



Fornes, Convey & Co., wholesale gents' furnishings, Toronto, have assigned. Their liabilities are placed at from \$55,000 to \$60,000, and the estate is expected to pay about 50c on the dollar.

The continued low price of grain at home and abroad do not suit the 'bull' speculators, and their latest 'point' is, that "as thrashing progresses the quality of the now grain is much below the average."

The Munster bank failure is followed in Ireland by a widespread distrust in banking institutions. The great Provincial Bank of Ireland reports a reduction of \$1,000,000 in its deposits for the past month.

So FAR this season there has been no sign of yellow fever or other epidemic disease in New Orleans. The health of this city, a cause of solicitude at this time every year, is reported to be unprecedentedly favorable.

The lumber firm of N. & O. J. Phelps, Merritton, Ont., has made an arrangement with its creditors on a basis of 53 cents on the dollar. The Imperial Bank of Toronto is the principal creditor. The firm resumed business.

SEVERAL consignments of wool which have reached Toronto from Calgary are said to compare favorably with Blue Cape wool, and will probably find a market at a price between ordinary fleece and South-down fleece.

The hop-growers of New York State met in Utica recently and fixed upon twenty-five cents a box and board as the price to be paid to regular pickers. Many young men who want a vacation leave the cities to pick hops.

Alonzo Smith, an extensive stock raiser and cattle dealer of Harvey, Albert county, N.B., has failed. His liabilities are placed at \$50,000 of which a large amount, said to exceed \$15,000, is due the Halifax Banking Company's agency at Hillsboro.

A LARGE number of forged Dominion notes are in circulation in Western Ontario and the United States. From the excellence of the work it is concluded that the bills were struck off from a form taken from a plate in use by the department and transferred to steel.

The Indian and Colonial exhibition to be held in London, England, next year promises well, the guarantee fund having already reached one million dollars. A space covering 5,400 square feet in the best part of the building has been secured for the Canadian section.

HERDERT Harrison, of Maccan, N.S., has purchased Harrison's lake, a body of water covering 400 or 500 acres. He proposes constructing a canal to drain the lake and let in

the tide to make marsh of it. A local paper says he will make the province \$30,000 or \$40,000 richer if he is successful.

The traffic on the great lakes has fallen into the hands of the owners of the largest vessels. A steamer which arrived at Sarnia, Ont., a few days ago from Duluth and Port Arthur, carried 5,000 brls. of flour, 5,000 bushels of wheat, two car loads of wool, a quantity of miscellaneous freight and a number of passengers.

The American Sardine Exchange held a meeting recently at Eastport and unanimously voted that owing to the strong advance in the prices of tin plate, pig tin, and the scarcity of fish, the price for 1 oil sardines be advanced on September 1st to \$5.25, and 1 mustard and spiced to \$4.25. The formation of a syndicate to handle all the fish packed is being discussed.

The sale of the damaged cargo of the SS. Grassbrooke at this port yesterday, drew a large number of buyers. The list included glass bottles, liquors, glycerine, acetic acid, sulphur, zinc, toys, etc. It is evident that a number of jobbers present did not know what they were buying in a business sense, as in some lines the goods fetched more than their value.

The trustees of the estate of Patrick Gallagher, Moncton, N.B., are asking for tenders for his stock in trade. His liabilities amount to about \$12,500.00, and the assets are estimated at \$3,000 to \$5,000. A number of Sackville people are among the creditors. Gallagher has made an offer of 25 cents on the dollar, secured, payable in three, six and nine months.

Twenty-nine men, representing every nation that took part, have passed a resolution that the cereal exhibit of the Dominion surpassed that of any other nation. The King of the Belgians as a token of his good will and gratitude to Canada, has requested her representative, Sir Charles Tupper, to accept the grand cordon of the order of Leopold.

The brigantine Man Zu, of 244 tons register, built for a company in Hamburg, has been launched from the shippard of Putnam Bros., Maitland, N. S. At Noel the day previously Messrs. Osmond, O'Brien & Co. launched the barque Pactolus, of 1,040 tons.-In the year ending June 30, 1885, the deal shipments from Northport, N. S., we'e 17 cargoes, containing 6,138,000 ft., valued at \$56,265. Six cargoes, containing 2,098,000 ft., valued at \$18,212, were shipped during that period from the adjacent port of Tidnish.

THREE large vessels have reached American shores from China and Japan, with cargoes of new tea. Unusual interest was manifested in the first arrivals this year, one of the ships being destined for Tacoma, in Puget Sound, W.T., with a cargo valued at \$100,000, the first direct shipment over the Northern Pacific railway for St. Paul, Duluth and other points north. His duties were to collect grease, and a few days ago he was intrusted with \$100 to buy tallow at the market, but he appropriated the money and neglected to turn up again. He has swindled several acquaintances out of small sums, and is also reported to have been short in his cash, but to what amount is not stated.

GODERICH Star .- Although the season is not more than half gone yet, and stocks are lower than in some former years, there is still a considerable quantity of lumber on the dock here. E. Hargraves, of Toronto, has received about one million feet on the G. T. R. dock, the best of which is being shipped via Halifax to the old country. Williams & Murray have at present only about two million feet, but will yet receive large consignments. H. Secord has already shipped from here a very large trade. and has now perhaps one million feet on dock, with more to arrive.

E. E. KNOTT, Toronto, Ont., real estate and insurance agent, is reported to have left that city recently with his wife and family, after selling his house and furniture for cash and borrowing as much money as he could. Some idea of the increasing trade in eggs between Canada and the United States may be gathered from the statement of a shipper in Antigonish, N.S., who commenced business fourteen years ago. His early shipments averaged 10,000 dozen; now they average between 45,000 to 50,000 dozen, the latter quantity being forwarded in 1883. During the past few years a number of merchants went into the business and cut it up considerably, consequently rendering it less remunerative than formerly. The experiment of forwarding eggs to England was tried four years ago, but it proved unsuccessful. The average price paid for eggs last year was 14c.



THE PUBLIC HEALTH,

The experience of life insurance companies as regards the rate of mortality in Canada goes to prove that the recent claims of medical lecturers in Montreal are not over-rated as regards the salubrity of our climate. Canadians as a whole are an exceedingly robust race, and in appearance compare favorably with their cousins across the way. Our oarsmen, lacrosse players, riflemen, etc., have a world-wide reputation, and our statesmen in the seventies and eighties can compare in prolonged mental and physical vigor with those of transatlantic

fame. The children of British parents born in Canada grow taller and are usually more long-lived than their progenitors. If there be any exception to this rule it will probably be found in the large cities, especially in Montreal, where early marriages among the masses of a large proportion of the population and the want of proper sanitary precautions result in sweeping off annually a considerable number of weakly persons young and old. The lack of any general knowledge of the simplest hygienic conditions among these people, and the enforced economy in winter heating which prevents proper ventilation in our almost air-tight dwellings, which unlike the poorer class of houses in other cities of the Dominion are chiefly built of brick, tend to bring about a rate of mortality in Montreal, which, although much less than in cities less frequently referred to in the newspapers, is still far too high to be ignored. It is to be regretted that those who possess the power do not use it in the direction of compulsory, vaccination among the masses. The exaggerated accounts of cases of small-pox by agents of foreign journals are scarcely less mischievous than the prejudice against vaccination, and are as difficult to overcome, and our hotels and business men generally must have considerable cause to regret the existence of so many "foul birds" among us.

It is only within the last thirty years that much attention has been paid to the science of sanitary engineering, which received its first impulse from the sanitary commission of the army of the Crimea. This movement led shortly afterwards to the establishment of "Boards of Health" in various cities on both sides of the ocean. The effect of these was shown by the following statistical results for two periods of six years each before and after that war:

It will be seen that the rate in Canada fell to one-half under the influences of the sanitary reforms effected.

There is no city in Canada more favorably situated than Montreal for the removal of sewage. The powerful current along the city front rapidly bears away

the accumulations of the various sewers constructed with modern engineering skill along the courses of the original streams emptying into the river at this point, and although there are many cases of imperfect drainage along the lower levels of the city, the system as a whole will bear favorable comparison, and it is not along this portion of the city that we must look for the greatest proportion of mortality. The main causes of sickness among our citizens will be found due more to individual neglect, simply to dirt, which has well been defined as " matter in the wrong place," and a visit to some of the poorer class of streets will serve to prove the correctness of the statement. Once contagion begins it is difficult to cope with it; it is spread by means of street-car, cabs, church pews, etc. The people therefore should be instructed in the ordinary rules of health, one for example-to burn all kinds of kitchen refuse instead of heaping it into barrels to remain for several days by the rear doors and win lows of the dwellings or in the lanes under the influence of the broiling sun until the scavenger makes his rounds-and in his indifferent way leaves a large portion of it behind him or scatters it along the route.

The filthy conditions of our streets is a subject of general comment. No sooner is the liquid filth dried up in the early summer days than it is swept up by the winds and blown into open windows and doors and into people's nostrils. The attempt at scraping the streets when muddy, and watering them when dry, are a mere farce and would not be tolerated in any second rate city. And verily it is not because the taxes are light.

The health of the city is a subject of supreme importance to the business community. Apart from its effect upon summer travel—largely through the exaggerations of the press local and foreign—manufacturers and all employers of skilled labor suffer more or less through a lower state of health among their operatives, who can neither accomplish as good work or as much of it under such conditions.

Our Board of Health have much to answer for in all that affects the sanitary condition of the city and through it our commercial welfare. Spiritually our people would seem to be fairly well provided for, and there is no lack of skillful physicians among us; what we want most now is some energetic reformer to awake the people to a sense of their responsibility physically—their temporal welfare, and to a general, practical application of the proverb that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

THE LATE SIR FRANCIS HINCKS.

There are few men who have left their mark more indelibly upon their generation than the subject of this notice, the Hon. Sir Francis Hincks, K.C.M.G., C.B., who died on Tuesday last in this city after a very brief illness. Born of a family the members of which have been distinguished for their learning and ability, he came to Canada at a time when his practical training specially fitted him to take an active part in the affairs of his adopted country. Among all his contemporaries, no one struggled with more earnest endeavor and persistency for the rights of the people or contributed more towards obtaining for them the blessings of responsible government.

Sir Francis Hincks was born in the city of Cork in 1807, the youngest of nine children, and was consequently in his 78t; year at the time of his death. He received his early education at Fermoy, in the same county; but in his 14th year his father was appointed head classical master in the Royal Belfast Academy, and there he completed his education, entering college in-1823, before completing his 16th year. He showed an early predilection for commercial pursuits, and in his 17th year entered, the counting house of John Martin & Co... Belfast, where he served a five years! apprenticeship. This firm was engaged in foreign commerce and owned several ships trading with houses in North and South America and elsewhere. This led the young aspirant to form plans for seeing something of the world, and, accordingly, on the completion of his term of apprenticeship in 1829, he took passage in one of the vessels about to sail for the West Indies, supplied with letters of introduction to the f reign correspondents of his late employers. While in Barbadoes he became acquainted accidentally with Mr. Geo. McIntosh Ross, of Quebec, a young man of about his own age, who had gone out to the West Indies. in a vessel belonging to his father, since the Hon. John J. Ross. Mr. Rossstrongly advised him to visit Canada, and offered him a passage in his ship, assuring him that he could thence return home more cheaply than from the West Indies. Arriving in Quebec late in the season, he was tempted to visit. Montreal where behe met persons from Upper Canada, then very sparsely settled, whose accounts of the new country led him to visit York (Toronto) where he spent the winter. The journey to York by stage and schooner occupied ten days. He was a regular attendant at the House of Legislature which was in session during the winter (1830-31) and made acquaintances;

among the members. He returned to the returns. During the governorship of Ireland the following spring, but he had formed a strong inclination to settle in Canada, and after having fulfilled a previously contracted matrimonial engagement and made arrangements to begin a mercantile life, he returned to Canada in 1832. When the Farmers' Joint Stock Banking Co. was organized in Toronto became 8. director. Francis Another bank was shortly afterwards started by the Reformers, and with this he became connected as manager in 1835. This bank, known as the Bank of the People, was subsequently sold to the Bank of Montreal, which prior to that

time had had no agency in the upper Province.

His public career began with the publication of the Examiner in 1838; and shortly after the appointment of Lord Durham as Governor General, he was elected a member of the first Union parliament, in which he represented the county of Oxford, remaining in active public life under the adminstrations of Lord Sydenham, Sir Charles Bagot, Lord Metcalfe, Earl Cathcart and the Earl of Elgin. He accepted the appointment of Inspector-General or Finance Minister under Sir Charles Bagot. He resigned this office in 1843 along with other members of the Lafontaine-Baldwin government, the result of some ministerial differences with Sir Charles Metcalfe; and having severed his connection with the Examiner he removed to Montreal, where he established the Pilot in 1844. Throughout his early public career, in parliament and by his writings, he was an earnest advocate of a union of the two Provinces the secularization of the

clergy reserves, and he may be said to be the chief promoter of the municipal system of Upper Canada. In the election of 1844, he was defeated by a small majority in Oxford, but subsequently recovered his seat on the exposure of political scheming characteristic of the times. In 1847 he re-visited his native land. On his return he found the country in the midst of a new election, and being again nominated for Oxford was returned by a large majority, after insisting upon another scrutiny of

Lord Elgin, Sir Francis again became Inspector-General, under the Lafontaine-Baldwin administration, and in 1851, on the resignation of Mr. Lafontaine, the Hincks-Morin administration was formed, and it was during this period that the great struggle for popular rights received its greatest impulse. The platform included the secularization of the clergy reserves, the extension of the franchise, abolition of seignorial tenure, encouragement of railway and steamship enterprises, etc. The construction of several lines of railway was proposed, including the Northern, the Great Western, the St.

Lawrence and Atlantic and later the Fin the beginning of 1876, when president Intercolonial railway. The discussions of the Hincks-Morin government led also to the establishment of the Allan Line of Steamships, and the appointment of a delegation to visit England for the purposes of railway construction, and it was during this visit that arrangements were initiated which led to the building of the Grand Trunk Railway. Among the other public measures promoted by Sir Francis Hincks were the Amendment of the Uni-

Canada, the adoption of a decimal currency, the abolition of silver as a legal tender, the repeal of the law of primogeniture, the advocacy of reciprocal free trade in natural products, the abolition of seignorial tenure in Lower Canada, and the reform of the Legislative Council.

In 1854 the administration resigned, and in the following year, while travelling in Ireland, Sir Francis, received notice of his appointment to the governorship of Barbadoes and the Windward Islands. On his return to Canada, before departing for the scene of his new labors, he found that much of the former party bitterness and animosity had

subsided, and he received an address from the Quebec Board of Trade soliciting his influence on behalf of reciprocal trade relations with the West Indies. A number of leading Canadian gentlemen visiting London at the time testified their appreciation of his public services by a banquet at the Canada Club.

In 1855 he received the Order of the Bath and was appointed Governor of British Guiana. He returned to Canada in 1869 and was created a Knight of the Order of St. Michael and St. George with the usual Imperial pension of retiring governors, one thousand pounds per annum. The portfolio of Finance Minister of Canada being vacant at the time, he was offered the position by the Premier, Sir John Macdonald, and, although he had fully determined to retire from public life, he accepted the position with the knowledge that he sacrificed thereby one third of his Imperial pension. He filled this office till 1873 when he finally retired from public life. It was

of the City Bank, that Sir Francis began his connection as associate Editor with the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE, in a series of articles on the Sugar Question. In the period of 91 years down to the issue of the 14th inst., there were scarcely half a dozen issues of the paper without some contribution from his pen; so that he may be said this period he found time also for various literally to have died in harness. During contributions to the American and Engversity and Common School Acts of Upper lish magazines, and pamphlets on

various subjects. His last great literary effort was the publication last winter of "Reminiscences of his Public Life," a work which has cleared up much in Canadian history and in his own career that had otherwise remained in oblivion. - He retained his mental faculties unimpaired far into a time of life when the faculties usually begin to show signs of decay. His industry and energy were remarkable, and in this sense he possessed that which has been truly defined as a great capacity for work, genius. On one occasion during the early years of his connection with the Journal of Commerce, the writer asked him when he thought of leaving for his midsummer holidays. "I never took a holiday in my life "-was the reply.

His ideas of responsibility in money matters were no less charactistic of the man, and in this respect as well as in the high sense of honor which guided him throughout, he required no prompting from "Noblesse oblige." His early training in mercantile life taught him the importance of the former; the latter was part of himself. His was a wisdom and tact which enabled him to pursue the right without recourse to means less direct; and he had the courage of his convictions as can be witnessed by the brilliant circle of business and professional men who during the last few years gathered around him at the City Club in the early afternoons to discuss matters of moment and listen to his opinions. His name will survive in the history of his adopted country as having contributed in the highest degree to its material progress and welfare. hearts of the entire people are heavy for his loss; yet while we cannot but deplore the manner of his removal from among us, we cannot but think that even this may be productive of benefit to his fellow-citizens as tending to arouse them from the indifference with which the fell disease which so suddenly struck him down has heretofore been regarded among us, so that even in his death he served the people, and we can fancy no more appropriate greeting for the close of such a life, full of honors and usefulness, than "Well done, thou good and faithful ser-

Sir Francis Hincks leaves two sons and a daughter, the last married to Colonel Ready, of Melbourne, whose son is manager of the Merchant's Bank at Sherbrooke. His elder son resides in England; the second son, Francis, has lived for some years in Philadelphia. Sir Francis lived to see his great-grand children, and although he passed a somewhat retired life

since the death of Lady Hincks in 1880,"

Who treads alone
Some banquet half deserted;
Whose lights are fied,
Whose garland's dead,
And all but he departed,"

he was blessed with frequent visits from his numerous relatives and friends, and was enjoying a visit from some friends in Toronto, when taken ill. He first showed symptoms of indisposition on Thursday, the 13th inst., and on Monday sent written word to the office that he would not be able to be down for a couple of weeks. He died the following evening. Owing to the nature of the disease, what would in all probability have been a large public funeral was strictly confined to the members of his family.

THE ST. CROIX COTTON Co .- At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the St Croix Cotton mill, recently held, James Murchie, of Milltown, Charles D. Owen, George Owen, Jr., and Louis Dexter, of Providence, R. I., and L. G. Downes, of Calais, the old board of directors, were unanimously re-elected. The treasurer's report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1885, was of a gratifying character. It showed that the old stock of goods on hand at the time of the failure of D. Morrice & Co., was entirely disposed of, that a very small quantity of the recent product remained unshipped, that the mill was now readily disposing of all the goods manufactured, and that the demand in some lines was greater then could be supplied. While the element of profit was not so large as might have been wished, yet the steadily decreasing cost of production was just as steadily improving the prospects of the corpojust as ration. It will be remembered, says the St Oroix Courier, that at a meeting held about six months ago, a deficit of about \$17,000 was announced. Yet owing to the changes that have been made in the product and the strict economy exercised, the whole year's work shows nearly a clean sheet after the interest on the debt, the running expenses and the cost of the exceptional changes necessary for manufacturing the class of goods now turned out have been paid. More than \$173,000 have been expended for labor during the year and nearly 7,000,000 yards of cloth manufactured.

TUNNELLING THE ST. CLAIR,-Work has been commenced on the proposed tunnel under the St. Clair river at the Grand Trunk railway crossing, Port Huron. The point at which operations have been commenced, according to the Detroit Free Press is a little below Great Western crossing on the Port Huron side, where the river is even shallower than at the ferry slip. A preliminary shaft will be sunk, and as soon as it is completed the work of tunnelling will be commenced in dead earnest. The approaches will be built back some distance from the river on cach side, giving a gradual slant to the tunnel level, so that entire trains can be run through without change of engines. The same paper publishes the fol-lowing alleged interview with a Grand Trunk official:—We shall form a tunnel company and give its bonds as security for the requisite capital, which we expect to raise largely in London. We find that we can guarantee 6 per cent interest on these bonds, may the cost of mainte-nance and repairs on the tunnel, and stillsave \$40,000 a year on the present cost of ferriage."

J. B. TROMAS, of Covent Garden, London, has issued his usual circular on the prospects of the fall and winter apple trade, which may be summarised as follows:—(1) That the apple crop of Europe, taking it as a whole, will be in excess of that of last year. (2) That fall shipments of American and Canadian apples to Glasgow and Liverpool should meet with fair demand at values ruled by supply. (3) That shipments to London of winter truit will, as in similar seasons, compare favorably in net proceed with other markets on this side—Speaking of the crop in Ontario the Hamilton Times says:—Reports from many sections of the Province go to prove that the crop, while in some localities fair, will not be nearly so large this year as last. The year 1884 produced a fine supply of the fruit, and the present appears to be the "off" season. We do not believe, however, that apples will be very dear during the ensuing season, at all events not until the shipments to Europe begin.

A Substitute for Oak Bark in Tanning.—
A new tanning agent, likely to be of great value, is said to have been discovered in Arizona; one which also has the property of adding weight to the leather. The plant is an annual, and grows upon desert and dry upland soil. It is known by the Mexicans and Indians as "Gonngra," and has a root somewhat longer and more scraggy than the cultivated beet, though resembling it in appearance. Practical use demonstrated that its tanning properties were about three times as great as the common oak bark, and that in all essentials it was superior to the bark in the manufacture of leather. The discoverer has used this root in the manufacture of leather, it being delivered to him by the Indians for about \$8 per ton, while oak bark cost \$20 per ton in San Francisco, and freight to be added.

SEVERAL boatmen of Staten Island have chartered a tugboat with which to make daily cruises off the coast or in the harbor in search of porpoises. When porpoises are sighted, the boats take long detours around the schools, unwinding from a large reel a thick and strong net. The net goes deep in the water. Porpoises do not show fight. When they find a net in front of them they leisurely wheel off in another direction until met by the net again. When hauled out of the water they seem netwous, and they almost die from fright. They flap considerably, but they are not pugnacious. The big fish are worth about \$30. All are taken to a place on South Beach, Staten Island, and the flesh boiled for the oil, which is often marketed to retailers as whale oil or cod liver oil according to the refining processes.

The first peach train of the season has arrived at Boston direct from Delaware. These trains were started in 1878, and in that year 210,000 baskets of peaches were brought into the Boston market. This quantity has gradually increased until last year 340,000 baskets of the fruit were brought. The present season is early, and the peaches are arriving in good condition, and readily command fair prices. There is reason to believe that the crop will be fully equal to that of last year, both in quantity and quality. From a commercial point of view, the peach crop is of no small moment to the Boston commission merchants and shippers. The average value of a basket of peaches being \$1.25; the entire crop of sny 300,000 baskets represents a value of \$375,000.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Aug. 20, 1885.

There is a gradual and healthful expansion of business in most lines as the season advances. Travellers for city dry goods and boot and shoe houses have secured a large number of fall orders, and in the iron trade we notice a growing confidence in values, though business in that branch has not improved. Money loaned on call at 2½ to 3 per cent. Sterling closed weak with sales of sixties at 8 7-8 prem. and of demand at 9 1-8 prem. The stock market after a fairly active week closed quiet with an unsettled feeling. Bank of Montreal to-day sold at 201 in the morning and at 200½, 2003 and 201 in the afternoon. The only

other bank stocks touched were (Commerce 10 shares of which were placed at 127\frac{3}{4} and Hochelaga which sold at 79. Passenger changed hands at 119\frac{1}{4} and 119, Telegraph at 127, Gas at 187\frac{3}{4} and 187\frac{1}{2}, Richelieu at 59 and 59\frac{1}{2}, Hudon Cotton at 80 and Pacific at 45. The following were the total sales and highest and lowest prices of leading stocks for the week:—

