after a protracted illness. Dr. Haley
had for many years figured prominently
in the politics of Hants, having previous-
ly to his election as member of the federal
parliament, in '96, represented Hants
County nine years in the provincial
legislature. Though not a brilliant de-
bater, Dr. Haley proved himself to be a
painstaking and practical representa-
tive and a public man of integrity and stri-
king worth. His kindness of manner
and his toleration for the views of others
secured him many friends on both sides
at Ottawa and eloquent tributes to his
worth were given in the House on Mon-
day by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Charles
Tupper and the Hon. Mr. Fielding, and
parliament adjourned for one hour out
of honor to his memory. His remains
were interred at Windsor on Wednesday.
