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TWO PASSENGERS HURT IN A CAR COLLISION

Bad Accident Near the Docks—Hamilton Athlete Winner of Police Games' Gold Medal.

HAMILTON, Aug. 4.—(Special)—A serious accident, in which two passengers were injured and many others given a severe shaking up, occurred on the street railway this evening, at James and Gore-streets, when a car from the shops, running right, crashed into another car standing in front of the station, jammed with passengers from the boat. The injured were Mrs. Williams, 16 Soppia-street, and Cecil Flanders, a traveler. The empty car was running at a lively clip, and the crash could be heard for blocks. The passengers were terrified, but escaped with few injuries, although both cars were badly mangled. The man in charge of the car that did the damage is a foreigner, and the nearest the police could get to his name was Kyritz. He claims he could not get the brakes to work. He resides at the old Kinrade home, Herkimer-street.

A GERMAN VIEW OF ENGLAND.

To see ourselves as others see us is usually taken to mean a disclosure not calculated to increase the bump of self-esteem. This makes the picture all the more flattering when a foreign hand finds our merits to exceed our demerits and undertakes to correct our mistaken ideas of his follow-countrymen concerning us.

According to Herr Bleibtreu, and he ought to know whereof he speaks, the popular German view of England is much distorted. The Englishman appears as the incarnation of selfish arrogance and vainglory. Inordinately proud of a history in which his success has been largely fortuitous, a 'shop-keeper' with his eye fixed on the main chance and only now and then throwing up by some unaccountable accident a fiery genius like Shakespeare or Byron, who stands out brilliantly against a background of petty, materialistic minds, devoid of all sense of the ideal.

If Germany allowed itself to be depressed by such circumstances while England, under the most difficult conditions, struggled indefatigably upwards - an extraordinary achievement for a nation originally owing but one-eighth the population of Germany - what can this denote but a great intellectual, moral and physical superiority?

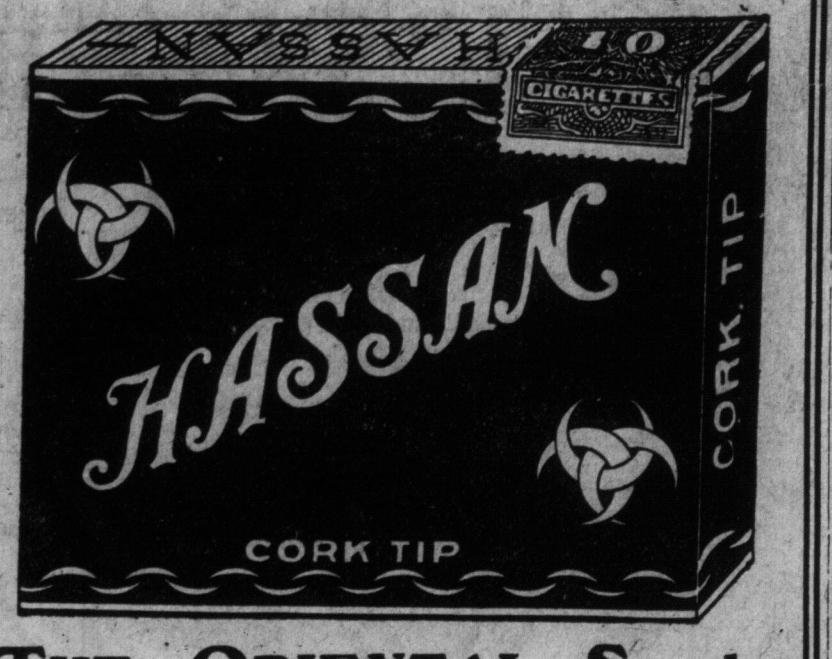
Herr Bleibtreu holds that not only on sea, but, relatively to her needs, on land as well, England is stronger and better equipped than ever before. He corrects, too, the current German notion regarding the comparative spiritual and intellectual development of the two countries and insists that there is implanted in Englishmen "a notable artistic impulse, which a certain loftiness of spirit ever tends to turn inward to the things of the soul - in a word, to poetry."

ELECTRIC COMPETITION IN BRITAIN.

Those people who concerned themselves so much over what they termed the unfairness of civic competition in the supply of electric light and power, and declared it to be opposed to British practice, may have their attention called to The Electric Lighting Acts (Amendment) Bill, now before the House of Commons Standing Committee.

