



American Girl's Two Years' Course in London.

Tall and graceful, with a personality essentially feminine and attractive, Miss Juliet S. Points was the guest of honour at a gathering of the American circle of the Lyce im Club yesterday afternoon. She has the distinction of being the first woman to win the scholarship which has been endowed by the Federation of Women's Clubs of America with the object of giving to American women the same opportunity of studying English life as the Rhodes scholarship offer to

Only one scholarship is yet available, but the scheme has met with the support and encouragement from the Rhodes trustees, and a sub-committee has been formed under the League of Empire, with Sir John Cockburn as chairman, to watch over the develop nent on this side of the Atlantic.

"This scholarship, which is of the same value as those given under the Rhodes Trust, £300 a year, enables me to take a two years' post-graduate cource at either Oxford, Cambridge or London Universities," said Miss Points, "I have chosen London because sociology and economics cannot be better studied than at the London School of Economics, which is famous throughout the world. Another reason is that London is the centre of English life, and therefore must be the best place to study English persononality and the English point of view.-Daily Mail, Oct. 22.





MEXICO CITY, Mex., Nov. 10. Mexico City to-day resembles an armed camp, following nearly 48 hours of demonstrations against Americans and the Government. In the was torn down, trampled on and torn to pieces. Citizens were assaulted o insulted in the streets, and windows of a dozen American business places were shattered, and an attempt was made to destroy the plant of El Imparcial, the leading Mexican - daily, and the exponent of Government policies. Quiet was restored only after smade of mounted police with drawn sabres had repeatedly charged the mob, killing three of the disturbers, resentatives of the European Banks roughly handling scores of others and arresting more than two hundred. Tories of mounted police are stationed in every block and hundreds of gendaries are patrolling the streets. The demonstration was confined to the business portions of the city, no disturbances having been reported in the residential quarter. Of several reported fatalities, one occurred in front of the offices of El Imparcial, and two during a charge of police near the Almeda Public Park near the outside of the city. The only explanation of the attack on El Imparcial was the political malcontents. fired by the students' activities over the burning of a Mexican in Texas on Nov. 3rd, took an opportunity to wreak vengeance on a Government organ. An American was reported to have been captured by the rioters who tore off his clothing and beat him






