

Sydney, N. S. W., April 17. - Public meetings of protest are being held FLIRTATION RESPONSIBLE throughout New Zealand condemning the Government's offer to build two new Dreadnoughts for Great Britain

as unconstitutional. Extraordinary scenes took place at Christ Church, where a meeting of the Navy League in support of the Government's action, degenerated into pandemonium. The speakers, including both Roman Catholic and Anglican rushed the police and seized the Union Jack, which they tore into shreds, and trod under foot. Many free fights that nsued were terminated only when the lights were all extinguished.

An expert examination has established the fact that the victim was poisoned by prussic acid. The poison hindered the decomposition of the body, which was found





WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR? Rev. F. E. Malott Discourses on

> the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

Rev. F. E. Malott, of the Colborne Street Methodist Church, spoke yesterday morning on the subject of "Neighborliness," choosing as his text the parable of the Good Samaritan. Mr. Malott pictured the circumstance surrounding the lawyer's question, "Who is my neighbor?" and spoke of the Lord's purpose in telling the story, and from it drew four lessons. It was first a rebuke to the legal spirit, which asks for definite boundaries, beyond which man was not required to go, in contra-distinction to the Christian spirit,

which asks not how little, but how much. It was a rebuke to the exclusive spirit; and here the speaker mentioned race exclusiveness, sectarian exclusiveness and social exclusiveness, all o which were rebuked in the parable The parable teaches how to be neigh borly. To be so, it is necessary to be willing to give of our time, of our money, of our personal service these were given by the Good Samarian to the wounded traveller.

The parable also teaches that life and religion are one, or neither are anything. The lawyer who asked, "Who is my neighbor?" had first asked How may I gain eternal life?" He needed to be told the nature of eterna ife, and was so taught in the parable compassion and love and neighborli-

Finally, the parable tells of one who like the Samaritan, was despised and rejected of men, and who came after the priest and the Levite, to do what they had not done-who came to staunch the bleeding wounds of humanity, for which there was no remedy in the law and tradition of the elders Lord Jesus Christ, who became ould be truly neighborly must catch his spirit and follow in his footsteps.
