Fertilizing Potatoes

Potato yields depend very large y on plantfood supply. Extensive investigation in farm management among 400 potato farms in New Jersey shows that "profits are Jersey shows that "profits are greater with each increase of potato yield per acre. Men and horses handle as many crop acres on the heavy-yielding farms. These findlings are of special into est to Ontario potato growers since potato prices rule high. Cost of production is also very high. Why not make your farm and labor count

for all possible in your potato yield's this year?

Potatoes thrive on a sandy to grav

elly loam soil. This is a type of soil that must be heavily fed, if it is to do its best. The potato crop also repays abundant feeding. Since potatoes contain so much starch, they are great lovers of potash. On normal potato soil without manure you should apply from 750 to 1,000 lbs. of high grade fertilizer per acre in order to get the best results. With a good dressing of manure this application may be reduced to 500 or 600 lbs per acre. The analysis we would advise should range not less than 4 per cen ammonia, 6 to 8 per cent. phosphoric acid and 4 to

6 per cent. potash.

Besides fertilization, the soil should be thoroughly tilled, should contain an abundant supply of humus and potatoes of high yielding humus and potatoes or man your type should be planted. 

N.B. Farmer Member Praises S. S. B.

In the House of Commons on May 7th Mr. Caldwell, who sits with the Progressive Wing and re-presents the new farmer movement in New Brunswick spoke of the operations of the coldier Settlement Board in his own province. He h d very warm praise for Mr. Meighen, Mr Black and the Gov nment generally for what has been accomplished. Mr. Caldwell spoke as follows;-

"I desire to make a few remarks on this subject, especially in view of the fact that I was very closely connected with the operation of the Soldier Settlement Act in the province from which I come. I was Chairman of the Qualification Board before whom the soldiers in my part of the country came for examination in regard to their fitness as settlers, and shortly after the work began I was made a member of the Loan Committee. I want to speak particularly in regard to the price per acre of land in the different provinces. I I want to speak particularly in regard to the price per acre of land in the different provinces. I observed that some hon. members soldier could not pay and still I smiled when they heard what the price per acre was in New Brunsprice per acre was in New Brunswick, and I am inclined to think they got a wrong impression in that respect. Perhaps no one no doubt that he made a good that respect. Perhaps no one realizes better than I that the statement is correct, because I was one of the board who decided what should be paid. I realize this probably more than anybody else because I was one of the board who decided what farms should be bought and what we should pay for them. The soldier selected a farm and the inspector inspected it and put a valuation upon it. We did not in every case pay what the valuator said was worth. We even turned down a number of farms that the farm inspector said were good value at the price asked for them. wick than in some other provinces. 



cent on capital but not exceeding fifteen per cent. the tax will be twenty per cent.
On profits in excess of fifteen

fits exceeding ten per cent will be taken instead of twenty-five per cent as at present.

Under legislation of last session he maximum scale of business tax is in effect this year and the mod. fied tax will apply to 1920 profits taxable in 1921.

Tariff Changes

The seven and a half per cent war customs duty is taken off all re-maining items. Last year the five per cents British preferential war tax was entirely removed as well as the seven and a half on food, clothing, agricultural implements. etc. The war customs duty imposed in 1915 are now entirely removed.

A feature of the luxury tax is its general application. It hits articles of all kinds. Small wares, as well as the more expensive opera cloak, come under the tax. Ten per cent. will be levied on the purchase price of boots in excess of nine dollars per pair, on hats, men's and boys' and boys', in excess of \$2 each; on hose, stockings, silk, men's and boys' in excess of \$1 a pair; on neckties and neckware, men's and boys' in excess of \$1.50 each; waist coats, men's, sold separately from suits, in excess of \$3 each; hats, bonnets and cess of \$12 each; hose, stockings, silk, women's and misses', in excess of \$2 perpair; kimonos, peticandy, confectionery, chewing gum, firearms, shells or cartridges, pianos each; pyjamas and underwear in exeach; pyjamas and underwear in excess of \$5.
