Paris, June 22.—Still later this afternoon the announcement was made that Senator Waldeck-Rousseau had completed the formation of a Cabinet. The Senator, accompanied by the new Cabinet members, proceeded to the Elysee Palace at 6.10 p.m., to present his colleagues to President Loubet.

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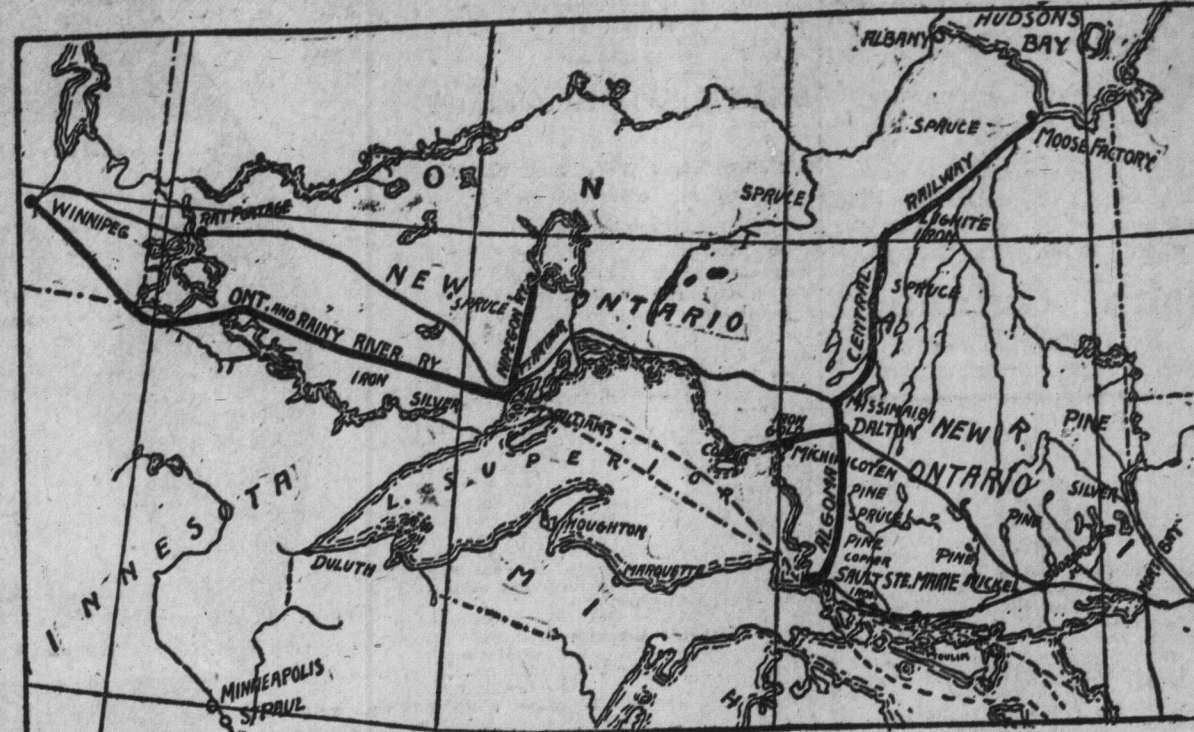

SAULT STE. MARIE ON THE WESTERN GATEWAY THE WESTERN GATEWAY Railroads the Big Factor in Developing the Great Resources of the Algoma District.

If Capital is Used, This District Will Produce an Amount of Wealth That Cannot Be Estimated.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 23.—(From The World's Special Correspondent.)—As one stands at this gateway of the West the impression is borne in upon him that the relationship existing between the Old Ontario and the New may be likened unto that which connects the head and the feet of the human body. If Eastern Ontario in the eyes of the easterners is the nerve centre of the province, Northwestern Ontario is looked upon by westerners as constituting the massive trunk and strenuous limbs of the corporate system.



This map of "New Ontario" shows the distribution of spruce and pine forests and mineral deposits; also the proposed Algoma Central Railway, designed to carry raw material to Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario; also the Ontario and Rainy River Railway and the Nepigon Railway.

The Soo Rapids at the head of the river form an impassable barrier to navigation, and to give an idea of the importance of the redoubtable member for West Algoma and Mr. D. F. Burke, really learned when the City of Collingwood yesterday morning began the excavation of the St. Lawrence in width and picturesqueness, and the broad bosom of its waters is always laden with a perfect fleet of passenger vessels and merchantmen and barges.

The Algoma Central Railway is intended to have two lake terminals, one at Sault Ste. Marie and the other at Michipicoten Harbor.

Woman's World...

Looking over the Indian exhibit at the Indian Exhibition, with Miss Mickie yesterday, I learned from her that the old battle ground of the Hurons and the Iroquois, in the Georgian Bay district, which is a perfect treasure ground of Indian relics, such as weapons, pipes, utensils, etc., is rapidly being depleted by the Americans.

The Indian room of the Historic Exhibition is one of the most interesting sections of the most comprehensive exhibition. Here the visitor may construct a whole history of the aborigines of America, learn their mode of life, both in peace and warfare, and into their customs, their arts, their manufactures, and their religious beliefs and superstitions.

Among the most interesting exhibits in the Indian room are a couple of small tablets, one made by a squaw of the Blackfoot reserve of the N.W.T., and the other by a woman of the Sisseton reserve. The Blackfoot tablet is furnished in the primitive fashion of the Indians, with a piece of wood for the text and the pot suspended from a tripod.

Downstairs there is a huge oval table that was presented to the University of Toronto by Dr. W. S. Clark. This table is made of granite, and is the work of Harvey, the discoverer of the circulation of the blood, and was probably used by him for his famous demonstration in 1815.

long steel blade that could sink into the skull of an enemy down to the very neck. It is a most hideously suggestive and repulsive looking weapon. Some of these horrible instruments of death are gaily decorated with feathers and tails of horse hair, that do not enhance them in the eyes of the beholder; it is as though we were to gaily decorate our guns and swords that were in use in carnage.

In this same case, beside these war clubs and dreadful weapons, is curiously enough the Mohawk prayer book of 1774; it contains the English text and the Mohawk translation. It was prepared by Chief Brant in his early life, and printed in Canada, and is the only one of the kind that has been preserved.

In another case is a curious little double-barred cross—whose meaning is not given—but which is supposed to be one of three that are in existence. Only enough, however, it turns up in the same case with a Nahantia, the guardian of health, a sacred medicine, and another comes from the yearly offerings of tiny round brooches in different designs; and one of these offerings is a miniature of the double-barred cross referred to. It was one of the annual presents to the god. From the same source is a miniature of the same cross, some beautifully polished and carved to resemble a miniature of the same cross, some of black, and some of white, and some of the latter with a pipe made of a walrus tooth, and decorated with black shells, seals and Indians in really beautiful relief.
