- The Oil Cabinct and Novelty Company, of this city, are about to dispose of their ellects en bloc, by tender.
- The stock of leather and shoe findings beloaging to the estate of Cumpbell Brysou, insolvont, has beensold by the assignce for $31 \frac{2}{2}$ cents on the dollitr, cash.
- A. Dion, grocer, Quelec, whose failure a few weeks :ugo, we have already repoted, has, within the lits fuw days, effected a settlement at 55 cents on the dollar.
- A. Climmpgrae, a well known Othwa hotel keeper, has found it necessary to make an assigmont. His liabilities are nut heavy, only about $\$ 5,000$, but his assots are merely nominal.
-T. A. Maybury, proprictor of the largest general store business in barkhill, has fitiled, and it is reported that he is missing. Mis liabilities are unusually large. One Montreal firm is said to be interested to the extent of $\$ 3000$.
- Mr. Crosson, of the car works at Cobourg, which have been in operation about ten yenrs, threatens to remove them to Port Hope unless some inducement to remia is oflered. The present accommodntion is too limited.
- The revenue of the Intercolonial Railway for Narch exceeded that of the corresponding month last year by thirty thousand dollars. This is a rery gratifying inerease, and uugurs whil för die fiture tralle of the road.

- The Dominion Govermment offers the city of St. John, N.B., a loun of half amillion dolInrs for improving the harbout. The deputation from the City Council, which visited the capital to negotiate, are inclined not to accept on the terms imposed.
- It is stated that there are ibout twentyfonr new retail grocery firms in Quebec. With the prospect of better times there is no doubt many will commence business to take the place of those who have dropped oftentring the "hard times."
- The grocery firm of A. T. Moore \& (lo., Brantford, is in financial difficulty, and is en deavoring to effect a compromise. Their liabilities are in the neighborthood of $\$ 15,000$. They have oftered their creditors 60 cents on the dollar.
- The arbitrator in the mater of the European arbitation has made an order, fixing the 31st May next as the day on which all claims arising on policies or otherwise, not brought in and proved, shall be barred. Creditors who have not sent in their claims should do so at once.
- Mr. E. W. Hyman, a prominent busineess man of London, Out., actively engaged in the tanning business and in pork packing for many yenrs, died last Priday. He was 2 most respected citizen, and always took a great interest in whatever tended to advance the materiul interests of the Forest Oity.
- Hartford's greatest income is from insurance stock. The residents of that Connecticut city hold $\$ 7,474,951$ of such capital, as a gainst only $\$ 1,729,826$ of bank stock.
- The Phindelphin Bullatin finds on one side of the new Ameriean silver dollar a fat girl with a tremendous "bang," and on the other a hen flying off her nest-probably frightened by the bang.

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- The book debts of insolvent estates are usually not looked upon as good investments, and as it rule that portion of the assets are worth very litle to the creditors. Within the jast week the following debts of this class have been sold for the respective mes specified, which it will be seen are very low : Mcheod, MaNaughton \& Co., brewers, (detots mader \$100) 6 cents; A. Bergeron, catlie dealer, Côte des Neiges, 8 cents; Thomas Scott, baker, 10 cents; John McKinnon \& Co., biscuit mann. facturers, 12 cents; Monroe $\&$ Bickerstaf; plumbers, $23 d$ cents; David Sleeth, wood merchant, 28 cents.
- The Charter Oak Life Insurance Company has called a meeting of policy-holders for the 18th of April to act on an amendment of the charter providing for reorganization on a mutual basis. Genema agents are reported to be working energetically in getting proxies, through which they will get power in the future control. They are reported to be making a deadset against. President Jewell, who tuok occasion to get at loggerheads with them soon after assuming the Presidency last year. At any event, Jewell will bedisplaced iu faror of some one having a practical krowledge of life-insurance business, and, if he endeavors to hold his pace, the plan is to reduce the sulary from $\$ 10,000$ to $\$ 5,000$, when he would retire roluntarily.
- The dry rot that has destroyed so many life insurance companics in the United States is at work in Germany. A recent mecting in Berlin of the policy-holders of the North German Mutual Life Insurance Company disclosed that the funds of the Company had been stolen. Another company in difliculties is the National Life Insurance Company. This corporation re-hypothecated 524,000 marks of its: bonds with the bankrupt Rostock Bank. The character of,
its management is shown in the fuct that of 180,883 marks received, 150,283 were used up in expenses. Other insurance companies than those in Life business are expected to follow soon.
- The firm of Clement \& Gibbons, general stor-keepers, of Morrisburg, are in deep water and a dissolution has taken place. Mr. Clement has been a prominent citizen of this thitiving little town and lad accumulated a fair amount of means, which, however; have been sunk in late unfortmate produce operations and he is now worth considerably less than nothing. His linbilities are estimated at $\$ 30,000$, while his assets may not reach one third of this sum. Mr. Clement held the position of town treasurer, and a number of farmers who had money deposited in his hands will suffer, as well as the municipality. Arrangements have been effected by which Mr. Gibbons will be enabled to continue the store business, compromising the firm's linbilities at 65 cents on the dollar, with security. No settlement of Mr. Olements liabilities has yet been effected,
- The Union Fire Insurance Company, chartered by the Ontario Legislature, has moved its bendquarters from Ottawa to Ioronto. It were well perhals if anotleer Ottawa compay were to follow its example, and move its hendquarters to Montrenl, where its business has been most profiable, and where, besides laving the benelit of a strong and well-qualified directornte, it would be tree from certain sinister and petty influences which hitherto have not prometed the interests of the shareholders, notwithstanding the ability and zenl of the honorable president and $a$ few of his collengues:
- Application has been made for the incorporation of the " Globe Lightning Rod Company," of London, with a capital of $\$ 50,000$.

- Messrs. J. Sternberg \& Cu., hat and cap mannficturers of this city; have offered lieiv creditors 25 cente on the dullar, in 4,8 , and 12 months, the last payment secured, and it is snid that a majority of the creditors have given theit consent to this arrangement.
-A bew method of manufacturing oatmeal is by a chopping process, which it is clamed is a great improvement, as the meal so made is tree from dast. A sample wits exhibited on 'Change at few days since and attracted considerable attention.
- Edward Buron, a merchinnt of Joliette, who recently failed, has been arrested on suspicion for having stolen a large quantity of goods from the store recently oceupied by him, which were found secreted on the premises of his father-in-latw.
- The men of section 9 , Lachine Canal, who were left unpaid by Phelan, the absconding contactiox, have been paid by the Govermment out of the reserve in their mands. Most of them - have found employment on other sections.
-The George Moorhead Manafacturing Co., of London, sumplied A. W. Matthews, of the Queen's' Hotel, Brussels, With the furniture required for his establishment, but as he did not pay for it as ngreed; but ran amay, tiey haye issued a writ of atuchinent:

E-The Sorel Gas Company, who began, operations in the fall of 1876 , buying out the stock of a former unsuccessful company at 20 or 30 cents on the dollar, have been attached after a brief but eventful career, there having been some seven or eight suits brought against them within the last few montis.

