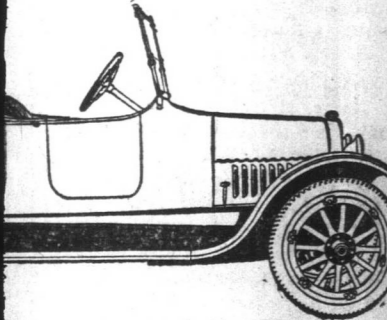

OTTAWA, April 3. A conference of shipbuilders from Port Arthur to Halifax with representatives of their employees which has been in progress for the past two days at the office of the Department of Labor, concluded to-day. The object of the conference was to arrive at a working agreement which would be satisfactory to both parties.

TESTING THE ENGINES.
WASHINGTON, April 3. Experiments are under way at the Naval Air station at Rockaway Beach, Long Island, to determine the number of liberty motors which will drive the naval seaplanes on the proposed flight.

At the House.

The House met at 3.15 yesterday afternoon. Petitions were presented by Mr. Walsh from the residents of St. John's for a ferry, from Branch for a breakwater, and from Trepasser asking for a sum of money to construct a road; by Mr. Moore from the residents of Fogo Island for a sum of money for public works, and by Mr. Morine from the residents of the north side of Bonavista Bay and the Straight Shore of Fogo District, asking that a branch railway be constructed from Gumbo on the main line of railway to Carmanville in Fogo District.

Mr. Morine (Bonavista), pointed out this was a very important petition, and he took occasion to refer generally to the condition of the railway. He was in fullest sympathy with the petition and thought that the inhabitants of this important section of the country were just as much entitled to the conveniences of a branch railway as those of any other section now supplied with this most important facility to business. He was well aware that two branch railways constructed for were yet uncompleted, that is Fortune Bay and Bona Bay. Again, there was the wretched condition of the main line to be considered, and it was beyond doubt that something had to be done soon to remedy the present unsatisfactory condition of the road which in his opinion, meant the whole rebuilding of some millions, and he presumed that this was one of the great problems referred to by the Premier on Wednesday as confronting the Government.

Mr. Coaker (Twillingate), supported the petition. Mr. Halfyard (Colonial Secretary, and member for Fogo), would also like to support the petition, but he also saw the crying need of doing something to remedy the present condition of affairs. The main line of railway was in a terrible condition, the rails were worn out, road bed gone, rolling stock out of general repair, and was in such a condition generally that it was not safe for human transportation. This coming from the Colonial Secretary as an official pronouncement, caused a deep impression in the House, and will also in the country. He could make no promises as to new branch railways under these circumstances, as he thought that the condition of the road needed attention first.

Mr. Walsh strongly supported the idea of railway extension and he believed that when and where possible they should be built.

Mr. Currie (Burin), wondered what evangelist had been throughout the country that the F.P.U. members should now be converted to a policy of railway extension, when they dejected the House a year or two ago with speeches against it.

The Premier (Rt. Hon. Dr. W. F. Lloyd), stated the Government had been giving the matter attention. Mr. Morine stated that the question was so serious that the Government would be wise to take the House into its confidence and either in secret session, or public, bring the matter up for debate.

On motion for the adoption of the Address in Reply, Mr. Currie (Burin), continued the discussion begun the day previous. He joined in the general thankfulness that the war was over. He then told of his trip to the other side and of the big leaders he had met while there. Referring to the election, he said that he had only one objection to it, and that was the haste with which it was being forced on the country. Previous experience has shown that a Spring election was not impossible, but he contended that it should not take place till the latter end of May. Mr. Currie had no doubt but that the people knew the Government very well, as each of its members had gone to great pains to tell about the other. The people, however, were ready for an election, and were ready to deal with the situation. He thought that though a surplus was anticipated for the current year, it was apparent from the remarks of the Premier on the previous day that it would be very small. He viewed the condition of the country with much concern. He had passed through abnormal times, but he had assumed big obligations and now were faced with an annual expenditure of at least seven and a half million dollars, with a sure prospect of a declining revenue.

The motion to adopt the address in reply was put and carried.

