COMMON COUNCIL GRANTS FIFTY YEARS FRANCHISE

N. B. Hydro-Electric Company Required to Deliver Power in City Within Three Years — Local Government will be Asked to Investigate Police Court — Mr. Durant Heard From.

Continued from page one.

Impossible For City.

The mayor remarked the city could not sell power and lighting. If they tried to do so, the power, the legislature would treat them as was done when they proposed to install a municipal telephone system. Personally he favored municipal ownership of all public utilities.

Another section provided that the rates should be revised by the public utilities commission and was adopted.

The last section was as follows: The common council do hereby permit to enter the city of St. John for the purpose of selling light and power be granted to other companies within a period of three years on the same conditions as set forth in the foregoing resolutions.

Change Wording.

Ald. Hayes moved that the words "within a period of three years" be stricken and the section be adopted with this amendment.

The Mayor—Is there anything in the agreement providing when the company shall start work or deliver power?

Ald. Kierstead—The company expects to enter the city in three years. It is not pleasant. He thought the company should be obliged to do certain work within a specified period. He also said the company should light the streets free of charge.

Ald. Kierstead—I'm willing to accept an amendment.

After some further discussion Ald. Kierstead moved that the company be required to deliver power in St. John within three years. This was carried.

Ald. Potts moved that the New Brunswick company be required to expend \$100,000 in the first eighteen months, and \$200,000 in three years. This was carried.

Ald. Kierstead moved that the city have the right at the end of 30 years of buying out the company at a reasonable price to be determined by a commission appointed by the legislature.

Ald. Elkin said he didn't see the council tried to revise them. It would be working against progress.

The motion to revise the rates was an unjust insinuation against the committee which had worked to secure them.

Ald. Hayes said he would like to second Ald. Kierstead's motion. If there was an assurance that the company would give the lower rates. Considering the conditions he thought the rates should be lowered. He thought he thought the franchise was too long. He understood the company was willing to accept a 35 year franchise.

The Mayor—That is a bold statement. Do you mean to say the company was willing to accept a 35 year franchise?

Would Accept Shorter Franchise.

Ald. Hayes—I was given to understand that.

Ald. Kierstead said the rates had to be high, because the circumstances were unusual, and three or four times would have to be built on the Le-preaux.

A motion to agree to the rates proposed by the committee was carried.

Ald. Green said provision should be made for regulating the meter rent. At present they were paying 21 cents a month.

Ald. Colner—We ought to be allowed to buy the meters. The present arrangement is a downward robbery.

Ald. Kierstead said he agreed with this idea. In Campbellton he only paid 10 cents a month for the meter.

Ald. Colner said there should be no charge for the meter. The company put it in to put itself in a position to tamper with the report as the company had agreed to it.

Ald. Potts said Ald. Green it was decided to add a section providing that the maximum charge be 10 cents a month.

The next section provided that if the St. John Railway Company secured a controlling interest in the new company, the rates prescribed for the new company should be adopted by it.

This was adopted.

Ald. Hayes said there should be a stipulation allowing the city to purchase the plant of the company.

Should Reconsider.

The Mayor—The statement made here by Ald. Hayes indicates that the council has made a great error. If the company was willing to accept a franchise of 30 or 35 years the council should reconsider its action.

Ald. Wigmore said that if Ald. Hayes' statement was correct, the council should reconsider its decision. If he had known the company would accept a 35 year franchise, he would never have voted for 30 years.

Ald. Hayes—One of the applicants gave me the positive impression that the company would be satisfied with 25 years.

No Motion.

No one moved for reconsideration and the matter dropped.

The report of the committee on slaughter houses was referred to a future meeting.

David H. Rose was reappointed to the Board of School Trustees.

Mary H. Knowles was granted a renewal lease of lot No. 47, Leinster street.

The Common Clerk—"A communication from the Inglewood Pulp Company."

Ald. Potts—"I move that it be filed."

However, the communication was read; it asked that the city council write bodies in revising the pilotage regulations.

The letter was tabled.

Regulations.

A communication was received from the Board of Trade requesting that a committee of three be appointed to act with writer bodies in revising the pilotage regulations.

Ald. Elliott said the Board of Trade took upon itself the duty of the common council. He thought the council was able to attend to its business. The Board of Trade was too inquisitive or presumed the aldermen were no good.

Ald. Hayes moved that the committee requested be appointed.

John F. Calder, Inspector of Fisheries, wrote asking that the matter be referred to the ferry committee.

John F. Calder, Inspector of Fisheries, wrote complaining about the fish-way in the dam at the Robertson Reservoir.