His liabilities are placed at nbout $\$ 100,000$. He failed about two years ago, and compromised then at 25 cents on the dollar, we believe.
- Some difficulty has taken place between Mr. Duncan McDonald, the con tractor who built the Q.M.O. \& O. Rail way from here to Otawa, and the Railway Commissioners, with reference to its possession. The Government have agreed to allow Mr. McDonald to remain in possession till the dispute is selthed by arbitration. The road is said to pay well.
- The Bank of Montreal has given motice that it will pay on and after the first of May; the coupons for interest then due on the bonds of the Province of Quebec Lonns, 187.4 and 1876. The coupons of the 187 g Loan are those hitherto paid by the Merchants Bank of Canada as printed on their face, but which are now payable at the: Bank of Montreal.

- The suspension and subsequent attachment of John Smith \& Co., wholesale grocers of this city, last Friday, were events quite unexpected to the grocery trade, though it had been known that the firm had been seeking renewals and showing signs of being in an uneasy position. It was at first reported that the estate showed over 90 cents on the dollar, but the statement submitted to the meeting beld yesterday aftetnoon dues not bear out this estimate, nor does Mr. Smith's mexpectedly small offer of 30 cents on the doliar. The gross liabilities reach nbout $\$ 76,000$, of which about $\$ 45,000$ are for goods, and the deficiency is estimatedat $\$ 16,000$. Mr. Simith's offer was not closed with; nor will any definite action be taken until the inspectors, Messts. Kinloch, Matthews \& Cochrane, make their investigation and report to a furthermeting.
- In connection with Prince Bismarck's tobace project, a celebrated botanist, Herr - Schlieden, has published some statistics in regard to the manufacture and sale of cigars in Germany. It appenrs that in Thuringia alone about 450 tons of beetroot leares, are annually "transformed into topneco." In Magdeburg

and the Palatiunte the cigar-makers employ large quantities nol only of beetroot leaves, but also of the leaves of endire, and even of the potato plant. The cigars sold in South Germany as coming from Veves, at a price of from one mark to one mark and a half a hundred, do not, according to Herr Schlieden, contain any tobacco, " except that made with cabbage or turnip leaves which had been deprived of their specific odor by various manipulations, and subsequently steeped for some time in an extract of tobacco." Herr Schlieden adds, with an air of conscions pride, " that in no country in the world are cigars sold at so cheap a rate as in Germany."

THE SUGAR DUTIES.
We publish elsewhere a letter from Mr. George Gorcion Dustan; who has responded to our suggestion that he should state plainly the extent of protection which would satisfy the refining interests. We find that we misunderstood Mr. Dustan's former letter in one particular. We had supposed that the 1 to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ was 1 to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cents per lb., instead of its being the proportion between the highest and lowest rates of duty. Mr. Dustan in his calculations makes no allowance for the effect of the ad valorem duty. He bases his calculations on weight, but he must bear in mind that the 25 per cent. ad valorem duty is equivalent to about $\frac{1}{2}$ cent. per lb. With regard to Mr Dusian's propositions we shall make a few observations. Ist. He calls for a permancnt act. We apprehend that he does not clearly understand the meaning of that term. Our act at present is what Mr Gladstone mernt by a permanient act. The sugnr duties had been brought annually under the consideration of parliament, and it was pro.
posed to make them perimanent, but it is of course quite impossible for any Par. liament to control its successors or to give any satisfactory plecke that any policy will be permanent. Our act therefore is at present precisely of the character which Mr. Cladstone hela to be permanent. On the and point we have more than once expressed ourselves as favorable to Mr . Dustan's proposition not only as to sugnr but as to every other article on which bounty is granted. The bounty system leads to finud, and protection should in otir opinion be afforded to onr manufacturers rgainst such frauds. We are not quite clear as to the meaning of the recommendation under the 3rd head, except as to the packages, which are only charged with duty at present on their value. We see no great objection to their exemption. As to the rates it would have been better if Mr. Dustan had stated precisely the rates on eneh stmadard. We presume that the l cent. per lb. is to be maintained on all sugars of $13 \mathrm{D} . \mathrm{S}$. or upwards; but we are not clear as to the others. There was no deduction by order in Council, except on sugars under 9 , unless we are much mistaken. We are satisfied that the proposed change in the claty on molasses will be deemed inexpedient. Of course it is out of our power to offer any opinion on the amount of protection which Mr. Dustan's propositions would give, as we are unacquainted with the mysteries of sugar refining. We, however, are well aware that a pound of raw sugar will not produce an equal weight of refined. We need not cliscuss further the question of crystalized centrifugal. That sugar has to enter into competition in England wibl refined sugar; neither having any protection. Dry. Dustan fitis to give any reason why they should not crmpete in our market with the same sugars if the duties were the same. With these few remarks we shall leave Mr. Dustan to plead his own cause.

## TEE OTPAWA AGRICULI'URAL DEFALCATION.

Sir Arthur Helps; in one of his pleasant and practical essays, observes that one object of having a board of directors in joint-stock compranies is to obtain the opinions of various persons and so to gain collective wisdom. He also makes mention, with reference to the division of labor in a joint-stock body, of one of the governing persons, an old gentleman (" confidence is a plant of slow growth in aged bosoms," as Lord Chatham said), who, on a certain occasion, solely busied himgelf in asking for important vouchers. He probably felt that he was not a very
skilful person in deciding upon difficult questions; but he had a sort of watchdog carefulness: and of that he was resolved to make use in behalf of the great interests purtly committed to his care. Tere is exactly where the difticulty lies in more than one insurance organization in Canada to day. 'The one man power granted to the general mannger implies a responsibility for which he feels he is not reseiving adequate pay, and when, at the end of thew years, defalcations are discovered, more mischief is clone to the institution by the weakening of public confidence than ean ever be restored by cheese. paring salaies and other necessary expenses.

Stockholders having purohased their shares are prompt to appear at the treasurer's oflice when dividends are declared, but, having done this, they apperr to rest content until some discovery is male which affects their interests, or some explosion takes place which informs them that a great part of their property has been used up by what is mildly tormed, in too many cases, barl management. Then it is that they and hitherto indifferent directors put in an appearance, and complain of causes which their earlier attendance might have prevented, and then it is that they attach blame, when the true origin of the trouble can be traced back to their neglect of interest in their own property. Again persons are chosen to fill positions of great trust through the influence of "friends at colut," and little inquiry is made as to their business character. The man who runs carelessly into debt, who owes numerous bills to tradesmen and others, which, at the time of forming, he trusted Providence would enable him to pay some time or other, is not the sort of person to spend less than he earns, at whatever rate of salary, or to hesitate applying the same blissful trust in the future when he feels the want of public or private funds passing through his hands; especially if he feels he is underpaid for his services.

