Lloyd George Declares Reds' Reply Is Incoherent.

London, July 21.—Premier Lloyd George, addressing the House of Com-mons today, said the soviet answer to the Allies regarding peace with Poland was incoherent, ambiguous and propa-ganda largely intended for home con-sumption. So far as he could under-stand, however, the Soviet Government indicated its willingness to negotiate direct with Poland.

The premier asserted that an independent Poland was essential to the whole fabric of peace, and that the Allies were resolved that they must arrest the destruction of Poland and the rch of Bolshevik armies through Pol ish territory.

Great Britain Building

More Ships Than U.S.

London, July 21.—Total ton-nage now building in the United Kingdom exceeds the amount under construction in the United States by 1,672,000 tons, according to returns published today by Lloyd's register of shipping. The aggregate amount now under con-struction in Great Britain is 3.578,000 tons—the highest amount ever recorded.

Much comment has been aroused in shipping circles by these figures, says the London Times. But, it adds, the failure of the United States to maintain its lead in shipbuilding was ex-pected, since the intensive con-struction there was chiefly a war measure.

PASSENGERS UNHURT WHEN LOCOMOTIVE JUMPED THE TRACKS

Mail Coach Ditched and Line Torn Up Near Kelly's

While traveling at high speed No. 28, the G. T. R. mail and passenger train, which leaves London at 6 a.m. daily for Toronto, via Stratford, was wrecked one mile west of Kelly's Siding this morning. Although the locomotive and mail car turned over in the ditch and the baggage and one passenger coach left the track, the crew and passengers scaped injury.

The train, which was in charge of Conductor Jack Folley and Engineer T. N. Devine, both of London, was approaching Kelly's Siding at 6:40, when the locomotive, for some unknown reason, jumped the tracks. After running on the ties for a short distance it ran into the ditch and turned over on its side against a wire fence some 30 feet from the tracks. The mail car which followed the engine was dragged

Lincoln, Neb., July 21 .- The United States' prohibition party opened its thirteenth annual convention here today p of the three days of day and night sessions to jubilation over the downfall of John Barleycorn. RUSSELL'S PETITION IS NOT CONSIDERED BY PRIVY COUNCIL

Appeal of Winnipeg Labor Leader Is Dismissed.

CHANCELLOR'S VIEW

Declares the Case Was Not Within Class Deserving Consideration.

London, July 21 .- By the Canadian Associated Press .- In the appeal of the Winnipeg labor leaders to the privy council, the petition of Russell was disnissed without the respondents being called.

R. B. Russell was the chief of eight labor leaders in the general strike in Winnipeg, which began in May of 1919. He was sentenced by a superior court of the Province of Manitoba to two years in the penitentiary on charges of seditious conspiracy. Appeal was taken seditious conspiracy. Appeal was taken by Russell through counsel to the last court of appeal in the British Empire, the judicial council of the privy council The appeal of the rest of the labor leaders sentenced to varying terms of imprisonment will now be heard by the

same tribunal. After nearly two hours' argument by W. H. Trueman for the petitioners, which soon developed into merely a running conversation between counsel and their lordships, the lord chancellor and their lordships, the lord chancellor dismissed the petition without calling on Sir John Simon, the respondent's

The lord chancellor said: "The peti The lord chancellor said: "The petitioner asks leave to appeal in a criminal matter. He asks the privy council to advise His Majesty that there should be an exercise of his prerogative. Such advice is only given by your lordships in very special classes of cases, which have been clearly defined in a long succession of authorities. It is sufficient for me to say that the petitioner in this case has entirely failed, in our opinion, to bring the matter within that class of petition."

Mr. Trueman, for R. B. Russell, submitted that matters irrelevant to the charge of seditious conspiracy had been introduced into the trial in Winnipeg, and that the trial judge had biased the jury in his charge. Sir John Simon, for the crown, interrupted to say that in view of the Canadian authorities the view of the Canadian authorities the question would arise whether there was any appeal to Great Britain on criminal matters. Wilful Defaulters Will Prosecuted by Department.

UNDER NEW CLAUSE

Amendment To Act Facilitates Court Procedure Against Delinquents.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, July 21.-Wilful defaulter. from federal income taxation may find a rude awakening from the slumber of security into which a recent lull in prosecutions has rocked them. Even now the office of the commissioner of taxation is preparing a long list of the proscribed and police court proceedings during the coming weeks by prosecutions against others than ordinary offenders against the law.

