

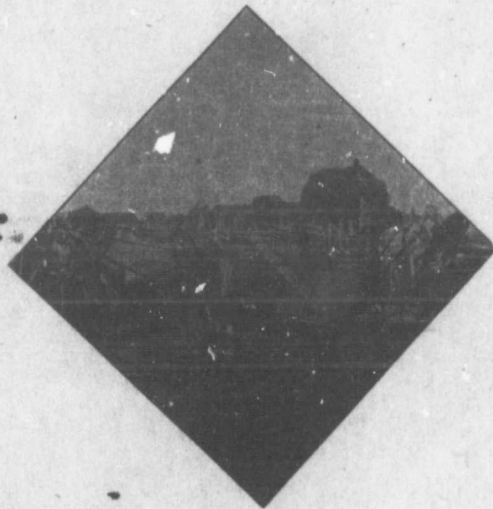

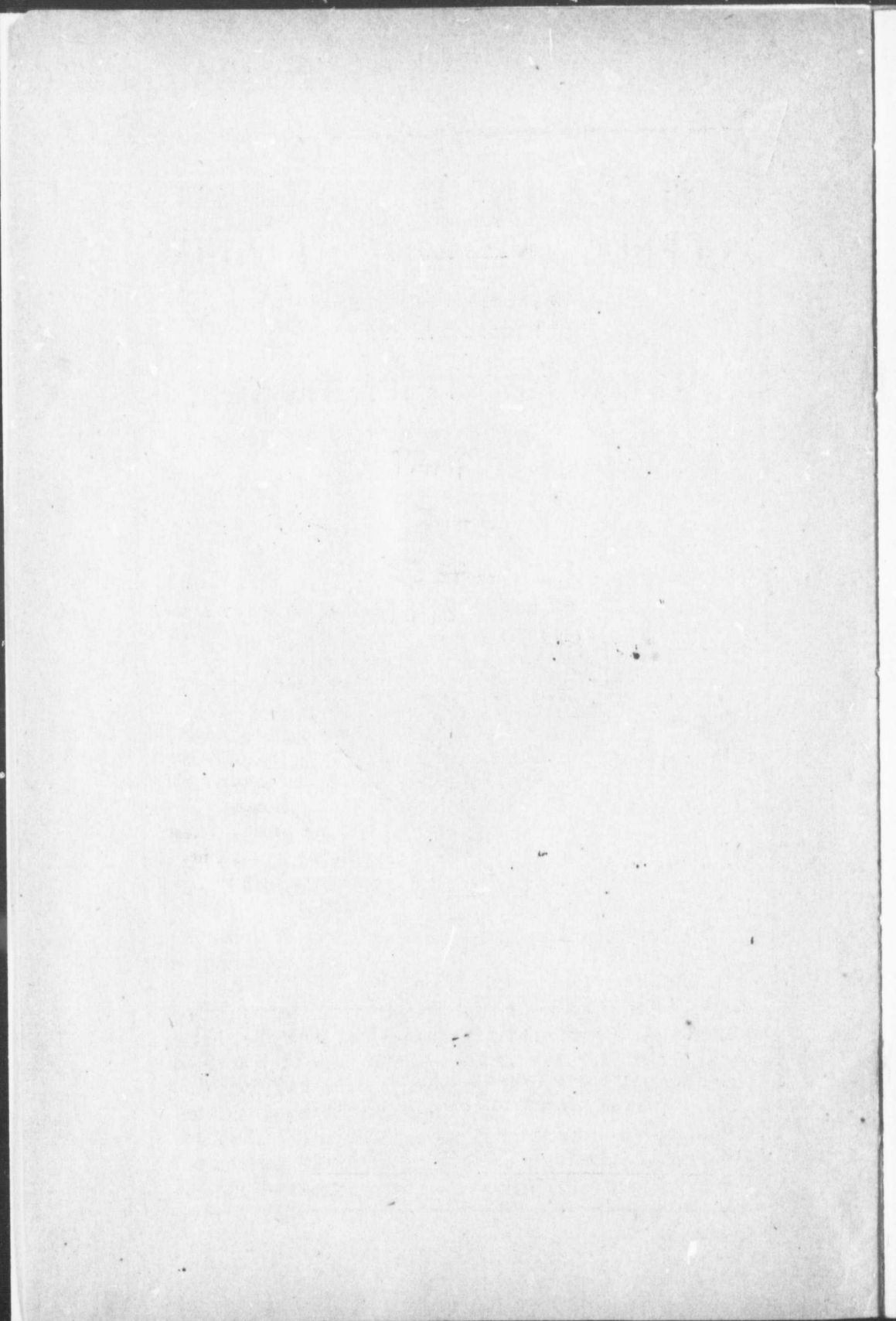

Dear Sir,

I beg to enclose herewith my report of work done on behalf of Colonization during the year ending December 31st, 1898, insofar as it affects your railway.

