WANT HIGHER PAY
Greatest Labor Movement in
American Annals Planned
by Railway Unions.

INCLUDES ALL TRAINMEN.
No Threats Are Made, But a Rousing
Strike May Result From
The Project.
ROAD MANAGERS ARE AGITATED.
More Sums Involved With Respect
to Revenue and Dividends—Demands
to Be Made on All Lines.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—The Record-Herald says: Operating employees of every railway system in the United States and Canada are planning the greatest labor movement in the history of their organizations, and as a result the railway managers of the entire country will soon be facing the most serious problem of the kind presented in many years.

The movement which is well under way is one of concerted action for higher wages for every class of workmen employed in the operation of trains. It includes engineers, conductors, trainmen or brakemen, firemen, car men and switchmen. Back of the movement will be a solid phalanx of between 1,000,000 and 1,500,000 workmen bent upon forcing the railroads to give them what they deem to be a just share of the proceeds of the phenomenal prosperity that has come to the companies. It is understood that the demands will range from the present scales of wages, and that the demands will be made upon certain groups of roads by the middle of September.

To Avoid Threats.
The demands will not be accompanied by threats to strike, but of course the strike spectre will from now on be constantly behind the chair of every general manager in the country. The greatest in the history of railroads, and will paralyze the transportation facilities from one end of the country to the other.

Local railway officials have been aware of the inception and growth of the movement since the attempt at the meeting by the various trade unions. Also no meeting of railway officials has been held in any part of the country to discuss the matter, close watch has been kept of the situation.

Local officials yesterday reported that such movement was on foot, and stated that they considered the situation as exceedingly grave. Beyond the question of a possible general strike there is the question of loss of revenue involved, which is considered even more serious. This is because it is felt that the general opinion is that some concessions will have to be made, it will mean a yearly increased cost of operation amounting in the grand aggregate to many millions of dollars.

Will Affect Dividends.
So large will be the amount that dividends upon many railroads will be seriously threatened, which would in turn lead to a corresponding reduction in values and a possible financial disaster. Should the demand for higher wages be met, and the railroads and the labor organizations likely to engage in the greatest struggle in their history.

The plan of labor organizations, as gathered by railway officials here, is comprehensive and well constructed. In the purpose of the labor men to take the railroads by territorial groups and to compel joint action between committees representing the employees of the entire individual groups of the railroads. It is the first group to be dealt with in cooperation of the Illinois, Northern, and Western, the Chicago, St. Paul, roads. These are: The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy; the Chicago and Northwestern; the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific; the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul; the Chicago, Rock Island and Western; the Illinois Central lines west of the Mississippi; and the Erie.

In order to understand the logical reason for this plan it is necessary to recall the fact that it was during the time a labor movement began among railroad employees with a view to equalizing wage scales throughout the country. Wages paid on eastern roads were about 12 per cent. lower than those paid on the roads in the middle west. On the latter roads wages were lower than those paid in the far Northwest, what are known as the mountain group, and also in the southwest group. Also varied considerably, due largely to the fact that the western roadroads were not so well established and more efficiently operated. Conditions have changed in this respect, and now wages have been brought up to standard, but in the meantime hard times came on, with the result that wages were reduced in operating expenses. This led a majority of the railroads in the country to lower wages from 10 to 12 per cent., with the tacit understanding that better times would bring a restoration of former scales.

CUSTOMS HOUSE IS SHAKY
South Wall Loosened By Settling
Foundations and Sections of
Brick Are Missing.

STRUCTURE STANDS ON ROTTEN PILES
Public Works Department Knows of the Danger, But Delay Is Contemplated.

Right on top of the revelations concerning the disgraceful and unsatisfactory condition of the Toronto post-office, comes information that another of the Dominion government's buildings is badly in need of an overhauling. The imposing structure at Yonge and Front-streets, known as the Customs House, has been for some considerable time in such a state of unrepaired that it is time the Public Works Department gave the architect necessary authority to spend some money on it.

In rear of the structure there is ample evidence that time has worked havoc with the foundations. The settling of the substructure has loosened many of the bricks around two of the windows, and they have fallen away in such a manner as to deflect the outlines and give point to the belief that if something is not done the whole structure may some day tumble down over the heads of the government clerks inside.

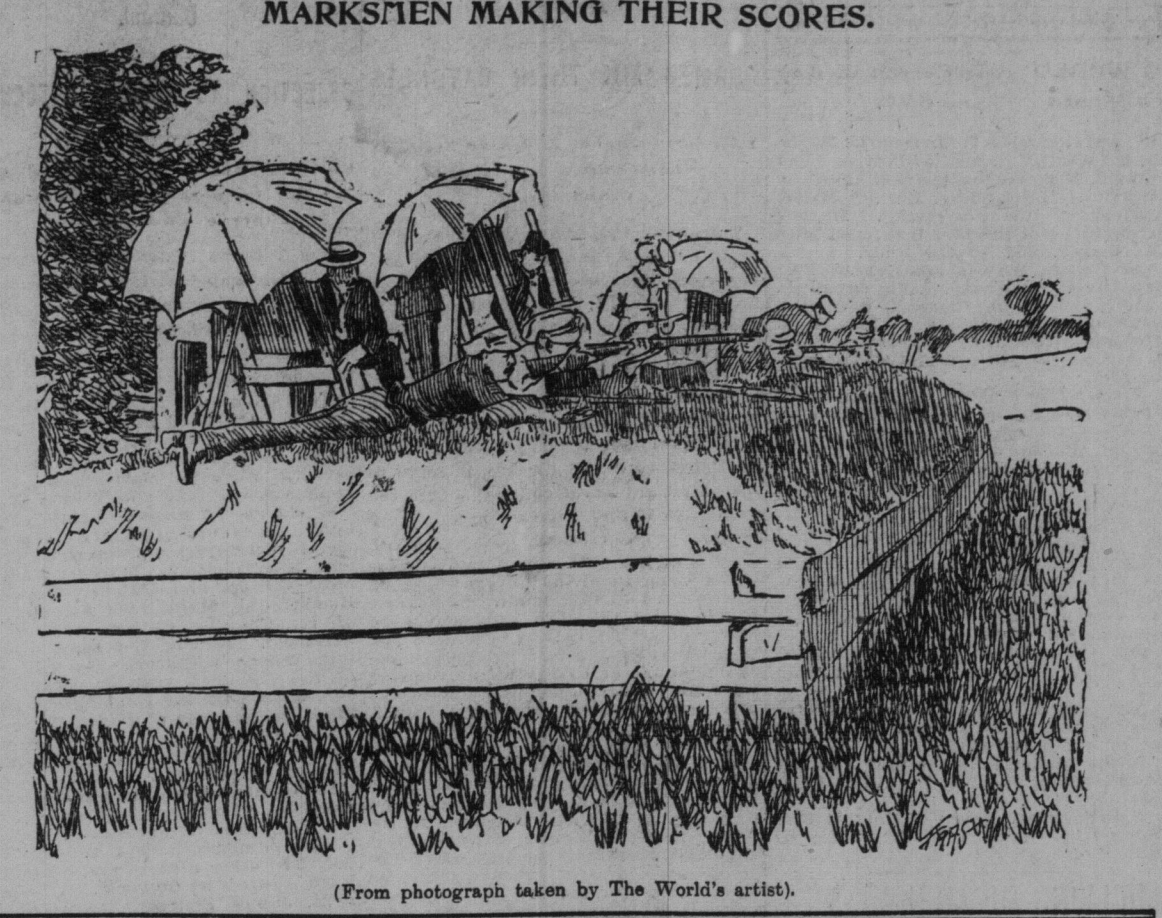
The Customs House was erected in 1878. The site was originally a bog, but was reclaimed by the city, and at this point piles were driven down to support the building. About a year ago the Public Works Department sent a man from Ottawa to investigate the report that the building was unsafe. At that time excavations were made, and it was found that the piles on which the building rested were rotten. The stone foundations had settled, causing the rear wall to loosen. There were several gaping cracks in the wall, and around two of the windows the arches were gone, and piles of brick were missing. Some of the walls objected to being compelled to stay in a place apparently unsafe, but the Public Works Department was not to be deterred. The building requires a new wall and a stable foundation.

Toronto government buildings seem to be ill-starred. Last year the east wall of the Armoury bulged and probably has fallen, but for prompt action. A liberal expenditure of money on some of the old structures of the city would be wise.

