



FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America School Society," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of

Pounds Sterling, to be raised and paid, for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements, or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements; for which Legacy the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution, shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

*** Bequests for charitable or benevolent purposes, of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personalty, not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

OF THE

AND

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SCHOOL SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be designated The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor.

11. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's System.

111. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice Patrons, Presidents Vice-Presidents, a Trensurer, a Secretary, or Secretaries, and also of Governors, and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.

1V. Each Subscriber of One Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.

V. Each Subscriber of T.n Guinezs, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for Life.

VI. Each Subscriber of Five Pounds annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and satisfied to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.

VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its Officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than Twelve; of whom Nine, who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.

1X. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered ex-afficio Members of the Committee; the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every month.

X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of Equality of votes, the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the Accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.

X11. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held in London annually, on the Second Wednesday in May, when the Proceedings of the foregoing year shall be reported, and the Accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.

XIII. A Special General Meeting of the Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter addressed to the Secretary.

XIV. Ten days notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society, who reside within the limits of the Three-penny Post, shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron, or, in his absence, the Vice-Patron, or should be be absent, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present, or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, and, in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed, or altered, nor any new Law established but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. That the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America School Society, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed to be called, "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of "for the purpose of co-operating with that institution.

2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum, or upwards, or Five Guineus, or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.

3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than Members, and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

5. That this Auxiliary shall furnish the Parent Society on, or before the first week in March in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

1. That we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the Newfoundland and British North America School Society, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this association be denominated "The Association."

2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per Annun, or making a donation of One Guinca or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.

3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.

4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that Three Members be empowered to

5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.

6. That this Association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society on or before the last day of February in each year, with an Abstract of its cash account, Se.

7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day, as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY,

That the Thanks of this Meeting be given to the Hon, and Rev. Gerard T. Noel, A. SERMON.

And this is life eternal, that they might know thee, the only true god, and jesus christ whom thou hast sent.—John, xvii. 3.

At that time jesus answered and said, "I thank thee, o father, lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes."—Matt. xi. 25.

THE mental faculties may be intently exercised upon subjects differing altogether in their nature and in their influence; and while these faculties at present may be circumscribed by definite boundaries, yet these boundaries may be susceptible of an almost infinite enlargement. Human life is but the commencement of an existence which will occupy the intellectual powers through eternity, and this under circumstances of which we have at present a very obscure notice. Limited, then, as are our times, our capacities and our means of acquiring knowledge, it seems to be of the highest importance, to select those subjects of knowledge which will bear the most directly upon our largest and our most durable interests. If the occupations of childhood,

as less valuable, are soon superseded by those of mature age, so the occupations of time will quickly be superseded by those of eternity. A future scene will very shortly absorb all the interests of the pre-Hence, if no responsibility to the Creator, who has gifted us with those faculties, required any specific mode of their application, still the influence which that application would have upon our ultimate happiness ought to preclude any indiscriminate selection of the subjects of our knowledge. Prudence would claim an examination into the various tendencies of these subjects to affect our interests in eternity: but, since responsibility to God does, in fact, lie in close connexion with every mental endownent, the importance of a selection of the subjects of knowledge rises to a degree scarcely susceptible of admeasurement. Who can tell the contrasted effects which certain portions of knowledge may have upon his happiness? Our knowledge is the highest, because the most durable, of our attainments. We cannot part with the influences of knowledge; they cling about us; they belong to an interior discipline, which, modelling the mental habits, becomes invoven with all the principles of our moral existence. With what emphasis of application, then, may the question be asked with reference to the attainment of knowledge-" What shall it profit a man if he should gain the whole world and lose his own soul?" or "What shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"

To travel the vast range of subjects, from "the cedar of Lebanon to the hyssop upon the wall," to be familiar with all the departments of art and science, might still leave us without a single resting place from sorrow in a higher and different world. Such knowledge might no more bear upon our ultimate safety than a minute knowledge of botany might bear upon the safety of a crew surrounded by rocks and surges in an hour of impending shipwreck. There is a necessary adaptation between circumstances and subjects of knowledge.—Should these be misplaced, ruin and misery may ensue.

Under these and similar considerations the infinite value of revelation rises into our view. This revelation, given at various times and by various messengers from God, was at length completed by the instructions of the Son of God himself. In Jesus Christ dwelt the "fulness of the Godhead bodily." His presence scattered the clouds of ignorance which, during so long a period, had hung dark and chilly over the human soul. "The day-spring from on high hath visited us to give light to them that sit in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace." Blessed be God! we are no longer left to wander up and down the dreary fields of conjecture—the way of truth is before us, together with the home and the safety to which it leads.

"This is life eternal, to know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." "I thank thee, oh Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes!"

These words, uttered on two distinct occasions, by the lips of him who proclaimed himself to be "The Truth," disclose to our view, the paramount subject of human knowledge; the disposition of mind essential to its attainment, and the vast results to which it leads.

In the first place the expressions of Christ mark out to our notice the highest and only essential subject of human knowledge.

"This is life eternal, to know thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent."

This knowledge of God, in fact, involves the tranquillity of all our connexions with Eternity. In the language of inspiration, "the Lord God is a sun and shield; he will give grace and glory, and no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly." These words speak a volume upon the subject of our knowledge. Without the knowledge of God, man is like the natural world in the absence of the sun, cold and unproductive; or like an enemy exposed without a shield; a mark for

cach deadly weapon of hostility and revenge. Without God, man is a bankrupt, bereft of heritage and home; the victim of scorn and infamy, a wanderer through the universe, "destitute, afflicted, tormented." The knowledge of God brings him again beneath the genial sunbeam, behind the everlasting shield, amidst the inalienable heritages of kingly favour and of eternal recompense.

