"It is very difficult," the late Lawrence Godkin wrote, "to make any change in public policy or legislation in the United States in less than five years." The conservative authors of the American constitution were anxious to put plenty of ballast in the ship of state and succeeded in ballasting it to a standstill. A new House of Representatives does not meet until a year after its election, so that in the event of a Democratic victory in November twelve months would elapse before the new President would have the cooperation even of the popular chamber. The Senate and not the House of Representatives has become the political center of gravity in the United States. and for the next four or five years the Senate will be able, in any event, to defy popular opinion. It is as though the Liberal party in Canada, elected to office in 1896, had not been able to revise the tariff or carry out any feature of its policy until after its re-election in 1900. Under the British system not only does the will of the majority become immediately operative, but the party in power can be held directly responsible for the fulfillment of its to the distribution of legislative and executive powers, this responsibility cannot be fixed. Mr. Godkin, who was one of the most authoritative political writers in the United States, touched on this point as follows:


