The Interesting Ceremony of Blessing the Corner Stone of the Addition to St. Boniface Hospital. Beautiful weather, and in consequence a large number of interested spectators, attended the ceremonies Sunday afternoon in connection with the blessing of the corner stone of the new and commodious addition to the St. Boniface hospital. Hundreds of those present were seated on benches, chairs, etc., along the eastern side of the new structure, while as many more occupied carriages or gathered around other vantage points at the south side from which to view the proceedings. A large platform had been built over the substantial stone foundation which is completed, and on this over a hundred stood and took part in the celebration. On the carpet placed close to the stone near the southeast corner were two easy chairs. On one was seated His Grace Archbishop Tache, who conducted the ceremonies. and to his left sat Bishop Clut, of Athabasca. Gathered around them were Rev.