The recent defalcation in the head office of the Ottawa Agricultural Insurnnce Company happens at an unfortunate time, after the çonficlence in such institutions had so recently sustained such $a$ shock in the disclosures made concerning the Agricultural Insurance Company which has made the voluntary exile, E. H. Goff; so notorious. From all we can leaw, the Ottawa Agricultural will lose not more than from $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 5,000$, and they may consider themselves fortunate in making the discovery before more serious mischief had been done. Those

wards rubud out，and it took me some troubte
to pick out the balance for verification of the thmal statement．Your accomatant appeats to have accepted what came to his iand from vour secretary or your agents wihout due serutiny．

It may not be out of place here to refer to the Expense Account of the company for the purpose of explaining what may appear an anomaly．The printing for the whole business has been done in Montreal for some time because it could be done elieaper，and saved the company sevomal thousand dollars a year as compared with the charges fommerly mado elsewhere． This should properly be charged to the head oflice．
In Mr．Ross＇examination he appears to lave discovered a liability which should have made its appearance in the annual statement，viz．：Unpaid losses，\＄10，5S7．03， including resistedand non－aljusted claims． There is an error in the amont credited to shareholders of $\$ 3,707.60$ ．This disere－ bancy appoas to have produced some litile discussion at the annual meeting，of which we were not furnished with a fuli roport this year，and forms the principal deficiency．

Now hat the wordhy president of the compuay has puthis shoulder to the wheel， it is to be hoped that the necessary changes for the better intugurated list year will bo energetically promoted．＇The amount of promium notes is cxeessive，and combined eftorts should be mado by all agricultur－ al companies to do away with the note system allogelher．In many cases these notes for such small amounts do not pay the cost of collecting；many are for sixand even nine months，and the companies meantime actually guiranteo the maker＇s ability to pay at maturity．
The company is aboud to make a further call of ten per cent．on its shareholders， which，with the amome of the first call $\$ 60,025.15$ ，and the net amount of over 25 per cent．at credit of protit and loss after allowing lor unpaid losses and defateation， will place the company in lirst class con－ dition，and under ordinary circumstances will enable them for tho future to pay ltundsome ammal dividends．There is besides an excellent opportunity likely to present itself for further strengthening the company，and one which should not be neglected．＇Who liabilities to policy－ holders on the parb of the Canada Agricul－ tural Insurance Comprany have been re－ duced over one－hited，and the latier would be in a better position now to entertaina proposal for reinsurance than when nogo－ tiations wero made three months ago． The amount of $\$ 70,000$ to $\$ 80,000$ being thus added to the capital of the company would make it one of the strongest native companies in Canada，and enable it moro
offectually to carry on its systom of ro－ form，especially as to rates and preminm notes．Of course in any such negocitions it nust be bome in mind that the ehoice risks of the company have already been largely insured elsewhere．Drr．Ross com－ eludes Appendix No． 6 with some sound pactical vilvice．Mo says：

In regard to sulseguent procedure，I think you might well divite he sectetary＇s duties from that of treasurer．The secretior ough， to receire all the eorrespondence and enter muney luters it a book kepu for the purpose， and bind over the bouk and money to the trea－ surer to be entered into the cash fiook，who whit initiall and return the book with memarks，if any be tegnited，for the ruidiance of he seere－ tary in acknowledging receipt of the money that the treasurer lodge all money in the bank and pay only by cheque，and only attee laying the accounthefore the Boand and receiv－ ing anthority to my，atm that snid chernes he initialed by the secretays ond sigmed by the trensurer，and combersigned by the president or other director appoined for the purpose that the atcomatan be treasurer ；the secertary will find enough to do in the conrespondene atal manargementof the iosurathe depatment or the company，attending to agents and pashing the comprany＇s business．

Much of the forogoing advice will seem shrange to companies of well－organized routine．Wo may rematrk that many of Whe practieal sugrgestions mate throth hont the Appendix were repoatedly urgol by the mathager of tho Montreal agoney in his occasional interviews with the bon． president and offor ollieers of the com－ pany．

## TILE LOCAL LUMBER TRADE．

After one of the dullest winters expe－ rienced for many years in the lumber Lrade，there is al last a moderate revival， and Spring having set in a month carlier than usual，building has fainly commenced． Some thirty－hwo houses have been com－ menced since Janmary，and about forly more which were commenced late last year are being completed．Contractors inform us that they are giving their cat－ penters only sixty to ninety conts per day，and others that \＄l．sp per day of ten hours is the highest price paid first－chass bricklayers．These low wages have in－ duced proprietors to make considerable atterations athe repairs whieh they aver will not cost them over hatl what it wonht three or four years ago．Substandial plain brick houses，two stories high，with Man－ sutd roof and basement，ean now be put up for st， 560 ，which could not be built three years since for less than $\$ 2,500$ ． These low prices may induce property owners to build，athough there is littlo demand for dwellings，ats the unprece－ dented number of＂lo lets＂hanging in front of houses at this late period of tho scason too plainly show－tenants boing unable to pay rent，owing to want of work and what they call＂starvation
wages." As usual, the policy of the Govermment is hargely blanmed for this unsatiosfactory state ol athiars. The purchaso in the United States of machinery used in canal enlargements has caused some dis. content. The value of the dredges, towboats, scows, elovitors, de., employed upon them amount to some $\boldsymbol{s}, 400,000$. Had these beon made at liome, our machine shops, shipyards, hamber yauds, hardware stores, and the people employed therein woukd have benefited by such an expenditure in the country.

There are in Montreal eighty-eghthember yards owned by filty-four dealers, many of whom have not had occasion to open their gates cluring the winter. There are forty million four humdred and sixtyfive thousand feet in lirst and second hands, sixteen millions of whichate in four yards. This is being offered at very low tigures with very few buyem. Whe stock in the smatler retail yards is light, but, as the demand is also light, the wants will be easily sumplich. We lave twenty-one mill owners, who also do a saw and planing business. Seven of these have been shat down for the last eight months, seven worked about half time withone-thind the usual number of hands, and seven womed two-thirds time with lagf the usad momber of men. All of these have plamed or bawed at very little orer hatl the usual charges, and what lumber has been sold, has generally been disposed of at or below cost. Some fer speculators have had on hand for the last three years dree to four million feet of lumber, which they are now willing to dispose of at rates that cannot net them much over hall the original cost, including interest and other expenses.

The lessened demand for dwellings, or jather the arrest of the usual increasing requirements of the growing population of the city, has led some of the building societies to adopt a change in business lac tics, and loans on mortgages now fom the principal investments.

