



BELFASTS LOYALLY OB-SERVE EVENT.

BELFAST, July 13.—Special Star Cable.)—Grey skies and drenching rain cannot dampen the enthusiasm of Belfast Orangemen. Despite the bad weather yesterday's twelfth of July demonstration was a record in every way. Never have so many grimly determined men marched in the procession; never was there such a banner display, and never has the appalling noise of Belfast drums sounded so

This year the concentration point for the fervid oratory incidential to the twelfth was at Finaghy, four miles from the city's centre. Here, loyal Orangemen from every corner of the British Empire were bidding Belfast to be of good cheer and bringing striking confirmation of Carson's words, "Ulster has many friends in Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Africa who, in the hours of difficulty, that God knew might come quickly enough, could be relied on to rush to Ulster's assistance to maintain the old motto, "No surrender." Prominent in the procession were the new banners presented by Canadian Lodges and now unfurled for the first time.

The Londonderry demonstrations having been forbidden by the military authorities, a detachment from that city composed of men who took part in the recent fighting, were given pride of place in the Belfast celebraiton and, in their midst, was carried the flag of Canada. Throughout the whole procession heavy emphasis was laid on the Orange support forthcoming from the Dominions.

At mid-day no untoward incident had occurred. The military precautions were so complete that any conflict between the Belfast processionists and the rival body was averted.







A Sugar Myth.

The story of sugar selling in the Philippine Islands at five cents the pound, while it costs from twentyfive to thirty cents in the United States turns out to be a sweet illusion, says the New York "Herald." Sugar retails in Manila at twentyfive cents, stocks are short and speculators hold very little.

This is the substance of an an nouncement by Senator McNary (Oregon) following an exchange of telegrams with Manila. On May 29 he cabled to the acting Governor-General: "Committee on Agriculture of United States Senate investigating the sugar shortage is advised that refined sugar is retailing in Manila at five cents a pound and that great quantities of sugar are stored in warehouses awaiting cargo vessels. As chairman of the committee, would be greatly pleased to have information covering this subject."

To this inquiry he received the following reply: "Referring to telegram from your office of the 29th ult., refined sugar retailing in Manila at twenty-five cents, United States currency, a pound, and twenty-six cents in Iloilo currency. According to leading dealers and exporters of sugar, stock on hand under contract for delivery will all be shipped away by the middle of July. Only 5,000 to 10,-000 tons, both centrifugal and muscovado, still in the hands of speculators. There is no congestion of sugar in warehouses."





Radium, the most wonderful of the netals and used chiefly as a cure for cancer, is produced at the rate of one ounce per year, which is valued at about \$3,000,000. The accumulated stores of the whole world amount to only four ounces. In actual practice the surgeon generally uses a minimum of fifty miligrams of the powerful substance, which quantity, of about the size of a match head, costs him \$600. Radium metal is shaped into a tiny rod no larger than a small piece of the lead of a pencil which is encased in a glass capsule and hermetically sealed, as any contact by the surgeon's fingers with the radium


