DOES THE MIND DIE?

WHAT HISTORY SAYS IN ANSWER TO THE QUESTION.

Post Mortem Intelligence—Instances of Decapitated Heads Speaking and Other Marvels Which Have Been Preserved to Us by the Old Chronicles—The Case of Frederick of Baden.

The remarkable experiment recently made upon the head of the decapitated Abbe Bruneau in France, as related recently in The Times, is by no means without precedent. It has been read much in history without coming across curious stories of apparent sensation and thought after execution; some of them go back to such remote periods that they are in general regarded as deserving to be placed in a category with the wondrous discoveries of Marco Polo and Ferdinand Mendez Pinto, but subsequent explorers have verified many things in the history of the subject.

The curious in such matters will find that historians relate a remarkable instance of speech after execution which recalls the story of the head of the post-musical, Orpheus, which was said to have still murmured after execution. In the execution of Conradin, a young prince of the house of Hohenstaufen, who was executed in the waters of Hebrus. This instance occurred in the thirteenth century; the executioner was a certain Frederick of Baden executed on the Market Place in Naples. These two young princes had invaded the Kingdom of Sicily in the name of their father, Charles of Anjou, who were held by him prisoners for a year and then condemned to execution.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER IS LAY.

His Condition Will Prevent Him Coming to Canada—The Railway General.

London, Dec. 21.—Assistant Manager Humphries of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway has personally superintended the fitting out and draping of the royal saloon carriage, Victoria, which has been placed in the hands of those having in hand the arrangements for the conveyance to Portsmouth of the remains of Sir John Thompson. The carriage is beautifully fitted up as a mortuary chapel, draped in black with a canopy of black velvet, relieved by silver staves over the head of the bier. At the back of the canopy stands a massive silver cross, the sides of which are placed at intervals around the bier, and at the head is a handsome crucifix. The ceiling of the carriage is covered with the Dominion flag. Special arrangements have been made for conducting devotional services during the journey. A number of clergymen will accompany the remains for that purpose. Similar arrangements have been made for the voyage across the Atlantic.

Under the Union Jack.

The entire staff of the Dominion's office in London will leave the building at about 11:30 o'clock on Monday. The under-taker in whose charge the body has been since its removal from Wianadee bears with grief panels will receive the body and convey it to the Victoria Station. A Union Jack will be spread over the coffin to the car.

The Queen Represented.

Mr. Sydney Burton, Under-Secretary, has sent a cross of gold, and the staff of the Colonial Office has sent a wreath with a cross of gold.

Arrangements at Halifax.

Ottawa, Dec. 21.—A. H. M. S. Blenheim is expected to arrive at Halifax on Wednesday, the 23rd inst., and to depart on Jan. 1 and 2 and to return on Thursday.

The Government has placed a private railway car at the disposal of Lady Thompson and her family, who are expected to leave for Halifax on Friday.

The Governor-General has intimated that the intention is to send the remains to Halifax on the same day as the arrival of the Blenheim.

Post-mortem Examination.