But how shall he know this God? Where shall he find his dwelling-place? Where behold his countenance? Where listen for his voice? Where wait for his will? Where be admitted to his embrace? In the person of Jesus Christ he finds an answer to these momentous questions. "This is life eternal, to know thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." "I am the way, no man cometh unto the Father but by me." "It is written they shall all be taught of God." "God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." The interminable line of Deity baffles human contemplation. We are lost in abstract properties, such as power, love, purity, truth. These qualities, standing apart from any sensible point of coherence, are as a dark and mighty forest to the soul without a single pathway, or beacon light to direct the course. They receive a tangible form, a practical expression in the person of Jesus Christ. "He that hath the Son hath life." "In him dwells the fulness of the Godhead bodily; and ye are complete in him." Deism, in truth, is a cheerless wilderness; a system fashioned by human conjecture, yielding no accredited information, and opening no shelter against want and woe. "But grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." In him God is revealed as a Father, a friend, an eternal resting place; made such by the mediation, atonement, spirit, power and intercession of Jesus Christ. The knowledge of God is thus imparted through Christ, and through him alone.

It ought, however, here to be observed that knowledge, in its scriptural sense, is seldom if ever separated from love. If a man know sin, it is because he loves sin; if he know the world, it is because he *loves* the world. The knowledge of evil could only be attained through the love of evil. Man must pluck and taste the forbidden fruit ere he could ascertain its influence. In the same way to know God, is to love God, It is only through the affections that religious knowledge is perfected. "I know my sheep and am known of mine." Can this knowledge be separated from love? The knowledge of God is in fact the love of God. It is God present to the soul, as the object at once of perception and of delight:

[&]quot;'Tis God himself diffused through every part,

[&]quot;'Tis God himself triumphant in the heart."

It is the occupancy of the understanding, by the highest and largest subjects of apprehension; and the occupancy of the affections by the noblest, the purest, the most durable objects of desire. expression of the Psalmist, "If so be that ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious," implies a relish, an appetite for that graciousness. It is this idea which gives the true intrepretation to "acquaintance with God." "Acquaint thyself with God and be at peace." Peace is the fruit of sympathy, and of conformity with his views. The "pure in heart" can alone see God. Under these circumstances it is not wonderful that the mind of the Apostle estimated the knowledge of Christ at so high a rate. "Those things I counted gain, I now count loss for Christ, yea doubtless I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord."

II. But what is the disposition of mind essential to the attainment of the knowledge of God? "I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes." That the subject which occupied the mind of Christ when he uttered these words is the very knowledge to which we have referred the expressions which follow in the context, give decisive evidence. "All things are delivered to me of my Father, and no

man knoweth the Son but the Father, neither knoweth any man the Father save the Son, and he to whomsoever the Son will reveal him." This knowledge is then a revelation made to the soul by the direct influence of Christ; and this revelation is said to be hidden from "the wise and prudent," while it is "revealed unto babes." The terms "wise," "prudent," are here used in a peculiar In the proper and absolute sense of the words, the "wise and the prudent," are the "babes," that is the docile, the meek, the humble; but our Lord here refers wisdom and prudence to a counterfeit species, which is stamped as genuine only by the pride and vanity of those amidst whom it is current. These persons are wise in their own eyes; they are prudent in their own estimate of policy. But "where is the wise," says the Apostle Paul. "Hath not God made foolish the wisdom of this world?" "If any man among you seemeth to be wise in this world, let him become a fool that he may be wise; for the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God."

The revelation of God to which Christ refers is then never made to the wise and prudent, continuing to be such. As long as a contrariety of nature remains between God and the soul, the knowledge of God implying, as it does, the love of God, can never be imparted. "The carnal mind is enmity against God." In this case, if the light

shine, however brightly, "the darkness comprehendeth it not." But if the wise become foolish; that is, if humility take place of pride; if docility mark the new birth into a spiritual childhood, then to the "new-born babe" this revelation is divinely imparted. Once the man was prudent in his own esteem, and the sources of true wisdom were to him even as the springs of folly; now he is a fool in his own eyes, and the fountains of heavenly truth are become at once visible to his search, and precious to his use. This dispensation of grace excited the joy of Christ. "I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes. Even so, Father, for so it seemeth good in thy sight." If God condescend to teach, is it not fit that man should be docile to learn?

Divine knowledge is thus an actual revelation made by Christ to the soul. It is not, indeed, a revelation distinct from, or in any way opposed to, the revelation made in the written word. No information is imparted to the humble which has not been already registered in the written page. It is new only because the apprehension of it is new. Should eye-sight be imparted to a man born blind, he would immediately see the sun, which he had never seen before. That sun would be new to him, and yet it would be the same sun which had

poured its bright stream during successive centuries upon the earth. So to the *spiritually* blind the revelation made by the Spirit of Christ is no new revelation; it has already glowed in all its living freshness upon the eternal page; but all this brilliancy has been unperceived, because it has not come into contact with any spiritual *faculty* of discernment. This faculty the *wise* and *prudent* soul has never possessed.

Pride is a condition of blindness—humility is a condition of sight, and the translation from the one to the other is as the translation from death to life. This imparted life, is Christ united to the soul, "I am the resurrection and the life!" "And you hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins." To the soul that has never experienced this change from pride to humility, it is almost impossible to describe its nature. To him who has no sight, it were vain to attempt to describe the loveliness of colour; or to him who is deaf the charms of melody.—Should, however, the gift of hearing or of sight be imparted, experience quickly subjoins knowledge, and the contrast between the past and the present becomes apparent.

The history of the first converts to Christianity was a remarkable exemplification of this fact. Our Lord had declared that he "would manifest himself to his disciples, as he would not unto the world."

