THE GUELPH LOTTERY

IS A BIGGER BUSINESS THAN THE
LOND ON MASONIC.

It is the "product of some interested Land
Lords Who Wish to Enticed—Repu-
blished as the Gentlemen Who Were
Published as Sponsors—Some Easy
Reading.

To say that Guelph was shocked is not
overstating the case, when The World
of Tuesday came to hand with its exposure
of the Guelph opera house lottery swindle.
The five hundred extra copies of the paper
that were sent to the town sold like hot
cakes, and in an hour or two that said
presbyterian town was in a lurch. Not a
word had appeared in the local papers; the
Herald was mum because of its connection
with Chadwick, one of the published pro-
moters, and not a word was to be found in
the Mercury, though it must have known
all about the swindle. Many of the gentle-
men whose names had been used as promoters
or sponsors held that they had been im-
posed on, while not a few were sorry that
they had ever lent themselves to a veni-
fiable project. It seemed to look ten
times as bad in private as when they talked
it over in public.

The country has been flooded with cir-
cuses and prospectuses of the scheme, and
many persons who have been forwarded them
to The World.

The trust deed under which this nefari-
ous scheme is proposed to be carried out
was never submitted to the Hon. J. Rob-
inson, Q.C., but only a set of questions,
which that gentleman answered, stating
that the scheme was not in his opinion within
the scope of the lottery act.

There is no guarantee in the deed that
the surplus profit of this lottery will be used
in the erection of an opera house and no ac-
curacy whatever to ticket-holders.

The proposed sale of tickets and the
redemption of the same is as follows: On
75 per cent of the tickets—holders requesting
the trustees to convert the land into
money, the trustees are to do so. This is
a clause in the deed. What the promoters
propose to do to get the required 75 per
cent is to get the consent from the pur-
chaser on the sale of the ticket—thus by
the very act of sale of ticket converting the
scheme into a money one. The sale of each
ticket and no tidings have been received
thereof, one set, and there can be no such
thing as joint tenancy or other saving pro-
vision as contained in the deed.

The scheme is a money one from the
inception. The property offered belongs to
John L. Murphy, a student in E. J. O'Connor's
office, to E. J. Chadwick, to A. D. Coffey, to E. O'Connor, etc., and is
principally composed of lots which are prac-
tically unsalable in Guelph. Hence the
scheme to get rid of them at owner's prices.
The price at which these lands are valued is
\$125,000. Murphy's share is \$31,000, O'Connor's
\$31,000, Chadwick's \$31,000, Coffey's \$31,000,
and the remainder of \$20,000 is to be
divided among the trustees under the deed.
The Guelph opera house company to be allowed
to redeem at \$104,000, thus getting the
start of the ticket holders \$31,000 less than
what it is given to the trustees under the
deed.

Respectable men of Guelph are down on
the scheme, which has only been known
during the past few days. It is a
Murphy's in the contracting party with the
trustees. There is no machinery or means
by which the trustees can possibly get any
control of the money. The proceeds of
sales of tickets will be paid to the secretary
or treasurer of the Guelph opera house com-
pany, who is not responsible to the trustees.
Murphy is not bound in any way, and there is
not the slightest security that the money will
ever be paid over to the trustees.

REPUTATING THE PROJECT.

The following is a copy of a letter from
Guelph yesterday and show the lottery
swindle up better than anything else.

Sir: Having had my attention drawn to
an article in your paper of this date re-
garding the Guelph Opera House Lottery, I
beg to state that the party named
Murphy is not J. E. McElderry, treasurer, Guelph,

TO THE EDITOR OF THE WORLD.

Sir: If your article on the opera house
scheme for Guelph is correct you are right
in denouncing the whole affair as an outrage
on respectability. The organization seems
to be in plain English a fraud, and the
means adopted by some of the promoters to
secure respectable names in order to cloak
the iniquity of the lottery, are to say the
least, "very shabby." The name of myself
as one of the committee, the first
information I had of this matter was from your

THE SWINDLE DEFENDED.

The Guelph Herald, the organ of Mr.
Chadwick, one of the promoters of the
swindle, mustered up enough courage to
come to the defense of the swindle last
night. But the defence is nothing but
blatant lies. Not one word of explana-
tion is offered. Here is the only at-
tempt at it:

It is unnecessary for us to vindicate the pub-
lisher whose name is connected with the
Guelph Opera House Lottery. It is un-
derstood the answer will be conciliatory.
In connection with this correspondence the

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THE GREAT FLOODS IN THE STATES.

Enormous Loss of Property in Penn-
sylvania—A Big Fire in a Colliery.

The despatches last night were full of
further details concerning the great floods
now prevailing in Pennsylvania, Illinois

borhood of Wilkesbarre, Easton, Scranton,
Pottsville, Allentown and Ashland, Pa.;

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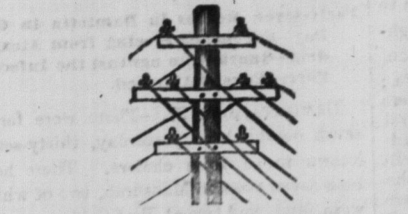