## IHE CONSHITUTIONAL QUESTION.

Before entering on the consideration of the speech delivered by Sir Johm Matedonald in support of his motion censtring the Lientenant Governor of Quebec for dismissing his ministers, we shatl notice as brielly as possible the remarks with which he profaced those on which he relied, as justifying the course which he recommended. The resolution was po. posed as an amendment to the motion for going into committee of supply, although Mr. Mackenzie had offered to aflord the mover an opportuity of briuging it forward as an original motion. Believing, as
we do, that the discussion was not only inexpedient but minconstitutional, we see no reason to regret that it took place on the oecasion of an amendment to the motion for going into committee of supply.
In justification of the course adopited by Sir John Macconald, he referved to : number of cases in which the conduct of govemors was discussed in the Lmperial Parlament, not one of which could be finly adduced as a precetent for his own resolution. The cases citech as having been brought under the consideration of the Imperial Parliment were those of Gor emors Light, Barthett, Byre, Popo, Hennessey and Daily. Now the four first named were Covernors of colonies in Which Padiamentary Government has not been established. The Imperial Government has invariably acknowledged its re. sponsibility for the acts of the governors of such colonics, as it did in old times for those of Canadian governors whose conduct was freguently brought under the notice of Pirlitument, Not one of these cases can fitirly bo alduced asa precedent. Governor Daily's case was that of the govemor of a colony enjoying labliamentary Govermment, but the complaint aganst him was that he failed to employ the influence of the Crown with which he was entrusted, to prevent his ministors pursumgan objectionable policy-a charge the reverse of that bronght aghinst Lientemant Governor Letellier. We, of course, Pully admit that the Parliament of Camada has the same right to discuss the conduct of a Drovincial governor that the Houso of Parlament in England have to discuss that of the governor of a colony enjoging Datiamentary Government. The propriety of doing so must depend entirely upon circunstances. It must be bornc in mind that the members of the Imperial Jouses of Parliament have no petiy interests to serve by impeaching the conduat of the governor of a colony. Are the members of our Parliament equally disinterested? 'Those of them belonging to lis Province of Quebec represent the same constitutions to which an appeal is now fending on the question at issue, While they are in strict alliance as members of a party with representatives from other Provinces of the Dominion.

This is one of the anomaties of our system, and the present political crisis hats brought it into prominence. We haye two political puties contenting for power in evory Province of the Dominion, and they are supposed to represent opposite views on questions of public interest. The party of which Sir John Macdonald is the recognized leader, and which is styled " Liberal Conservative," claims public con-
lidence manly on the gromed of its adyocacy of what is termed a " National Policy," or protection for native industry, It is scarcely nceessary to observe that political parties in the Province of Quebec must be organized on clifierent grounds. It cannot be athirmed with a shatow of reason that the guestions on which parties have been divided in the Quebec Logislathere would, if submitted to the Dominion Ifouse of Commons, be deened of at party ehameter, or likely to conmand the support of one side of the Honse rather than the other. And yet on a guestion of strichly local interest, on which an appeal to the people was pending, and which was to be decided within three weeks, Sir John Macdonald has thought it constitutional for a llouse of Commons, consisting of members many of whom will shortly be required to appeal to the same constitutions, to decide, sitting as a judicial tribunal, on what is pactieatly an impeachment of the Lientenant-Govemor. We must own that we know of no precedent for such a procecting; and, in the public interests we rejoice that the First Minister refused to discuss the question on its morits, and took tho high and constitutional, and, let us ath, the thoroughly conservative course of disclaming the right of the Fonse of Commons to interfere in a question of a strictly local character. That any members from the Province of Quebec, butespecially members of French origin, shouid have countenanced suchia motion as that submitted by Sir John Mactonake, is to us a subject of anazement.
That motion involves not only an im. pathment of the Jientenat-Governor, but a censure of the Govemment for its non-interference. No other inference can be dawn from the proceeding than that Sir John Mactonald, if in ollice, would have recommented the iemoval of the Lieutenant-Governor or Quebee, and, as a conseguence, of the presemt Quebec Ministry, without reference to the people of the Province. The obvious intention of the framers of the British American Aet was to make the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces independentiof the Domi. nion Government during' their period of service. They are only removable for canse assigned, and that canse mast lie not only commmicated to the dientenant. Governor, but likewise by message to the Sonate and Hollse of Commons, within a week after the next session of Parliament. If a Lieutenant-Governor were guilly of conduct warranting stich a resolution as that proposed by Sir Jolin Macdonald, there would have been a canse within the neaning of the 50th clause of the British

Amerien Act-of conise ino precedent can be cited from English history. The amalogous procecting would be the depo. sition of the Sovereign and a change of dymasty. Sir Jolm Machonald cited sercral precedents for arbitury acts on the part of former sovereigns since the complete recognition of Parlimentary Gor ermment, but he is well aware that all cases of difticulty were solved without resorting to almomal metsures. That the Conservative party should sympathise with the Quebec ex-ministers is natura, and we can guite understand their indig. mation at what, looking at it from their stampoint, appears an arbitrary por ceeding, but they have committed a grave error in appealing to the Honse of Commons to interfere in a question of strictly loen policy, with which the people of the Province or Quelec c:un alone constitutionally deal, and with which they were on the eve of dealing when hais ill timed interference was invoked.
lut for the strong opinion which wo entertain as to the unconstitationality of the interference of the Dominion Parliament with the localallairs of the Province of Quetiec, min interference which would jistity simila interference on the part of the hmperial Honse of Commons with our Dominion allaits, we should have been pleased that a discussion should have taken place in the House of Commons on the constitutional powers of the Lientenant Governor, of the Province. Unfortumately, the ministers of the Crown were prechaded, owing to the circumstances of the case, from debating the question on its merits. And yet Sir, Jom Macdonath has limself done gond service in placing the question at issue in a clearer light. He distinctly refused to argue the guestion on the narrow gromads on which Mr. Kerr and other disputants have based their eensure of the Lientemant-Governor. Referring to Mr. Kem's argument he observed" There is muel to be said from a "merely lawyer"s point of view in that "respeet, and I would not be at all sur"pised if a cose were brought un before "the contrs which would be obliged to "sel aside the constitutional question "and look at the strichly legal question, "whether that might not be mantainell." We certainly should be very much sur prised to find that the courts put any construction on the words in the bird elause of the Union Act, "the Executive "Council shall be composed of such per"sons as the Lientemant-Giovernor from " time to time thinks fit," but that consistent with common-sense, and we fail to comprehend the moaning of the term "it constitutional question" as applied to a
clanse in an Acl of Paliament. Nevertheless we should not be sory if Mr. Kem would apply for a writ of gur warranto against Mr. Joly, to ascertain whether he holds oflice legally or illegally. We appehend, howerer, that, atter Sir John Macdonald's speech we shall hear no more of the illegality of the dismissal of the exministers.
We have on a former occasion admition that an aet may be legal and yet unconstitutional, that is tosay, "conhruy to the spinit of the constitution." Sir John Maclonald has cited Loul Brougham's as afliming that an Act of Parliamont may be unconstitutional, alhough legal amd binding. We are quite willing to meet the question at issue fairly, and to main. tain that the specific act was in strict accordance with the spirit of the constitntion. If we understand Sir John Macdonald's theory he would reduce the monarchical element of our constitution to what Lord Elgin most happily termed "a niant of mook soverejgnty." We shall quote his words: " so long as the at"visers of the Crown have the confidence "of Padiament they have a right to clam "the confidence of the Sovereign.. What is the great pinciple. If wo do not hole "to that, then we are all at sea and in great danger of being wrecked." It is true that this broad assertion was to a certain extent moditied ly the supposed ease of the Sovereign believing that the representatives of the people had forfeited the confidence of the people themselves. This was illustrated by a deference to ary. Gladstone's last dissolution of Parliament, Sir John admitting that the Queen might have intimated to the Premier that, inasmuch as the single elections were going against his govermment, an appeal to the comnty by a dissolution, might be desirable. Sir John informs us that Mr. Gathstone " did not wait for any such intimation on the part of the Crown;" but we mast point out that he has no more ground for such am assertion than we should have if we athmed the reverse. Whether MLs. Gilulstone acted in consequence of an intimation from the Queen or spontancously is known only to the Queen and himself, or, possibly, to some or all of his collengues. This may be thought amation of trifling importimen, as it is in itsell, but we advert to it because a great deal of the misconception which exists arises from what. Mr. Todd has so elenty pointed out, vi\%," "the idea that the Sovereign herself" "lans ceased to be anything but'a cipher "in the State without any measure "of political power:" The whole tendency of Sir John Macdonald's speech was to convey the impression which Mr.

