A \$73,000 Block Destroyed—Three Lives Reported Lost,
Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 24.—Flames broke out in the Williamson block, southeast corner of Euclid-avenue and Monument-square, at 2 o'clock this morning. In five minutes the entire building, which had a frontage of 100 feet in Euclid-avenue, was a mass of flames. The ground floor was occupied by Benfield Brothers' drug store, Meiners' jewelry store and the Goodyear Rubber Company, the four upper stories being filled with business offices. In all there were about sixty tenants in the building was gutted, only the walls remaining. The handsome new Cuyahora building caught in several places, and the firemen directed their efforts to save that structure.