As in former years, I have lectured in different parts of the United States and Canada, illustrating the lectures with lime-light views of the Lake St. John region. I have delivered 27 of these lectures which were attended by about 20,000 people, giving an average of a little over 740 per lecture. Of course, admission to these lectures was free in all cases.

These lectures seem to be very popular, and great interest is taken in the Lake St. John Region in all the places I have visited, it apparently being much more in favor with intending settlers than any other part of the country.

I organized six farmers' excursions to Lake St. John, and 385 intending settlers took advantage of these opportunities of visiting the country.

All intending settlers and farmers taking part in these excursions have to be holders of certificates from the clergymen of their different parishes to prove that they are *bona fide*, and they are carried to Lake St. John and back (380 miles), at very nominal rates in order to give the agricultural classes an opportunity of examining the country. The above number of passengers does not include passengers carried on Free Delegates' passes, many of whom travelled on these

excursion trains, I conducted these excursions personally, and I am convinced that they have been of great benefit to the lake St. John country.

Between January 1st, and December 31st, 1898, 201 delegates went to visit the Lake St. John region on *Free delegates' passes*, representing:

90 parishes and cities in Canada and the United States,
36 counties in Canada,
4 states in the United States,
2 provinces in Canada,
182 delegates from the Province of Quebec,
16 delegates from the United States,
3 delegates from the Province of Ontario,

Total: 201 delegates.

These delegates were sent by the clergy of their parishes to examine and report upon the district, two delegates being allowed from each parish for this purpose.

From January 1st, to December 31st, 1898, we also had:

710 new settlers from Canada
612 " " " United States

Making a total number of 1322 new settlers for the year 1898, and an increase of 104 over last year.

The above figures are indeed very conclusive as to the popularity and attractiveness of the country into which we are directing the new settlers.

At our request, the Provincial Government published, a few months ago, an illustrated guide book in french (*Guide des Colons*), giving a great deal of valuable information as to the Lake St. John district. This handsome pamphlet is being very widely circulated by my department, and is attracting much attention to the country.

I have now on hand many letters of different parties of six, seven, ten and more families asking me to meet them and give them the necessary information. Unfortunately, my department has not enough funds to meet even the most necessary expenses, and we are likely to lose a great deal of this valuable business for want of funds. The annual subsidy of \$8,000 from the Ottawa Government towards our work has been very useful, but it is entirely insufficient.

Comfortable steamers now run regularly during the season of navigation from Roberval to the different points on Lake St. John, most suitable for settlement, and also up the navigable rivers flowing into the Lake. In this way, the new settlements at Normandin, Albanel, the Trappist Monastery, Péribonca, Honfleur and Rivière la Pipe are made very accessible.

The new settlers are now coming in such large parties that we have not the necessary accommodation to shelter them on their arrival, and so have to refuse many parties on this account. This being a very important question and one which is hindering us very much in our work, and on which the future success of our efforts depends very much, it is to be hoped that the Governments will be able to see their way to come to our assistance and increase our annual grant, so as to enable us to continue the work on a larger scale and to provide shelter in the way of an immigrant shed at the steamboat landing at Peribonca which is the most central part of the whole district and the point of departure for the interior.

Amongst the new settlers during last year were 66 persons from the Acadian population of Cape Breton, who are so satisfied with their new country, that a large number of their friends are now arranging to follow them to Lake St. John, instead of emigrating to the United States as they would otherwise do.

Work has been so plentiful last year in the Lake St. John district that it has been impossible to get enough men for the lumber camps.

May I draw your attention to the great increase in the number of new settlers from the United States, which proves, I should say, that the repatriation movement has increased to such an extent, that both, the Federal and Local Governments should see their way to help us in a more effective manner, considering the immense benefit they derive from our efforts.

Two years ago we unfortunately had to send back a certain number of settlers from Detroit, Mich., who proved unsuitable. I am glad to state that we did not have the same trouble last year, having been more prudent in the choice of our settlers, and I am also glad to state that we had

to deal with a better class of settlers, and the best proof of this, is the fact that 118 new settlers have been registered from Detroit last year, as shown in the report.