Tod notices in orter that he may remove it, which he cloes by the citation of authorities of the highest kind, and authorities will which mere writers on the constitution, such as Bagohot and Freeman, cannot be brought intocompetition. That impression is that the Crown neither has nor ought to have any authority, especially as to legislation. We have already in the course of this controversial dis. cussion cited from a speech of the late Derly, who hat himself filled the offico of first Minister the following passage: "it isthe daty of the Minister for the "time boing, in stumit ling an! proposi"Lions for the assent of Mer Majesty, to "give satisfictory reasons that such pro"positions are calted for by publie policy, "and justifed by the pablic interests." We shall not cite, as we could do, innumomale authoritios to the same eflect, tut simply allim that there is no doubt whatever ats to the conatitutional doolrine inealeated in Mr. Todd's recent pamphiet. It must be bome in mind that Sir Joln Macdomald has not denied to the hien-tenant-Governor of Quebec, within his restricted sphere as a component part of the Quebee Legislatore, precisely the same constitational right as the Queen or the Govemor-Geneml within their respective spheres of action.
Sir John eited a great number of procerients, but not a single one strictly in point, and for this reason, according to the best of our jurgment, we do not believe that there ever was an instance of an English minisier acting towards the Sovereignas tho Quebec ex-ministers acted towards the Jjeutenmb Governor. Their courseot proceeding is, we confess, incomprohensible to us, beenuse Mr. Del3oncherville on all occasions has professed his respect for the position of the SientemantGovemor, Sir John Macdonald takes pains to create the impression that he himsell acted in the same way towards the Govemors mater whom he served. We refered in our last article to a question put by him in the House as to the assent of the Governor to the introduction of a bill, and we find that our supposition as to what took place was catctly correct. Mr. Mackenzie maturally supposed that the question had reference to the necessity for a formal authorization to the Honse, eilher by written message or by a minister stambing in his place, and conveying it, and he replied that such was unaceessary as to that bill; whereupon Sir John was said to have stated that he was of that opinion, but that Mr. Letellier thought otherwise. Ite was told by Mr. Mackenzie in the course of his own speceh: "Every bill the ministry intro-
duced has the assent of the Crown," whereupon Sir Jolm dechared that though he had served under five governors, "I never heard that doctrine proclamed before." At the same time he almitted immediately after, "The Queen, if she chooses, cun send for the minister and say, T do not like that bill, and 1 would like to discuss it with yout, 1 hink yon must modify it, or hold il over." The Sovereign ean thus interfore if he chooses, but, practically, he leaves all legislation to the country." Now on this we would observe that the discussion between the Sovereign and her ministers, to bring athont the modilication or holling over of a bill, would be of litule practical use if the bill had been atready introduced into Parliament with the anthority of the Crown. Sir Jom Macdomalel has referred to Lord Elgin and to his practice, and he was certainly the governor who established the rolations between a governor and a ministry responsible to Pahtament. We cannot understand how it is possible for a governor to cnjoy the influence which Lord Elgin deseribes himsell' as possessing, and yet be treated as Sir John Macdomad maintains he onghit to be treated. As reference las been made to Lord Jigin, the writer maty be pardoned for stating that, for upwards of six years, he served under that great statesman, during the half of which period he was leader of the govermment, and during the whole time the invariable pactice was to treat Mis Lordship with entire confidence, both as to subjects for legislation and administration. Such was the practice of Mr. Lafontane and Mr. Batdwin, to which he himself rigidiy adhered. We have already noticed an assertion of Sir John Macdonald as to Mr. Ghadstone having proposed a dissolution of Parliament without a suggestion from the Queen. In another part of his speech he declares of the Qucen, "she keeps a sharp and watchful eye on the foreign policy," and then proceeds "but, as re"gards the legislation of the mation, she " left that, as it ought to be left, to her "people through their representatives." We recommend Sir John to ponder on the following passage in 'lodla: "From "the secrecy which properly enshumes the "interview between the Crown and its "advisers it rarely happens that the "opinions or conduct of the Sovereign on "governmental matters become known "to the public at large." It is wholly im. possible for Sir Jolun Macdonald to know the extent of the Queen's interference with legislative measures. What we infer, and we admit that it is only an inference, founded partly on 1 Ic celebrated communication to Lord Palmerston, already
quoted in our columms, and paitly on other evidence of a similar lind, and especially of the life of the Prince Consort, is that if Mer ministers introduced into Parliament without her sanetion a bill which she conscientionsly believed to be contmy to law and justice, she would not hesitate to acquaint them that she had ceased to have contidence in them and would seek other alvisers. 'That Lord IElgin would have done the same thing we have no doubt whatever, and we are strongly inclined to believe so wouhl any of the other governors named by Sir John Mactonald. In his long speech Sir John Macdonald has read a great mumber of extracts, all in support of his own views, while he has carefully abstained from noticing those which tell against him. He phaced great reliance on the censure visited on King William $1 V$. for his dismissal of Lord Melbourne, but it must be boone in mind that the dismissal ia question was censured chiefly because it was believed to have been an unfair atvantage taken by the Crown to get rid of a popular ministry. Had the dismissal been based on a specifie act, suoh ts that which led to the recent crisis in Quebec, we feel assured that no question would have been raised as to the constitationality of the proceedings, but that the policy of the measure which had led to the dismissal of the ministry would alone have been discussed. Mad the discussion in, Quebec turned on the policy of the ex. ministers, we certainly should not have interfered in the controversy. We have never seen the railway bill, but we must remind Sir Jolm Macdonald that it was one of the principal, if not the most inportant, measures of the late session in Quebec. Mr. Kerr holds the same opinion that the Lieutenant-Governor does that it was contrary to law and justice, but we do not clearly understand whether he is likewise of opinion that the ministers may treat the Lioutenment-Governor as a cipher, or whether he thinks that the Lieutenant-Governor should permit a bil to be introduced with his sanction which is contray to law and justice. Our information regarding the bill has been chielly derived from the very lucid speech of Mr. Wurtele, which has led us to form a very different opinion of it. The question, however, with us is not whether the bill was a good or a bad one, but whether the Lieu-tenant-Governor conscientiously believed it to be bad, and whether it was introduced without his sanction. On that assumption we do not see how it was possible for him to act otherwise than as he did. We need not pursue the discussion further. The speakers who followed Sir Johm Macdon-
ald in the Ilouse of Commons did not imitate the moteration with which he argued the constitutional guestion, but descended to personalities. In the Somate the leater of the Opposition, the IIon. Mr. Campleell, was even more modemte than Sir John Macdonath. He simply atifmed hy his resolution that the eonise ithopted a was "at variance with the constitutional prin"ciples upon which responsible govern"ment should be condinded.". To us it seems most extraorlinary that the members who have, in the exuberence of their real for the promotion of party interests, mate a vain athempt to interfere most un. constitutionally in the low athairs of the Provinee of Quebee, should be so blind as not to perceive that they have established a precedent for the interference of the linperial Patianent in the attats of the $\mathrm{D}_{\mathrm{o}}$ minion. In both cases the right of interference exists, but the wistomand propriety of such intorference mast be unequivoeally densed. We showh maintain this view of the recent procedlings in Jarliament just as strongly if we were of opinion that there was any ground forcensure on the lieutenant-Governor, holling that the appeal to the people of the province of Quebee is the true solntion of the difien ty, and that the repesentatives of other Provinces have no right whatever to interlere, particularly on the eve of a general election, when their interference is absolutely indecent. believing as wodo that the lieutenant Governor was placed in such a position by the Debouchervillo ministry that he was compelfed to bring about a crisis, and that he ald not exceed his constitutional powers, we have felt it it our duly to delend him on the merits. The athorities that we have relied on, and that we have submited to our readers, are simply orerwhehming and there has not been even an attempt to overthrow them. The time is approwhing when the verdict of the country will be pronounced, but whatever that vertiel may be, we do not entertain the slightest apprehension that any futureministry will treata lientenant, Govemon as it has been clearly established Lieutemul-Govemor Jetellier was treated by the ex-ministors of Quebee, viz, as what Lord Elgin terms, "A néul of mock sovereignty."

