, and during this time two lifeboats were wrecked, doors were smashed and the cabin flooded with water.

"The deficit," continues the report, "we would endeavor to cover by special effort rather than further encroach on our capital which, during the years 1921, 1922 and 1923, was depleted a total of \$,4609.41.

"The salaries of our nurses show an increase of \$10 per month over the previous year. This is due to the decision of our Central Board at Ottawa and applies to all branches of the order throughout Canada where the increased scale was not previously in force. Due to the larger demands called for by our agreement with the Board of Health our new superintendent has to be highly specialized in that branch which applies to Child Welfare and Public Health Service as well as the work of the order and as such we will have to pay her a salary of \$1,800 per annum.

"The grants applied for have been reduced to a minimum as we well appreciate the great necessity of keeping down the public burden, We feel confident, therefore, that we can rely on your support to assist us in our very serious financial position."

President's Review.

In his report as president, Hon. J. G. Forbes recalled the coming of the work to St. John in 1899, and told of various phases of the work in the intervening years and at the present. The nursing work was shown to include visits to West St. John, Fairville, Randolph, East St. John, Glen Falls and Simonds, hesides the city proper, and the report stated that the universal approval of the medical profession and of the poor evidenced their appreciation of the services.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3-A bill to levy a federal tax of 90 per cent. on the money involved in the sale of a baseball player from one club to another, except when the money is re-ceived by the player, was introduced in the House Monday by Representa-tive LaGuardia of New York, Inde-

The bill is designed to force revision of organized baseball's regulation so that diamond stars may reap the financial benefits of their proficiency instead

Would Benefit Players.

"Baseball is about the only profession or calling," said LaGuardia today, "where an individual does not derive the full benefit of his efforts and proficiency. A musician, movie or stage actor, artist or prize-fighter can demand a better contract when one expires, but a ball player cannot. If he does not come to terms with the club with which his contract has just expired, he is banished from the national pastime. I believe that a ball player should be permitted to go out and look for the best proposition he can find." of their "owners."





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