COAL AND WOOD.—There has been a fair jobbing demand for coal but wood is dull. We quote American anthracite at wholesale as follows:—Stove, \$5.65; nut, \$5.35, and egg and furnace, \$5.16. Ordinary distributing prices, according to quantity are: stove, \$5.75 to \$6; chestant, \$5.50 to \$5.75; egg and furnace, \$5.25 to \$5.50. Cape Breton, \$3.10 to \$3.20; Picton, \$3.30 to \$3.50, as to mine, \$5.50. Cordwood—Yard prices per long cord—Centage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4. Wharf prices about 50c lower.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.—The only movement of any consequence in butter is in creamery, which is commanding a fair sale at 19c to 20c for good fresh jobbing lots. There is also some demand for fine dairy suitable for the leading grocery trade at 18c to 19c. As to the medium and poorer grades there, seems to be no enquiry whatever, and the prospects of held stock are anything but promising. The export trade is practically dead. In cheese transactions are few and far between. Holders are not prepared to accept the views of buyers and the latter, with few exceptions, see no money in the article at present prices. There is a large quantity in the country and considerable here: some of the latter, it is said, will have to change lands at an early date. It is reported that 7c is about an average price for most of the best stock here, and we quote 65c to 74c; French cheese, 5c to 6c. At London, Ont., on the 19th inst., 396 boxes sold at 74c, 430 at 73c; \$20 at 8c and 800 on private terms. At Woodstock, the holders of 9,270 boxes of July make asked 8c, but there were no buyers at that price. Eggs.—Good fresh stock has been selling at 124c to 134c but anything doubtful in quality is

sacrificed at any price. Provisions.—Pork sold fairly well, there being a demand for small lots of short cut at \$13.35 to \$13.50 per bbl. Lard, hams and bacon have also met with a good jobbing enquiry.

Drugs and Chemicals.—The fall business in drugs, has so far been favorable and collections are good. Castor oil is firm. Canary seed has advanced and is likely to be still dearer. The combination among German manufacturers still keeps up the price of glycerine and we quote 18c to 22c. Owing to the dread of infectious diseases causing an increased demand carbolic acid, both crude and crystal, has advanced. Opium is unchanged. Danaged glycerine and rather poor quality sold at \$30 per case, representing about 16c per lb., at the sale of the damaged cargo of the S.S. Grassbroke. Opium is unchanged. In heavy chemicals the only change reported is an advance of 15s a ton on Bleach. Dye stuffs.—Sumac \$90 to \$100 per ton for prime brands. Cutch firm at 64c. Extract of logwood 72c; chip log-wood 15c to 2c. Archil 27c to 30c per lb. for concentrated.


Day Goods.—The wholesale trade continues to be actively engaged in the execution of orders. The majority of the travellers have returned from the regular fall trip and are unanimous in reporting a good feeling throughout the country. The crops now being harvested are prolific and a large proportion in Western Ontario is already safe. Since the middle of the month there has been an improvement in remittances. Prices, generally, are firm, and the outlet is such that manufacturers are not accumulating stocks to any great extent. The city retail trade is quiet but in the suburbs business has been fairly active. In Boston most woolens are selling steadily at low prices. Serges have been advanced. Flannels are in large movement at firm, in some cases improving, prices. Worsteds are selling briskly at a handsome profit. From present appearances cheviots will only be in limited demand during the present senson.

Fish and Ohs—Labrador herrings will be earlier in the market than usual as a steamer which recently left port has been specially chartered for a return cargo of this fish. It is generally October before the first arrivals are in, this year they will be on the market early in September. Dry cod have sold at \$3.62\frac{1}{2}\$ and we quote \$3.50 to \$3.75. Cape Breton herrings are worth \$4.75 to \$5.00. A few consignments of canned mackerel are expected by steamer on Saturday. Canned mackerel \$3 \times to \$3.10. Canned lobster, \$5.60 to \$5.70 per case of 4 doz. Canned salmon \$1.30 per dozen to arrive. Oils dull and unchanged.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The flour market has been quiet. Stocks last week decreased 6,000 brls. Two thousand sacks of Strong Bakers' were taken for export to London and several lots of flour were also sold for shipment below. About 1,300 brls. of Manitoba Strong Bakers' changed hands at \$4.45 to \$4.55. Grain.—The movement from the West for through shipment is increasing, but the amount of business on spot is light. The principal changes in stocks is an increase last week of 25,000 bushels of wheat and a decrease in peas of 48,000 bushels. Corrections in prices will be found in the tabulated form elsewhere.

FREIGHTS.—The market has been quiet, and owing to the scarcity of freight offering low rates obtained; grain freights however close firmer as more stuff is beginning to move. The development in the cattle and deal trades, at this port has been a great aid to vessel owners, but ships seeking deals for Liverpool

GROCKRIES .- A fair business has been done in staple lines of groceries. Teas have been moving to about the same extent as last week, a good proportion of the new crop being among the shipments. At New York where several large consignments have been received the demand has been a little uncertain and confined in the main to small lots on the development of some unexpected want. Buyers, however, find nothing available until they are willing to bid full former figures, and the tone is steady. Sugar.—The market has been firmer during the past few days with granulated held for 63c to 67-8c. The St. Lawrence refinery is again in operation. The following was received from New York:—For the time being refiners are fairly supplied and call for additions only lightly, but are distributing their product well, and this is looked upon as a supporting feature. Indeed, desirable raw ment of some unexpected want. Buyers, howsupporting feature. Indeed, desirable raw sugars are sparingly and indifferently offered and sellers' valuations range high and full all around. The European accounts are favorable generally. Sales of 100 hlds molasses sugars at 4 7-8c; 55 do muscovado, 5 1-8c; 95 Jamaica, 5 1-4c; 147 Barbadoes, 5 1-4c. Refined have been have been in good demand from home sources, and of both hards and softs the supply was very well cleaned up, with no great change in ues. Exporters were looking around, but eared to find sales too high for their limits. Coffee has been quiet and somewhat neglected.

