TENDERS are hereby invited
that about January next, Tenders will be re-
ceived for the works connected with the construc-
tion of what is called the BAIE VERTE CANAL,
to connect the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St.
Lawrence.
Commencing near the outlet of the River An-
napolis, the line follows in a South Easterly direction
to a point between Tongue's Island and Port
Cumberland; then in a nearly direct course along
the valley of the Missisquoi to a place between
two Hamstead Lake, and Miner's Point; thence
curving round still further to the South East to
the Main Line of the Tidal River, near
Chapel's Farm, where it takes a North Easterly
direction to near the mouth of the river, and then
crosses Tidal Head in an Easterly course to
deep water in Bale Verte.
The works will be divided into Sections suited
to circumstances and the locality.
The outline of the route above indicated will
enable Contractors to examine the dry portions of
the line before winter sets in, and those parts
through bogs after the ground is sufficiently frozen.
To facilitate this examination, a Lithographic
map of the locality will be furnished on applica-

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the
Minister of Customs, and under the provisions
of the 4th Section of the Act passed in the
Session of the Parliament of Canada, held in
the 31st year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter
5, and intitled "An Act respecting the Customs"
His Excellency, by and with the advice of the
Queen's Privy Council of Canada, has been pleased
to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the
following item in Schedule C of Customs Tariff
Act as amended by the Act 37 Vic. cap. 6, viz:—
"Woods manufactured when chiefly used in
dyeing" be and the same is hereby declared to be
intended to apply to "Woods" used for the pur-
pose mentioned in the said item, which may be
imported free when simply ground or chipped as
well as in solid pieces or sticks, such grinding
and chipping not being considered such a manu-
facturing as would take the article out of the ex-
emption.

And it is further ordered, under the authority
aforesaid, that the item "Ratan for char makers"
mentioned in the said list of free goods (Schedule
C) be, and the same is hereby declared to be, in-
cluded to cover Ratan imported for ship manu-
factures.

PRESIDENT:
HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL,
IN COUNCIL.

On the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and under the provisions of the 13th clause of the "Fisheries Act," His Excellency has been pleased to make the following regulations:—

"In the Provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick no person shall, during the months of July and August, fish for catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession any soft-shelled lobsters or female lobsters with eggs attached, nor shall lobsters of a less size than nine inches in length, measured from head to tail, exclusive of claws or feelers, be at any time fished for, caught, killed, bought, sold or had in possession, but when caught by accident in nets or other fishing apparatus, or by the occupier of the fishery, on whom in every case shall devolve the proof of such actual liberation.

His Excellency has been pleased to cancel the fishery regulation established by Order in Council of the 7th day of July, 1873, having reference to the lobster fishery, and the same is hereby cancelled accordingly.

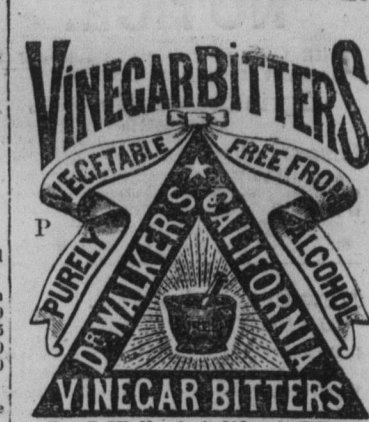
