

TELEGRAPHIC.

Paris, June 6.
Another attempt upon the life of the Emperor Louis Napoleon was made to day, while he was returning from a grand review in Champs Elysees, which took place this afternoon in honor of his Imperial visit to the Czar of Russia, who accompanied him.
A shot was fired at the carriage by some person in the crowd, fortunately neither of the Emperors was injured.
The incident created great excitement and confusion for a time which was however soon quieted when it was found that the intended assassination had failed. Up to this time the assassin had not been arrested but he cannot long escape.

Dublin, June 6.
The Fenians who were arrested a few days since while attempting a landing in Dungarven, County Waterford, say that they were from Boston Massachusetts.

London, June 6.
Lord Russ chief secretary for Ireland, announced in the House of Commons to night that the sentences of all the convicted Fenians have been commuted.

Frederickton, June 6.
In the Assembly the first thing done this morning was to refer the Bill to incorporate the St. Andrews Deep Sea, Wilmot and Railway Company. Progress was reported.

Steven introduced a Bill relating to Grammar, Superior and Parish Schools, also a Bill relating to St. Stephen Branch Railway.

The rest of the day was occupied in discussing in Committee of the whole, the Government Bill introduced by Mr. Tilley, to give further aid to Western Extension to the extent of \$300,000, the Province to take stock to that amount, and providing for a subsidy of \$5,000 a mile, for 3 1/2 miles of a railroad towards Houlton. The Bill was strenuously supported by Messrs. Tilley, Gray, Skinner, Wilmot, Wilmot, Chandler, Dow, Beckwith, Ryan, Lewis, W. P. Flewelling and Lindsay, on the Government side, and by Messrs. Smith and McQueen from the Opposition.

June 7.
After a lengthy debate, Surveyor General got before the House a motion refused yesterday, to take up in committee, two days hence a petition for aid to Woodstock Bridge Company.

Protracted discussion took place on a bill to extend Jail limits in York.

Mr. Wilmot moved an amendment extending provision of bill to all other Counties.

Messrs. Smith, Stevens, Cook, Kerr, and others opposed the former moving an additional section that operations of bill shall extend only to contracts hereafter made.

Amendments both carried by vote of 17 to 12, and bill passed.

A messenger from the Legislative Council submitted a Bill agreed to, incorporating the British and American Telegraph Company, and asking the concurrence of the Lower Branch.

SOUND ADVICE.—The New York Albion offers some very sound advice to American newspapers who are deriding the efforts of Colonists to bring out Colonial Union. It says—

"In behalf of this prosperous, rising, free and eminently fortunate people of British North America, we would say to our over-anxious American Cousins—'Bestow your sympathies and counsel your own disfranchisement, discreditation, and despising countrymen, who are now lying prostrate at the feet of not only youthful, but irresponsible and experienced military commanders—whose word is law, till another order is issued from these quarters. Confer your criticism upon your own self-willed despots of high places in your own land; but forbear further mistatement in reference to your neighbors, until you can, at least, comprehend the spirit of freedom and good government. The very foundation of these cherished liberties the Northern Provinces are determined to perpetuate on this continent, and before the close of the present century there may possibly be other communities on this continent desirous of joining the stable and well-governed Dominion of Canada.'"

Reception of Mr. Cartier.

Ottawa, May 25.
Hon. Mr. Cartier arrived here this afternoon. The band of the 10th Regiment was in attendance, and played "La Claire Fontaine." His Worship the Mayor, on behalf of the corporation and the president and vice president of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, tendered him a cordial welcome. The Mayor then presented him with an address, congratulating himself and colleagues on the consummation of Confederation. He referred to the cordial reception Mr. Cartier had met with at Montreal, and spoke of him as a friend of Union, a promoter of loyalty, and the representative of national and religious tolerance. An address was also on behalf of St. Jean Baptiste Society. Mr. Cartier responded, in French and English, remarking that if any city of the new Dominion would receive an increase of prosperity by the confederation of the Provinces, it was Ottawa. He said Confederation would not merely accomplish the union of Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, but the measure had in contemplation to bring into the Union the great North-West and Hudson's Bay Territory, and the British Colonies on the Pacific. All the trade from the Atlantic to the Pacific should pass this city through the noble channel of the Ottawa, as should the trade from the Pacific to the Atlantic. Ottawa was yet only in the beginning of its prosperity. In reply to the

