ANNAPOLIS. IN THE COURT OF SESSIONS, APRIL TERM, 1877.

Court met in the Court House, Annapolis, on Tuesday, 17th inst., at ten o'clock, a. m.

Present.—Justices W. Y. Foster, Mills, Corbett, Spurr, J. P. Foster, W. B. Troop, A. Langley, Silas Potter, Barbeau, Daniels, Geo. Dittmars.

In the absence of the Custos, W. Y. Foster, Esq., was appointed chairman.

Upon reading and considering the Memorial of the Fire Wardens of Bridge-town, asking for authority from the Court to assess the district of Bridge-town in the sum of two hundred dollars for fire purposes, it is ordered by the Court, that the prayer of the memorialists be granted.

Ordered, That a Committee of three Justices of this Court be appointed to make inquiry about the character and condition of the lamnias belonging to this County, now in the Provincial Lunatic Asylum at the expense of the County, with a view of withdrawing from the Asylum an early day such as are harmless and are not likely to derive benefit from a longer continuance therein; and, further, that any expenses consequent upon the foregoing Order be chargeable to the Contingent Fund of the County.

Ordered, That the horses and Cattle be not allowed to run at large on the highways of the County, except in Granville from Phinney Mountain Road to Victoria Beach, also on the Liverpool Road from Lightfoot's southerly, and the post road from Allen's creek to Bear River.

Upon reading and considering the Petition of John H. Tupper, et al., in reference to certain encroachment made upon the Saunders's Road in the Township of Annapolis, it is ordered, That a Committee be appointed to visit the locality, and report next term.

Ordered.—John Becker, George Wells, Edward G. Anderson.

Ordered by the Court, That the Clerk of the Peace call a Special Session for the purpose of appointing a Commissioner to re-appraise the damages on the line of the W. C. Railway, on behalf of the County, in accordance with an Act passed at the last session of the Legislature for that purpose.

Ordered by the Court, That the By-Laws of the Annapolis Fire Company be confirmed.

Ordered by the Court, That the Clerk of the Peace shall apply within two days from this date to the Law Clerk of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia for a copy of the Bill entitled "An Act to re-appraise Railway damages in the County of Annapolis," so as to have said copy present at the Special Sessions to be convened at Annapolis, on the first day of May next.

Ordered by the Court, That Silas Daniels be allowed to perform one-half of his Statute Labor on his private road.

Ordered by the Court, That Dr. Augustus Robinson be Health Inspector for the County of Annapolis.

line, and the Thornycroft obliquely, so as to take the Bayonnaise in flank. The steam-tug went at 14 knots an hour, going at full speed in order to escape the Thornycroft. The latter went at 19 knots. The rate not attained by any vessel in the squadron. The chase lasted about an hour, the squadron keeping in the rear, so as to witness the operations. At the end of that time the distance between the Thornycroft and the Bayonnaise had sensibly diminished, and at a given moment the former, in order to come up with the latter at the requisite distance, had to slacken speed to 8 knots an hour.

The whole squadron watched this last phase of the struggle with breathless interest, and people asked themselves whether the shock of the torpedo would not infallibly destroy the little vessel which bore it. It was feared that the lives of the second lieutenant, Longstre, and his three companions were absolutely sacrificed.

However, the two vessels got visibly nearer. All at once the Thornycroft put with its whole force on the starboard bow. The sea was terribly agitated, a deafening report was heard, and the Bayonnaise, by the explosion of the torpedo, was wrecked rapidly. As for the Thornycroft, rebounding by the shock about 15 metres off, even before the explosion occurred, it was again struck by a few moments, and then quietly resumed the direction of the Bayonnaise; it was literally swallowed up, and as she sank she was seen to be surrounded by another disabled ship, with the same success. The "Times" correspondent says:—

"The little torpedo boat, with its lateen sails, resembles a small grey lizard, and is scarcely discernible in the water. It is evident that the object of this kind would be unable to approach an enemy's ship unless at dusk, or when it was impossible to distinguish it at a distance.

For had such an attack been attempted at broad daylight, the Thornycroft would manifestly have been knocked to pieces by the guns of the threatened ship before it could have carried out its project. On the other hand, it would be quite impossible for one or even several ships to defend themselves against a simultaneous attack, say, by twenty or thirty of these little craft, which are so easily transported to State navies. What is certain is, that the invention of this kind was greatly impressed by it, and are persuaded that it is the starting-point of an inevitable transformation in naval tactics."