The matter was referred to the water and sewerage board.

Sugar Refinery Promised.

Weldon and McLean wrote that the Atlantic sugar refinery would be built and depressing any attempt to interfere with its title to the site at the Barrack wharf. The communication was filed.

C. B. Lockhart applied for the privilege of placing a fishing weir on the wharf of Barrack wharf, and the matter was referred to the Board of Works.

Police Investigation.

Mr. Wigners moved the provincial government be asked to hold an investigation into the administration of the police court and police affairs.

Ald. Elliott seconded this. The motion was adopted.

Ald. Hayes moved that the \$400,000 franchise be granted \$20,000 were short that amount on the season's operation. It was carried.

Ald. Smith moved that the council ask the citizens committee to publish the commission charter, so the aldermen and ratepayers could have an opportunity to study it.

Disputed With Council.

He was in favor of the commission because he was disgusted at the way the common council did business.

Ald. Hayes said the council had memorialized the legislature to appoint a royal commission to frame a charter. Whereupon the citizens committee went to Fredericton and got an irrefragable charter commission of their own. The common council had been slighted and should not try to interfere now.

The motion of Ald. Smith was lost.

Day After Tomorrow.

Ald. Hayes moved for another special meeting next Monday to receive the report of the committee investigating the board of works.

The Mayor—Is the matter very important?

Ald. Elliott said he did not like to be turned out on every little pretext. The matter could wait.

Ald. Potts thought the committee should be relieved so that the land tax could be sent to work.

Ald. Kierstead—We can report on the land tax at the same time.

Ald. Potts—I'll be like some other star chamber reports.

It was decided to adjourn till next Monday evening.

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APARTMENT HOUSES NEEDED IN ST. JOHN

Vice-Consul Carrigan Thinks Accommodation Here Needs Extension, and Says So in Report to Washington.

The following item from the Daily Conservative Trade Reports, published at Washington, indicates the interest exhibited by our American consuls in business chances in Canada. It is taken from a report of Vice-Consul Clarence Carrigan, stationed at St. John.

"Report was made from this office in 1909 of the necessity for more hotels and apartment houses in St. John. This need has steadily increased, and seems to open up a good field for investment. There is not an up-to-date apartment house in St. John, the nearest approach to it is a hotel building which has lately been remodelled into an apartment house. The apartments are renting readily, although the improvements are not yet completed.

"An apartment house built on modern lines should prove a paying proposition here, as apartments of ordinary size, attractively finished, should easily bring \$25 to \$30 a month. The early completion of the Grand Trunk Terminal in St. John, and other improvements which this harbor will see in a few years, will greatly increase the need of house accommodation here, and this should be a field worthy of investigation.

WOMAN FIGHTS TO KEEP TOWN HONEST

Miss Mary E. Livesey, of Moonachie, N. J., Seeks to Have Voter Indicted - Voted Twice She Says.

New York, Nov. 12.—Miss Mary E. Livesey is busy straightening out certain political disorders in Moonachie, according to the politician she says there are 150 voters in the town not counting the one she is trying to have indicted on a charge of voting twice on Tuesday.

Moonachie is one of those towns which even the Erie Railroad refuses to visit, and where every one has a mail box in front of the door, so that Mr. Hitchcock's men can demonstrate the efficiency of the rural free delivery.

Miss Livesey lives alone in a house in the woods, the house being completely surrounded by bulldozers, so that a stranger has to make a noise like a dog barking to get within hailing distance. Miss Livesey says the dogs are friendly except to members of the Board of Education of Moonachie, who, it is said, are endeavoring to seal Miss Livesey out.

"I'm all tired out," began Miss Livesey yesterday. "The last two days have been hard ones. I have been down in Hackensack all day trying to get a certain citizen of this town indicted by the grand jury for the above stock."

"How do you know he voted twice?" Well, I saw him with my own eyes, once at one poll and once at the other, and I guess I can count."

The politicians say that Miss Livesey is busy about little things like that, and that some weeks there isn't any grout at all since she entered politics.

"Yes," declared Miss Livesey, "they are trying to get me to resign from the board of education because I won't stand for graft. They want to build another school when it isn't necessary. Why, there are hardly enough children in Moonachie to keep one school teacher."

"I have lived here for five years, and this place used to be a part of Lodi township, but some of the politicians got it so that they could control it and graft. Then I began to attend the meetings of the town council, and asked questions that they couldn't answer. Finally they put me on both tickets for a member of the board of education, so that I would surely have something to do and that I would stop attending town council meetings. But I can keep up both kinds of meetings on the same nights. I am the only one of the town and I intend to stick I oppose everything that the other members suggest that savors of graft, and they asked to resign at the last meeting in October. They all voted 'aye' except me.

