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

Newfoundland Herring.

Mr. Simonsen, the Norwegian attached to the Fishery Department, offers several suggestions in his report to the Minister which he deems would be of great advantage, if adopted, in Newfoundland. He is of opinion that the herring fishery can be made a great industry in this country. He declares, however, that "the curing and pickling in barrels must be improved, in order to compete with other countries, and meet the require-ments of the different markets to which I am in hope Newfoundland herring, will find their way in large quantities. The compulsory branding of all herring exported in barrels from Newfoundland by a Government Inspector will tend to improve their market value, provided that such an inspector understood and performed his work properly."

Similar opinions have been offered before and like advice given time out of number by others. The ruin of the Labrador herring market in Canada by bad packing has been told time and again. But the admonitions appear to pass unheeded. An attempt was made by the last Liberal Administration to deal with the situaministration to deal with the situa-tion and do something worth while with the herring industry, but the at-tempt was made the target of politi-cal attack and although Sir Edward Morris promised to encourage the herring industry, nothing has been done by his administration.

In the N. Y. Fishing Gazette received yesterday shows how necessary it is that greater attention should be given to the matter of packing if Newfoundland herring is to obtain and retain a market value worth. Such adverse statements and comments must materially improve our trade and it behoves those interested and the Government to give heed to the warning. Here is the statement to which we refer:—

"The situtation with regard to herring remains about the same. Practically the only stocks obtain-

spring herring, which were bought around \$2 a barrel, and have not brought much profit to the holders. Shipments of these fish, made to the West Indies, have in many cases had to be thrown overbeard because of to be thrown overboard because of their bad quality.







ST. PETERSBURG, May 26. A Japanese was arrested at Sebastapol on Friday, on a charge of espionage. He proved to be Major Homi, military attache to the Japanese Embassy at Berlin, and was released when his credentials were verified, but was ordered to leave Sebastapol at once. Another version is that the Russian officials apologized for his arrest.

BOSTON, May 26. 
SMYRNA, May 26. The s.s. Nevada, with 200 passen gers, struck three mines in success ion, vesterday, in the Gulf of Smyr na, and sank. Only 80 passengers and crew are reported saved. The mines were strewn in the coast waters of Asia Minor by the Turks to prevent attack by the Greeks during the Balkan war. The 80 were rescued by boats from the French cruis er Bonix, which was anchored in the harbor. The Nevada is the second passenger steamer sunk by mines in the Gulf within a week, and the fourth destroyed in this manner since the outbreak of the war. The others were the Texas, 480 tons, lost April 1912, 68 out of 139 lost, the majority Greek pilgrims from Jerusalem; on Wednesday last the Senegal, 5 killed and 6 injured; and in January the Turkish 'Hordores,' a sailing vessel of 650 tons, was blown up at the entrance of Smyrna Bay.

I think it is a disgrace to see so many cows roaming the roads trying to pick up a feed which they find it very hard to do, and out in all weathers. I think it brutal of the owners of them, and a number of these cows are owned by farmers who have plenty of land and pasturage but prefer to turn the poor animals out while they try to grow enough to just tide them through the winter. Oh, you poor cows, you feed your master and his family but he does not care to look after you; oh, no, get out and get what you can in all kinds of weather, you are expected to give your full complement of milk and pure at that:

Secondly,- Mr. Editor, as regards cleanliness of milk. Can this milk be pure? I say no. The cows pick up every sort of disease on the road sides and we know what the grass is alongside of same where dust and filth are always accumulating, and with this grass to eat can the cow be supposed. being half-starved trying to obtain a feed, to supply pure milk and milk free from disease. Mr. Brehm should look into this matter, it may look a small thing but there is a lot in it. Test the milk and see what it contains. The stables and dairies may be pure and clean but look at what the grass contains. If it was tested I guess the trouble of so much sickness would be found out and a great deal of it stop-