He is compelled to do so on reasonable terms. Of particular interest too is Clause 13 of the Bill, which reads as follows: "If an auditor appointed by the Board of Trade to audit the accounts of any undertakers who are not a local authority reports to the Board that the undertakers have declined or neglected to comply with any of his recommendations or requirements in so far as they relate to matters affecting the interests of the authorities empowered to purchase the undertaking, or of the consumers, the Board may, if they think fit, after giving the undertakers an opportunity of being heard, make an order directing the undertakers to comply with such recommendations and requirements with or without modification, as may be specified in the order, subject to an appeal to the Railway and Canal Commission, or any two of them, who shall finally decide the matter, and confirm, annul or amend the order as they think fit."

THROUGH KEEWATIN ROCK ASTOUNDS ENGINEERS

Astonishment Expressed at the Valuable Find Made in This Once Despised Formation.

COBALT, Aug. 3.-Casual visitors to this camp are surprised and even astonished at the surface indications. This astonishment is the result of casual observation by an eye unpractised as to mineralized formation. They see the silver and that is all-sufficient. The next observation is the stock market quotations.

The experienced engineer has also been astonished and they that came to scoff at Keewatin remained to gaze, as it were. Keewatin, like most other formations, has been taboed in its day. It has been limited and calculated to preserve somewhat staid traditions and perhaps the reputation of somebody who thought he knew all there was to know about matters concerning mining.

What is Keewatin? To the lay mind, Keewatin means practically nothing but a term that is used to describe a rock and lately with silver bearing formations. Keewatin is, to quote Prof. Miller, the oldest of a series, what is known as the Keewatin complex, consisting largely of green stones or traps of different ages, together with quartz-porphyrity and other igneous rocks.

On a six weeks' jaunt thru Canada from Montreal to the Pacific, the big men of the Grand Trunk Railway and its gigantic offspring, the G.T.P., passed thru Toronto yesterday afternoon. The members of the party are: Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, president of the system, who, fresh from London, is paying his first visit to Canada since 1906. His entourage consists of eight private cars and accompanying him are about a dozen leading officials of the road, including General Manager C. M. Hays, as well as Lady Rivers Wilson and several of her friends.

Spells a Fortune. It is a long, long call from time which cannot be estimated until a month ago, when the Keewatin was first discovered. This period of erosion was of long duration, and represents a great interval of time, and it cannot be even approximately estimated.

Over at the Provincial mine, a few hundred yards from the Waldman shaft, a diamond drill brought to the surface silver-bearing pieces of Keewatin. Engineers here in the camp proclaimed it to be the most sumptuous find since the discovery of the Keewatin in a few days' work of trenching.

What It Means. This victory of the Keewatin means a grand bonanza. Only the other day, the Nipissing mine found a 4 inch vein in Keewatin, and latest advices say the metal is getting stronger as the find is investigated.

Up to date for 1909 Cobalt companies have paid over \$2,085,167, out of a few workings, and the ground has only been scratched. With promises such as the Keewatin bestows on the investor, and the fortunate other big legitimate companies, this amount should be appreciably increased in 1910.

The rebuilding of the burnt area of Cobalt, he said, was being delayed by the fact that the Nipissing Mining Co. wanted \$1.25 per foot yearly rental for their ten-year leases.

Solid For Library Stack. Quickens will not impede the erection of the stack for the new university library. The 250 tons of pig iron which were loaded on the footings a couple of weeks ago have been removed, and it was found that the wall was not the slightest. Work will now be pushed.

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AMATEUR FIRE FIGHTERS IN KEEN COMPETITION

Results of Annual Tournaments of the Western and Northern Associations Held Yesterday.

PARIS, Ont., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—The Firemen's Association of Ontario is the new title of the Western Ontario Volunteer Firemen's organization, whose annual convention concluded to-day.

The proposed change will embrace all firemen in Ontario who wish to join, whether paid or volunteer.

The association will seek a provincial annual grant of \$500, also the reduction of time from seven to five years as the period of service which entitles firemen to exemption from serving as constables, jurymen, etc.

The firemen's demonstration was a great success. A large number of companies and bands were present, while thousands of visiting firemen and friends from all the principal towns of Northern Ontario.

Fire brigades were present from Brockbridge, North Bay, Midland, Brantford, Huronburg, Burk's Falls, Orillia, Huntsville and Perry Sound, and bands from North Bay, Brockbridge, Midland, Penetang and Perry Sound.

In the marching contest, Burk's Falls won first prize for best appearance and marching. Firebrigade and general appearance in the band contest.

In the hose wagon contest, which was a severe test of the experience of the fire fighters, Huntsville won in 63 seconds, Penetang second in 65-2 seconds, and Brockbridge third in 72 seconds.

The winning team was composed of L. H. Ware, chief; D. Richards, H. Hebler, G. Settery, W. Jago, A. Tildersford, J. Thirion, D. Draper, W. Miller and O. McCarter.