Since writing the foregoing remarks we have seen the Gazatle ol yesterday. We shall not condescend to reply to the imputation that the atheles which have appeated in this journal were prompted by friendship for Mr. Stames, nor shall we bo forced to enter into a discussion of measures when the Gazelle and the candidate of his choice have thought proper to rest their case on the unconstitutionality of
the course taken by the Tientenant-Goremor. We have anticipated what the Gazette has urged in support of his views. To all his quotations the lest reply is me of "Todd's "leadisy pinciples: :"
"That in order to enable a constitution"al grovernor to fintil intelligently and "elliciently the charge enturted to himu "by the Crown, he is bound to direet-as "by his commission amt instruetions he "is authorizerl to require-h hat he fullest. "information shall be atfirded to him by "his ministers upon every matter which "at any time shall be submited for his "approval, and that an poticy shatl bo "carried out, or acts of exeentive anthori"ty perfomed, by his ministers in the " nime of the Crown matess the same shall "have previously received his sanation." Sir Johm Macdonald has himselfandeated what, in his opinion, would have been the proper course for the Lientenatut. Govemor. He should have said, " 1 to not atgree in this police of yours, and I do not think the people do. I will insish on your lemsing it to the poople, with maving the monsure "and submithing it to the peophe:" Such a comsc, though" "an oxtreme monsure," "woutd have been an whllemene to the letter of the constitntion." Sir fohn chooses to igmore the fact that the hill was introduced in the name of the Govermment without ever having been submitted to the Lientenant-Governor. 'Those who know the extent of the inter-ference-the bencfitial interference-ol Lord Elgin with the Seigniorial hill of 1sint, camot pretend fiat he ever sandioned the new conscrvative (?) doctene that the representative of the monarehich element: in our Constitution shonla he "a what of mock sovereignty." The whole athair is at most hamiliating proot that, in the interests of party, public men will violate the best established prineiples of the constitution.

HONORABLE JOHN YOUNG.
The death of the Honomble Jolm Young, which took phace on the tath inst., although not mexpeeted; has heen a severe shock to the inlabitants of the dity of Montreal, for whose interests Mr. Young labored with mremithing zeal during a long period of years. Mir. Young who was a native of Scothand, emigrated to Camada in the year $182 l$, and devoted himself to mercantile business in which he soon obtained suceess. He was a man of indomitable persererance, amb of strong will, and the mature of his commercial pursuits having led him to study the course of the westem trade, he became convinced of the importance of
drawing that houle to the St. lawrence by the improvement of our water communications. Although an enlightened promoter of publie woms genemaly, the special object of his life seemed to be to make the eity of Montreal the rlepot for the commeree of the West, to aceomplish which, he was the stremons atvocate of the eleepening of the chmmel of the St. Lawrence between Montrend and Quebec. To this ohject he devoted himself diring a great momber of yems, ant his momory will he cherishod by his fellow citizens whiefly as an onlightened :ubout of publie inurovements catculated to benclit. Whe cily of Montreal.

At the emmencement of his earem, Mr. Vomas's lemings were toviads the party then bnown as consorvative. At What thme there was lathe division in what was known as the British paty, but about the year listh a sphtit took pate, ant soon atter hat fims, Mr. Jomng beemme an active member of the libienal pary to which he has evor since heen abtachech. In the year lsal, he beeame a member of the govemment as minister of public worls, and deroted himself to his duties with his asian real. He was on Hat oenasion chected member for the city of Montreat, which he contimed to represent untit 1855 , when he retired tempomaly from public life. In 1 sad he again hecame a candidate for one of the divisions of the eity, whom he was clected by a considemate majority. On the hissolntion which took phace soon ather, he was not it candidate for re-election. He hat tilled the oftices of President of the Monfreal Board of Truble and of the Dombinion Boam of trable and had boen doming many reats fresident of the harbor Trust, whieh latter position he filled at the period of his cleath. He wis selected by the Govermment to represent Camada at the recent Exposition in Austmatia, a duty which he performed in a most ereditable mamer, and in retuming from which he mformanely received a samstroke, which it is to be feared hastened his denth. of Mr. Vomg it mas he satid with truth, that those who diftered most widely from his opinions were ever realy to acknowledge his sinecrity. Il chad no enemies, and his fellow citions of all parties marked their resped for his memory by their attendance at his funcral. The deepest sympathy is folt for his bereaved widow and family by a poputation for whose benefit he de voted the hator of the best years of his life.

The meding with the shareholders amp polieyholders on the occnsion of the Sixth Ammat General Meeting of the Association altionts your directors very great pleasure, the more so, that they are able to hay betore the meeting a report for the past year which they anticipate will be fonnd highly satishetory.

Juring the year there wis made known to the poliey-hohbers and the conntry the results of the first quinguenuinm by the distribution of the surplus. The solid pirinciples which underlie every part of the business, the handsome results demonstiated by the distribution of the profits, and the liberal tentures which have marked its mode of doing business, have commen ed the Association to the pablic; and your Directors have good reason for the belief lime at no time has the Association been more popilfar than now.