The Apostle Judas, surprised at the assertion, enquired its meaning. Would not the world have the same evidence arising from miracle, character, and ability to reason, with the Apostles? Wherein then would lie the peculiarity of this manifestation? "If any man will do the will of God he shall know of the doctrine whether it be of God." "If any man love me he will keep my commandments, and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him and make our abode with him." therefore the arguments of Christ, urged by an authority, and selected by a wisdom in which weakness and error could have no place; while these failed to convince the educated and the mighty; the address of a Disciple in one single hour converted three thousand souls to the knowledge and service of that very God and Saviour whose blood they had deliberately shed. The medium of their conviction was not the new and cogent arguments of the Apostle, but the altered state of the affections of the people. They cried—"men and brethren, what shall we do?" "The heart of stone" was removed, and the perception of evidence then became easy. Hidden from them, "when wise in their own conceits," it was powerfully manifested when, become as little children, they gave God again the warmth and allegiance of their hearts.

The attainment of religious knowledge is thus dependant upon the state of the heart—it is the result

of divine influence; the work of grace—the interposition of the Spirit who takes of the things of Christ, and reveals them to the soul through the medium of that very spiritual faculty which he has himself communicated. This connexion between humility and the perception of truth God himself has established. "The meek will he guide in judgment, and the meek will he teach this way." The propriety of this connexion might seem too apparent to be overlooked. It is however discerned only by the pious. God is holy, and the knowledge of the Holy One cannot be communicated to the unholy, continuing to be such. Generosity is lovely to the generous, and courage to the brave; resemblance of character is needful, fully to appreciate its excellence; therefore God " resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble."

III. But is the difference between religious knowledge and ignorance so momentous in its issue as to warrant the exercise of hope and fear in their highest possible degrees? Let us attend to the vast result of the knowledge to which we have referred. "This is life eternal, to know thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent."

This knowledge stands associated with no less a blessing than *eternal life*. This connexion was before asserted in those memorable words, "I know

my sheep, and am known of mine; and I give unto them eternal life, and they shall never perish, neither shall any pluck them out of my hand. My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all, and none can pluck them out of my Father's hand."

These high results are indeed at once to be inferred from the subjects to which this knowledge If to know God be to love God, and if this love be the reflection of His love to us, in virtue of a spiritual union and fellowship with Christ; and if this union be dependant on Christ's life, and henceforth be in fact coeval with it—" Because I live ye shall live also;" then this union is eternal, because this life is eternal. To know God, and Jesus Christ, whom he has sent, can be nothing short of eternal The life which Christ imparts is said to be "hid with Christ in God." It is there hid far beyond the reach of hazard or decay. The true believer is a part of that mystical body, of which Christ is the head; and as the happiness of the head never can be affected by evil, resting amidst etherial elements which no storm can assail, neither can that of the mystical body. The saving knowledge of Christ is therefore Eternal Life. It is the consummation, and the completeness, and the duration of felicity; it implies all that man can receive, and all that God can bestow. It is the participation of the Redeemer's glory; the fulness of joy flowing from the

The result of this knowledge no language can set forth, no imagination, however vivid, conceive. Of this wisdom it is everlastingly true, "Whosoever findeth me, findeth life." This is that wisdom which philosophy cannot teach, nor research unfold, nor eloquence secure. It is the gift of God; the rectitude of the heart, the harmony of the affections, the offspring of grace, the companionship of Christ. It is a "new nature;" it is conformity to truth; it is the mind and the life of God in the soul of man. "Oh! blessed are they that know the joyful sound, they shall walk, oh Lord, in the light of thy countenance."

If these things be so; if God in Christ be the paramount subject of human knowledge; if humility be the disposition of mind essential to it's attainment; and if it's result be endless life with Christ, then how perilous is that pursuit of knowledge which excludes or overlooks the salvation of Christ! This peril I conceive to be very great in the present day. The avenues to knowledge are many and easy. Education has made a progress rapid and decisive. Science is travelling fast from the college to the cottage, from the secluded scholar to the daily occupied mechanic. The art and the facility of printing have thrown down the barriers

which previously had limited knowledge to the favoured few; and are opening at once the theories of legislation, the secrets of nature, and the facts of history to the gaze of the multitude at large. Every thing is known, canvassed, adjudged.

It

Against the progress of this knowledge I would never lift up my voice. Ignorance can never augment the ultimate happiness of mankind. Knowledge more or less is power; but power may destroy as well as save. The value of an instrument lies in its application. Science, if it stop short of God, may prove the baleful tree of evil and not of good. Its juices may fill the poisoned chalice, and not the healthful cup. If knowledge assimilates not to God, it will ultimately assimilate to The consecration of science can alone insure its value. This connexion is, however, much forgotten in the present day. The peculiar aspect of society is indeed two-fold. In no period of our history, it must be conceded, has so manifest a respect been paid to the revealed record of God. The sacred volume was never so widely dispersed, or the effort still to widen that dispersion, so strikingly perceptible.

On the other hand, the effort to throw down many of the distinctions of right and wrong; the effort to seeme equal respect for all religious opinions, whether founded upon divine, or upon human

authority; the effort to render earthborn science the fountain of healing to nations and individuals, the intellectual idol before which every community is to bow; this effort was never so great, and never so sustained by numbers as in the present time.

Liberty of opinion is the watch-word of society. Against the just use of that term I can have no single word to allege. But with the pages of revelation spread before my eyes—with the agonies of Gethsemane, and of the Cross within my view, I would assert true liberality to be nothing less than the charity of the Bible, "holy, just, and good," as well as patient, gentle, and solicitous. Under its sacred influence, and by the grace of God, I would proclaim an unrighteous courtesy in this matter to be fatal to the best interests of mankind. and hostile to the honour of Christ. I would aver the scriptures to be the only and immutable standard of truth and error; I would aver every moral sentiment, carrying its ascendancy over the heart, to be there cherished beneath a high and solemn responsibility; the tribunal of God to be the ultimate arbiter of discordant opinions; and the decree to have gone forth in characters as legible as they are imperishable, "He that hath the Son hath life, and he that hath not the Son shall not see life!" "Behold he cometh, and every eye shall see him." Behold he cometh, to sift the chaff from the wheat, to reveal the sanctity and the value of his own law; the triumph of his grace, and the everlasting felicity of his redeemed!

