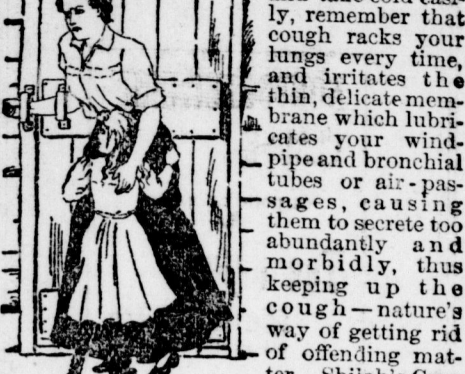

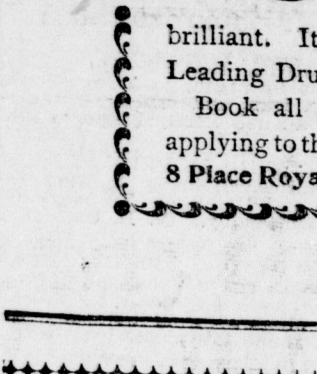

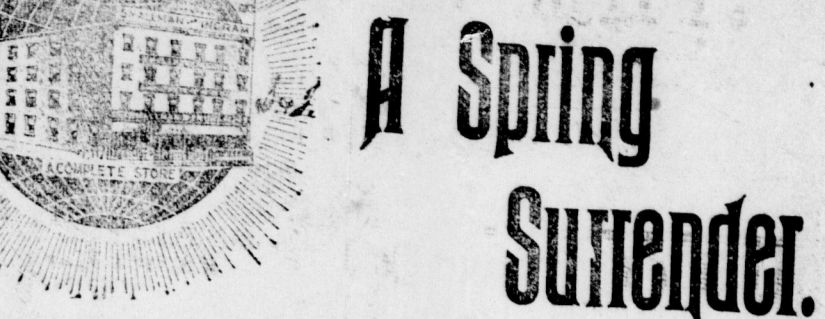

Capture of a Mail Steamer With Spanish Officers, Soldiers and Ammunition on Board.

Unconfirmed Report That Manila Has Been Captured by the U. S. Fleet. THE BOMBARDMENT OF MANILA. London, May 3.—A special dispatch from Madrid says the Spanish colonial office had advised of the beginning of the bombardment of Manila, before the cable was cut, which said: Thus far the American shells have not reached the town proper, which is strongly protected. Continuing, the office said: Only the outlying quarters have suffered. They are now in flames. Occasionally a shell fell in the European town, where a few houses were struck. The batteries of the citadel, especially the six large guns, are vigorously replying to American fire, which has inflicted considerable damage on the fleet.

FOR ONLY A FEW HOURS. London, May 3.—A Madrid dispatch says: The Spanish cabinet and the cabinet of the queen regent have agreed that the cabinet will continue in session. Senator Salmeron will give notice that he will interpose a resolution on the subject of the Philippine Islands, and Premier Sagasta will reply, voting the intentions of the cabinet government to pursue the war to the bitter end.

SHORT OF MONEY.

The Spanish officials say that when Commodore Dewey demanded the surrender of the Spanish guns, torpedoes, etc., Gov. Gen. Augustin replied: "Come and take them!" The second Spanish squadron, a Cruz de Azules, consisting of the warships Polaris, Albatross, and Victoria, has nearly completed its preparations for the Philippines. It is reported, however, that great difficulty is experienced in fitting out the ships, owing to a lack of money.

BUCKET SHOP STORY THAT MANILA HAS FALLEN.

New York, May 3.—A Wall Street news agency sends out the following: "Hong Kong—Manila has fallen. The Stars and Stripes wave over the Philippines." It is an event of enormous international importance. I should not be surprised if the German Emperor were to be spurred to some startling action by the prospect of his dream of possession of the Philippine Islands being realized by the American triumph. He has a brother-in-law in command, and we may hear of some significant move on the part of that squadron within a day or two. I don't believe he can sit still in the face of such a blow to his most cherished hopes.

CUBANS CAN ENLIST.

Senator Proctor has introduced a bill permitting Cubans to enlist in the American army during the Spanish war. The bill also permits the president to accept the services of Cuban independent volunteer troops, and to muster them into the military service of the United States for a period of not less than one month nor more than two years. There is also a provision depriving those serving under this law of the benefit of the pension laws of the United States.

EFFECTS OF THE VICTORY.

Washington, May 8.—The general opinion among prominent members of the administration is that the naval victory at Manila is not only highly important itself, but that it will have a very decided influence among the nations of Europe, which may ultimately result in their united action in forcing Spain to an early relinquishment of the impossible task of compelling the United States to change its course with respect to Cuba.

INVASION OF CUBA.

New York, May 8.—War department officials state that the invasion of Cuba has been put off until the whereabouts of the Spanish fleet has been definitely ascertained. The army now at Tampa is in perfect condition, as far as equipment and supplies are concerned, and all are anxious to begin the actual warfare. Preparations for the organization of the large volunteer army of 125,000 men are now completed.

AN ITALIAN VIEW—END OF THE WAR IN SIGHT.

New York, May 8.—A special cable dispatch to the World from Rome says: At the railway station, commenting on the Manila fight with Under Secretary Palumbo and others, Admiral Brin, minister of marine, said: "The Spaniards have thus effectively proved their unpreparedness. The conclusion of the war is now within sight. The Spaniards may cheerfully continue to receive a fresh beating in Cuban waters, but the superiority of Anglo-Saxon seamanship is too noted to leave any doubt of the early results."

Bayamo Abandoned SPANIARDS WITHDRAW FROM AN IMPORTANT CUBAN TOWN.

Montego Bay, Jamaica, via Kingston, Jamaica, May 8.—General Pando, the commander of the Spanish forces in the field, withdrew the Spanish garrison from Bayamo, one of the important towns of the province of Santiago de Cuba, on April 25, and refugees who have arrived here from Manzanillo, the port of Bayamo, by the schooner Governor Blake, says General Claxio Garlo (the insurgent commander), occupied the town the next day. Bayamo, or San Salvador, is situated about 60 miles northwest of the Bay of Santiago de Cuba. It has a population of about 7,000 in time of peace. There is knowing what its population is at present.
