FIRST FOUR DAYS OF THE COMBAT

Turned Enemy's Right.

Losses Placed at Four Thousand-Operations Were Conducted by Telephones.

With the Japanese Left Armies, Saturday, March 4, 10 p.m., via Tien Tsin, March 8. - The first four days' fighting on this flank has resulted in the complete turning of the Russian right. and promises the certain defeat of the entire Russian army. The two left armies have swung north to a point on the Mukden line, and are now parallel to and four miles westward of the railroad, and advancing directly east. The Russians at first made a strong fight, but later their resistance slight, retreating in disorder before the onward rush of the Japanese, who have advanced over twenty miles in four days, constantly in touch with the enemy. The Russians had many strong defenses in several lines, but did not defend them as stubbornly as was expected. A number of strong positions were given up without a show of sistance, and the battlefields shows evidence of a hasty retreat, being covered with clothing, and heavy felt boots, besides many rifles and thousands of clips of rifle cartridges. Today's reports show the Russian roops almost in a panicstricken condition, one army corps retiring without



Sympathetic and Eloquent Reference Made by Sir Wilfrid

Ottawa, March 7. — In the House to-day, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Borden Dr. Sproule, Mr. Osler and others made reference to the late E. F. Clarke, member for Center Toronto. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, shortly after the opening of the House, arose and said: The attendance of the House yester-day was so small that after conference with the leader of the Opposition, we both agreed that the moment then would not be opportune to call the attention of the House to the fact that we have lost one of the most prominent members of the House, in the person of Mr. E. F. Clarke. The House had been aware that for some weeks past Mr. Clarke had been suffering from an illness which his friends and admirers knew to be severe, but hoped would not be fatal. We all cherished the belief that his strong constitution would be stronger than the disease which wan attacking him, but by a strange fatality it so happened that his death occurred on the evening of the very day when the press bulletins informed us he was out of danger, and when it was hoped and believed that within a very short time he would again oclong and well, but which is to be his no more. I am sure that when we believed that our late colleague, then so strong and hearty, then in the full flush of health and activity, would have been the first victim in this Par-

he Famous Quartet Delights a London Audience at the Audit rium.

The second of the three events mentioned in these columns three weeks ago today-the Kneisel Quartet-was held at the Auditorium last night, and shared the distinction of the one which preceded it, and its fate, also, as regards attendance. Messrs. Franz Kneisel, von Theodorowicz, Louis Sve-censki, and Alwin Schroeder, were comparative strangers to London musiclovers until last night, but seldom, if ever, have artists so quickly played their way into the hearts of an audience as did these gentlemen. Chamber music, too, has been practically an unknown quantity, too, notwithstanding that many of the masters have done some of their best work in this direction, and that, as Mr. Schroeder said last night, the literature of the string quartet is richer than that of almost

any other department.

The vehicle that served to introduce the quartet was the Dyorak quartet in F major—a work introduced originally by the Knei-sel people. Those acquainted with sel people. Those acquainted with Dvorak's style were not unprepared for the wealth of harmony, and more especially of rhythm displayed in each of its three movements. Even the "lento" is treated in complex style, and varied n rhythm-combination, but throughout the work, leaving technical perfection aside, the beautiful balance of tone and the exquisite nuances phrase by phrase, marked the quartet as masters of ensemble, and moved even those who might not have appreciated, from past inexperience, so classic a form.

Through the succeeding numbers. selections from Rubenstein's C mino quartet a serenade of Hugo Wolf, a complete quartet of Haydn, and a Cho pin C sharp minor etude, arranged for 'cello solo and strings, the interwas constantly stimulated, and the impression of the opening quartet

It is difficult to analyze that which goes to make up the perfection that characterizes these players. First of all there is the individual temperament, refined by cultivation and broadened by experience. Then there is twenty years of practice-hours of hard work together every week; and, lastly, an instrumental equipment unsurpassed in the world. In this last connection i is interesting to note that the quartet hire a special Pullman compartment for their instruments alone. To return whatever it is that has made them so, they stand at the head of all such organizations, in America or abroad, and by virtue of abilities such as were shown last night.

One point cannot be too much dilated upon-viz., the wonderful beauty of tone shown by the 'cello, particularly in the Chopin number; by the viola, in the Rubenstein, and by the violin in every phrase. This was exemplified in the only encore that the club allowed the Andante from Tschaikowski's beautiful quartet in F. If ever Mr. Kneisel and his associ-

ates visit London again, they should be greeted by an audience more worth numerically, of a city this size. However great the artistic success of such concert, the financial result cannot fail to kill all enterprise on the part of those interested in securing such attractions, and the positive hostility shown in some quarters is the greatest possible menace to the artistic health of the city

Mr.Cyril Dwight-Edwards surpassed, in the opinion of many, any effort be-fore made on a London platform. His See the Long, Beautiful Hair, the result of the use of the first number was Massenet's "Vision Fugitive," from "Herodiade," although the Dvorak gypsy song, his last number, was accorded, if anything, the most enthusiastic reception. He responded to an encore with a beautiful "Spring Song," of Paul Vidal.

All through, the programme was varied and well-balanced, and certainly more than fulfilled the high expectations formed of it. The concert was under the management of Mr. George C. Phelps, who acted as accompanist to Mr. Dwight-Edwards. The thanks of the public are also due to the little group of r cians and amateurs who worked hard

to create an interest in the event.

A striking parallel has been noted between the present Czar of Russia and Louis the Sixteenth of France their personal characters, and the circumstances in which they The analogy of these circumstances is strengthened by the resolve of the Czar States General, at their origin, consisted of representatives of the clergy, the nobility and the third Russian emperors, came to feel that they could rule alone. The States General met only thirty times in the fourteenth, fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. The last meeting before the French revolution was in 1614-15, in which the third estate, or commons, were humiliated. On the eve of the revolution, one hundred and seventyfive years later, the king was forced by popular agitation to reconvene the States General, just as the Czar today has been forced by public opinion to revive the principle of representative government. The States General assembled at Versailles in 1789, and for the first time the third estate asserted the sovereign power of the people. They declared themselves the sole body having a right to act as a legising only certain classes, to attend their deliberations. They solemnly proclaimed themselves the legislators of the country, and constituting themselves a body under the name of the National Assembly, they became the




