"Listen," proceeded the steward, "and you will then know that there is a volcano at your feet. In the first place, you are not the child of Lady Stanhope, but a changeling."

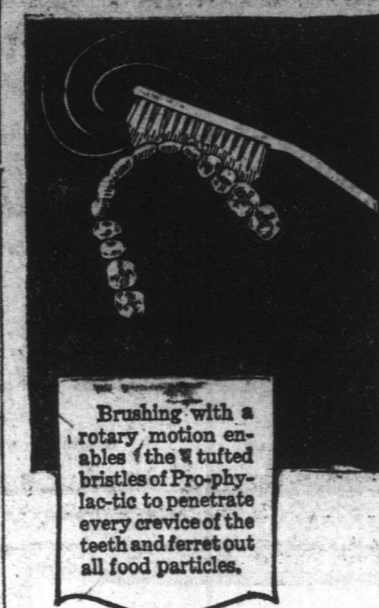
"It's an infamous lie!" roared Lord Cecil.

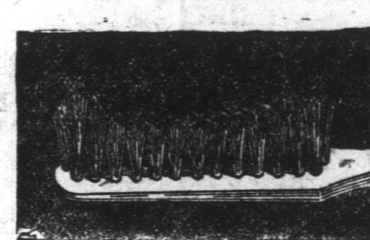

### Coronation of George IV.

The ceremony in Westminster Abbey at the coronation of George IV. on July 19, 1821, lasted from eleven o'clock to four, and was succeeded by a still more splendid display in Westminster Hall, which wore a new aspect. Two tiers of galleries supported by twenty iron pillars, were crowded by the fortunate persons admitted to witness the spectacle. Six dinner tables, each fifty-six feet long, accommodated the numerous guests who had the honour of being bidden to the banquet. Twenty-eight magnificent lustres, each containing sixty wax candles, were suspended by chains of gold from the roof. The King's throne was placed immediately under the south window of the Hall, and six gilt gothic elbow-chairs were prepared for the other members of the Royal Family. The first course was ushered in with a magnificent procession, in which Lord Howard, of Effingham as Deputy Earl Marshal, the Duke of Wellington as Lord High Constable, and Lord Anglesea, as Lord High Steward, rode on horseback. The course being served, the entrance was again cleared, and young Dymoke, hereditary Champion of England, mounted on a horse borrowed from Assley's Theatre, rode into the Hall, threw down his gauntlet, and delivered his challenge. These and other ceremonies being completed, the company proceeded to the discussion of the princely banquet which had been served up to them. One hundred and sixty tureens of soup, one hundred and sixty hot joints, and more than three thousand other dishes had been prepared for the company, while more than eight hundred dozens of wine and one hundred gallons of punch were provided at the magnificent feast. At night time London was ablaze with brilliant illuminations; fireworks were displayed in all the parks, and fireballs cast additional brightness on the scene; while a brig of war decked from stem to stern, was moored off the Strand, London, indulged in an universal revel, in which, it is computed, five hundred thousand people shared in some way or another; and amidst this vast aggregation of people there was no riot, no disorder, and no ill-humour.

### Wilson's Murderers.

In the debate on the assassination of Sir Henry Wilson, Mr. Shortt, M. P., said that neither of the two men charged with the crime had any connection with Ireland. They were both Londoners, both formerly soldiers, both resided at home with their parents, and there was no evidence that they had ever lived in Ireland or their lives. Furthermore, the War Office authorities were satisfied that the revolver found on the body of Sir Henry Wilson was not the same as the one used in the assassination. The statement of Mr. Shortt must have proved gratifying to the friends of Ireland in the House, as it did to those outside.

There have been assassinations in England, with Englishmen as the assassins, but that did not detract from the Englishman's reputation of being the most law-abiding person in the world. A premier of the United Kingdom was once assassinated. That was Premier Percival. A very fellow once tried to murder King Edward, when he was Prince of Wales, although that royal personage, noted for his broadmindedness and good nature, was the last person anyone with an ounce of sense would think of killing. Attempts were made on the life of Queen Victoria. Army Officers have been murdered by men former-

ly under them, who had fancied or real grievances. The soldier who has been harshly disciplined, bears an ill-grudge against every officer of whatever army, and if a little unbalanced could easily get himself to the point of making an attempt on the life of any officer of high rank.