address from the St. Jean Baptiste Society, he remarked that although separated by Confederation from their countrymen in Lower Canada, they would still be glad to recognize the efforts of every Lower Canadian patriot. There were also French Canadians inhabiting Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, who heretofore had not the advantage of intimate communication with their fellow countrymen of Lower Canada as the people of Ottawa had. They would now be brought into that Association. He was glad to learn that they had adopted the motto of always being on good terms with their neighbors; but he hoped they would not be behind them in any good work. Mr. Cartier, the Mayor, G. E. Desbarats, Esq. (Queen's printer), the President of the St. Jean Baptiste Society and Mr. Currier, M. P., then stepped into a carriage and moved off; the bells of the Cathedral were then rung, and as the carriage passed the nursery, the pupils appeared on the balcony, and three of the younger pupils presented Mr. Cartier with a bouquet. He was then accompanied by a large number to his residence on Victoria terrace.

Public Documents.

The annual Report of the Postmaster General for 1866 is before us, and is made up with much care. The Hon. J. McMillan not only understands, but performs his duty. Several new mail routes have been opened in districts which have not hitherto enjoyed the privilege of Post Offices, and the number of trips increased. The Postmaster General recommends some improvements which will meet with the unanimous approval of the Public. Among them we may mention a reduction in letter postage between the United States and the Province from 10 to 5 cents; a reduction has already been made in postage of books, pamphlets, &c. He also suggests that "all mail matter must be prepaid by Postal Stamps," this suggestion is based on the fact that from the returns compiled in his office, he finds that "80 per cent. of the correspondence passing through the Post is prepaid. He gives other cogent reasons for the principle being adopted, and observes that "the experience of other countries goes to show that a low rate of postage has invariably increased the revenue."

The CROWN LAND REPORT for the past year has also been received. The Surveyor General Hon. C. Connell has undoubtedly given the public a vast amount of information, going back for some years, showing the amount of lands sold, and he makes some capital suggestions respecting the future management of the public domain. The Report also contains the rules for the government of the Crown Land Department, an excellent Map showing in colours the ungranted lands in the several Counties. The total receipts for 1866 were \$41,031.07, being an increase over 1865 of \$18,434.55. The mileage on timber lands which is now \$4 per square mile Mr. Connell believes might be safely increased, and he proposes to repeal the credit system. Under the Labor Act 449 persons had applied and were approved to settle under the Act in this Province. Several suggestions are made which we cannot notice at present.

The AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT is made up with much care, and shows how "the money goes."

The Chief Commissioner of Public Works—the Chief Superintendent of Schools, and the Militia Reports for 1866, have also been received, and will be noticed in future issues. On glancing over the Adjutant General's Report, we were surprised to notice, that no mention is made of Col. Anderson, his services, or his able reports, as Governor Gordon termed them.

THE LEGISLATURE

Is drawing to a close. Several Bills have been passed; an important one, to extend the Jail limits to the full extent of each County in the Province, passed in the House on the 7th inst. Its provisions do not extend to any debts heretofore made or at present existing. The Bill to close up the old burying grounds in this place has also become law.

The Revenue Bill introduced by the Provincial Secretary has also passed; the duty on certain articles required by our manufacturers, has been removed, placing them on an equal footing with those of other parts of the Dominion in foreign markets. The duty on tea, alcohol, and some other articles has been increased, so as to assimilate our tariff with Canada.

The old Bankrupt Act with amendments has been revived; and a Bill providing all trials of civil suits before Magistrates, take place in the Parish where the plaintiff and defendant reside, has been agreed to; this will answer the ends of justice better than the former practice.

The Western Extension Bill also passed a third reading.

Several of these Bills passed the Council, and will receive the Administrator of the Government's assent this week.

The bill introduced by Mr. Chandler to repeal the Act relieving the port of St. Stephen from export duty on lumber passed the House on Monday by a large majority, only four voting against it.