But if humility be the qualification for the reception of truth, then how hopeful an effort is the scriptural education of the poor! "I thank thee O Father, Lord of Heaven and Earth, because, thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes." history of the Christian Church has been ever accordant with this declaration. In every age God has more or less chosen the poor of this world, rich in faith, and heirs of his kingdom; while pride and prosperity tend to harden, poverty and humility tend to soften the heart, and thus to render it impressible by the holy lessons of God's truth. not on the keenness of the intellectual powers, nor on the subtlety of varied investigation, nor on the accuracy of reasoning, nor on the favourable circumstances of leisure and of solitude, that religious success depends. Scholarship is not religion, nor profound research allegiance to God! Religion lies rather in the affections than in the skilfulness of the understanding. God is love; and the poor man is as capable of love as the rich man: God is good, and the poor man is as susceptible to bounty as the rich. Salvation in truth, whether to rich or poor, is God's work; and the Spirit teaches with an efficiency which they alone can estimate who have themselves received his lessons.

It is in connexion with this consolatory truth that I now recommend to your kind support the Schools in whose behalf I am this evening engaged The Newfoundland Schools claim, I to plead. think, that support by considerations at once National and Christian. The Colony of Newfoundland has been very long associated with our native Its poverty likewise is great—its local calamities have been many, and its effort for its own improvement encouraging and decisive. Under these circumstances it claims your national sympathy. The Society on whose behalf I speak has already fifteen schools under its charge, into which above 2,500 Scholars have been admitted; while five additional Schools are in progress, and fourteen other Teachers are urgently required. The expences of the Society have been greater than their income, and the poverty of the colonial inhabitants precludes the effort essential to sustain these expences: poor Colonists very naturally look to the kindness of the parent country, and I trust, my Brethren, that they will not look in vain: I trust that you will admit the sympathy due to their anxiety and their wants, and that you will supply that which their own resources are utterly inadequate to afford.

But while national sympathy may of itself excite a deep interest in the welfare of these Newfoundland Schools, a remembrance of *Christian obligation* ought to excite a yet deeper: It is on this higher ground, my Brethren, that I would rest the burden of my appeal, on this occasion, to your kindness and liberality.

We cannot indeed command the influences of Heaven—we cannot bring down the golden chain of divine love, and link it fast around the human heart, thereby to draw its affections up to God-we cannot make the "new creature," or give to the darkened soul the faculty of spiritual light, but we can at least bring that soul to the external touch of truth; we can delve, as it were, the channels through which the waters of life may flow; we can put into exercise the train of means with which God has furnished us with a direct promise that they shall generally prove successful; we can "train up the child in the way in which he should go," leaving it to the Lord so to dispose his heart, that "when he is old he shall not depart from it." We can, as it were, expand his youthful forehead to the beams of heavenly light, and pray in faith to him who has the power and the will to say, "Receive thy sight."

If, then, my brethren, I remind you that the way of death is in a man's own heart, and the way of life in the word and counsel of God; if I remind you that the youthful mind is far more susceptible than when hardened and beaten down by the vices of maturer age; if I remind you that by

the instrumentality of these Schools, 2,000 Children are already admonished of those great truths once spoken by the lips of everlasting love—can I want—ought I to want a firmer grasp upon your consciences, or a readier avenue to your kindly affections?

And say if it be not a consideration truly generous and elevating that the revealed words of God, written by the hand of the Great Comforter, upon the heart of a poor and friendless child, can give to that child a place in the scale of happiness, which neither fame, nor science, nor rank, nor wealth could attempt to impart? I bless God that he has already permitted you to witness this joyous effect of his own love. The annals of these schools. as contained in your last Report, give the simple history of two children who have recently died in the evident hope and peace of the Gospel. Amidst the pains of disease and the ravages of dissolution, amidst the cheerless and scanty resources of poverty, these children, unknown to the world, as flowers hidden in the depth and solitude of the forest, have bloomed and shed their leaves, but yet live, transplanted to a milder world! children have died in the Lord with views of his character, with hopes of his mercy, with aspirations after his presence, with prospects of his glory, with dispositions assimilated to his own, and with anticipations of his endless joy, which leave at an infinite

distance all that the proudest efforts of human science can effect for the dying spirits of men.

FOR EDUCATING THE POOR OF

NEWFOUNDLAND.

PRAISE to the Father of Mercies and God of all Grace, is the first and best expression of those feelings with which your Committee at the close of their annual labours, are again permitted to communicate to their Friends and Subscribers, the general prosperity of the Society, and the progressive enlargement of its sphere of usefulness. From its commencement, the necessity for its establishment, and its adaptation to the existing circumstances of Newfoundland, have been abundantly By combining with the discipline and strictness of mechanical arrangement, a simple plan of Religious Instruction, calculated for, and freely offered to the poer of all persuasions, this Society has provided a remedy, not applicable merely to the moral wants of one, but of every other colony in which a similar destitution of religious instruction exists.

It is not because this benign experiment is so well justified by its results in Newfoundland, that your Committee have now conceived the idea of trying it upon a wider scale, and extending the operations of the Society to the adjacent continent of North America. The British colonies were not overlooked in that glance of comprehensive love, which first lighted upon Newfoundland. It was never intended by those who made the first onset, and broke the ice on that neglected shore, to stop there; but as they were favoured by Divine Providence, to penetrate the recesses of North America and carry the Lamp of Christian Knowledge into the Canadas, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia. The moment for this advance, your Committee think, is now arrived.—A voice is heard from the Wilderness, and a cry raised from the Desert in British North America,—" Come over and help us."—The population of these Colonies consists of hundreds of thousands; and the ecclesiastical establishments formed by the Government, or conducted under the management of the Society "for propagating the Gospel in foreign parts," are unequal to the spiritual wants of the great and growing population of these provinces, scattered as it is, over an immense surface of Country, especially as regards the education of the rising generation. The extension, therefore, of the Society to these regions, is

contemplated, not in the spirit of rivalry or interference, but of love; having no other object in view but to give light to them that sit in darkness, and to aid, as an auxiliary, every Christian institution within the sphere of its operations. There is, in truth, a want of free Daily and Sunday Schools, particularly in the newly formed and distant settlements, which present a wider and more uncultivated waste than was found by the Society in Newfoundland. This is a well known fact to those who are conversant with the true state of our Transatlantic Brethren in the British provinces.—Deplorable however as their case undoubtedly is, your Committee could not have felt justified in recommending the occupation of so large a field, had they conceived that by such a step they would compromise those interests in Newfoundland, to the support of which they are primarily and sincerely pledged.

