Sir William Praises London For Progressive Spirit Shown.

CITY OF HOMES NEEDED

London Should Aim at This Rather Than at Tenements.

Sir William Hearst declared the new ternoon. The city had issued \$766,000 in debentures, and in three funds it has since gathered together \$460,000. Besides it has made other investments out of profits, and today has a total investment of over one million dollars.

Western Siberia, says a dispatch to the Times from Pekin dated July 4. The Bolsheviki are being driven westward from Irkutsk and many are endeavoring to escape into Mongolia.

Referring to the Czecho-Slovak move-ment as a basis for the struggle against Bolshevism in Siberia, the correspond-ent predicts that it will lead to the elimination of the Bolsheviki in a short

time.

The question of intervention, however, is still pressing, he adds, because Russia is torn with political differences and personal fealousies and there is urgent need of a responsible govern-

ment.

Political circles in Harbin are discussing the danger of a new government in the eastern provinces, which may be formed of elements favoring the old regime. 



AMSTERDAM, July 9. — Denying rumors which have been circulating in Austria-Hungary regarding Empress Zita, the correspondent at Vienna of the Tijd says:

"It is true the Austrian empress partly desires peace and has with proper dignity advocated it, but the rumor that an energetic Austrian offensive against Italy was delayed by her influence is slanderous, as also is the rumor that the empress was to blame for one or two set-backs which followed the offensive.

"It is still more slanderous to involve her honor as a woman with Imperial statesman and the imperial house. The empress, whose sensitiveness is well known, suffered not a little under the imputations which have driven her to a sick bed.

"The slander was more painful, as it even assailed the wedded fidelity which so distinguished the conduct of the imperial couple, while the non-existent correspondence, which was said to contain utterances of the empress regarding peace, is reported to be the first cause of the difference between the emperor and the empress."

The hum of the fly, the buzz of the "skeeter" and the hop, skip and jump of the flea at this season of the year begin to make you remember that these insects are more than accidental carriers and distributors of shivers and shakes, typhoid, dysentery, malaria and typhus fevers.

The animalcule of malaria is a microbe visible under the microscope as tiny black dots in the red corpuscles of the sufferer's blood. In stages of prenatal development, the malaria parasites are allive unborn in the female mosquitor's stomach, mouth and saliva. They are born when the female mosquitoes bite a human creature and thus inoculate them into the victim's blood. Here on alternative days or some regular interval, they mature and burst simultaneously from the confines of the red corpuscles.


