Salt as a Fertilizer. One of the drawbacks to the cultivation of wheat is its liability to be ruined by rust. Afte all that has been done to secure a crop, and when the prospect has been most promising up to within a very short period before the ripening of the grain, the rust attacks the stalk, and the opes of the fermer are blasted. For a long time in England, and to some en tent in this country those who have tried the experiment claim that it is nearly an effectual remedy for the rust to sow salt on the land put