Molasses fairly steady but slow of sale. Spices in limited demand.

GREEN FRUITS.—There has been an ample supply but the trade in fruit has ruled dull. Apples have again fallen in price but are depressed at the declined, and there seems to be no demand for them. We quote good to fair at \$1.50 to \$2 per brl; choice \$2 to \$2.50. Oranges \$5.50 per box. Lemous \$5 to \$8 per box as to quality. American peaches, \$2.50 to \$3 per crate. Canadian, \$1.25 per basket. Bartlett pears \$4 per keg; \$8 per brl. Bananas dull at \$1 to \$1.50 per bunch. Water melons \$3 yer dozen; 25c cach. Concord grapes, 11c; Delaware, 18c.

HAY, STRAW AND FRED.—The receipts of new hay have not been large to date and the demand has been fair at steady prices. Timothy sold at \$9 to \$10 per hundred bundles, as to quality. Straw firm at \$6 to \$7. Pressed hay is steady at \$16 to \$17 per ton; straw in bales, \$8 to \$9 per ton; shorts, quiet at \$17 to \$18 per ton; bran, \$14 to \$15, the former for Montreal and the latter for Upper Canada; moulie, \$24 to \$26, as to quality; buck wheat, 65c per bushel.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—Prices of hides, published eleswhere, have undergone no change during the past week, Montreal uninspected being still quoted at \$8.50. Olips are firm at 40c and lambskips at 46c. Tallow is quoted at 5½ to 6½ of for rendered, with probably an occasional sale of choice at 7c.

HONEY.—A considerable quantity of strained honey has arrived but it is glow of gale.

Prices range from 11c to 12c per lb, as to quality and size of package.

Hops.—The market here is quiet and unchanged at prices quoted last week. By last European mail Messrs, W. H. & H. Le May report:—The market remains in a very quiet state, the few consumptive orders that come to hand are executed entirely in buyer's favor; holders are competing keenly to secure the orders. The reports from the plantations all say that the bine has suffered from the excessive drought; vermin is causing a great amount of auxiety in some parts of East Kent, in fact some gardens have gone black; mould gives a little trouble in the Wenld and Mid-Kent districts; the early descriptions are now well in hops, the first pocket was consigned to us on the 1st inst, and realized £8 8s per cwt. The imports of foreign hops into England last week were 1,064 bales; for the corresponding week last year 464; the total im-orts of foreign hops into England from September 1st, 1884, to August 1st, 1885, were 65,466 bales; for the corresponding period last year, 94,281.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—The local market has remained quiet all round. A few British houses continue to write dolefully of the iron trade, but the drift of opinion seems to show that the slight improvement, previously renorted, has been maintained. There is a good demand for nails as dealers are getting their stocks sorted up for the fall trade; the mills are all running at full capacity. have started up with feeders in place of the striking nailers but the success is doubtful. We quote \$2.15 to \$2.20 according to the size of the lots. The makers of shot in our own market, in consequence of the advance in lead goods of all kinds, are going to issue a new list of advanced prices. There has been an advance established in the States in the price of wrought iron pipe. One of the large makers of pipe says:—" Iron having gone up 10c per 100 lbs. we are justified in securing higher prices. We have been selling far below cost for some time, and as trade is picking up, manufacturers are determined to get cost at least for their pipe hereafter. We are now extremely busy." The impression among a portion of the trade here, is, that in the event of a material check to the ravages of cholera in Europe the exports of lead from Spain would be heavy and the late advance could not be maintained. In the States and particularly in St. Louis this article has been largely controlled by speculators and these state that lead is up to stay. The president of the Desloge Lead Company, explains the situation by saying that even if Mr. Corwith, who has advanced the market, should let go and throw his holdings overboard, prices would not go down to. He said that lead had been mined at sacrifice, and that as a consequence smelters had only been run to keep the men employed and the machinery from lying idle. Lately they had been running full. The tributary mines, those without smelters, had also been idle. The trouble with the lead men had been that they did not bring business sense into the conduct of their affairs, and Mr. Corwith had done as a speculator just what they should have done as intelligent business men—hold their products for prices which would pay them for their labor and expense. It was very clear that lead was worth the money, and would go higher, as the supplies in Colorado were about exhausted, and living prices would have to be paid.

