





The Eastern Trust Company on behalf of a client, applied for an option on the Municipal Home property for the sum of \$75,000, the option to be taken up on November 1st, 1913. The company undertook to pay \$25,000 when it took up the option, \$25,000 in May, and \$25,000 on November 1st, 1914.

Coun. Agar said the price offered was ridiculous. He moved that the offer be declined.

Coun. McLellan recalled that the council had turned down his motion to give the Bastern Trust Company an option for \$150,000. Also that it refused a lawyer an option for \$152,500. He held the council was responsible for the depreciation in the valuation of the property and again supported the offer of the Eastern Trust Company. Within an hour they had had an admission that the Norton Griffiths Company did not want the Municipal Home property. Property fluctuated in value; other properties out there had depreciated in value.

Coun. Agar said up to a few months ago they had taken a pride in the Municipal Home. It was only recently they had discovered that the building was in a state of decay. He felt that the councillors should seriously consider the effect the acceptance of the offer would have upon the people. Coun. McLellan said he felt he represented as much sentiment in St. John as did Coun. Agar. He was not worried about the effect upon the people. He thought they would hold the councillors responsible for the loss of \$75,000.

Continuing Coun. McLellan said Coun. Agar was not conversant with conditions at the Home. Its position

Coun. Agar saw no reason to get panicky; the Home was still a good one. He had considered the price of \$150,000 offered by the Eastern Trust Company a fairly good one, but felt they would not have been justified in tying up the property for six months for \$1.00. That was all the money the Eastern Trust Company put up.

Coun. Schofield said the parties who wanted the Home no doubt intended to sell it. The county could afford to hold on to the property, and wait for better prices.


