mere infancy with the most courtly attention, and his literary talents cultivated to the utmost allowable extent; or, in other words, he was bred up in the midst of flatterers, and permitted to study the Koran. His theological acquirements are spoken of accordingly as very great. In the beginning of his reign, his autographic dispatches were entirely composed of quotations from the holy book. And (as we said before) "his literary studies almost necessarily ended in making him fanatic and superstitious, even to the verge of Mahomedan superstition." In regard to his line of policy in the present warfare, though we give him no greater credit than even his enemies conceded due to him, he must be sufficiently Lynx-eyed to perceive that he is forced to engage in no single-handed contest. Whatever are the professions of AUSTRIA, and however eagerly the EMPEROR may desire peace, there is but one opinion of the course dictated to him by his very interest in the event of hostilities being carried on to any great extent or for any considerable period of time. In every battle gained, in every position advanced, AUSTRIA would behold the forerunner of her own fate, and the apparition of a RUSSIAN soldier at her gates. Prussia is equally interested; Germany is at the EMPEROR'S command, and DENMARK may be easily influenced.—The whole speculation seems dark and dismal in the extreme; for, who in the present state of EUROPE, dare predict the consequences of a general war, and if our latest accounts are to be credited, there seems to be no prospect whatever of an armistice between the immediately contending Powers.

It is now so long since we paid our respects to DON MIGUEL, that we almost owe an apology to our readers for the neglect of this illustrious "Child." The scenes which have lately passed in the Peninsula, remind us of little else than the wayward and unaccountable freaks of spoiled children; and whether we consider the inconsistency of the PORTUGUESE themselves, with reference to what ought ever to be nearest the human heart—or the ludicrous incompetency and imprudence of the contrivers of the ruin of an ancient state, we hesitate not in making up our minds, that a more disgraceful page than is occupied by the record of these recent transactions, does not exist in the chapter of modern history. "Dungeons and prisons," says a Colonial Journalist, "are crowded with the victims of fidelity and honour, while the abettors of perjury and usurpation are ruling unopposed." We conclude the sickening detail in the words of the Journal Des Debats:

"Whatever humanity England may have shown in her conduct towards Portugal, it cannot be denied that the events of the Peninsula have struck her to the heart. There is not a more pitiable sight than that of Don Miguel sulking with his usurpations the last English soldiers under sail from Lisbon for Plymouth. The Cabinet of the Regent sat against Sir Frederick Lamb during his official residence as Ambassador from His Britannic Majesty—acclamations of joy in the Government Gazette on the departure of that Freeman—the denunciation of so melancholy a drama consummated amidst cries of Death to the Constitution, to the legitimate King, and to the English! Sir J. Doyle sent into a dungeon, reclaimed by a diplomatic intervention—refused, and brought before the merciful tribunal and nine inquisitors; English subjects arrested at Oporto, their property confiscated to pay the expenses of the Emperor's campaign and perhaps those of his coronation; the embargo laid on vessels which the British flag no longer protects in the Tagus and the Douro, if they have on board a single victim of Don Miguel, or a few Piastras, if taken by a faithful subject of Don Pedro going in to exile. This, in a few words, what England has just experienced in Portugal. And let us remark, that this is only what may be called the outside of the question. We must see in it, besides an alliance of vital importance in the opinion of all Statesmen, who have succeeded each other in power in England, hazy and perhaps irrevocably lost, by these last discussions. Now all this is only the work of the triumph of a party; and the vanquished of to-day becoming victors to-morrow, restore with usury to England the advantages which she has so strangely abandoned."

The anticipations we expressed last week, on the subject of the appointment of a MAYOR, have been fully realised, both as respects the individual selected, and the caution and judgment with which the selection has been made. The Hon. WILLIAM BLACK has received the appointment, and will be sworn into office agreeably to the terms of the Charter, with all convenient speed. This election, we believe, is highly satisfactory to the community at large, and we would be understood as giving utterance to our own private feelings, when we express a cordial wish that the Mayor elect may long live to enjoy his civic honours and to benefit the public by the mild but energetic and judicious acts of his administration.

It gives us pleasure to state as a proof of the genial qualities of the climate in the interior of this Province, that some GRAPES lately made their appearance in this City, which were raised in the neighbourhood of Frederickton; and as an evidence of the growing industry of our Fishermen, that a quantity of Line Mackerel, Haddock, Cod-fish, and Pollock, were brought to our Market last week. This is something new, and evinces the march of enterprise.—We cannot help, however, taking notice of some Beef which was exposed for sale in the Country Market on Saturday last, which was really not in a state fit for culinary purposes. Perhaps the unfrequency of this occurrence rendered it more remarkable, but we think it right to shew that such delinquencies cannot pass without animadversion at least, if no heavier penalty be inflicted.