LEATHER, BOOTS AND SHOES.—Business in the manufactured article continues fair, the influx of orders from travellers being large. The situation as regards leather is unchanged, and we notice the same state of affairs prevails in Boston as is the case here. A Boston manufacturer, who was recently interviewed, said:

We are very busy with an excellent trade and are cutting up a great deal of leather, although buying in small lots. The leather dealers ought to get a fair price for their stock, now, if ever, especially as hides are strong and advancing. And yet every time we go into the market we find the leather dealers anxious to sell and the leather market weak all along the line.

Live Stook.—The exports of cattle continue large and in excess of previous years, the total to date being 38,710 head. The exports of sheep have been 26,234, a decrease of 2,522 as compared with last year. Sales of stock for shipment transpired at 42c to 53c, but the

supply of really choice was limited. Sheep were slow of sale at 3½c to 4c per 1b, live weight. Butchers, cattle 3½c to 4c per 1b, live hogs, 5c to 5½c. Calves 54 to 55. Total exports of beef to date 7,974 quarters, against 8,024 lust year. The improvement noted last week in the British markets has been lost, and prices of prime Canadian steers have fallen from 13½c to 13c. The receipts have been heavy and the demand slow and irregular. Best sheep in Liverpool sold at 13c.

Wook.—The demand for wool has continued moderate, there is a slight disposition apparent in some quarters to anticipate requirements, but as a rule manufacturers seem to think that they can secure all they want at present prices and purchase in a hand-to-mouth sort of way. At the next London wool auctions, Sept. 1,290,000 bales in all are expected, of which 71,000 bales were held over from the last sales owing to low prices. Recent auction sales of East India and Mediterranean carpet wools in England established a decline there of 5 to 7½ per cent in price. The Boston market continues strong and firm with large sales, although the demand is no longer so well distributed as during the last month and the total amount is attained by the heavy sales of a few houses. The inquiry is still good and in many instances more wool would have been sold if it could have been offered.

TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

(Revised by Telegroph.)

TORONTO, Aug. 20, 1885.

Business continues generally very fair. In all departments of trade there is the usual amount for this season of the year. Remittances are fair. The money market rules unchanged. There is but a quiet business doing. Money on call is in light demand; a few loans have been made on debentures at 3 per cent; rates rule from 3 to 4 per cent. on debentures and 5 to 54 per cent on stocks; prime commercial paper is discounted at 6 per cent and the general run at 61 to 7 per cent. Sterling Exchange is easy at a decline of 1-8 to 4 since Saturday, 60day bills between banks are quoted at 108; to 109 and over the counter at 1091 to 109 3-8 and demand bills at 109 to 109 3-8 between banks and 1091 to 1091 counter. The stock market has been rather unsteady since this time last week. During the past few days it has taken an easier turn. Sales have been made of Montreal at 2003 and 202; Commerce at 1274 and 1272; Imperial at 126; Federal at 96; Standard at 116; Western Assurance at 99 : Imperial Savings and Loan at 1091; London and Canadian Loan at 144 and 1441; Comsumers Gas at 1624; Building and Loan at 1041; and Canada Permanent at 2013. FLOUR AND GRAIN.—Flour is inactive and easier. Superior extra guaranteed sold on Friday at \$3.90; extra on Friday and Saturday at \$3.75; on Tuesday choice extra sold at \$3.80, and very choice superior at \$4; yesterday superior extra was quoted at \$3.90 and extra guaranteed at \$3.70. The stock in store here is 2,375 bbls. against 1,675 bbls. for the same period last year. Wheat—Little doing

prices are easier. The market closed yesterday with No. 2 fall offered at 87c with 84 bid. No. 3 fall held at 84c with no bids; spring nominal. Fall and spring sold on the street at 80c to 82c and goose at 70c. The stock in store here is 81,112 bushels of fall against 40,541 bushels last year and 61,442 spring against 56,066 last year. Barley continues dull and unchanged. The stock in store is 10,567 bushels against 2,072 bushels same time last year. Oats—Offerings are light, but sufficient to supply the demand; there has not been much doing. Prices are firm at 33c for cars and 36c to 37c on the street. The stock in store is 7,306 bushels against 4,140 bushels same time last year. Peos, nothing doing. Prices nominal at 66c for No. 2. There is none in store here against 1,213 bushels a year ago. Rye, none offering; none in store against 442 bushels last year. Bran has been inactive and is quoted at \$10.50 to \$10.75. Outmeal, quiet at \$4 for car lots and \$4.25 to \$4.50 in small lots.

Groceries.—A very satisfactory business is being done. There is a fair demand for everything. Sugars continue very firm; yellows are scarce, prices are unchanged, granulated has been selling at 64c. Canada refined sold to-day at 4.7-8c to 6c and granulated at 6.7-8c to 7c. Fruits unchanged. London layers \$2.50 to \$2.75; black baskets, \$3.25 to \$3.50 loose muscatels, \$2.25 to \$2.40; new sultanas, 6c to 64c. Prunes, Bosnia, 5c to 64c; do, French, 4c to 44c. Tobaccos in good demand; myrite navy, 58c; solaces, 42c to 53c. There is also a good demand for liquors.