The Bill to amend the Election Act of 1913 was then introduced and read for the first time. Mr. Morine (Bonavista), made some suggestions regarding it, to which he thought the Government should give attention. He urged that the election at St. Barbe should be deferred until it was possible to get round that district. It was ice-bound generally until June and it was impossible to get ballot boxes distributed. He also urged the wisdom of dividing the district into two parts. Its population warranted two members. He further urged that St. George's should be given two members. It was becoming one of the most important districts in the Colony, and its population warranted another representative. Another suggestion he made regarding the forthcoming election was that a supplementary list of soldiers entitled to vote should be prepared by the Militia Department. This would save a great deal of trouble and would prevent delay on polling day.

The Minister of Finance gave notice that he would move the House into Committee on Supply to-morrow (Friday), after which the House adjourned until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Financial Juggling.

Continuing our observations on the speech from the Throne, we come now to the financial condition of the colony as discussed in the address, and it will be plainly discernible to every reader that, in the estimation of the Government, it was not deemed worth while to devote as much space to the preparation of this statement, which is the most vital and interesting of all, as was found necessary to execute the Government for the plunging of the country into the throes of a general election at such an unsuitable season as they propose. A bare paragraph suffices to acquaint the taxpayers that there was a surplus of revenue for the past fiscal year. Good news indeed, if true, (for this is an age of paper balances), and we do not yet know just how many hundred thousand dollars were spent, on the authority of Minutes of Council, which the Auditor General refused to sanction, and which had to be carried along by the Bank with the Government business is done, until the expenditure is legalized by Act of the Legislature, which will not be done at the present session, and is apparently one of the reasons why the party in power so anxiously desires a "snap" verdict from the electoral jury, in order that they may "cover up" the huge sums spent unauthoriously, by legislation, as it would be fatal at present for the actual amount to become known. When the monies so spent are deducted from the paper surplus which the speech announces, it will leave the actual surplus so microscopic as to be invisible to the human eye. The Country is further told that a surplus revenue for the current fiscal year, pending June 30th, may also be anticipated. The eight years months ending February 28th last, showing an increase of one million, four hundred and fifty four thousand, six hundred and twenty three dollars over the receipts for the same period, viz., July 1st, 1917 to February 28th, 1918, last fiscal year. This would be extremely gratifying if on the other hand the expenditure for the same two periods were given, and indeed, if it were, it is beyond the shadow of a doubt that the expenditure, authorized and unauthorized would show a corresponding increase for the last period therefore, the boasted surplus is purely fictitious. It is often urged in argument that figures do not lie, but—they may be so manipulated as to deceive even the expert, and to make a good pre-election showing and to deceive the people into the belief that Newfoundland is pre-eminent sound financially, the manipulators have been at work at their favorite pastime of juggling, to such good purpose that they make credit balances show where none really exist. This is known as high finance, and among its chief exponents are the members of the National Government of this Dominion. Nothing could be further from the purpose of the Government than that the real condition of the Dominion's affairs should be publicly known at the precise moment. It would kill the few, very few, chances its candidates have of winning. Hence they, or rather the Prime Minister, who on Wednesday declared in the House that the official speech from the throne was his, have by a copious use of verbose language, concealed from the public the true facts, and have presented for consumption a statement filled with subtleties and evasions, a statement which carries on its face popular discredit, and a statement which could only be expected from a Bolshevik administration, such as at present controls and strangles the promise of Newfoundland's future.

Re-Establishment School.

Last night the Re-Establishment Night School for Sailors and Soldiers was opened, when some eighteen men were enrolled for various courses. The Vocational Officer was present and made a brief address on the importance of education to the men assembled. There were also present Mr. A. H. Whitman, Principal of the School and three assistants who have quite recently cast aside the Khaki, namely: Messrs. Victor Curtis, Hubert Greenland and Patrick Hearn.
The men who had assembled were an earnest crowd, bent on getting the best value possible out of the School with a view of increasing their chances of promotion in their several walks of life.
It is the intention of the Civil Re-Establishment Department to make the day school—a thoroughly efficient instrument. In the Day School there are over sixty men enrolled. The men are divided into small classes and the work is of an intensive character; each man being taken individually. The progress of most of the students is most encouraging.
The same intensive methods that are used in the Day School will likewise be used in the Night School and the Staff will be increased from time to time as occasion demands, so that the individual needs and circumstances of each man will be dealt with as little waste of time as possible.
In addition to fundamental subjects special facilities will be afforded for commercial and industrial subjects. It is planned to organize a class for mechanical drawing for the good of mechanics of every kind as well as a class for the generation and control and application to industries, of electricity. This class will be particularly useful to men who are engaged in motor engines of every kind that depends upon the electric spark for ignition, to electrical engineers and to all who are employing electricity in connection with power and motion. The Night School will be open on Monday, Tuesdays, Thursday and Friday of each week until further notice.
It is planned to open a work shop in the course of the next few days where the Internal Combustion Engine will be made a speciality. As soon as the arrangements for the opening of this work shop are completed, public notice will be issued. In connection with the Re-Establishment Day School a wood work shop is to be opened. The Department has happily been able to secure the Manual Training School controlled by the Superintendent of Education (Methodist). Every class attending the Re-Establishment Day School will have an opportunity of taking a course in woodworking during the afternoons. The mornings will be devoted in the woodwork shop to the men who are to be placed in the Orthopedic Hospital attached to the Empire Barracks. It is hoped by means of this work shop and by the use of suitable exercises, specially prescribed by the doctors, to restore strength and usefulness to many an injured limb.