Field Marshal Wilson was an able soldier with a great war record, admired by probably hundreds of thousands of men in the British Army. Among those multitudes, however, there are probably some cranks and wickedly-inclined men who would not hesitate to commit murder for any cause that seized their fancy. It was two ex-soldiers who shot Sir Henry Wilson dead, at any rate, and they were Londoners.

It must appear strange to the ordinary mind how in the first newspaper despatches sent out the alleged assassins were classed as members of the Irish Republican Army, that they spoke with a distinct brogue and were Irish gunmen. It only goes to prove that very little reliance can be placed on the accounts in the newspapers of happenings in Ireland. The men arrested, it found guilty will pay for their crime, according to British law, and it is well that neither with the murder nor the subsequent proceedings was the Irish nation concerned. Ireland's leaders have worries enough now without being called upon to bear the burden of crime they are not responsible for.—The Review.

### Early Cables

FARMERS LEAD IN  
**MANITOBA ELECTIONS.**  
 WINNIPEG, Man., July 18.  
 At 7.30 o'clock to-night it was predicted, from incomplete returns at hand of to-day's provincial election, the farmers would have the largest group in the next Legislature. More constituencies must be heard from before it can be known whether or not they will have a majority over all. The summary so far shows the Farmers have elected fourteen, Liberals three, Conservatives four, Independents two, Labor two, in doubt twenty-seven, deferred three, total fifty-five.

LATER.  
 WINNIPEG, July 18.  
 Manitoba is to have a government of united farmers. To-day the Liberal Government of Hon. T. C. Norris was rejected. Premier Norris himself was returned in Landsdowne and Attorney General Robert Jacob in Winnipeg, but three ministers were defeated. Mr. Norris will lead a group of about eight members, one of four opposition groups confronting the Farmer party which is expected to have the support of a clear majority over all. The Farmers, outside of ten seats in Winnipeg, secured twenty-four members. In Winnipeg they appear to have only one supporter. They will also likely have the support of J. H. Edmison, Fusion candidate in Brandon, and it is considered the Farmers have an excellent chance of electing their candidates in the three deferred elections. In a Legislature of fifty-five members it is considered a Government can elect a speaker and carry on with a total of twenty-four members, particularly when the Opposition is divided as in this case and there is no thought to-night that anything can prevent the United Farmers from entering into control of the Administration at an early date. The Conservatives will have six or at most seven in the new House and the Labor five or six.

### Will Tobacco Be Next?

(From the Review.)  
 The first impulse of the average smoker will be to laugh at the mere notion that he is ever to be deprived of his tobacco, but in view of what has happened in the United States, and what is happening in Canada even now there is ground for reflection. We do not say that the danger is imminent, but we would point out that as with all other reforms those in Canada who wish to see tobacco placed on the taboo list are professional reformers, and they must show results, as with the prohibitionists, if they are to draw their salaries. It has been calculated that in the United States upwards of forty millions a year is given by people to professional reform movements. The reformer has one of the finest businesses in existence, and thrives fat thereon. Generally, they are a class of ignorant people who could do little if they had to make their living honestly. They have the virtue of determination, and the crop of "suckers" is always in existence.

### Printers' Strike Over a Year Old.

The strike of the International Typographical Union for a 44-hour week began a year ago last June. In the interval 75,000 members of the Union remaining at work paid in the sum of \$3,500,000, of which sum \$8,800,000 has been expended to maintain the nine thousand men who went on strike. Of the original nine thousand who downed tools, six thousand remain on the Union's hands, the balance having either deserted, the Union or branched into other activities. From the point of view of the International Typographical Union the contest has been disastrous. For instance, in Canada previous to June, 1921, practically every large printing plant was unionized. To-day with one or two exceptions there is not a commercial printing plant of the first rank that is under Union jurisdiction. In September, 1920, 59 per cent of the employees of commercial printing plants in the United States and Canada were Union shops, and 41 per cent were non-union or open shops. In September, 1921, 28 per cent were union shops, though 14 per cent of those shops were on a 48-hour basis, and 72 per cent of production was in non-union or open shops on a 48-hour basis.