"Why won't you even give the teacher a vote? I have only one school—a stove big enough to heat the room. She says that she is going to close the school if she can't be kept in her civic activity. I got her appointed."

The other members of the board say that butting in on the town council is a parody compared to putting any resolutions past Miss Livesey. Several of the original members of the board have resigned already.

Miss Livesey is about thirty-five years old and owns considerable property in Hooksett. She is a devoted wife and mother who devotes her time to collecting rents.

WE CONDEMN SEX LESSONS IN SCHOOL

Lowa Educator Says Such Matters Should be Left to Fathers and Mothers in Homes

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 13.—Opposition to the teaching of problems of sex and similar subjects in the public schools was voiced yesterday by Homer H. Seelye, president of the Iowa State Teachers' College, Cedar Rapids, before the Iowa Congress Mothers and Fathers Association.

"Such teaching," he said, "should not be of a character that arouses curiosity and creates a desire to test the same by experience. Mrs. William Force Scott Tells Patria Club Struggle for Ballot is Destroying Feminine Qualities.

New York, Nov. 12.—Characterizing the women's rights movement as one which is in the nature of a decadence, Mrs. William Force Scott, who returned from an anti-suffrage campaign tour in California, last evening gave the negative side in a debate on whether the suffrage should be granted to women. This debate was held in the Hotel Manhattan before the Patria Club and its members were warned by Mrs. Scott against granting women a demand which marks a retrogression.

The feminist movement seems to be a subtle attack on representative government, she said. Suffrage is a sex revolt which has taken hold of the world. It is the resistance of women to all duties and obligations which have been hers through all the ages and under the influence of this modern spirit of freedom woman is choosing to imitate man. She asks to work like a man, she wants to be paid like a man, she wants to be held like a man, she wants to be treated like a man. She asks to be compensated by the state for her domestic duties. She thinks she needs less protection than in the past when, on the contrary she needs more of man's protection. It is our fault for not producing better men. We all know that it is a very strange man to withstand political temptations and it would take a very strong woman to withstand these temptations if she had political power.

The reason suffragists do not have greater success is because they call men traitors. Men really are easier to grant women anything. But since the men are the ones to enforce the laws men should be the ones to make them. We must progress by masculine and sometimes called immoral opponents of suffrage believe that it is not for the best interest of the race to have women competing with men in practically every field. And we anti-suffragists are working for the future of the race.

Miss Elizabeth Freeman upheld the suffrage side of the argument and declared that men were making this a monopoly of sex by refusing to give them the ballot. THE FUTURE OF THE BRITISH WEST INDIES.

Mutual preferential trade between the Dominion and the West Indies is indicated in a despatch from Ottawa as part of a progressive commercial policy to which Mr. Porter, the Minister of Trade and Commerce, is giving consideration as a means to stimulate the external commerce of Canada.

The step now contemplated may lead to far reaching developments. It will certainly not hinder but must tend to stimulate the movement to bring the British West Indies into the Canadian confederation.

There is much to be said in favor of the transfer of the West Indian islands, or at any rate such as desire it, to the political overlordship of Canada.

It stands to reason that the West Indies cannot expect a great deal of consideration at the hands of the House of Commons, overlaid as it is with the affairs of the United Kingdom.

Whether newspapers should accept advertisements from candidates whom they oppose in their editorial columns is a question that was recently debated by Buffalo newspapers in the course of the New York state elections.

CONSERVATIVE OPPORTUNITY IN ALBERTA.

The result of the recent by-elections in Alberta is likely to have an important influence upon the political destinies of that Province.

Under present circumstances a vote on a question of confidence in the Legislature would in all probability result in the defeat of the Government.

The only hope for the Sifton Administration lies in the possibility of patching up some sort of agreement with the disaffected Liberals, but that is likely to be a task of exceeding difficulty.

Messrs. Sifton and Rutherford, Cross and Cushing serve in the same Administration. The difficulties of the Sifton Administration are the Conservatives' opportunity and if, as is not improbable, the Government is compelled to appeal to the people, the Opposition will enter the campaign with brighter prospects of success than at any time since Alberta became a Province.

BANQUET REMINISCENCES.

Reminiscences of the Borden banquet in the Toronto Star afford a glimpse of the capabilities of the Ministerial speakers who were present to do honor to their leader and are not without interest.

The reception to Hon. Mr. Doherty was perhaps, the most unique. When the ex-judge was introduced a fellow Irishman called for "three cheers for the Irish," which enabled the Minister of Justice to get away to a good start, and which he took full advantage of.