A NUMBER of our readers have expressed a wish for some information regarding ROBERT POLLOCK, the author of "The Course of Time," of which we have lately given a few specimens in our poet's corner. We are sorry that it is not in our power to gratify their wishes to the extent we desire. His life was short, and made up of few remarkable incidents. Born of humble parents, in the Parish of Eaglesham, near Glasgow, he was trained in his earlier days to the pursuits of rural life. But having shown a fondness for study and early indications of intellectual superiority, he was afforded the advantages of a Grammar School and University education, and greatly distinguished himself among his contemporaries. He studied theology, on completing his University studies, under the Tutor of that science appointed by the Secession body of Presbyterians in Scotland, and after the requisite number of terms, he was licensed as a

preacher or probationer among that sect. He only officiated thrice in public, signs of an incipient consumption having discovered themselves which required his cessation from all professional engagements. His medical attendants at length recommended a change of climate, but when travelling through England, on his way to embark for a more genial latitude, he was suddenly arrested by the hand of death, at the early age of 28. His fame rests entirely on his "Course of Time," which the critics have pronounced worthy of a place on the same shelf with the poetical works of MILTON, and which, in the course of a very few months after its appearance, reached a fifth edition, a very fair criterion of its reception from the public.

TREASURY CIRCULAR.—Mr. Rush, the Secretary of the American Treasury, has addressed a circular letter to all the Collectors on the frontier, warning them to use the utmost vigilance to prevent the introduction of British Goods through the North American Provinces. Should one or more subordinate officers be necessary in the Districts, he says they will be furnished—but really if the frontier line is to be defended against the Smuggler, with a direct Bounty of nearly 100 per cent in most cases, it would require not only all the Custom House officers but all the Troops in the Union, to carry the substance of the Hon. Secretary's letter into effect.—Newscotian.

Kempt, for redress, by gentlemen who have been dismissed from their Militia Commissions by Lord Dalhousie, on account of the Constitutional exercise of Civil rights, or for no just cause. Fine and superfine Flour in this market are still held at the high prices of 5s. 6d. and 4s. the barrel. There can be but little exportation probable, from the stock being fully equal to the consumption of the country, that prices will fall.—Old Gazette.

POSTSCRIPT. From the St. Andrews Herald, Oct. 27. The Norah, arrived here on the 24th, from Liverpool, brought Liverpool and London papers to the 13th ult. inclusive; they add nothing of an official nature, to the published intelligence from Europe, previously received, but it gives us great pleasure to state, that the trade of England appears to be in a highly prosperous state, and that the prices of the staple exports of this Province have somewhat improved. The supply must, however, eventually regulate the market, for three years past, it has been more than adequate to the demand, the longest period into our recollection, that any market has continued ruinous to those who supplied it.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Last night we received the Paris papers by express. The Gazette de France of Thursday contains an article from Odessa, dated the 20th ult. but it consists almost entirely of loose reports, or of looser speculation. The Messenger des Chambres has news from Constantinople of the 14th ult. which, connected with our previous intelligence from that and other quarters proves almost to demonstration that the Russians will not winter in that capital this year. Indeed if it accurately describe the spirit displayed by the Turks, the former must consider themselves fortunate if they maintain their present position. That spirit had already raised, as we all know, a sufficient force to arrest the Russians in their progress, and even to compel them, at almost every point, to substitute the defensive for the offensive. This is notoriously the case at Chosma, against which their main force, and consequently their principal efforts, have been directed. There is reason to think that before Varna, Silistria, and Roudschick, they have not been more successful, and we presume they have no cause to boast of their recent achievements. That spirit, which has been so long and so far from their own pretensions. In addition to the forces which have checked the Russians in their career, it now appears that the Porte has assembled, under the walls of Constantinople, an army of more than 200,000 men, of whom one-third consists of cavalry—an army in which the Turks, perhaps, excel.—Morning Herald. Sir Herbert Taylor has entered on the duties of Adjutant-General, and has transacted business in the office of the Horse Guards. The London Gazette of the 8th Sept. presents the rare and gratifying circumstance of only a single bankrupt being announced. The clerks and other officers of the House of Commons are notified to have received orders to be in attendance in November, as the Parliament is then expected to meet. BRITISH MARINE.—From the official tables it appears that the British tonnage which entered inwards and cleared outwards from and to all parts of the world in the year 1814, 1,800,000; in the year 1827, 2,200,000 (Tonnage not included); that the number of British seamen in 1814, were 116,000; in 1827, 171,000.—Again, that the foreign seamen engaged in navigating foreign vessels to and from the United Kingdom, were in 1814, 23,000; in 1827, 39,000. Thus the British seamen have increased under the free trade system, about 55,000 men; and the foreign seamen about 6,000. Nearly one hundred and eighty prosecutions have been commenced against the trustees of public charities. The defalcation of Mr. Austin, late Deputy Treasurer of Greenwich hospital, in the sums of £12,543 12s. 6d. and £60 15s. 7d., and which never could have happened had the Auditors done their duty, has opened the eyes of the public to look more strictly to their own interest. It is reported that Sir Hudson Lowe has gone to Scotland to seek an explanation of Sir Walter Scott, for his allusions to him in "Bonaparte's Life." The Emperor of Austria has appointed his grandson, the Duke of Reichstadt, a Captain of the Yagers. The military career, therefore, of young Napoleon will commence this year in the approaching reviews, under the auspices of the Archduke Charles.
