There is much speculation as to what will be the fate of Cuba after the war now in progress has been brought to a close. The declared intention of the United States President is that Spain shall be driven from the "Pearl of the Antilles," and that the people of Cuba shall then be permitted to rule themselves-presumably as a republic. That is the desire of the Cuban Junta and of Gomez, the commander of the patriot Cuban forces, too. But is it not possible that the conflict will be of such a nature that our neighbors may find an excuse for carrying out the intense desire of many of them-that Cuba shall become part and parcel of the United States?

It is on record that again and again the United States has endeavored to Money Raised by Sewer Deget possession of the historic island. During the presidency of Jefferson, the Cubans sent a delegation to Washington, asking that the island be annexed to the United States. At that time Spain was under the yoke of France, and it was strongly believed in the United States that France was about to evercome Great Britain as the sea power. Therefore Jefferson declined to accede to the request of his visitors. After the annexation of Texas, President Polk offered to buy Cuba from Spain for \$100,000,000, but the offer was declined. Then filibustering expeditions attempted to steal the island, and President Taylor found it very difficult to restrain them.

A most remarkable attempt to get possession of Cuba by purchase was made by President Pierce in 1854. 




