Runaway Elevator Carries Man to Bottom of Coves Shipload of Laborers Bound for Mexico

James Steele Has Narrow Escape From Drowning-Saved by Presence of Mind.

Mr. James Steele, manager of the Crystal Lake Ice Company, had a narrow escape from drowning at the Coves yesterday. Presence of mind alone saved him from an untimely

Mr. Steele was engaged with a number of others erecting an elevator for hauling ice from the cove to the storage, and after the other workmen had gone to dinner at 12 o'clock, he remained to complete some minor details to the slide. The elevator was at the top of the inchne, and Mr. Steele was standing directly in front of it when it broke away from its moorings and started down the shaft at a rapid rate of speed. Mr. Steele did not have time to get clear of the apparatus, which carried him down through an opening in the ice to the bottom of the pond.

Although the elevator worked its way into the mud for some distance it did not hold Mr. Steele prisoner, However, it was only with some difficulty that the latter extricated himself. Allowing 22 miles for the ferry and 414 miles to London, the whole distance from Blacksod to London is 664, miles. traveling at 50 miles per hour will, therefore, take about fourteen hours to reach London. The distance from Blacksod to Dublin is 222 miles, and ferry steamers can take loaded trucks



The Thrilling Experience of a New York Fireman.

CRASHED DOWN THREE FLOORS

Recover-Two of His Comrades Were Killed.

New York, Jan. 9. - John J. C. Seufert, the fireman who was rescued from a burned warehouse in Roosevelt street this morning, where he had been imprisoned in the debris for nearly 30 hours, is at a hospital to-

Except for a few bruises on his arms and legs, Seufert was not hurt and when he recovers from the pervous shock of his ordeal he will leave the hospital.

Two comrades went down with Seufert when the ruins collapsed on Sunday night. The body of one, Thomas Lenno, has been recovered. The other man Danfel Campbell, was still in the ruins. There is but litle hope that he es-

caped death as did Seufert, but the rescuers are working with renewed vigor to reach his body. Seufert today was able to give a brief account of his experience. He

said:

"I was on the fourth floor taking a line of hose out. There came a crash, followed by three more. It was the roof falling in and carrying the floors to the basement. I felt the floor sink. "I jumped between two big bales and I fell to the bottom between them. I

retained my senses all the time. The bales saved me. They made a cushion for me. The timbers formed above me and penned me in so I could not move. One sensation was that I thought I had been struck by lightning. The water poured in on me, but I was glad of that, because I knew I would not

"I shouted all the time. I could hear the people talking, but they could come to see your sister, did they ever give not hear me. I got the idea after awhile that they knew that I was there and did not want to rescue me. I kept on shouting and it seemd a long time before anyone answered me. I pounded on the beam near me, and I finally heard a voice calling to me. Then knew I was safe."

They found him dead. leaned far over the pulpit to look his Seufert had been lifted from the hole at 1:40 o'clock this morning, Foreman Schott lifted up a board and saw a man's thumb sticking from the paper underneath. In two hours more the firemen had uncovered the body.

Campbell's body was buried under tons of paper and charred beams from the floors above. The body was not burned, and death must have been almost instantaneous.

Seufert chuckled when his wife admitted to him today that she had sent friends to make arrangements for his burial and that one of the neighbors had even advised her as to what she should wear.

"Well, no undertakers for me for some time, replied the fireman. "I was born lucky. While I was lying there under all that mass I wondered just how you would take it. I knew you would see the undertaker and I wondered whether you would need him after all. It was like lying at the bottom of the sea in a diving bell with a rope cut away from the top. I was alive and yet I knew I was as far from New York, from you and all the boys in the company as if I had been in Greenland."

Manual Training. The question of introducing this sub-

ject to our public schools has occasioned me considerable thought. In a city wherein a large percentage of the population are mechanics and where expert mechanics are required. I belleve we, as Canadians, should furnish that, and we should provide the means for our boys who desire to acquire such knowledge. The present method of sending some from each school to the Normal is not satisfactory, on account of the distance some of them have to go, and the great loss of time required in going to and from. Yet, I know that the establishment of manual training departments at each school is unnecessary, and would be altogether too expensive, but I ask you to consider the advisability of providing manual training in two or three centers in the city. we will not have some great expensive concerns that will be of little practical use to the citizens' children. THE PITTSBURG DISASTER

Victims of Explosion in Steel Mill Placed at Over Thirty. Pittsburg, Jan. 10 .- Partial investiga-

tion to ascertain the number of fatalities at the Eliza furnaces of the Jones & Laughlin Steel Company, Limited, last night, when an accumulation of gas exploded, bursting the base of the large furnaces and showering tons of molten metal over about 40 men, was completed tonight, and shows that the bodies of twelve men, horribly multilated, have been recovered, and from fifteen to twenty men are missing.



THIS DEAD MAN KEPT HIS PACT

Ten Years After His
Demise.

New York, Jan. 10.—Profs. Josiah Royce and William James, of Harvard University, are beginning today for the American Society of Physical Research, an investigation of the story of the reappearance after death of a Boston business man to a prominent lawyer of New York, which is looked upon as extremely unusual, uncanny and im-

The lawyer withholds the names of the men concerned. He has made an affidavit to his story. In 1889, when he and the dead man with whom he talked were Harvard freshmen, they made a serious compact to the effect that the one who died first was to, if possible, communicate with the one living. Ten years later the Boston man, who is designated as "W," died.

The lawyer, who comes of an old New England family and who was born in New Hampshire, did not receive his word from beyond the tomb until recently. But it came in due time. He says he was sleeping in a Pullman car when suddenly a man called "C," a friend of the lawyer and of the dead Boston man, appeared before him. He says he was wide awake and in good health. They were instantly present in a seemingly foreign city, where gray old houses loomed up around them. The sun was wonderfully bright.

Then appeared the dead man, clothed, looking the picture of health. The dead man extended his hand, but the lawyer and his dream companion were too astounded to shake it. As suddenly as came the vision came also the disappearance of it, and the lawyer says he found himself with his eyes hurting from the fierce light he had just left. The next night in his study the lawyer again met the dead friend in the same way, and once more awakened with the brilliant light's effect paining his

Investigation proved that the friend "C" was ill at the time the lawyer saw these things. The lawyer declares he was not asleep in either case, that he was in his senses, and knows the appearance of the dead man was not a dream

Henry C. Quimby, an acquaintance of the attorney, drew the affidavit which was submitted to the psychical society. Mr. Quimby did not take much stock in the vision, believing that an overwrought imagination was the cause.

The lawyer says he is not a spiritist, and has little use for such bellefs. He says he used to sit up later at night than was good for him, and at late dinners, which would have made him dream, if anything would, yet he insists that he never was a dreamer, always slept well, and had a mind that never played him false.

At the time he and the other Harvard man made the pact to appear after death, Mrs. Piper, the famous medium, was in the limelight, and was talked of much by "W," "C" and the lawyer.