TRADE UNIONISTS SHY.
Iron Founders' Secretary Comments Pointedly on U.S. Labor.

London, Aug. 28.—Alfred Moseley is encountering some trouble in the matter of acceptance of his invitations to visit America. Mr. Bachelors, secretary of the Operative Bricklayers' Society, said he would not accept Mr. Moseley's invitation, because British bricklayers have nothing to learn in America.

Mr. Maddison, secretary of the Ironfounders' Society, is also reluctant to accept Mr. Moseley's invitation. He said that the American iron foundry men turn out more product than the British workers, but this is at the cost of shorter lives, the average life of the British iron founder being 45 years, as against 44 for the American iron founder.

FLYER HAD A CLOSE CALL
Wreck of the G.T.R. International Limited Near Brockville Narrowly Averted.

The west-bound International Limited of the G. T. R. had a narrow escape Thursday morning from a serious wreck. As it was, ten cars of a fast freight were piled up in front of the dying express, but not a person was hurt. This is the fastest train in the service, and one of the handsomest in the country. Every one of the well appointed coaches contained a large number of passengers, and the difference of a few minutes in the breaking of a beam in the equipment of the freight world, might have meant a ghastly disaster and the heavy loss of life.

SHOT IN HEAD CURSES INSANITY
Wisconsin Man, in Fight With Police, Strangely Restored.

Marquette, Wis., Aug. 28.—The shock of a bullet fired by a pursuing officer restored a raving maniac to perfect rationality to-day. Joseph Forvillan, 30 years old, had held a posse of officers and citizens at bay all night and this morning. He had become suddenly insane, raced into his father's barn and defied the officers. Three times the man had been shot in the chest. The madman fired the building, but the officers succeeded in manning Forvillan and subduing the flames. Later the prisoner broke away from his captors and ran. Officer Zimmerman shot him. The bullet did not strike a vital spot, but its effect was to banish every trace of insanity. Forvillan now talks in a perfectly rational manner, but remembers only vaguely what happened during his episode.

CONQUEST OF WAKE ISLAND.
Tokio Excited Over Report of Possible Ousting of Squatters.

Just on the top of that favorable impression, however, there arrives telegraphic word that the United States is to send a war ship to oust the Japanese from Wake Island, southeast of Marcus Island.

With Government Tax on Imports and an Export Bounty.

Madrid, Aug. 28.—Cabling from London, the correspondent of the Standard says financial papers of that city announce that preparations are advanced for the creation of a Spanish sugar trust. This idea, however, is strongly censured by the press, and it will be crisscrossed in the Cortes, because the avowed intention of the proposed combination is to maintain prices by checking overproduction, insisting upon a government tax on the foreign article, and a bounty to native exporters.

STEEL TRUST MAY BE INTERNATIONAL
America, Britain, Belgium and Germany Divide Canada's Rail Supply.

SCHEME QUITE FEASIBLE.
United States Steel Company Says German Producer, May Be Basis for Morgan and Schwab.

FREIGHT AGREEMENT FIRST.
Fear That Cheaper Rates From United States to Europe May Make Differential Tariff.

Berlin, Aug. 28.—The combination of American and English steel and iron exporting interests continues to supply food for discussion. The announcement is made by way of prelude that the English, American, Belgian and German steel mills have arrived at an agreement to export steel rails to Canada, of which the United States and English works supply 115,000 tons and the German and Belgian works 98,000 tons.

CONDITIONS RIPE FOR IT.
Washington, Aug. 28.—Conditions are ripe in Germany for just such a world-wide combination of the iron and steel industries as it has been reported Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan has in contemplation. A special report from Mr. Frank H. Mason, United States Consul-General at Berlin, made public by the State Department to-day, seems to indicate that unless some such arrangement is made whereby the German iron and steel manufacturers can be assured of their home market and a share in the markets outside of their country there is danger of a crisis in the industry in Germany. According to this report plants have been multipled in Germany since the outbreak of the war, and the supply of manufactured materials far outrunning the demand.

TO FIGHT SHIP TRUST.
British Government Completes Plan Against Morgan.

London, Aug. 28.—The Daily Mail this morning says it believes the government's plan for meeting the iron and steel shipping combination is now completed, and that the government departments are discussing and working on the details.
