The Market By-Law.

The Council at its meeting on Monday night passed the By-law containing several amendments to the Market By-law, which came into force last summer. As we have already stated, the principal change effected in the By-law is the alteration of the hours at which produce may be bought by dealers and retailers. Heretofore, these could not purchase any produce brought into market before 10 o'clock in the summer months and 11 o'clock in the winter. Now the By-law is changed so as to permit these dealers and retailers to buy produce during the summer months on and after 9 o'clock, and in the winter months on and after 10 o'clock.

The only change affecting the buying or selling of wood, or bringing it into market is the clause which will be enforced on the 1st of January, requiring all parties bringing wood on to the Market Square for sale to have it piled on a square rack. This regulation is only obligatory on those who stand the market. Parties who have contracts to fill in town can, as before, bring their wood in any kind of rack they please.

We notice that a correspondent in our columns to-day complains that the sale of wood is put under market regulations at all, and thinks that in the matter of measurement, quality, &c., these things could easily be adjusted between the buyer and seller. He is labouring under a great mistake, and if he was living in town, and had his wood to buy by the load on the market he would soon find it out. The sale of cordwood is regulated by law in every market town in the Province, and it is right and just, and necessary for the interests of all parties that it should be so. It is as much a marketable commodity as butter or eggs, and as such its sale is regulated by enactment of Council. As regards contracts, the Council does not interfere in the matter any more than collecting the fee, the same as if the wood was brought on the market for sale. The party receiving the wood on contract may employ the Town officer, appointed for that purpose, to measure it, for which he charges 5 cents a cord, and both seller and buyer must take such measurement as the correct one.

The clause respecting the fee of 10 cents per cord, collected on each cord delivered by contract remains as before, and is in full force.

Mr. Horsman Declines.

A REMARKABLE OLD WOMAN.

On Friday, September 19, 1872, near Dunvegan in the ninth Concession of Kenyon, Co. (Glengarry), died Ann Campbell, a native of the Isle of Skye, Scotland. She was born in the Parish of Bracadale, in 1741, and at her death reached the great age of 131 years. The greater part of her life was spent as a dairy-maid in the employment of some of the first families of her native island. In 1771, when 30 years of age, she entered the employment of the Marrays of Glashornish, with whom she remained till 1821, or for fifty years. Immediately after she entered that of Malcolm Nicholson, Esq., father-in-law of Dr. Bethune of Toronto, with whom she remained for seven years. In 1828, at the advanced age of 87, she emigrated to Canada with a number of her countrymen, who settled in the rear of Kenyon, among whom she passed her 44 years of Canadian life. The pioneers who were in the prime of life when she came to the country are gone, and she seemed to be so lightly dealt with by time that little difference could be seen in her appearance for the last 40 years. She retained her intellect intact to the last, and was capable of doing all the work which could be expected of a person 50 years of age. She would pass hours in singing the Gaelic songs of her country, or giving an account of many of the events which took place in her younger days. She was able, up to the Monday preceding her death, to follow her former occupation of milking cows,—this she did not do from necessity, but for the pleasure it gave her, and she imagined that her longevity depended altogether on her vocation. She was never married.

OPENING OF BARKLEY BLOCK SCHOOL HOUSE.—The handsome and commodious new school house erected in Section No. 5, Guelph Township, will be formally opened on Friday evening, the 27th inst., when an entertainment will be held in connection therewith. THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Bismarck Relieved. Carlist Bands Defeated. Fourteen Fenians Arrested. Heavy Storm in England. The "Bucoria" Wrecked. The Slave Trade.

Berlin, Dec. 17.—Gen. Von Boon will act provisionally as president of Prussian Council of Ministers, the Emperor having granted Bismarck's request to be relieved. Madrid, Dec. 17.—Three Carlist bands were defeated and dispersed by the Government troops on the 16th. London, Dec. 17.—Fourteen ringleaders in the disorderly demonstrations at the Fenian Amnity meeting at Stockton, on Sunday, have been sent to prison for various terms.