The profits were distributed in $n$ manner to do equal justice to all chasses of policies, so that no one suffered injustice in order that more than justice might be done to one especially favoured class. The results will bear a very fleasing comparison with the protits distributed to all classes in other Compmaies. Beside the amonnt necessary to provide for the bonus additions, the large sum: of $\$ 15,184.40$ Was paid in ensh to the policy-holders.

The severe depression in all branches of trade has tended to limit the volume of new business for the year, but it will be gratifying to observe that without any spasmodic effort the amomet reported and the gain secured show a steady
increase, and indicate that heathful progress whieh your Directors desire should matk the yearly growth of the business.

Grantemen, -Having received instuctions, through your president, to make it thorough investigation of the Records of your company, and to report upon the present posithon of its. Mfairs, I beg to state as follows, viz:-

That I have given the mater a very enrefn and minstaking investigation, and bave ox amined and tested the slock and shareholders accounts; the receipts or income of the combpany; the ensh disbursenents and vouchers; the book-keeping of the books of atconnt; rand the system ouserved in the olliee work generally.

In each and all of them there are irregularities, though fortanately not to stich in extemt as to seriously affeet the position of the comImay in any manner.

The only matier to which I have specially to draw joir nitention is to the fied that your secretary will have to accoltul. to you for several thousands of dotlars, the exact amount not having been yet ascertained, as lie las refused to give me errtain requisite explanations, stating that he will do so to the bontd; but I think it will not exceed ten thousand ilollars, ind, as the compang hold a guarantee bond covering his intromissions, the loss to you cantiot be very great. I have thought it best not to make this report too voluminons, shd have, therefore, in an atrpendix given to each of the paragraphs herbin; fuller details and particulars, and also aceomjanied by statements of accounts where 1 have thought them required, so as to elucidate the points referred to. The otiginal stock subscription books have not hitherto been all called in. This I would recommend you to do ats soon as possible-the want of them has impeded
my of erations-and they are, in my ophaion,
aisolntely required for the fith examination of aisolutely required for the fith examination of the mbital stock account. I'lis subseribing shameholiders who have not paid theit liest instalmentorght to be mate to do so, (see Apfendix, Section 1). I have checked the receipts of larome so fir us it was possible to do so winh or by the agens statements fumished me, amd, with one exception, they agree. (See Apendix No. 2.) The cash dishursments are not eomplelely sustained by rouchers. Aprit from Pehy Rxpenses, the praments have pronerally been mate iny eloques; and, where fley have been made by chardes payable to order, 1 have necepted the entionsed chegrae as a roucher. The Pety Wipenges, the memoramimn af' wheh was on sheets, the secrelary sings was submitted to the board guarterly, but I do not see it minnted. I have detajled and elassifed tho following acconats tor yotur information, viz:-Expense Account, Stock Commission Aceonnt, and Furniture Account. (Siee Appendix No. 3.) The office work and acconntamtship will have to he materially reformed, althongh consiterable jmprovement is mantfost lately in the lather department. (See $A$ ppendix No. 4). Generally, draw your athenfion to some matters of remime, calling for the iuspection of the boam. (See Apyendix No, 5 .) Aso some recommendadions as to fine fiture methos of comblicing the hasiness of the comMing. Sce Ampoulix No. (i.) Aml in con cluston 1 beg to say, hat thare is nothing in all my investigations or its consegtences to eatuse the slightest discommarement to the directors or the sharcholders, or to destroy the condidence of the genemb phblic. Your onstanding risks cond probally tex re-insured for fifty thonsind dollars, but you will observe that the Govermment Depurtment of Dusurance demand an exeessively ligh rate of re-insmance (vi\%, one lumdred thousand Whans); therefore it is barely possible that the Suferiotendent of hishrance miy request you to make a call on your stockholders, bat, Whether he thes so or not, I consider that it woild be prudent on your part to do so, and strougly teronmemd fis leing done, in order dat the confilence of policylohders may be increased, athe also to provide for the future cmamgement of your business, of which there is no tonbt, as well is to meet the views of the Covernment as to its rate of re-insurance, as mentioned ibove.

Its equily consists in its 19nn clanse, which enacis a "shitax" riphinst sugat exported under bointy; withut ihat change, The treaty woult, on the face of it, hold outia preminn to the wrong. coer, and enable him to
profit by his own wrong. This was well devised to secure the end of all free trade, numely, that nature, not artifice, should determine the channels of production. Every economist kuows that a bounty on exportation is "a pernicious "but most successiti form of aggressive pro"tection, muless it is intercepted by a comnter"vailing customs dhit, and thus prevented "from interfering with' the natural course of "trade:" (Giludstone.)
Lord Monteargle, in his fimmous speech in the House of Lords on the Import Duties justifies conntervailing duties thus: "It would obvious"ly be the height of all injustice were a state "to permit the imporit of articles, the subjects "of fortign bounties, to compete with similar "home productions burthened with heavy duty." And furcher on in his speech, he said: "I be"lieve that the sisill, the industry, the capital, "and unconquerable perseverance of the in"dustrious classes of this country will, if the "Seyistatare give them fuir phay, be more than "a match for the competition of all the coun"tries of the carth,"
Lord Clarendou characterized Lord Montengle's speech as "a statement more powerful, " more replete with fats of the most importunt "character, and with deductions the most ". logical and conclusive, it lad rarely been lis "fortune to hear."
Sir Robert Peel. I could quote many appropriate passages trom Sic Robert's speeches and other eminent statesmen. In all If find the words "reciprocity"-" fair play"-" cquality," coupled with measures culculated to make them ealities.
I have distinctly proved a case of manifest injustice and, unless my authorities are impugned, or my reasoning illogical, it is surely the clear duty of the Government anil Legislature to grant me fair play. Iask only common justice, nothing equal to the protection afforded the other manafacturers of the Dominion.

You have done the cause good service by conceding a countervailing duty, and I very earnestly pray you will conkinue your powerfal aid till our efforts are crowned with success.

The fine weatber of this week has given quite a stimulus to the retail dry-goods tride, and $\Omega$ large quantity of goods are being disposed of Remittances are improving. The money market is dull and unclianged. Stocks continue to tend upwards, and are firm, out of sympathy with the Bank of Montrent, which advanced in consequence of a $\mathfrak{g}$ per cent. diridend being declared. Some of our local Wall Street brokers did not believe that the Bank would be able to deehre such a handsome diridend, and, having beught "short," are losers in consequence.
Ashis.- Receipts of Pols, light, sales during the week nt $\$ 3.90$ to $\$ 4.10$ for light to good tares; two or three small bills sold at rather higher, for very heavy tares. No Inferiors receired or sold this week. Pearls.A few bris. Firsts sold for local use. We quote nominal at 55.75 to $\$ 6$ for new. The receipts since 1st January have been 1,755 bils Pots and 60 brls. Pearls.- The deliveries 514 bls. Pots and 310 brla. Pearls, and the stock in store on Wedinesday evening was 3,135 brls Pots and 403 brls Pearls.
Boots and Stoes.-There is a little more animation in trade the present week, the tine
wenther causing na improved demund for light Spring und Summer goods, of which stocks in first liands are light. Prices are without clinnge.

