

### FINANCE AND TRADE.

Trade in Canada has been very flat the past week. Prices of leading staples continue low, and the outlook is anything but satisfactory. American firms are selling cottons and many descriptions of iron manufactures in this city and Montreal for the sake of getting the cash, ignoring altogether any profits that otherwise might accrue. Prices of these articles are consequently lower.

Bradstreets says: The unfavorable condi-tion prevailing in commercial industrial circles throughout the United States, with the prospect for no material improvement during the summer, marks the present season as probably the dullest relatively for season as probably the dullest relatively for 20 years. At no time since panic and business depression manifested themselves last year have reports as to the volume of sales of merchandise, the manufacture of staple goods and the indisposition of merchants generally to buy except for absolutely immediate wants been so pronounced and so gentle throughout the country as during the past few weeks.

General trade in the Canadian Dominion is quite as dull as in the U.S., but has been

General trade in the Canadian Dominion is quite as dull as in the U.S., but has been particularly restricted this week owing to the intervention of a holiday. Montreal reports no apparent prospect for an early trade revival with merchant and manufacturer doing very slow and only dulness in sight. The discharge of many railroad employes intensifies the trade depression. Low ocean freight rates render shipping unprofitable, but it is noted that woolen manufacturers are starting up in some nanufacturers are starting up in some istances now that uncertainty as to the tariff is removed there.



It is an acceptable way in which to dispose of the tough end of a porterhouse steak, which should never be allowed to come on the table with the rest of the steak, but should be either minced for Hamburg balls or used in a stew. To season a pound and a half of Hamburg steak add a teaspoonful of enion juice, a liberal teaspoonful of salt and a saltspoonful of pepper. The meat must be minced as fine as sausage meat, and there should be neither fat nor sinews with it. A chopped onion minced very fine or a good-sized shallot may take the place of the onion juice. The minced beef may now be moulded into ittle/cakes and broiled, or, if you prefer, dipped into the yolk of egg and bread crumbs, and fried brown. This will keep it rare in the center, as it should be. Indeed, a Hamburg streak is sometimes served at gentlemen's suppers without cooking. It must then be made of the tenderest meat and garnished with anchovies, capers and parsley, and highly seasoned. This practice of eating raw beef, however, is not commended now by physicians as it formerly was, when mothers often gave little children well-seasoned, scraped beef as a tonic.—New York Tribune.