London, Dec. 18.—7:40.—The funeral of Lady Beaconsfield takes place on Thursday. It will be strictly private. It has been storming for the last six hours, and the rain that fell has been the heaviest of the season. A large tract of land in Leicestershire is inundated. In Derbyshire the rain has now fallen to the depth of 15 inches. Telegraph lines in all directions are badly damaged. Telegraphic communications with Liverpool, Leeds and Hull are interrupted. At Grimsby, the gale was a hurricane, and many casualties are reported. The Daily News, commenting on President Grant's message, trusts that his recommendation for the abolition of slavery in Cuba will be successful with the Spanish Government.

The ship Bucoria from Philadelphia for Rotterdam went ashore in a storm near Bolgas, and became a total wreck. All on board were saved except one. Alexandria, Dec. 17.—Sir Bartle Frere, who is now en route to Aden, to join the British expedition for the suppression of the African slave trade, arrived here this afternoon.

The Tremont Hotel, village of Welland, was burned down on Tuesday morning.

SHOOTING MATCH.—The return match between the Eramosa and the Fergus Rifle Companies comes off in the field near Dryden's Hotel, Eramosa, on Friday the 27th inst., when an excellent day's sport may be anticipated.

Bracing themselves up for another struggle, they began to move forward again, when both plunged into the centre of a wreath some four feet in depth.

"I could lie where I am," continued Harry. "I have a feeling as if I could go right off to sleep."

Blinded, bewildered, and nearly suffocated, they staggered about in helpless impotence and grasped at each other for support.

ANOTHER LARGE FIRE IN HAMILTON.—On Tuesday evening, the smouldering ruins of the fire which broke out on Monday afternoon again burst into flames, and before anything could be done to check their progress, they had communicated with J. Davis & Co.'s store, the building which was saved with great difficulty last night, and which was gutted in a very short time. The Bank of Commerce, which stands within a few feet of the burned buildings, owing to the intense heat, took fire several times, but the flames were extinguished before they had time to communicate with the interior, which proved its salvation. For had the fire got under the roof, which is covered with iron, its destruction would have been certain. James Turner & Co.'s large wholesale grocery, which stands immediately in rear, and only separated by a space of about six feet, was also on fire, and at one time the volume of smoke and flame which issued therefrom was such as to cause grave apprehensions for the safety of the entire establishment; but fortunately the efforts of the fire brigade, assisted by the employees of the firm, proved successful. Had it been otherwise, there is no telling where the destructive element would have stopped. The total loss cannot be far short of \$100,000.

ONTARIO TEMPERANCE LEAGUE.—A special convention of the Temperance and Prohibitory League of the Province of Ontario held its first sitting in the Temperance Hall, Toronto, on Tuesday. The Rev. A. Sutherland, President of the League, occupied the chair. After an address from the President, verbal reports from the various representatives of temperance organizations in each of the counties of the Province were then presented; and suitable persons for county secretaries were also nominated. Mr. Neville, of Cobourg, then delivered an address entitled, "How can the work be systematically carried on in each county?" At the evening session interesting addresses were given by Mr. Gibbons, on "The Evils of the License System, and Defects of the Present Law." Rev. Mr. Scott, of Oshawa, spoke upon "What the Liquor Traffic costs the Country." Mr. Thos. Nixon also read an able essay upon "Prohibition, the only Effectual Remedy."

THE TROUBLE AMONG THE MEDICOS.—The Ontario medical students have secured through unity of action—the medicals of Toronto Colleges, Queen's College, Kingston, and McGill College, Montreal, having unanimously agreed to the resolutions adopted at the mass meeting in Toronto. The Medical Council aroused at last, have requested an interview with a deputation of students, which has been arranged to take place on Friday. The executive committee, which meets them, are understood to be divided upon some of the questions included in the resolutions.
Hon. Mr. McKellar, Commissioner of Public Works for Ontario, and Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Chief Superintendent of Education, have gone to Ottawa. Their business will be in connection with the selection of a site for the Normal School.

THE LATE FIRE AT MR. BURTON'S.—In the report of this fire in our issue of the 5th one or two inaccuracies occur which we now correct.