In the past prosecutions have been sent to the defautter blanding in affi-his return. If he fails to do so an affi-davit is made out to the effect that the return has not been made. The fact of registration, coupled with the affi-davit, is all that is required for prosecution, and witnesses are not required. The chief reason for the lull in prosecutions recently is the fact that the department has been awaiting the facilitation mentioned. Now it can and will

The person found guilty is subject to two penalties. In the first place delay beyond the prescribed time in putting returns subjects him to an additional impost of 24 per cent of his assessment. In the second place he is subject to the penalty imposed for wilful default.





FAIR SEX ASPIRE AT PRIVY COUNCIL

Their Freedom League Calls On King To Let Them in and Wants Full Equality With

Men.

London, July 26. — British women are becoming more and more self-reliant, not to say independent. At a recent meeting of the Women's Freedom League it was decided to petition the King, "through his responsible ministers," to appoint women to the privy council.

Many Canadians may not know that this body dates back to ancient Norman times. Nowadays, although the true privy council is the cabinet, the name is given collectively to a large number (309 on the latest list) of eminent people whose membership and position are titular only. The title of the council is the "Lords and Others of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council." The members are addressed as "Right Honorables." Perhaps some of the ladies of the Women's Freedom League would like to see that title before their names as rightly indicating their admirable character.

At this same meeting the women demanded that all barriers of inequality between the sexes be broken down. The women called on the Government to bring in a bill granting the franchise to women on equal terms with men. Pensions for widows with children under 16 years were also demanded.

The same spirit is shown by women in every walk of life. At a meeting of the Women's Labor Parliament the other day Miss Adams of Glasgow, a housing reformer, exclaimed:

"I want a home, a house, not a washhouse. I don't want a washday. I think my laundry should be done by machinery in a municipal laundry. It should be taken away in a motor and brought back to me all beautiful, clean and finished. No washhouse, no washday, for me."

The Parliament has called on the Government, in view of the hindrance to marriage and the impossibility of finding adequate accommodation for family life, to institute an inquiry into prices of building materials; to raise a national loan for housing; to consult working women in regard to plans, and in the event of the house famine not being quickly dealt with, to introduce a room rationing scheme as a temporary expedient.







Businessmen are sick to death of a policy of bribing (out of the exchequer) the masses to keep them in good humor, instead of the country being governed on sound and just lines. They are sick of it for two reasons: In the first place, experience from 1909 (the year of the Lloyd George budget) down to the present time, has shown that that policy, stead of allaying unrest and promoting good feeling amongst the entire community, has had exactly the opposite effect. Strikes were never so prolific (sic), while the worker is restricting production and keeping up prices. And businessmen are sick of this policy of weakness and bribery for another reason, namely, because they know the end of the

So, according to this Tory malcontent, or nalignant," as the Cromwellians once called the people's enemy, keeping the masses in good humor only puts them in bad humor. What has been this reprehensible "bribery"? Old age pensions, which no Tory dares openly and explicitly to attack; national insurance, no longer decried, though at first the workingmen themselves were not altogether pleased; the various budgets, which have progressively placed taxation on the shoulders capable of bearing it; the bread sold at less than cost to the whole public. Some of the opponents of this "bread dole" declare that it was such maladministration that caused Rome to fall, If it did, Rome was 600 years falling after the cheap bread distributions to the citizen body were begun by Caius Gracchus.

The Tory critic holds that the country should be "governed on sound and just lines." That is everlastingly the Tory view. The sensible element among them have cheerfully resigned themselves to what is really a rational compromise between the old regime and communism, in yielding up annually a good fraction of their income to the state. They no longer as a class cry out against the new taxation of the last decade as "confiscation." They are at least resigned. It is to be expected that a democratic parliament at Ottawa will soon do something to put taxation in this country on a modern footing, and we shall not call it "bribery of the masses."

RIVER VS. SPRING.

With prolonged tests of river water in progress at the north branch of the Thames, and the likelihood of an official analysis being made within a few days, citizens in general are waiting anxiously to see whether there is really a possibility of the hitherto pure drinking supply of the city being threatened from this that the average Londoner will have grave

Commissioner F. G. Mitchell has taken a decided stand against increased drinking supplies being obtained in this way, and there is no doubt that he is heartily indorsed by the majority of the citizens. He claims that the possibilities of obtaining spring water on property already owned by the city and from other spring land between here and Komoka, have not nearly been exhausted, and urges that every effort be made to augment the supply from these sources. The comparatively slight cost of obtaining river water may be urged as one of the reasons for using it, but if by the adoption of this plan the citizen loses the sense of security which he has in the purity of the present supply it is doubtful whether it would be true economy. Even daily tests of the water obtained from this source would not satisfy entirely his apprehensions.