It is with great satisfaction that your Committee are enabled to state, that they have obtained the approbation and assistance of His Majesty's Government to establish Schools in the British provinces in North America. A Deputation from the Committee waited on the Right Honourable Sir George Murray, the Colonial Secretary, by whom they were kindly received. The objects and extended views of the Society were then fully considered; and, in a few days after, your Committee received a very satisfactory communication from Sir George Murray, approving the extension of the Society, and engaging

to instruct the respective Governors of the British Provinces in North America, to make the necessary grants of land to the Society for its Schools, and also promising a free passage for the Teachers in His Majesty's Transports, whenever practicable. For this cordial concurrence and patronage your Committee desire to record their grateful acknowledgements, and to express their perfect confidence in the future support and paternal encouragement of His Majesty's Government. The sanction of this Meeting is now therefore required to the extension of the sphere of the Society's labours to the British Provinces in North America, and to the necessary alteration of the Title or description of the Society, which it is proposed shall henceforth be called by the name of "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor."

The principal feature of the Society's proceedings during the past year, is the Voyage, which Mr. Willoughby, at the request of the Committee, has, the second time, made to Newfoundland. Mr. Willoughby was instructed to visit all the Schools, and carefully inspect their condition, to examine the claims which had been preferred from various outports for Teachers, to ascertain the wants of other Settlements, and generally to obtain further support and confirm the existing interests of the Society in the Colony. These objects have all been accomplished, as far as circumstances would permit, to the entire satisfaction of your Committee, who are happy to have this opportunity of expressing how much

they feel indebted to Mr. Willoughby, for the uniform zeal, fidelity, and enlightened judgment with which at all times he has supported the character, and advanced the objects of this Institution. The substance of Mr. Willoughby's Journal is already printed, and has been placed in the hands, it is presumed, of most of the Subscribers; it is not therefore intended at present to refer to it more at large, but in the following very brief notice of the state of the Society's respective Schools in Newfoundland, nothing important will be overlooked. The first in order is the central School at St. John's.

ST. JOHN'S.

Mr. and Mrs. Jeynes are steadily engaged in their work, and are now reaping the fruits of their patience and perseverance; their daily School has continued gradually to improve, and at present the attendance of the children is more regular than usual, averaging nearly 100 daily: the number on the books is 141. Besides their Day School Mr. and Mrs. Jeynes have an Evening Winter School for adults, which is well attended; and where there are many young men who evince, by their punctuality, a sincere desire to obtain instruction: the number in attendance according to the latest account was 40. But it is from the adoption of the system of Local or Branch Schools that peculiar encouragement has been derived both at St. John's and elsewhere. Mr. Jevnes has succeeded in establish16

and lishing four Branch Schools, (including that at Quidi Vidi noticed in former Reports,) at which more than 200 Children are learning to read the Holy Scriptures, who, but a few months since, appeared to be cut off from all means of instruction. Mr. Jeynes has also been much encouraged during the last year by the increase of subscriptions in support of the Society, by the very liberal haul of fire-wood made for the use of the School by the inhabitants of St. John's, aided by the influence of several merchants; and particularly by the continued kindness of his Excellency Sir Thomas Cochrane, the Governor, and in his absence of the President, the Honourable the Chief Judge, Tucker, and of the other members of the Government, as well as of the merchants and inhabitants of St. John's in general.

Mr. Jeynes, anxious to fulfil the injunctions of the Committee to observe the strictest economy, has let the cellar under the central School for a sum which covers the interest of the money expended upon the premises from the funds of the Society. Some money likewise has been sent home, as the produce of work done by the Children in the Schools, not only at St. John's, but at the other stations, the amount of which will appear in the Appendix.

TRINITY.

Mr. Fleet has an excellent Day and Sunday School, the average attendance at each of which

is 86. The School-house and Master's dwelling are nearly completed; in erecting which, the inhabitants of Trinity, and the houses of Messrs. J. B. and G. Garlands, and of Messrs. Slade and Kelson have been very liberal; no less a sum than 1781. 15s. having been subscribed, besides timber estimated at 22*l*. Messrs. Garlands and Messrs. Slade and Kelson have also put up at their joint charge, a handsome and substantial fence round the Society's premises, of the value of eight guineas; and they have engaged to promote a haul of fire-wood in the fall, for the use of Mr. Fleet's School: indeed, on every occasion they have shewn the most cordial attachment to the Society. Your Committee take this opportunity of acknowledging their obligations to Mr. Kelson for his unwearied personal exertions, and uniform kindness in supporting the School at Trinity: and to Mr. Drawbridge for his hospitality to Mr. Willoughby during his stay in the harbour.

Mr. Fleet has opened two Branch Sunday Schools in adjoining Coves, at which 76 Children are now receiving the blessing of religious instruction.

In quitting Trinity your Committee take occasion to observe, that they are sorry they cannot indulge themselves in selecting any part of the journals of their masters, much of which would be found highly interesting, but to do justice to each would not be possible, without extending to an inconvenient length this sketch of their proceedings.

Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell's Schools are all thriving, and do great credit to the Society; in the Day School the number at present on the books is 153, and the average attendance is about 100. The poor evidently begin to feel an increasing concern for the instruction of their children. The Sunday School under Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell's care has in it 148 Scholars, and is distinguished by the proficiency of its classes, its excellent order, and neat appearance: this is a department of labour in which Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell greatly delight, and in which they are much encouraged. In the winter evenings Mr. Kingwell held an Adult School, which was punctually attended by 18 Scholars, who made considerable progress in learning to read the Scrip-Besides these employments Mr. Kingwell has established a Branch School at a short distance from Harbour Grace, in which he has collected between 40 and 50 Children, and he has made arrangements for another in the neighbourhood, where the people have cheerfully agreed to build a The Society has many friends in School-room. Harbour Grace, and Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell have experienced much kindness from the inhabitants. A very encouraging list of Subscriptions to defray the expence of building the premises in the occupation of the Society, has been sent home.

CARBONNIERRE.

Of the Schools at Carbonnierre your Committee regret to say, that they cannot speak with the same satisfaction as of those at other stations. Mr. Tenlon has given so much of that time which should have been devoted to the fulfilment of his engagement with the Society, in affording medical aid to the people, that the Schools have greatly suffered. The number of Children in the Daily Schools is little more than half of what it was last year. Sunday and Adult Schools have declined in like Under these discouraging circumstances manner. the connexion of the Master and Mistress with the Society has been dissolved; and your Committee would have felt it their duty to recommend the relinguishment of Carbonnierre as a principal station (leaving only a Branch School there,) had not the most respectable inhabitants in the place expressed to Mr. Willoughby, on his late visit, their regret that so little had been done, and their sincere desire to have the School placed upon a more efficient and permanent footing. In order to effect this, a gift of land in an eligible situation was immediately made to the Society by the joint kindness of two principal houses in Carbonnierre for the site of the intended buildings, with the promise of a sufficient supply of timber to complete them: indeed, one gentleman, Mr. Pack, took such a lively interest in the subject, that he proposed to go himself at the head of his people into the woods in the fall, and to bring out

the frame for the building, upon the understanding however that Teachers should be sent out as soon as possible. Thus what appeared at first to be a hindrance, has proved an advantage to the Society, and there is good reason to hope that the zeal and liberality of the inhabitants of Carbonnierre will speedily complete the necessary buildings without drawing on the funds at home.

PETTY HARBOUR.

Your Committee have great pleasure in noticing in the next place the Schools at this station under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Martin: none of your Teachers appear to be more happy in their work, or more respected by their neighbours; the kind feeling of the inhabitants was displayed not long since, when at the close of the winter Mr. Martin's stock of fire-wood was completely exhausted. He went on that occasion from house to house to raise a gang to go into the woods to make a haul for the use of the School, and he did not meet with one refusal: and he remarks, that "the haul amounted to 61 slides, and more than 1,000 sticks, by which the expence of purchasing fuel for all the coming year will be sayed."

Mr. and Mrs. Martin's Day School is conducted in the best manner, and contains 67 Scholars, viz.: 34 Boys and 33 Girls.

In their Sunday School are 59 Children in excellent order. Mr. Martin has likewise a Branch

School in a neighbouring Cove, where 35 Children, hitherto without means of instruction, are learning to read.

BONAVISTA.

The Schools at this Station, which were under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Hopper, and commenced with such a fair promise of success, have been unexpectedly suspended by the illness and subsequent death of Mr. Hopper. When Mr. Willoughby was at Bonavista, he found Mr. Hopper so ill, as to render his immediate return absolutely necessary, and not being able to engage a suitable person as a temporary supply, he could only promise the inhabitants that other Teachers should be sent out as soon as possible. Your Committee are happy to inform the meeting that they have been enabled to engage a Master and Mistress, who appear to be well qualified to succeed Mr. and Mrs. Hopper, and who will sail immediately for Bonavista. Mr. and Mrs. Hopper had been scarcely two years at their Station, but in that time had accomplished much; 208 Children had been under their instruction, and the number on the Attendance Book of their Daily School, was nearly Mr. Hopper continued to labour even longer 100. than the state of his health could justify; and Mrs. Hopper, notwithstanding her anxious duties as a wife and mother, kept up her school in excellent order to the last. The latest letter received by the Committee from Mr. Hopper, on his quitting Bonavista, contains

The produce of the Work done in the Girls' School, including the value of the Materials, was 7*l*. 6s. 5d., and Articles sold, 4*l*. 18s. $0\frac{1}{2}d$.; making a total of 12*l*. 4s. $5\frac{1}{2}d$.

Mr. Hopper was in every respect a most valuable Master, and in his death the Society has sustained a great loss. During his protracted illness, the truth and supporting power of those principles which led him first to engage in the work of religious instruction, were strongly illustrated in the faith and patience with which he passed through all the stages of his appointed sufferings, and as he drew nearer to an eternal world, he realized increasingly his interest in Christ, and in his last moments enjoyed that " peace of God which passeth all understanding."

GREEN'S POND.

This is the last Station in the occupation of the Society, and is situated about 30 miles north of Bonavista, with a population exceeding 1,100. Mr. Willoughby had paid a very seasonable visit to Green's Pond a short time previous to Mr. and Mrs.

King's arrival, where he received much assistance and many civilities from Mr. Parrott. That gentleman introduced him to all the principal inhabitants, who entered very cordially into the Society's views, opened a subscription, and pledged themselves to finish the Buildings forthwith, and to give the Schools their best support when the Master and Mistress should come to reside among them. full reliance upon these encouraging assurances, Mr. and Mrs. King were despatched to this Station, which they reached in the month of October last. They were indebted, on their arrival, to the hospitality of Mr. Smith, a merchant, who received them into his family until they could be otherwise accommodated, the Society's premises not being completed. Mr. and Mrs. King opened their School with 34 Children, and the expectation of being joined by many more as the season advanced; they soon also obtained 54 Sunday Scholars; and they express themselves as much encouraged by the cheerfulness with which the Children receive instruction.

