OUR CALIFORNIA LETTER.

Lodi to Yosemite—Snow fifteen feet in depth—The Big Trees—Description of the world-famed Yosemite.

Lodi, Cal., June 24, 1890.

DEAR SIR.—As the days slip past and weeks roll by, bringing about the wondrous changes which summer ushers in, I am reminded more than ever of home and friends; and when I think of the pleasures I have found on beautiful Charleston Lake and amid the shades of Grand Old St. Lawrence, I am led to compare the attractions of the East with those of the Golden West.

Before I come to a conclusion as to which offers the greater number of attractions to the pleasure seekers, let me say that I am seeking to determine which is deserving of most praise. By contrasting the qualifications of each, we should be able to arrive at a decision which will give to both all the merit they deserve.

Just now, I do not feel that I am able to give an unbiased opinion of either, for the reason that I have but lately returned from a trip to the mountains, Yosemite Valley, &c., and while all the wonders that I there beheld are yet fresh in my mind, I am led to forget that other lands possess superior attractions and therefore turn to you on the principle that an editor is everybody's friend and adviser, and expect to get the information I need. I think I am in any danger of swerving in my allegiance to the East and its beauties, but let me place before you a pen picture of those western charms, that you may see how they are for me to become enthusiastic on one of California's most encouraging features.

I am becoming more and more impressed with the idea that Nature is not the only subject that gives pleasure to the human mind, but that she offers so many contradictions and presents so many difficult problems that one is lost when attempting to fathom their depths. Nature gratifies the senses, inspires and elevates us, and is ever offering something new, no matter what our vocation or aspirations, we are aided by its influence and encouraged to better things. Before dropping these thoughts, let me offer a quotation from Longfellow which will more clearly convey what I mean to my mind—

"If thou art worn and hard beset
With sorrow that thou wouldst forget;
If thou art fainting and wilt keep
Thy heart from fainting and thy soul from
Go to the woods and hills."

With the hope of obtaining all the good that might be gleaned from practicing such advice, I went "to the woods and hills" and came back, I am happy to say, refreshed in body and mind and with an amount of food for thought that will aid me all the way through life. I had for a companion during my trip, John H. Lillie, formerly of Lynn and known to many of your readers. He has lodged in this town and with his brother carries on an extensive trade in merchant tailoring, gents furnishing, etc., and also continues to practice surveying when occasion demands, but being for services he will line eight and ten dollars per day.

We left Lodi on the afternoon of June 5th, feeling it our duty to celebrate Mr. Fraser's re-election, which we felt certain would be brought about and which we are happy to learn was accomplished. Long life to Mowat! That day we only succeeded in reaching the foot-hills of the Nevada Mts., which held the attraction of the first place in the world, that Lodi is less than fifty feet above sea level, for before I have done, I will have taken you to an altitude of 10,000 feet and must necessarily leave to your imagination many of the things which we saw. Our equipments, baggage, &c., consisted of a light covered wagon drawn by two horses, a tent, guns, cooking utensils, and not least because last, food of provision, it being our intention to camp where ever night overtook us.

The second day of our journey we found ourselves in a land of an entirely different nature from that of the Nevada range. The mountains, whose heads could be seen only from the ridge of some mountain, crossed our way. We were then in a region once so noted for its gold, and many evidences of the past may still be seen. In the distance, however, may yet be found working over the refuse which was so carelessly handled in those exciting days which introduced the name of California, the world over; and those Ottomans are making money fast, for they often secure valuable nuggets. Only last year, one of their number found one of the largest lumps ever discovered; but I must go on with my trip. Each hour was carrying us farther into the mountains, and the more we traveled the more we were struck by the beauty of the scene and the atmosphere. You know how refreshing is the smell of the pine when one has not been out of town for six months. These pine trees are one of California's wonders, for they attain in innumerable instances the height of 300 feet and are from four to ten feet in diameter.

I must tell you of the Big Trees, which are noted the world over and which in height and beauty rival the world, for nowhere else on earth has anything like them been discovered, so far as I am aware, are concerned. There are in California eight different groves containing from 30 to 2000 trees each, and what is somewhat remarkable about them, they are never felled out of these groups which seem to be themselves in some sheltered nook at an altitude of about 5,000 feet. The Calaveras Grove ranks first both in number, height and
