Serious Spanish Military Outbreak. MADRID, Nov. 21 .- A serious military outbreak occurred during the mobalizing o 5,000 reserves at Getafe, a town eight miles south of this city. Some of the troops re volted and the civic guard was called upon quell the disturbance. This they sough o. but the mutinous reserves turned o to do, but the mutmous reserves turned on them and fought desperately. A number of the civic guards were injured. It was finally found necessary to call out the regular cavalry and infantry to restore order. The reserves were being mobilized because of the drafts made upon the egular troops in consequence of the trouble

Disastrous Results of an Earthquake. London, Nov. 21 .- A special dispatch from Meshed brings further details of the earthquake that occurred Friday at Kueearthquake that occurred Friday at Kuehan, in the northern part of the Province of Khorassan. The town was completely destroyed and the loss of life was immense. Great cravasses were opened in the earth, through which water flowed in torrents, causing the Atrek River to overflow its banks. The fertile region around the city was inundated, and the large gardens and extensive vineyards were swept out of existence.

The people of Kuchan had no chance to The people of Kuchan had no chance to save anything. The shock was so severe that the largest houses in the town, including the residence of the Governor, were almost instantly toppled over, crushing hundreds of people to death. The town had a population of between 20,000 and 25,000 persons, and it is thought that at least 10,000 perished. Many persons were carried away by the flood that flowed down the valley. It is not known yet what damago was done in the valley, but it is feared that many of the villages below Keuhan have been destroyed.

Addresses Another Big Raily in the Wellington Street Methodist Church.

If home is wretched with want, harsh words and fault-finding always in the ascendant, the children will invariably spend many hours out of it, and are often compelled to associate with denraved persons of both acres. Lord Shattsbury once stated at a public meeting in London that from personal observation of adult criminals in that city nearly all had fallen into a course of crime between the ages of 8 and 16, and if a bay lived an honest life up to the age of 20 years there were 499 chances in his favor and only one against him.

He came home late Saturday night after an absence of two weeks, and early yesterday the neighbors knew he had arrived. He was noisy with drink, and oursed the wife and her daughter. Early in the afternoon the child Anna went to church, and an hour after she had gone Charles Ebbit, who lives on the floor above, heard screams of pain and a man's loud voice teiling her to keep quiet.

He ran to the roem, and seeing the woman writhing and the bostle's label told Caston to go for a doctor. He only cursed. Finally an ambulance was called and the woman taken to the hospital. She and the little boy both declared that Caston had compelled her to drink the carbolic acid.

The neighbors said yesterday that the woman was constantly beaten and abused by her husband. "Poor thing," said one of them, "she wanted to die, but feared for her child. It's hard to leave all one loves to this cold world's clarity."

Not only has the grea strike resulted in loss to the mine owners and to the miners, but it has adversely affected every industry, and no doubt is responsible for much of the dullness of trade that has been recently reported from Great Britain. Taking the question of wages, about 280,000 miners came out or were locked out. The Asylum and the Churches.

The Asylum and the Churches.

During the last Ontario elections a leading opponent of Sir Oliver Mowat told a public meeting that while the Protestant elergy had to conduct worship in the Asylum for the Insane without remueration the Roman Catholic priests were paid for their services. This statement was brought under the notice of Dr. Sippl, the bursar at the institution, the official who pays out all moneys, and he at once gave it an unqualified denial. It was hard to overtake the untrath, however, after it once got legs. For months afterwardshet ADVERTISER had queries addressed to it as to the truthfulness of the allegation of the mischief makers. This year the charge of favoritism looms up in a new shape, but none the less fill-founded. A Jarvis correspondent asks us if it is true, as stated by a P. P. A. lecturer at that place, that while Roman Catholic priests and nuns are taken to the Asylum for the Insane to hold services with the unfortunate inmates who are adherents of their faith, the Protestant clergy have to go there at their own expense. Dr. Sippi says the statement is a falsehood. Religious services, he points out, are held by the Protestant clergy every Sunday in the year, and a cub is always sent for them. A Roman Catholic priest holds a service at the asylum once every two weeks, along with a small choir, which, it is explained, is necessary for the saying of The Asylum and the Churches. weeks, along with a small choir is explained, is necessary for the mass. For the conveyance of testant clergy \$2 is paid every \$1 the conveyance of the priest tendants \$3 is paid every of These payments, Dr. Sippi expla the religious bodies. There have been no complaints of unfairness on the part of an

complaints of unfairness on the part of any of the denominations.

Dr. Sippi is borne out by Rev. Dr. Antliff, who told an Advertiser representative that he has been uniformly very cordially received. He had always been furnished with a conveyance, and had never found any difficulty in that regard. Identical testimony to this is supplied by a clergyman of the Church of England, who volunteered the information that he could speak for his brethren on the point. Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presbyterian Church, indorsed this view, and added that no complaint of any favoritism had ever, to his knowledge, been made to the Ministerial Association. Rev. Ira Smith, of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, says he has always met with the kindliest and most considerate attention from the authorities, who invariably placed a cab at his service when his turn to conduct worship at the asylum came. All those interviewed were astonished to find that anyone, far making allegations against the asylusauthorities so unfounded.