I may add that our colonization work has expanded in such proportion during the past year that a whole tract of land had to be reserved along the Peribonca River for the establishment of a new settlement by a certain number of repatriated Canadians, (farmers) from Northern Maine. The new settlement is called Honfleur and the site has been chosen after inspection by a delegation sent for that purpose during the month of August last. This movement is directed by the Parish Priest of North Lyndon, Louis Dionne, Mayor of Acadia and Doctor Lafèche, of Caribou Maine. Mr. Dionne left last week for Honfleur with members of two other families to prepare camps etc., for the reception of the new settlers, who will be directed there by Rev. C. F. Marsan and Dr. Lafèche.

The most favorite spots where settlers are going in are :

Peribonca,

The St. Jean Baptiste colonization society of St. Sauveur have a very flourishing settlement at the last named point.

I annex a list of the delegates of the different parishes sent to Lake St. John during the year, and statements showing the different places in the United States and Canada from which we obtained the 1322 new settlers sent in by the railway free of charge.

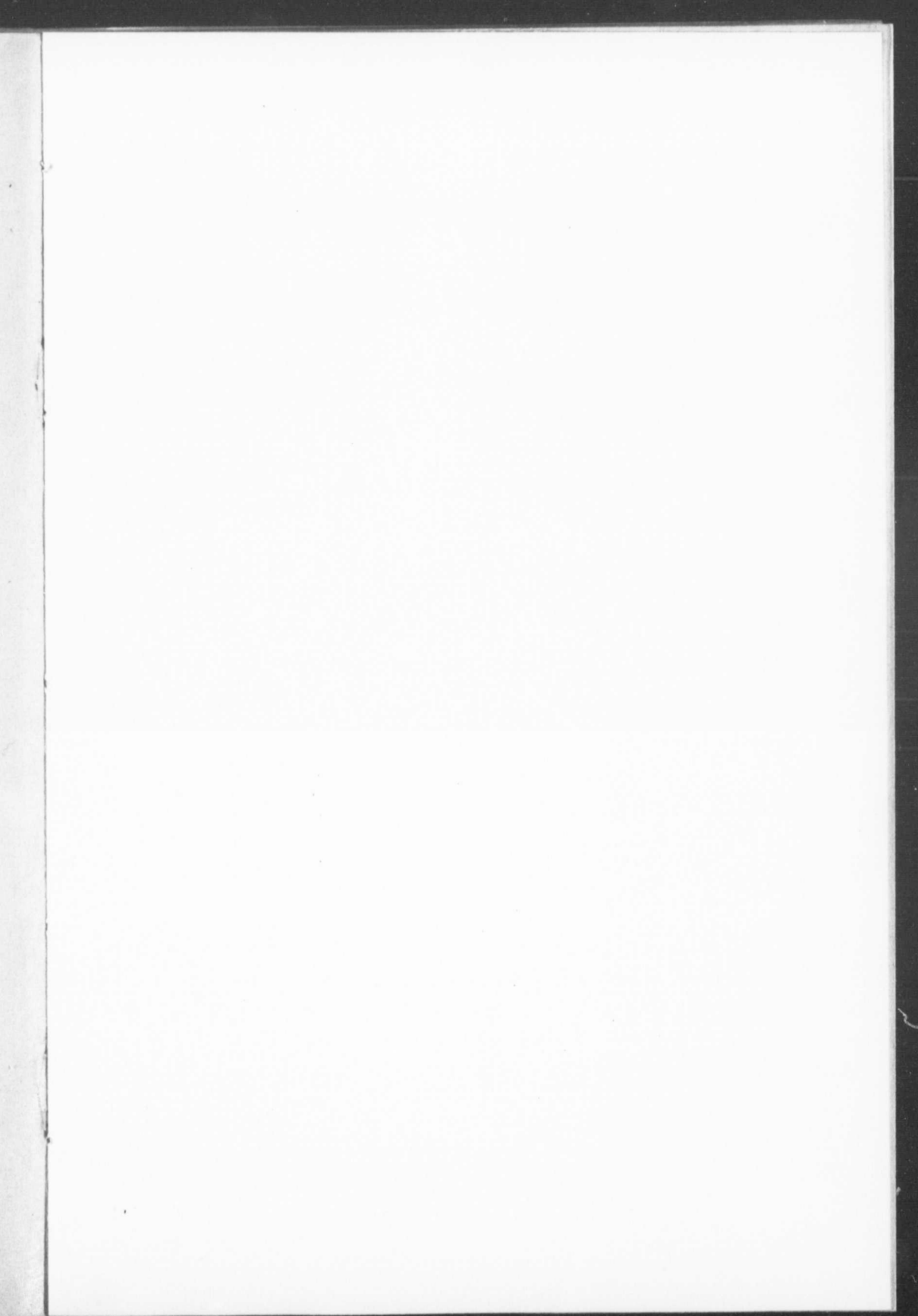

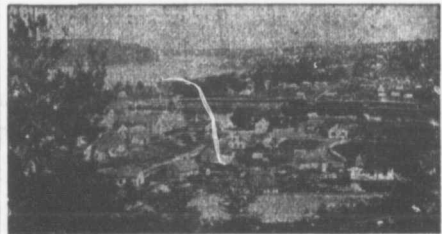

THE CLIMATE OF LAKE ST. JOHN.

