So far is this true that on four occasions predictions of probable explosions were made and were verified and this not in thunderstorms, but from electrical disturbance. He emphasizes the necessity of perfect connections and the rigid exclusion of all good substances, of which iron and dust are the most in evidence, from the interior of magazines, which is all the more imperative because explosions during thunderstorms are caused by the return shock.