S. A. Maternity Hospital.

A representative meeting of the Maternity Hospital Committee, consisting of ladies and gentlemen, was held in the Board of Trade Rooms this forenoon. The meeting was most enthusiastic over the work already accomplished and important plans were decided upon, and as a delegation the committee will meet the Prime Minister and the Education Committee by appointment tomorrow, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, in connection with the Hospital movement.

Women Workers.

It was a woman of Italy who first devised the special kind of gas mask which was officially adopted by the Italian government and distributed to the soldiers of that country and the Allied countries. Women committees manufactured hundreds of thousands of these masks.
Women's divisions of the United States employment service, department of labor, are receiving aid from the council of national defence in placing woman war workers.
Clarendon, Va., boasts of being the birthplace of the first woman's fire department.
An economic battle is being waged in London, England over the 1,500,000 unemployed women of the country as munitions workers during the war. Some English newspapers and commentators are asking if a sex war is one of the sinister possibilities. They point out that the situation is more dangerous than when the Suffragettes smashed windows and terrorized the London police because the women did not then know the full measure of their power.
Since the armistice was signed it has become more and more apparent that the 1,500,000 women workers would have to return to private life to give employment for returning soldiers. But they have answered the challenge of the economic condition by strong organizations to protect woman's position in industry.

Famous Plate.

The famous Marlborough plate was used at a dinner given recently by Earl Spencer at Northampton to local volunteer officers and members of the Territorial Force Association. The plate includes two gold ice palls, reported to be the largest pieces of gold plate in the country, whilst the silver includes a wine cistern weighing 2,000 ounces. The plate was last used during the King's visit to Althorp in 1913.

She had been brought up not to know how to do anything and instead of getting busy and learning, she preserved her ignorance as precisely inviolate. My friend told of dropping in upon her one noon and of hearing her say she did wish Robert would come home, she was hungry and she wanted him to get her something to eat. Perhaps she was as silly as she sounded. I doubt it. I think more likely she was proud of her incapacity.

Surely, we have much to be thankful for, that incapacity and uselessness are not so much the style as they used to be. Perhaps our children's children may see the day when people will be ashamed of uselessness.

Awarded \$25,000.

Chicago, March 21.—Mrs. Margaret Reeves, wife of Melville Reeves, known as the "sky scraper burglar," was awarded \$25,000 in damages against Nicholas Hunt, former Chief of Detectives, and Detective Sergeant Charles Grafton, on her charge of false arrest. Mrs. Reeves charged the officers, while seeking her husband, broke into her hotel apartment while she was in her bath, and compelled her to dress in their presence. She sued for \$75,000. The award was made by a jury.

If potato peelings are dried, they will make a quick fire.

Beware of the Law.

When A Penny May Cost \$2,000. The Scoteman who spent £160 in a futile attempt to recover a disputed halfpenny extra fare from a tramway company, may count himself a lucky man compared with some others who have found litigation a much more costly game to play.

Such a disillusioned man was a Highbury resident who defended an action for a penny fare brought against him by a London omnibus company. When the verdict was given against him, he appealed again and again, carrying his case to the Supreme Tribunal, the House of Lords, and always employing the most costly counsel.

When judgment was finally given in favour of the plaintiff-company, he found himself after six months' litigation compelled to pay his penny, and with it a bill of costs amounting to well over £9,000.