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American's Report On Canadian Fruit

Activities of Co-operative Industry Outlined in Interesting Form by Consular Official—36 Associations in Ontario—Combines Excluded Under Existing System—Organization as Yet Somewhat Loose.

The American consul at Kingston, Ont., has prepared an interesting report on Canadian Co-operative Fruit Associations, which contains much information that should be of interest to New Brunswick fruit growers.

There are 36 so-called co-operative fruit associations in Ontario. These may be divided roughly into three classes: Apple associations, shipping mainly to distant markets, and small fruit associations, concerned with shipping apples, pears, plums, peaches, cherries, berries, etc., to home and distant markets; and small fruit associations, engaged mainly in shipping berries to home markets.

The Forest Fruit Growers' Association is one of the best examples of a simple form of organization. It is a truly co-operative. There is no share capital and the deposits of buyers are deposited upon for working capital.

The new bylaws were read and discussed and some amendments made. J. F. Gregory stated that some time ago, Hon. J. D. Hasek had promised the association a grant. The general elections had put it off for a time, but he hoped to be able to secure the grant now that political affairs had settled down again.

The secretary further said that all the members of the different departments to whom he had spoken were willing to help the association in these matters, and it was probable that all the streams in which fishing is good would receive proper attention. This season nine cases of dipping scabies into streams had been reported, and in this case the mill owners had been compelled to either burn the sawdust or remove it beyond the reach of the trout. Secretary Gero said that he had approached the Hon. J. K. Fleming on matters of this kind, and that when the premier comes to this city at the end of the month, they will be definitely settled.

SCHOOL TRUSTEES IN MONTHLY SESSION

Committee on Penny Savings Banks so Far Unable to Confer with Local Government - Other Matters.

The monthly meeting of the board of school trustees was held last evening in the board's rooms. Chairman R. B. Emerson presided and those present were Trustees Russell, Agar, Day, Smith, Mrs. Dever, Mrs. Skinner, T. H. Bullock, Coll, Nase, C. B. Lockhart, Supt. Bridges, Secy. Leavitt and Trust Officer McLean. Considerable routine business was transacted and a number of communications dealt with. Following the adoption of the minutes of the preceding meeting applications for positions on the teaching staff were received from Miss Mary Coy, Miss M. Killorn, Miss Agatha Shannon, J. Kerr Higgins, of Campbellton. The applications were filed to be dealt with by the teachers committee. A number of communications were received by the board. Among the letters received was one from the teacher of the school on Partridge Island, informing the board of the insufficiency of the supply of fuel for the heating of the school. The matter was left to the superintendent to deal with. Miss Ferrill, of St. Vincent school, and Thomas Powers of the High School, made application for increase of salary, the matter being referred to the committee. The St. John teachers' association wrote the board asking that inasmuch as a former request for an increase of \$30 for female teachers over four years in the service of the board had been only partially met, the board would provide for the other half of the increase in making the estimate for the year 1912. On motion of Trustee Russell a small committee was named consisting of J. V. Russell, Mr. Coll and T. H. Bullock with Supt. Bridges to take up the matter of increases in salaries and report to the teachers committee so as to simplify and accelerate the work. Col. H. H. McLean in a communication to the board asked an option to purchase some property leased by him from the board, and asking the price at which that body would sell. This was referred to the finance committee for consideration. Chairman Emerson reported relative to the establishment of the penny savings banks in the schools, and the committee appointed for the purpose had been unable to arrange a meeting with the local government to place the matter before the government, and secure legislation empowering the board to proceed with the establishment of the banks. Owing to changed conditions it was deemed advisable by the board to revise the regulations relative to the duties of janitors in the school buildings and a committee consisting of Supt. Bridges, Trustee Coll, and Sec-

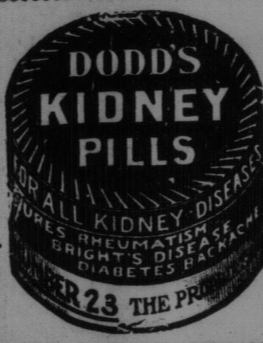

SUCCESSFUL SEASON'S WORK AT THE ST. JOHN SALMON POND

Artificial Culture of Fish Conducted on Extensive Scale and Better Results Obtained than Under Natural Conditions--Government Asked to Establish Another Hatchery on St. John River.