The competition called for a start 200 feet from hydrant, with 200 feet of hose on the wagon, run past the hydrant, lay 200 feet of hose, attach branch, turn on water and knock down a dummy who possesses a tin can distant from hydrant, the branchmen to be not less than 100 feet from hydrant; then turn off water, uncouple hose two lengths from hydrant and insert a "y" uncouple the two forward lengths of hose and attach to "y" and attach extra branch, turn on water and knock down.

In the band contest, North Bay won with a percentage of 79, Orillia second with 69, and Brockbridge third with 55. Penetang won the contest for bands with under twenty performers. Others entered were road and firemen's and landwehr.

Capt. Alex. Gunn, serial 1, and W. Simpson, assistant superintendent of fire alarms, Toronto fire department, and George T. Gault, Peicha and Rubber Company, Toronto, made admirable judges, and under their management everything went off in a first-class manner without a hitch or dispute.

Bandmaster Divor of the 23rd Regiment and Mr. Parke, Perry Sound, were the judges in the band contest, and gave general satisfaction.

AVIATORS WILL BE CAUTIOUS Don't Expect to Fly Across the Ottawa River For Awhile.

PETAWAWA CAMP, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—So rapid has been the progress of assembling Baddeck No. 1 that an unforeseen event happens the new aerodrome will be completely set up by Friday.

The framework is ready for the motor, one wing and bow control have been attached, and the other wing is nearly ready.

A feature of the new machine is the entire absence of parts which cause any air resistance. The conical shaped gasoline tank is not seen, and the space formed by the construction of the double surfaces is utilized for the purpose.

The radiator, common with all automobile motors, is inserted at the side. Wood has been displaced by steel and aluminum for the body.

Stories that flights over the Ottawa River may be attempted are fictitious. All tests will be developed when the performance of the aerodrome is seen. The aviators will proceed with caution.

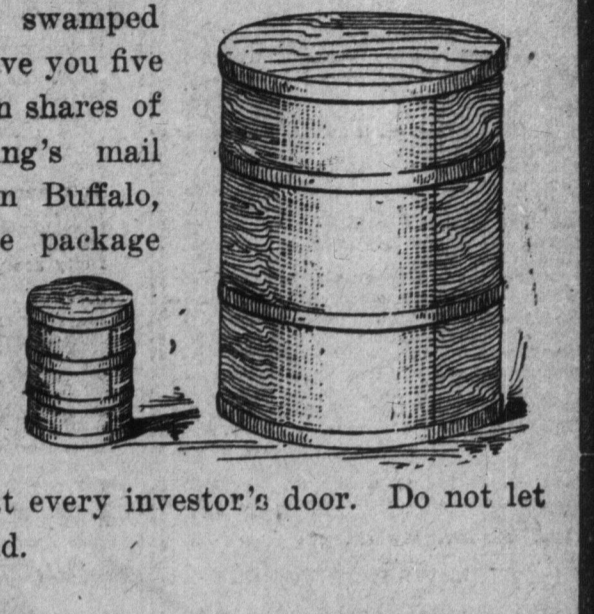

ALL TELL SAME STORY OF NORTHWEST CROPS

Bank of Commerce Reports Indicate a Greater Than Average Yield.

With few exceptions late reports received by the Canadian Bank of Commerce from its western branches bear out previous indications of a greater than average harvest.

The farmers are getting ready for the cutting of spring wheat, which it is reported will be general in less than three weeks.

Harvesters' excursions from the east to the prairie provinces will be arranged by the C. P. R. within the next week.

Following are quotations from the bank's reports: Durban—Grain crops are all looking very well and making wonderful progress. Hay is desperately poor, and I regret to note, many farmers are forced to curb swamp grass.

Gleichen, Alta.—No damage from frost or hail in this district and an exceedingly large yield may be expected.

Above the Average. Portage la Prairie—Prospects could not be brighter. While not exceedingly heavy, the crops are, generally speaking, above the average.

Red Deer, Alta.—The crops will be a little light on account of the slow growth early in the season. Several hailstorms have passed thru, with, however, very little damage to anything.

Rivers, Man.—The writer had a 50-mile drive, traveling in a southwesterly direction, and saw splendid crops all the way. A great many farmers estimate 30 bushels to the acre and are feeling jubilant.

Trueline—The crops are for the most part good and the yield should be satisfactory. Harvest will be general by August 10 and 15.

No Pest. Brandon—Farmers assure us that their fields never looked better and that the grain shows a healthy root, stalk and beard; no evidence of rust or bugs having yet made an appearance.

Elbow—The crops are looking splendid and present indications are for a yield per acre as follows: Wheat 30 bushels, oats 50-60 bushels, flax 15-15 bushels.