Among several important applications for Teachers received by your Committee, those from Toulinguet or Twillingate and Port de Grave claimed their first attention. The population of these harbours is large, and the inhabitants have undertaken to build the Schools and Dwellings for the Teachers at their sole expence. Mr. Willoughby visited both settlements, and was much pleased with his reception. At Twillingate, which is 210 miles

north of St. John's, a most encouraging prospect of usefulness presents itself: there are nearly 500 children, whose parents earnestly desire the blessings of Christian instruction for them. Mr. Willoughby arrived at Twillingate on the 9th September, and quitted it on the 17th. In that short time a suitable building and sufficient land for a garden were freely given and duly conveyed by deed to the Society, and the sum of 160*l*. was subscribed to build a dwelling-house for the Teachers, and put the building into a fit state for conducting the School.

At Port de Grave, on the north side of Conception Bay, Mr. Willoughby found a population of between 2,000 and 3,000 without any daily School. After conferring with the principal merchants, it was finally agreed that Teachers should be sent out as soon as the necessary buildings could be prepared for their reception. Mr. Willoughby then selected the most eligible site for the School-house and Master's residence, a Grant of which has since been confirmed to the Society by the Government.

From the fevegoing statement of the Society's Schools in Newfoundland, it appears that there are fifteen already established, viz. seven principal and eight branches. After filling up the vacancies at Carbonnierre and Bonavista, the Society is under engagements to send Teachers to Twillingate and Port de Grave this season. Besides these pressing demands, three other settlements are looking for the

immediate assistance of the Society, comprizing a population of not less than 16,000. For these five Stations, as many Masters and Mistresses are required, and your Committee earnestly hope and fervently pray, that with the knowledge of these wants there will be found a corresponding desire to satisfy them, and that as soon as suitable Teachers present themselves, the necessary means will be furnished to send them forth.

When the difficulty and the responsibility of selecting proper Teachers are considered, as well as the inseparable connexion between the prosperity of the Society and the good character of the Masters and Mistresses, your Committee feel assured that the Meeting will hear with pleasure, and gratitude to Him who alone provides and qualifies every instrument for his own work, that they have great reason upon the whole to be satisfied with the management of the Society's Schools, and the progress of the Children: and they are thankful to perceive that a very general disposition prevails throughout the Colony to assist largely in defraying the expense of building Schools; in some places it is hoped that ere long the Society will, by the liberality of the people, be almost entirely relieved from that burthen. It will be the duty of the successors of your present Committee to dismiss very shortly to Newfoundland five new Teachers, viz. Mr. and Mrs. Meek, Mr. and Mrs. Lind, and Mr. Walker, all of whom are present here to-day, and on whose

behalf the prayers of the assembly are earnestly solicited,—for their protection while traversing the mighty deep, for their acceptance and success among those to whom they shall be sent, and above all, that the love of Christ (the only vital principle of duty) may constrain them to shew all good fidelity in the performance of their work, and to adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things.

The system of Branch Schools so often referred to, as now in operation at almost every Station, is at once simple, efficient, and economical; it enables the Master to meet the wants of the whole population within his reach at a comparatively trifling expense, while it is admirably adapted to the peculiarities and difficulties of Newfoundland, where the people are located in numerous insulated creeks and islands along its winding and deeply indented coast.

Your Committee cannot refer to the great advantages likely to accrue from the establishment of Branch Schools without alluding to a gentleman who originally suggested the attempt, and whose name will ever be connected with the first efforts and growing prosperity of this institution. Mr. Cock, of St. John's, was its early and steady friend; his gratuitous labours for the Society, and his kindness to its Teachers, have been noticed in preceding years, and it is now the melancholy duty of your Committee (while they once more record with gratitude his many valuable services) to announce to the meet-

ing his presumed decease. Mr. Cock sailed from St. John's on the 22d of December last on board the Matilda, and as no tidings have since been heard of the vessel, all hope of his safety is now abandoned. The Society has also to deplore the loss of another warm friend in the decease of Mr. Alexander, of Bonavista, whose personal exertions greatly contributed to the establishment of a School in that harbour, and who was ready on every occasion to countenance and assist its Teachers. While we mourn these bereavements, let us acknowledge the kind providence of God in raising up such friends to the Society; let us trust Him more implicitly who has the hearts of all men in his hand; and let us not be weary in well doing, seeing that "there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom in the grave, whither we are going."

In introducing the Home proceedings to your notice, your sanction is requested to an alteration of the day of the Monthly Meeting of the Committee, which it is proposed shall in future be held on the first Tuesday in every month. Of their proceedings at Home your Committee regret that they have so little to communicate. It has been found impracticable to keep alive, much more to increase any general interest, without visiting the associations periodically, and making known through them the success as well as the wants of the Society to the country at large.

Without such an agency, the principal source of your revenue will gradually dry up. This painful truth has, in some degree, been experienced already in almost all your associations, where from this cause alone, symptoms of declining interest have appeared, clearly shewing that the appointment of a travelling or Clerical Secretary can be no longer postponed; and your Committee cannot but believe, notwithstanding much disappointment and delay,* that if such assistance is really necessary to the Society's well-being, and is diligently sought for in faith and prayer, that it will in due time be provided. The great exertions which one of your Honorary Secretaries, Mr. Codner, made in establishing this Society, have so much injured his health that he has been obliged to leave many places unvisited during the past year where he would have been gladly received. He has, however, been enabled to form an Auxiliary Society at Lyme Regis, and a Ladies' Association at Bridport, at each of which places a sermon was preached by the Rev. Daniel Nantes, A. M., rector of Powderham, a zealous friend of the Society. Mr. Codner also proceeded to Axminster, where a public meeting

^{*} At the last Annual Meeting it was announced, that the Rev. Mr. West had accepted the office of Secretary; but it is with unfeigned regret that the Committee are compelled to state, that the Society has been deprived of that gentleman's services by unexpected circumstances, over which neither Mr. West nor the Committee had any control.