Dibus AND Chbmicalas.-During the mist weck business has been rather quiet in heary lines, but comatiry orders binve been coming in pretty freely. Wre have no change to note in orices, which continue flom.

Diry Goons-u'The city retail tride for the fast few days has been very busy, mud the rood results followinge a harge lessening of those engriged in this line of business are now being feli. The wholesale jeople lave had a grood many buyers here, making theiv Spring purchuses, during the fast few days, and we hear of th good many repeat. orders having been sent down of late from the West, which goes to prove that those who. hind boinght from sample early are begimbing to get already sold out of some desirable lines, Remithances eontinue to improve as the weeks wear ont nud now that navigation has some prospect of being open evenuatly, let us hope that a turn for the better will be slowly reatized.

Fhodr.- I'he demand has been modernte throughout the week, and prices are unchanged. LAEATHER.-Within the last day or two there has been a better feeliner, and : very finir demand for sued slock as Buif, Pebble and light Splits. Slaughter only in moderate demand. Tight Buttito Sole continues in gool demand. We quote, No. 1, 20c; No. 2, ISe. Light waxed Upper will soon be winted, bat at present tanners do not feel inclined to aceept the low price oflered. There has been rather more firmmess in the Wide market the past week. Wo do not think it advisnble to alter quotitions.
Lave SuBch.-The arivals of live siock at Point St. Charles last wek were fifty-one chtloads of cattle, 992 bogg two mixed londs of catule and sheep, and a carload of sheep Io the above there has been added this week seven carlonds of cattle and 311 horri. A good busiutss lats been done, but there are a good many catile venting unsolat. Prices ranged from 3 c ta de ber th., ibe laned priee being paid only for a few very extril cattle. A sale of foucalaes at 88.50 each is reported. Some apprer heasion has been felt among dealers engaged in the export irade with reference to the effect of the Puke of Richmond aud Gordon's Gathe Bill now befise the Imperial Parlimment, one mrocision of which required Camadinn eattle to be slaughtered at the port of entry. Thant apmetnension has been removed by a Cable desputch just received. The Government has ugreed to relax the clause; and cattle from the Dominion will be admitted on the same sonditions 36 Irish beasts. This satisfactory result has beea brought abont by the prompt and effective action of the Canadian Government.

We are pleased to observe that the chavacter of Camadian bred catule is kepping up in the United States. At a recent sale at Lexington, Kentucky, five Jersess, bred by Mr. Romeo Stephens, at St. Lambert, sold for the following prices, $\$ 341$, $\$ 290, \$ 235, \$ 320$ and $\$ 230$. The demand for Cumadian horses keeps up in Eng land. A private letter states that a pair of Canadian earriage horses were recently sold in Liverpool for 350 grineas. A ad who wouldn' be a Canadian hog, provideal they could be necommonated with such a lixumons residene as at Mr. Eddy of Finchville, Ky, has provided for a drove of choice Berkshires which lie recently imported from Cunada. The buidding is made of henvy stone, and throngh it rums a hallway to0 teet tong, traversed by a rippling stream of water. Perfect light, ventiation, and other essentials to porcine confurt have been secured, and the entire establishment cost $\$ 20,000$.

Lumber. - The T'imber 'trailes', Tournul notices a considerable re vival of tictivity in the London market. There is a greater willingness to biy, and stocks ate moving off fiom the docks in an increasing ratio, which is plensant to see. A certain weakness in prices, however; is admitted, as well as a positive droop in sónic kinds of gouds, but neifler has been sufficient to canse any stagmation of business as in regatar bud times. Simson \& Mason's wood circular confirms the above. At Liverpool comparatively few ships are being chartered, and those which have been engaged have been taken at low rates, especiatly for Canadian ports, and very tew contracts have been closed at free-on-honrd prices, unless at low figures. We maty therefore expect that the ensuitg import season will bring a jarger proportion of Uamadian gooils upon the open matleet than has been the cinse for some yoars phist. Mr. Shane, editor of the Lumberm in's Journal? published in London, Enc., was exmmed betore the Immigration and Colonization dommittee at Othama a few days ago with reference to the lumber traie. Lin his evidence he stated that the best Canadian white.pine was in great demand in Ragland for the finest joiner's work, but the importation had fatlen off becatise a sufficient quantity of first-class pine could not be had.' There were sotue 287,010 square miles of lumber:Inads in Canada. He gave interesting information regarding the English lumber rade, the supply in Northern Burope, etc. A Troy dosinten says that the limbering trade of Northerri New York is unusually meagre this seasin: The quantity cut is $56,000,000$ feet less thin the preceding year, and onethind of that conld not be transported to the mills owing to lack of snow. From the Muskoka district the reports are encouraging. The mills at Ot tawa are expected to commence work next Monday. It is sta ed that Henry Fry \& Co., of Quebec, have received a contract from the Inaerial Goremment for the supply: of timber reguired for the entrent year. .The following are the prices in the Montreal retail market:-

The arrivals of new make are still limited, aud the retail trade are enger buyers at roc to 22 c for choice descrip tions.: English advices report really choice in good demand at 100 to 115 s , also an improved enquiry for medium at 45 s to $85 s$, according to quality, and holders of this description are undesellers nud do not refuse any rensorn offers. The New Fork Bulletin says: "More or less irregularity of tone is shown on this market, and it is difficult to filly reconcile the variable reports of dealers. As a rule, luwever the inclination is adverse to the entor tainment ot any very strong feelings, ant in sonie' eases we again mark ofl "xtiente figures a trite. This is especially the case on creameries; which in invoices will to-day scarcely exceed 30c, the quantity proving pretty ful from both the Siate and the West; and as the dairy-packed competes closely on quality, buyers refuise to pay more than the above. On Welsh we henr of invoice salos at. 98 c and for half-firkin tubs 2ae, but both of these rates are evidently extreme to-day for nothing except the small grocers' selections. Western factory continues abont steady, at say yen to 23 c for the average; bat now and then odd parcels of fresh racked do 1e to 2 c better. Old butter is slow and to some extent nominul. Our figures are probably as full as conld be realized, but a strictly fine gilt-ejge dairy would sell higlier. From exporters there does not appear to be much demand, thou gh some are still willing to handle stock at 7c or under." Checse-Very little doing, even for the local trade, and prices are nominally 14 c to 15 c . We understand a number of factories in the Belleville district are about commencing operations, so that the new make will soon be on the market. The cable quolation remains at 63s. Of the New York market the Bullelin says: "Business dues not show much animation, and buyers generally appear to be moving with a show of indifference. Really fine old will-command ahout former rates, and there is not much of it offering, but the remainder of the common grades are pretty much all available on easy terms. Intarest now turns towards the new make, and both buyers and sellers avait arrivals. The sules in the country were at 124 c to 123 c , in one case 12 e for full cream, and 85 c to 10 c for skims and partially skimmed, the latter from night milk skimmed stock. Some skims liave been selling here part at 9$]$ to 10 c , but this is the extreme of the range. ${ }^{n}$
