From Egypt we learn that there has

been a series of sharp engagements which

prove that Arabi's forces are not such

contemptible foes as was at one time

generally supposed. General Wolsey has

been resolved to operate chiefly from the

line of the canal, and having gathered a

large force and ample supplies at Ismailia,

began to advance. The battle which took

place near the canal when the Highland

regiment, supported by the artillery

of the gumbaste, drove the body of

Egyptians from an entrenched position,

gave further proof that the enemy would

fight, although they could not long with-

stand an English force, even inferior in

numbers. Compelled to move to the

sweet water canal in order to prevent the

supply of water for his men being cut off,

General Wolsey found his advance op-

posed by considerable bodies of Egyp-

tians, who seldom came to close quarters,

and who were invariably driven back

after some hours fighting. The accounts

of the loss of the British in these fights

seem almost incredible. On Thursday

and Friday last week, the body of

Englishmen who were killed, were

counted. A program dated Ismailia,

August 24th, says:—

"At the outset of the fight we were

under very heavy fire, especially from

the Egyptian left. The 5th and 6th

regiments in skirmishing order, as

they were ordered to do, were