The outlook is hopeful, however, as every indication points to the continued use of spring water. Reluctance to announce the results of the first analysis of river water indicated that it was not satisfactory. The Utilities Commission is preparing to drill for either spring or well water in the vicinity of the Coves, and, finally, no enthusiastic advocates of the river water plan have appeared, while the opposition

to it has been pronounced. The other members of the Utilities Commis-

sion, while not so decided in their opposition to the plan, have done anything but support it. The purity of London's drinking water is a proverb throughout the Dominion, and the citizens will stand behind their representatives who intend to keep it pure.



Answer-That is a question in simple arithmetic. If fifty-six lemons reduce the weight 22½ grains in eight weeks, seven million ninety thousand cases of lemons would reduce the weight 30 pounds in 983 years. Keep up your courage, but be careful never to omit your breakfast, for that might reduce you a whole pound a day. This lemon thing is just an old joke "beauty specialists" like to play on the gullible sex. It's a lemon, all right, isn't it?

Castorollipation. Is castor oil the best physic for one who has chronic appendicitis and chronic constipation?—R. J. S. Answer—Appendectomy is a much better remedy for such constipation. Castor oil is binding in its after-effect therefore not advisable in chronic con-stipation. From a teaspoonful to a tablespoonful or more of plain vaseline (the white petrolatum has less taste than the yellow), once or twice a day, apart from mealtimes, is a good intestinal lubricant. If constipation depends on chronic appendicitis, or upon some other lesion amenable only to surgery, no physic or other treatment than surgery can be expected to over-come the constipation.

Bedbugs.

Will fumigation with formaldehyde andles kill bedbugs? If not, what will?

Mrs. W. H. H. Answer-Formaldehyde fumigation of the room is fairly effec-tive, but when expert fumigators are available hydrocyanic gas fumigation is better, though of course this is too poisonous for any but an expert to use. If fumigation is impossible, squirt into every crevice of bed, room, floor, walls or closets, a mixture of 5 per cent (1 to 20) earbolic acid solution and 1 to 500 corrosive sublimate solution. These

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

"To ask a person to gather his own mushrooms for the table without previous instruction that will enable him to avoid the deadly kinds is equivalent to, if not worse than inviting him to put his unprotected hand into a den of

General Rules Formulated,
"General rules for the guidance of
mushroom hunters are trustworthy and
serviceable only when formulated by
experienced botanists. The following
six rules by the late Dr. W. G. Farlow,
Harvard University, will prevent, if
scrupulously observed, the eating of
pretoricusty reisonous species. notoriously poisonous species:

"(1) Avoid fungi when in the button or unexpanded stage; also those in which the flesh has begun to decay, even if only slightly.





Aside from rust and smut, Canadian wheat crops have been found remarkably free from destructive plant diseases. Recently, however, there have been discovered in the United States two new diseases, "flag smut" and "take-all," about the presence of which

there has been felt considerable alarm. Now up to the time of writing, Canada has not been invaded by either of these new troubles. But growers should be ever on the look out for these and any

other obscure trouble with which their

practice has not made them thoroughly VICTORY, SAYS JARVIS

"Flag smut," so called because the smut occurs on the flags or leaves of wheat, is easily recognized by the long streak of smutty stripes running along the leaves. The affected plants also show a peculiar tangled and twisted appearance, as if the leaves were wound around the stem. Any suspicious plant should be sent to the division of botany,

Experimental Farm, Ottawa. "Take-all," as the name implies, takes, and is probably the most serious phatically claimed by the practical grower as well as the scientific observer. The recognition in the field is not difficult. "Take-all" is a root disease, spreading from below up the stem for about one to two inches, discoloring the stem dark brown. The affected plants may be pulled up very easily: plants may be pulled up very easily; their anchorage in the ground is very loose as compared to a sound plant. The affected plants turn yellow and finally die, taking straw and all. Both diseases are most likely conveyed by infected seed grain, hence it is most important to "nip these diseases in the bud," and report all suspicious cases at once. The use of foreign wheats for seed is cautioned against; particularly wheat from Australia is under sus-