was held, at which Sir William Templer Pole, Bart. presided; and afterwards to Honiton, where a Branch Association was formed, H. B. Lott, Esq., M. P., in the chair; which appears likely to render efficient aid to the Society. At Torquay also a Branch Association was organized under the auspices of the Lord Viscount Sandon, M. P., and 551. 15s. were collected. Mr. Codner was received at these different places with the same kindness he had experienced on former occasions. From the various Auxiliaries and Associations have been received during the past year the sum of 9071. 8s. 11d., being 1371. 16s. 5d. less than in the preceding year. The City of London Ladies' Association has paid the Parent Society nearly 801.; and the Camberwell Ladies' Association about 50l. Mr. Willoughby, on his return from the colony, landed at Greenock, where he waited upon several gentlemen connected with the Newfoundland trade, and stated to them the nature and objects of the Society, and was very favourably received. Through the kind co-operation of Mr. Johnston, a subscription in aid of its funds was then set on foot, to which all the merchants in Greenock trading to Newfoundland contributed, and in a short space of time 55l. 13s. were collected. As it is not intended to call upon our female friends at present to promote any further sale of useful work, the Committee avail themselves of this opportunity to urge the necessity of obtaining annual subscriptions as the most effectual

mode of assisting the Society, and giving it a permanent character.

The continued liberality of the British and Foreign Bible Society, of the Prayer Book and Homily Society, of the Religious Tract Society, and of the Sunday School Society, in making respectively large grants to this Institution during the past year, demands its warmest acknowledgements: by these grants its Teachers have been made the happy dispensers among the poor of Newfoundland of not less than 5,000 copies of the Scriptures, 40,000 Tracts, and many Prayer Books and Homilies, while no less than 8,000 Spelling Books for the Schools have been placed at the Society's disposal. In addition to these grants your Committee mention with grateful respect the valuable gifts of one of your Vice Presidents, the Right Honourable the Lord Bexley, your noble Chairman, and of Mrs. Vansittart, of a large assortment of Books for the purpose of furnishing, at the Society's respective stations, loan Libraries for those who have been taught to read, and desire to obtain religious and useful knowledge. Several other kind friends have likewise benefitted the Society by gifts of a similar The Society is greatly indebted to several Clergymen, who have permitted the wants of Newfoundland to be advocated in their pulpits during the last year; and to the following Clergymen, who have considerably aided the funds of the Society by

preaching in its behalf, viz.: the Rev. Henry Budd, A. M., the Rev. R. W. Sibthorpe, B. D., the Rev. R. C. Dillon, A. M., the Rev. J. Wilcox, A. M., the Rev. W. Marsh, A. M., the Rev. William Thompson, A. M., the Rev. C. Day, LL. B., the Rev. D. Nantes, A.M., Rev. Astley Cave Browne Cave, A. M., the Rev. Thomas Dale, A. M., and Rev. I. F. Denham, B. D.

Your Committee hope that not merely the liberality, but the sympathy of many has been called into exercise on behalf of our colonial population, which will result in the steady support of an institution, established to fulfil the sacred duty of a parent to its offspring, by communicating the knowledge of Christ (which is the glory and strength of the Mother Country) to her absent, dependent, and uninstructed children.

Your Committee have great pleasure in expressing their deep sense of the kindness and enlightened judgment which have marked the conduct of His Excellency Sir Thomas Cochrane, the Governor of Newfoundland, towards all the agents of the Society; but especially towards Mr. Willoughby, who, in his late visit to the island, received on all occasions from His Excellency the most prompt attention, and every facility for carrying into effect the objects of his mission. Neither in this place should be omitted the grateful mention of that hospitality, courtesy, and good feeling which were shewn to

Mr. Willoughby by all classes while he was in the Colony, nor the increasing liberality with which they support the Schools.

Your Committee have much pleasure in announcing the name of the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Sandon as one of the Vice Presidents of this Society.

In concluding this Report, it would be unjust to the memory of a departed nobleman, who gave the first impulse to this Society, and cherished its infant growth by his counsel and his patronage, not to mention the name of the lamented EARL of LIVER-POOL, late one of your Vice-patrons. He was "a just man, ruling in the fear of God;" and as he was a blessing to his country while he lived, so his death must be deplored as a national calamity. Christian patriot, when presiding at the formation of the Margate Auxiliary Bible Society, in the year 1821, made some forcible observations on the duty and the responsibility of Great Britain to give to her extensive Colonies the blessings of religious instruction, which made such a powerful impression upon the mind of a Newfoundland merchant then present, that he determined to attempt the formation of that Society, the sixth Anniversary of which we are met this day to celebrate. Lord Liverpool was the first powerful friend of the undertaking—he largely subscribed to it—he procured the patronage of Lord Bathurst, then at the head of the Colonial department—obtained for it the sum of 500l. from his Majesty's Government for the building of a central School at St. John's—an annual stipend of 100l. for its Master—a free passage for the Teachers to the Colony in his Majesty's transports, and all necessary Grants of Lands for Schools in any part of Newfoundland. In this way did that enlightened statesman testify his regard to this Society, but chiefly to those sacred principles which it was instituted to promote, and on the maintenance of which he so well knew the stability of empires and the happiness of man to depend. In the simplicity of the language of Holy Scripture, it may be truly said of the late Earl of Liverpool, "the memory of the just is blessed."

Your Committee have now fulfilled their task, and in surrendering their trust into your hands, they heartily pray that the Society may continue to be conducted in the spirit of faith and love; and that it may speedily become the medium of communicating sound religious instruction, not only to the poor of Newfoundland, but to the hundreds of thousands of immortal souls in the wilds and wastes of British North America, who are daily perishing for lack of knowledge. Hitherto the Society has confessedly been signally blest in its selection of Teachers. He who supplies them, gives effect to their labours, and thus graciously condescends to assure us that he is blessing and will continue to bless us; for six years he has carried us in his bosom, as a "nursing father beareth his sucking child;" and is it not our duty

and our privilege, in the obedience of faith, to appropriate that word once spoken to Joshua?—
"Have not I commanded thee? Be strong, and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed; for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest."