The Dominion government's retaining pond for salmon at Little River has just completed its season's work and operations have been attended with great success. In addition to providing a full supply of eggs for the salmon hatchery at Grand Falls, the capacity of which has recently been increased from 2,000,000 to about 3,500,000 eggs, the St. John retaining pond has supplied 1,700,000 to the hatchery at Charlottetown, P. E. I. The special object for which the retaining pond was established here is to supply eggs for the hatcheries and thus assist in the work of increasing by artificial propagation the supply of salmon in the rivers in the province and particularly in the St. John river and its tributaries. It is understood that those most interested in angling have been asking the government to establish another hatchery on the headquarters of the St. John and it is believed that the department of fisheries looks with considerable favor on the proposition.

Beats Nature. When salmon culture was first begun in this province, the results were not very encouraging, but as the work has progressed new processes have been developed, and it is now fully demonstrated that artificial propagation gives much better results than are obtained under natural conditions. Scientific and practical observers declare that under natural conditions not more than 25 per cent. of the eggs deposited on the spawning grounds by the salmon are ever hatched, while by the methods of artificial propagation at least 80 per cent. of the eggs taken from the salmon are successfully hatched and turned drift in the rivers as young fry.

Perhaps a few statements in regard to the conditions which salmon have to contend with under natural conditions may be of interest. In the St. John river there is a drawback at the outlet, arising from the fact that there is a big difference between the number of males and the number of females. In other rivers the proportion is about equal, but here 70 per cent. are males as against 30 per cent. of females. So far neither the scientist nor the practical observer, has been able to determine whether or not salmon are polygamous. What is known for certain is that during the spawning season the fish pair off, the male making the bed in which the female deposits the eggs, and they together stand by for several days to protect the bed. Then they leave for the deep pools in the river, there to remain till the next spring, when they leave for the sea, with the yearlings or young fish of the previous year's hatching.

The Spawning Grounds. The place selected by the salmon for spawning is generally a gravel bar, and what is considered a good spot by one pair will naturally seem attractive to another pair. It often happens that a second pair will destroy the bed of the first pair, and a third pair destroy the bed of the second, and so on, thus dispersing the eggs which are then devoured by the voracious trout and other fish waiting about during the spawning season. It is estimated that in many cases two-thirds of the eggs deposited are often destroyed in this way.

Supposing that the eggs have not been disturbed by other pairs and that they have been properly impregnated, which is not always the case, there are many other things which may prevent them reaching maturity. A gravel bar is subject to shifting, and when the spring freshets come, ice or log jams may tear the beds to pieces long before the eggs are ready to hatch, and it is quite possible that none of the eggs on that bar may ever develop into fry.

The eggs hatch out in the spring when the water begins to get warm, the temperature of the water being an important matter. Eggs hatch out 30 days earlier in P. E. I. than at Grand Falls.

Artificial Propagation. Artificial propagation is not subject to such vicissitudes as characterize the wasteful ways of nature. The fish are caught in the mouths of river and safely cared for in the retaining pond until the spawning time comes round; whereas if not caught for this purpose they might be captured for the table, otherwise destroyed before they could reach the spawning grounds up the river. As the spawning season draws near the condition of the fish is carefully noted, so that those in charge of the work may know just when to commence operation, and prevent the fish dropping their eggs in the pond. This year the officials at the pond commenced stripping the salmon on the 23rd of October, and only caught 15 fish on that day which were not ripe for expressing their eggs.

In the early days of artificial propagation taking the eggs from the females involved a great deal of labor, and was not always attended with success. Originally the operators when the fish were caught wrapped a wet cheesecloth around the head of the fish in order to hold it, a method of handling which often resulted in the death of the fish before it was delivered of the eggs. But now a device for holding the fish, invented by the late Chas. McCuskey, superintendent of the Grand Falls hatchery is used, and the work is carried on with little difficulty, and practically no harm to the fish. This device consists of a sort of tray in which the fish can easily be held while the operator is removing or expressing the eggs.

Tender hearted people visiting the retaining pond and watching the operation of removing the eggs frequently ask whether the fish is not injured by the process. But the general opinion now is that an expert operator, the merely assists nature, and that the fish are not harmed by their treatment.

After the eggs are taken from the female they are placed in a receptacle and artificially fertilized. Then they are placed in percolated trays and arranged in a tank of running fresh water and allowed to stand for several hours, or until the eggs have become hardened and all foreign substance has been washed away. They are then carefully packed in cases, surrounded by moss and shipped to the hatcheries, fresh water being poured over them every two hours during transit. From year to year up to five years the salmon in our rivers showed a notable depletion, but since artificial propagation was started there has been a very notable increase in the number of salmon using our rivers, and the runs in some recent years have been very large.