The failure of the executive officers of the International Typographical Union to estimate the economic trend of business, together with the union's despotic ruling that the 44-hour demand could not be arbitrated, unquestionably lost them the victory that might have been theirs under different circumstances.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

### Colonial Ancestors of the Volstead Act.

Although the Colonial Virginians were hard-riding, hard-drinking, hospitable, and gallant gentlemen, little inclined to brook undue restraints of their personal liberty by legislation, it is recorded that they did, at one time attempt to enforce a prohibition measure. In "Potomac Landings" Paul Willstach tells about the fate of this ancestor of the Volstead Act. "Small 'tipping houses,' probably mere drinking bars, for the refreshment of travelers became so numerous that Virginia passed her first prohibition laws limiting each county to one at the courthouse and one at a public landing or ferry. But the law was not popular and was quickly swept aside, says Mr. Willstach. The inns and coffee houses were so attractive with their convivial tap rooms that they became an embarrassment to the colonial government for the clerks in the provincial offices spent far more time 'tipping at their bars than in recording deeds in the government offices. Jellie's tavern in St. Mary's City, the first capital of Maryland, was so alluring that the council in 1696 requested the mayor and aldermen to suppress it. The legislature also made stringent laws regarding the comfort of the traveler. The St. Mary's bottlers, according to Mr. Willstach, were obliged to have at least twenty leather beds, and in their tables they were required to furnish room for at least twenty horses.

"To all these victims of the exorbitant bootlegger who regret the days when a drink was a drink instead of a transaction in high finance the Maryland laws against profiteering in liquors will be interesting. Among the charges fixed by the legislature were Brandy, malaga, and cherry, 10 shillings per gallon; canary, 12 shillings; French, Rhenish, Dutch, and English wines, 6 shillings; Rum, 3 shillings; plain cider, 25 and bottled cider, 30 lbs. tobacco per quart. Lodging in bed with sheets was also fixed at 12 pence, and diet 1 shilling per meal."

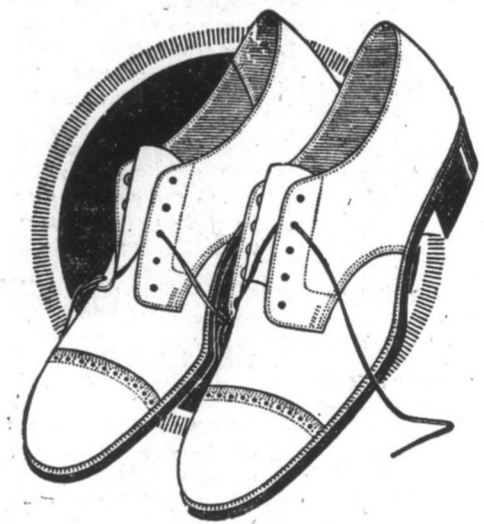

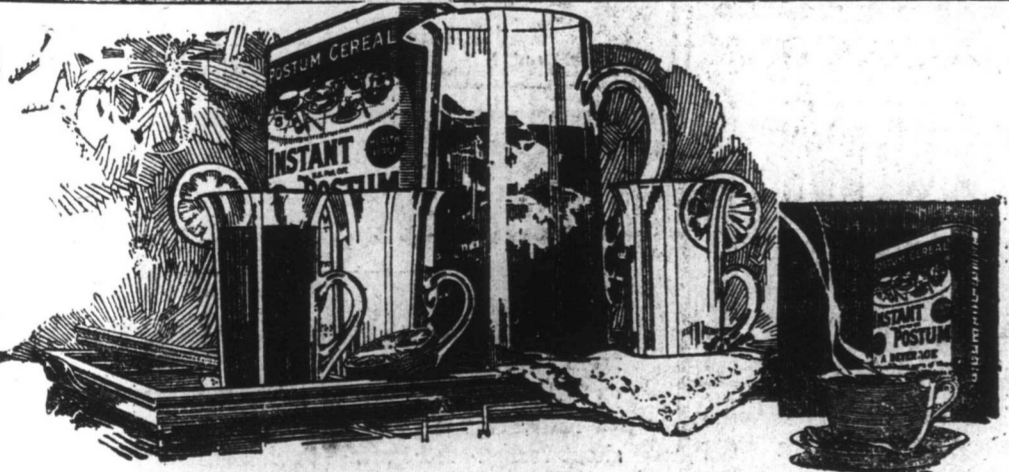

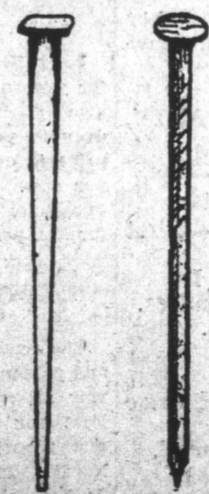
