ANOTHER STEAMSHIP TO BRING REMAINDER VIADIVOSTOK May 10—The steamship Empress of Japan sailed today with the balance of the 260 th battalion and details of a total of 700 men of all ranks.

TAXES RAISED BY HARD TIMES

Burden Is Lightest in Communities Boasting Live and Thriving Towns

(Copyright, 1917, Western Newspaper Union)
Taxes are always heavy—to the man who has to pay them—but taxes in some communities are much higher than in others. If you have ever stopped to investigate the matter you have discovered that the lowest taxes are found in the most prosper-

The prosperous community has the lowest taxes because there is a large amount of wealth in the community against which the taxes may be assessed. There are prosperous merchants with large stocks of goods upon which taxes are levied. Property values are high and there are thriving industries which pay a large proportion of the

The higher the property values and the greater the wealth of the community the lower are the tax levies, for a lower tax on each hundred dollars of valuation is required to produce the necessary revenue for the administration of the city and county

Other Taxes Are Raised On the other hand, take a dead town. Property values are low. Merchants' ks are small and they have little money in the bank. Industries which ordinarily pay a large part of the taxes of a community have closed down. There are vacant ngs which were formerly filled with stocks of merchandise upon which the owners paid heavy taxes. Who pays the taxes that were once paid by the merch the manufacturers, the bankers and the men who had large holdings of high-pred property! The taxes to conduct the city and county governments, to maintain the chools, to build and repair the roads must be collected from someone. Who pays them? The man who owns his little home or the vacant lot or two upon which been planning to build his home must pay double or triple the amount which he paid in the times when the town was prosperous, to make up for the taxes which are not paid now by the merchants, the bankers, the manufacturers and the big prop-

erty owners who bore the heaviest burdens of taxation when times were good.

The farmers in the country surrounding the town are also among the hea sufferers from the ebbing of the town's prosperity. A certain amount of money must be raised by taxation to provide for the expenses of the country. Roads must be built and kept in repair. Bridges must be built and maintained. Salaries of county officers County institutions for the care of the sick and the poor must be maintained. In counties which contain one or more thriving towns, a large proportion of the taxes for the county are paid by the towns. The greater the wealth of the towns and the higher the property valuations, the lower the tax levy for the entire county. When the tax levy is low the burden placed upon the farmer is light.

Burden Falls on Farmer When the county contains no prosperous and wealthy towns the greater part of the burden of taxation for the county falls upon the farmer. The value of the farmer's property does not fall in proportion to the value of the property in the town and the higher tax levy that results from the lower property values in the towns makes his

The farmer forgets at times that he is vitally interested in the prosperity of "his town." He thinks that it is up to the town to take care of itself and that it is up to him to take care of himself and he overlooks that fact that the prosperity of the town means as much to him as it does to those who live in it. The farmer who is inclined to overook this fact has only to think of the matter of taxes and he is likely to change his point of view for taxes are one thing that neither he nor anyone else can escape, and they are one thing in which the farmer ordinarily takes a very lively

now rarmer can ne. There is just one way in which the farmer can best promote prosperity in the town near which he lives and that is by spending his money in that town instead of sending it away to the far-distant city. Every time the farmer sends an order to a mail order house he helps to destroy the prosperity of his own community and to boost his own taxes. When he sends a dollar away from home he gets none of it back. When he spends a dollar at home, a part of that dollar comes back to him in some way. It helps the town where it is spent to provide a profitable market tor his products and it helps the town pay a large part of his taxes.

The farmer is the one man in the community, above all others, who should have no love for the mail order houses for they are doing more to add to his troubles than

There is an obligation upon all Canadians to buy domestic products, just as there is an obligation upon manufacturers to supply commodities equal in merit to those of foreign competitors. 





If the car has a tendency to swing to one side you will know that one brake fails to take hold. Unevenly adjusted brakes cause severe skids.

At this time of the year most persons have a natural hankering after salads and all sorts of succu-

The early Romans were particu-

The etaly Romans were particularly fond of asparagus, and during the time it was in season it was served daily as the principal dish. This plant is a native of Europe and is grown extensively over the entire continent. The roots are planted from six to ten inches below the level of the ground. The sprouts or the stalks are permitted to grow but three or four inches ablve the ground and then they are out and tied in bunches. The average length of tie a bed of as paragus requires to mature is about two gus requires to mature is about two years, and it will then produce good-sized spears for about seven

Asparagus is marketed under tw classifications, namely green and white. The green comes inall sizes and qualities varying from bright green to a greenish purple. The white is usually tinted purple especially the large sizes.