Since the above telegram was received, the debate has reached us, and we can only this morning give the following extracts:—

The mover argued the case in favor of repeal on the ground of fair play to other portions of Charlotte County and the whole Province. As was expected Mr. Stevens opposed the Bill with a great deal of ability and fluency; but the best speech and the best arguments in favor of the repeal was made by Mr. Hibbard, who went very fully into the statistics connected with the manufacture and exportation of lumber on the St. Croix and in other portions of Charlotte. Mr. McAdam replied. He said that very very little of the lumber cut and shipped at the port of St. Stephen is taken from Crown lands. It is nearly all cut upon private property, and the most that is not taken from private property on the English side is cut on the American side. He expressed himself, however, as opposed to the Export Duty entirely, but favored a stampage even if it made a dollar a thousand. He said that one of the reasons used for the repeal of the law, viz. that lumber brought down the St. Andrews and Woodstock Railway, which should be shipped at St. Andrews, is now taken to St. Stephen over the branch railway, is fallacious. But a very small quantity of lumber can be brought that way until the Woodstock Branch Railway is built.

Mr. McAdam now stated a fact to the House, although it could hardly be called a legitimate argument in favor of the Bill,—that if the Act be repealed his firm will be the only one that will be called upon to pay the export duty.

Mr. Hibbard made his closing argument, in which he showed that while the Seaside lumbermen cut on the streams of Charlotte County and drive their timber to St. Stephen, and ship it there free of duty, the St. George operators, who cut on the same streams, and ship at St. George, have to pay a shilling a thousand and export duty, besides port charges. Last year ten millions of lumber passed down the St. Andrews Railway and paid duty at St. Andrews. This year there is every likelihood that this lumber and four or five millions more cut at McAdam's mill on the River will run to St. Stephen by the Branch Railway to be shipped there free of duty.

Mr. Stevens, seeing that there was every probability of the Bill being carried, and that the fact that lumber brought down on the Branch Railway is shipped free of duty, as well as that floated down the river St. Croix, was one of the strongest arguments in favor of passing the Bill, moved that the provisions of the existing Act shall apply only to lumber cut on the St. Croix River.

The question was thus taken on Mr. Stevens' amendment and it was lost by a large majority. The Bill afterwards passed through on division, only four voting against it.

It is commonly rumored here, that the Hon. John McAdam is to be Chief Commissioner of Works, an office for which he is well qualified. It is also reported that James G. Stevens Esq. and J. W. Chandler, Esq., have been offered County Judgeships. Should these reports be well founded, there will be two vacancies in the Legislature, and the people should be prepared to elect good men to fill them, as well to select a man for Ottawa.

THE LATE CAPT. STOOPE.—A tourist who visited the Cemetery at Richmond, Virginia, last month, states that he saw the grave of our former young townsman, Capt. John Stoop of C. S. A. heavy Artillery, who like others, yielded up his life in defence of the South,—the land of his adoption. Our young friend's grave has a handsome head stone, with his name, age, and date of his death cut on it, and an appropriate inscription. The grave is surrounded with violets, and is kept with care. On it was placed a handsome pitcher with a bouquet, which was beginning to wither. From this it appears that some fair unknown one, remembers our respected friend.

We notice that the new Episcopal Church is drawing towards completion; the arches are erected, the window frames and shingles are finished, and the building is expected to be ready for plastering within three weeks.

When finished it will be one of the finest Churches in the Province. We will notice it more fully in a few weeks.

By Cable despatch dated Dublin June 10, we learn that two prominent Fenians were arrested at Dungarvon who proved to be Cols. Nagle and Warren! The latter was on the lines during the attempted raid a year ago. These worthies are in safe keeping now.

The "modus operandi" of the hay-rake swindlers is ingenious, to say the least. They sell a right to a farmer for \$100 and take his note, on the agreement that if the buyer doesn't make \$200 in a year on his purchase, they will give up the note. This agreement is written across the back of the note and is signed by the swindler. Once out of sight, the swindler taking from his pocket a pair of scissors or a knife and trimming off the edges of the note, the back instantly separates from the front, for the piece of paper on which was written the agreement to return the note in one year if the farmer has not made any thing out of the sale of the article, was neatly fastened to the note itself in a scientific manner with mastic. Having thus freed the note from any incumbrance, he proceeds to the next farmer and gets it cashed or gives it in payment for a team of horses, carriage or what not. [Canadian paper.]

An English scientific paper describes a steel boat, which is to go in search of Dr. Livingstone. It will be built exclusively of steel and charcoal iron plates, one sixteenth of an inch in thickness. The heaviest of these sections will not weigh more than forty pounds. After boat can be taken to pieces and carried on the backs of negroes from one piece of water to another.