To show the excellent climate enjoyed by the Valley of Lake St. John, especially at harvest time, we give below a table of the observations of temperature made between 15th September and 8th October, 1890, by the officers of the Meteorological Service at Montreal, Quebec and Roberval.

It will be seen that the mean temperature was two degrees higher at Roberval than at Quebec and even Montreal.

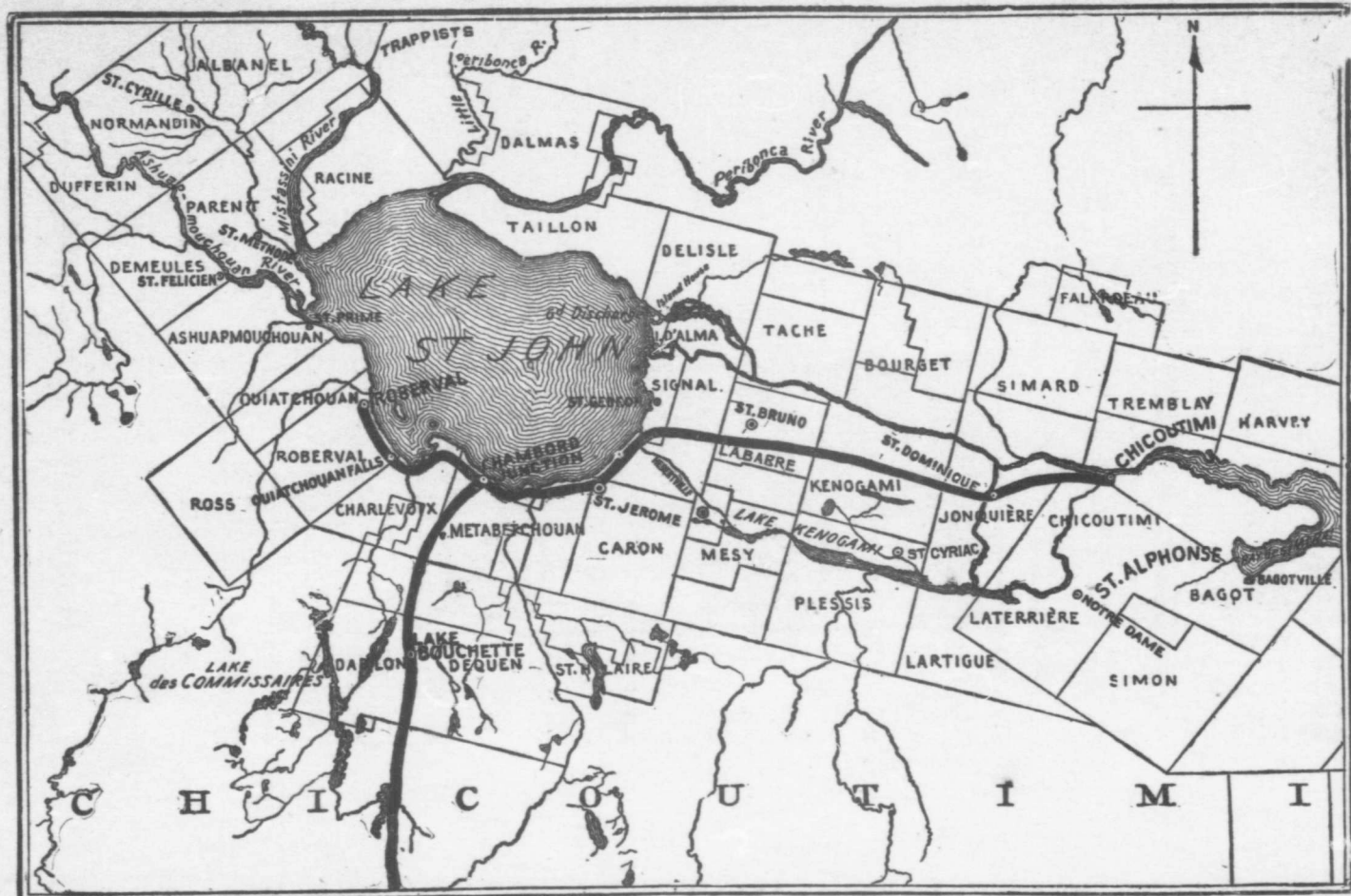
