THE RESULTS AT GRAVESEND.

Rampage Defeats Pickpocket.—A 20 to 1 shot in Front—A Wet and Heavy Track.
New York, May 25.—The promise of fine weather drew a large crowd of spectators to the track at Gravesend this afternoon. The track was wet and heavy, and it will be several days before it will be anything like good condition.

In the opening race the calculations of the talent were all upset, a 20-to-1 chance winning easily.
The second race was won by a favorite, Rampage, who after being ridden hard, with hand and heel, came under the wire's half length ahead of Pickpocket, who beat Prince Klamath 15 lengths for the place.

King Gold delayed the start for the third race for 20 minutes, but the field finally got away in good order.
Chicago was first to show in front, but Corn Cob soon took the lead, which he was forced to give up as soon as they were straightened for home to Glad, who was never afterwards headed.

To a good start in the fourth race Hartford went off in the lead, but Judge Morrow passed him and showed the way to the home stretch, where he gave up to George Brock, who, after a hard drive, won by an open length, Judge Morrow second, Galloping King third.

The fifth race was run in a heavy rain. Rubicon set a killing pace from the start clear around to the home stretch, where he was overtaken by a desperate drive, Dorian finally winning by a neck from Rubicon, who beat Armitage eight lengths for the place.

In the sixth race St. Vincent got a slight advantage at the start and held it to the clubhouse turn, but here Potash rushed up and took the lead, which he easily held to the end.
The Ponch colt made a strong endeavor to run away with the seventh. He beat the flag and set a killing pace to the last sixteenth, where he was overtaken by a neck from Potash, who won by a neck from Rubicon, who beat Armitage eight lengths for the place.

Why Our Mines Remain Underdeveloped. The Liberal party, led by Sir Oliver Mowat, has been twenty years in power. Yet it has accomplished nothing at all in the development of Ontario's iron mines.

Sir Oliver Mowat has done nothing to develop these mines. He belongs to a party that is opposed on principle to the expenditure of money or to protection of any sort that tends to develop any of our infant industries.

Our country which possesses rich resources of soil, timber and minerals, and which has large numbers of unemployed men, is not doing all that it can do to develop its resources.

What about Mr. Meredith's intentions? Well, whatever he may do or fail to do, he cannot come out worse than Premier Mowat.

The Liberals at Ottawa and the Liberals of Ontario have the same ideas in regard to the development of this country. At Ottawa they are in the minority, and consequently they are unable to close up the factories and workshops that the National Policy brought into existence.

Ontario and Michigan saw mills. Michigan is still the first pine lumber-producing State of the Union. The maximum production has been reached, however, and the Upper Peninsula mills that are heavily on Canada for material, no less than 206,000,000 feet have been rafted across the lakes last season.