In another case a dog which stole a sausage, valued at three-farthings, from a Glasgow butcher's shop, was responsible for a useful lesson in the risks of appealing to the law. The defendant pleaded that he was not the owner of the felonious dog; and, strong in his sense of innocence, fought valiantly from court to court until his final appeal left him a loser, with a bill of £4,000 to settle.

A mud-splashed tie. The company declined to pay; twice the plaintiff scored a favourable verdict; but on the last appeal the decision was given against him; and in addition to having to pay for the repairs, he was called on to write a cheque for £3,500 for costs.

In the case of Burnet vs. Brent the plaintiff claimed the modest sum of three-and-sixpence, to replace a tie ruined by a mud-splash from the hoofs of the defendant's horse. Here again the plaintiff was twice successful, before a second appeal turned the tables on him by deciding in favour of Mr. Brent; and the owner of the ruined tie had to submit, with what grace he could, to final defeat and the payment of a sum of £4,330.

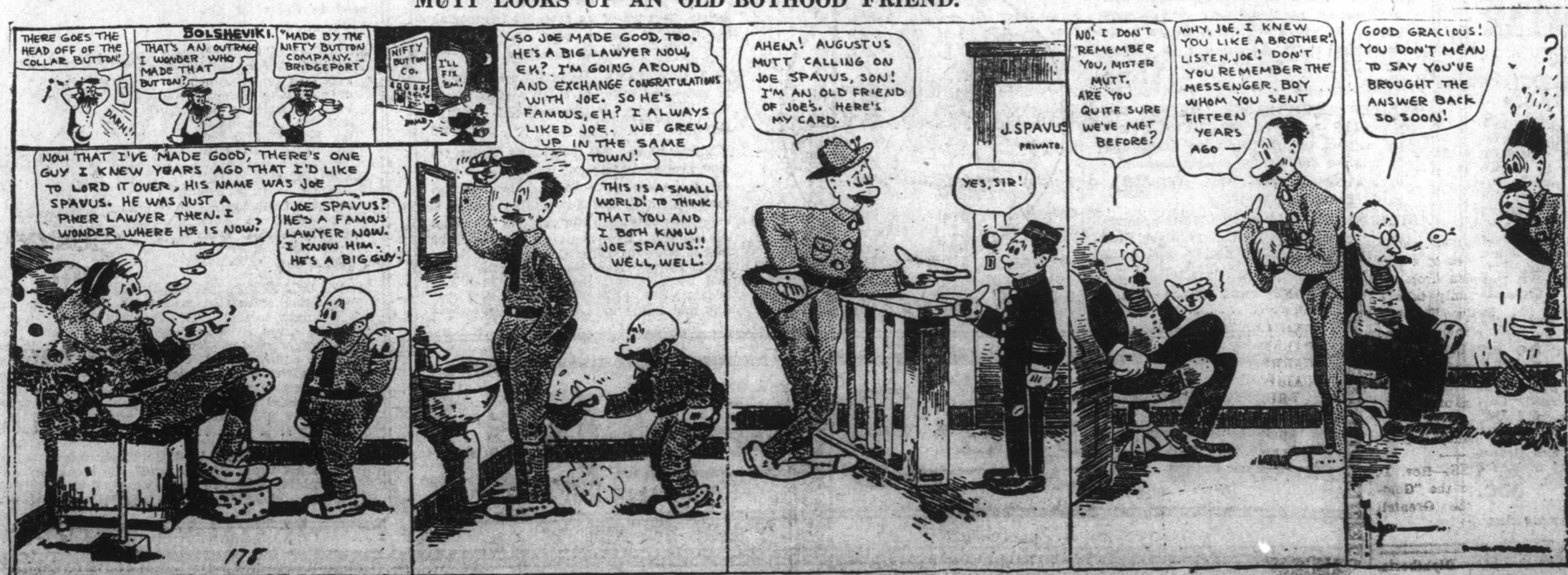

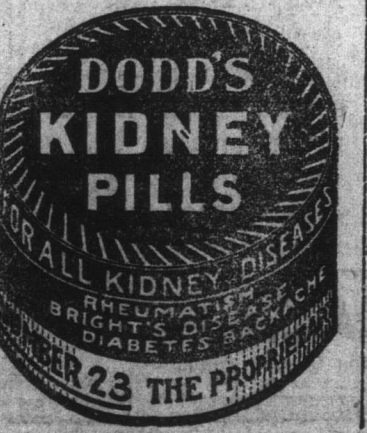
