





Care in Construction, Quality of Materials and Convenience of Layout and Equipment Are Uppermost Features in the Making of These Cabinets, While at the Same Time Beauty of Appearance Receives Its Share of Careful Consideration. The Description Briefly Is as Follows :

The cabinet work is the result of the use of selected materials carefully assembled by skilled workmen. The top has a two-door cupboard which is lined with white enamel and is fitted with two shelves, the door of which has a rack for extract bottles, etc. The left upper door is attached to a hinged flour bin, which has a handy sifter in the bottom of it. The lower compartments consist of an enclosure for holding baking devices, and the right side contains sugar bin and set of nine spice, tea, coffee, etc., glass jars. The whole being enclosed by a wooden curtain which rolls up out of your way when so desired. The bottom section, which has a sliding top covered with either nickeloid or porcelain, is size 41 by 28 inches, and pulls out to a depth of 33 inches. There are 3 pull drawers, one of which serves as a bread or cake box, because it has within a metal box with automatic closing cover. The other side is a one-door cupboard for kettles, pots, pans, etc., the lids of which may be conveniently placed in a rack for the purpose on the back of the door, which encloses them. These, along with many other features, make this a handy cabinet—a great convenience for any kitchen.