In new York ready sale for both varieties can be found, asparagus is abundant in valuable mineral elements. It is diuretie in its properties, and it acts freely upon the liver and kidneys. It is low infood value, but this can easily be overcomeby methods of preparing and serving this delicate, succulent vegetable. To co

To cook asparagus cut the tough pith ends, discarding them. Scrape lightly the remainder of the stalk to within four inches of the tip. Sash well in plenty of cold water to remove the sand. Tie inabunch and then place in a deep saucepan containing sufficient boiling water to cover the stalks half their depth. Cook until tender, usually about thirty minutes. Lift then ally about thirty minutes. Lift, then drain and serve with cream, hol-landaise or butter sauce. Asparagus should never be thrown

Asparagus should never be thrown loose in water to cook. Always stand it on end. This method steams the delicate tips withoutbreaking them. This will require a pot sufficiently deep so that the lid will not break the tips. Do not add soda or salt to the asparagus. Salt will jill, by neutralizing, the valuable mineral content. Measure and then add equal amounts of milk. To every two cupfuls of the above mixture add one tablespoonful of corn starch. Disolve the starch in cold liquid, placelon the stove and bring to a boil. Cook for five minutes. When ready to serve beat in one teaspoonful of butter, one-half teaspoonful of finely chopped parsley to every two cupfuls. Serve with oasted corn bread. Two cupfuls of asparagus cut in one-inch pieces; one small onion, grated; pepper, mincedfineline;..., two tablespoonful of vinegar; one teaspoonful of salt; one teaspoonful of paprika. Place in a bowl and toss gently to mix. Xerveon a bed of crisp lettuce with mayonnaise dressing.

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



HUNGER YEAR IN

Crops Failed: Half-Starved Children Dying - Raw Potatoes - Wolves Almost Annihilated Deer

Almost Annihilated Deer

How many in Canada know the real history of the "Hunger Year"? The late Henry Ruttan, Esq., in an address once gave his experiences of the great hunger strike of 1790, he says: "I remember the time when, as Bishop Berkeley observes, a man might be the owner of ten thousand acres of land in America and want sufficient means to buy himself a breakfast. One-half of the land in the Bay of Quinte, the garden of Canada, could, within my remembrance, have been purchased for five pounds a two-hundred-acrelot. All this cannot be a matter of wonder when I tell you that a great scarcity of provisions prevalled for two or three years consecutively, in sonsequence of failures in the crops and what brought on the famine or learney ever (about the year 1790, if am not mistaken), was the almost entire destruction of the deer by the wolves in two consecutive years. The prown in two consecutive years. The prown in the ground from Derember until April at the depth of four to five feet.

Horses Were Eaten

"In the month of February of the last of these years, a near-relative of mine sent all the way to Albany in New York State, more than 200 miles, for four baskets of Indian corn. And this was brought all that distance by iwo men on snowshoes. It took them shout eight weeks to accomplish this journey. The few cattle and even lorses which the settlers had collected at great trouble, were killed for load. The faithful dog was, in several instances, sacrificed."

Children Almost Starved

Another resident of the Bay of Quinte district tells of a farmer in Adolphustown, who planted the potato syes and peelings, and adds that some children were so hungry that they lug up the pieces of raw potato and the them, to the great detriment of the succeeding year's crop. But Providence about the year 1791, and about leven years after, began to assume a somewhat milder aspect. The wolves in their turn became a prey to the famine which their own devastation among the deer had caused.



## PEOPLE OF GERMANY **OPPOSED TO SIGNING**

REPORT CLAIMS THAT MASSES

REPORT CLAIMS THAT MASSES ARE FOR REJECTING PROPOSALS NO MATTER WHAT COMES.
BERLIN Thursday May 9—The people, though fairly stricken dumb by the peace terms are now recovering sufficiently to declare that Germany cannot and will not sign the compact, no matter what comes strikes are increasing and Bolshevism and the Spartacan uprising of the past two months have in anything made Germany immune to the possible

two months have in anything made Germany immune to the possible horrors which are to be anticipated if they are again plunged into war-according to the best opinion here.

There exists a small group of Germans, chiefly Conservatives who prefer to see the entente occupy the whole country than to have it Bolshevik but they are in the dwindling minority.

The Parliamentary leaders of all factions who are in Berlin to attend committee meetings admit that they were stunned by the severity of the proposed peace terms. Beyond casual comment however, they declined to discuss the entents's conditions or



# How Returned Men Can **Become Farmers**

EVERY returned man who wants to become a farmer and is qualified for that vocation can get real, practical help through the Soldier Settlement Board.

The Government's programme

(1) The securing of land.

(2) The loaning of capital needed to purchase equipment and live stock, and erect build-

(3) Agricultural training and farm supervision.

### The Loans Granted

Loans may be approved by the Loan Advisory Committee, cording to the needs of the settler, on the following basis:-

(1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land.

(2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase of live stock, implements and other equipment.

(3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of buildings and other permanent improvements.

The first and third are repayable in twenty-five equal annual instalments: the second in four equal annual instalments beginning the third year, no interest being charged for the first two years.

On all these loans the low interest rate of five per cent, will be charged. A cash payment of ten per cent. of the purchase price will be required on the land-but this may be waived by the Board in special

Qualified settlers on Dominion lands may secure loans up to a maximum of \$3,000 on a plan similar to the above for farm equipment, live stock, and erection of buildings, provided security offered justifies the loan.

### To Whom Granted

To be entitled to these privileges a man must have served with an honourable record in the Canadian Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war or outside of the country in which he enlisted (service in U.S. or Bermuda not included). Others eligible are:


