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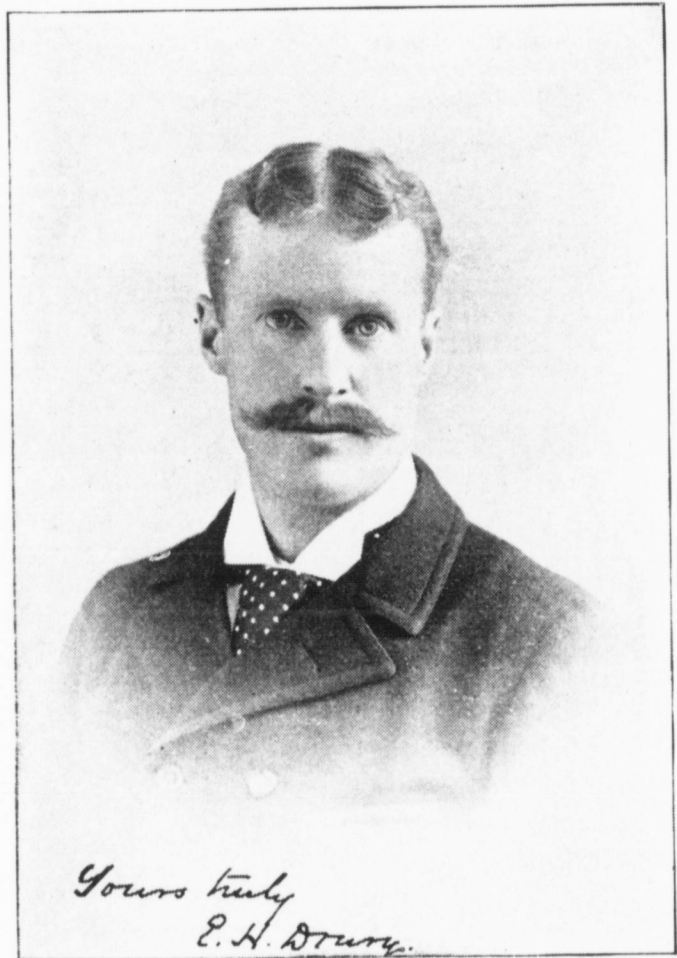

To the President, Officers and Members,

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE CLUB OF CANADA.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Report for the year 1893, and in so doing have subdivided the same into different parts, as in the previous year, in anticipation that this system will meet with your approval.

NO 1. GENERAL REVIEW.

The year we have now to take into consideration can be fairly viewed as a successful one in many ways. The membership shows another decided increase ; the work accomplished is far more important than was anticipated, and on this occasion there will be presented reports from the Committees entrusted with the Memorial to our late comrades, Mackay, Robinson and Stairs as well as the Report of the Distinctive Badge Committee both of which will no doubt commend themselves to you.

The object of the establishment of our Club has proved during the year, a benefit to its members, who have been enabled to take advantage of the concession granted by the Province of Ontario as regards the legal profession ; employment through the instrumentality of the Club has been obtained for one of our members on the Staff of the Hydrographic Survey ; a concession obtained from the Government of the Province of Quebec respecting Land Surveyors ; the Medical Profession has shown its recognition of the educational system in force at the college by a concession in favour of its Graduates and the Ontario Association of Architects at the time of writing, have under consideration an application from the Club with a view of granting a favourable concession to Graduates.

With a determination on the part of the individual members to do their utmost during the present year, there is no reason why we could not add considerably to the good work already accomplished, and obtain from the other Provinces of the Dominion similar concessions as have been obtained from the two leading Provinces, Ontario and Quebec

Members resident in these provinces could advantageously take the matter in hand, and can depend upon receiving every assistance from the Executive officers of the Club

The Constitution and By-Laws have been carefully revised, in accordance with the resolution passed to that effect at the last Annual Meeting, and will this day be submitted for your approval The changes recommended include one touching upon the system of members joining the Club, and if adopted, will offer an opportunity to individual members to use their influence in getting such as have not joined our ranks to do so, and thereby render material assistance on behalf of the Club. Let us look forward to this being acted upon in a manner to show a considerable gain in membership by the close of the year

We have a grand future before us and with an energetic and willing body of members we should without doubt accomplish a great deal We should all be willing to do something with such an objective, as the objects of our organization are the mutual welfare of each and every one connected with it. To entirely depend upon the work of the officers and those who have heretofore and are still keenly disposed to further its welfare is not

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what is expected and when we consider the advancement made with what may be taken as but a small percentage of the whole, we can reasonably look for better results generally with the co-operation of the majority of the members

No. 2 — BUSINESS INCIDENTAL TO ANNUAL MEETING

1893

In accordance with the resolutions of condolence passed at the Annual Meeting, held on the 24th of February 1893, a certified copy of the same was sent to the relatives of the late Captains W. H. Robinson and W. G. Stairs, which were mailed on the 13th of March. No acknowledgement has ever been received although we have every reason to believe that the letters duly reached their destination

Notification of the election of Major-General E. O. Hewett, C. M. G., R. E., and of Colonel E. Kensington, late Royal Artillery, as Honorary Members of the Club, were sent to these Officers of the 5th of March and suitable replies received thereto, in both cases expressing interest in our welfare and a willingness to assist in furthering the objects of the Club.

Several meetings were held in connection with the revision of the Constitution and By-Laws and which is treated under a separate heading.

The recommendations made in the last Annual Report have been carried out to the letter and also included under a separate heading in this report.

No. 3 — GRADUATES AND THE MILITIA SERVICE.

Your Secretary on behalf of the Club had an interview with Major-General Herbert, C. B., Commanding the Militia, on the 27th of February 1893, which was held in the Citadel, Quebec. Among other matters discussed were the following :—

Commissions in the Permanent Militia of Canada.

The Imperial Army Service Corps.

Invaliding home of Officers in the Imperial Service.

Dress and Rank of Officers, Canadian Militia.

Needless to add that the above referred directly to Graduates and Ex-Cadets of the College and was brought forward for the

purpose of endeavouring to obtain the recognition which it is admitted should be extended to us.

It is to be hoped that in the near future these matters will receive the necessary attention at Headquarters and the Militia Service made such that it will be to the mutual advantage of the Graduates and Ex-Cadets of the College and to the Militia of Canada to bring the two together, in lieu of the present detrimental effect to the former, as under the existing Regulations and Orders such as have attached themselves to the Militia and retired therefrom now find themselves removed from the Active List, whereas others who have simply attended a specified number of Annual Drills in Camps of Instruction are still maintained on the Active List, have been promoted and will in course of time rise to a higher rank. This is not as it should be and further comment is unnecessary here as it will require other measures to have the present state of affairs remedied with a view to justice to those immediately concerned.

No. 4 — MEMBERSHIP.

The number of new members added to the Club during the year 1893, although not in point of numbers equivalent to that of the previous year, is nevertheless proportionately larger, as the field in which we had to work was considerably less and as a result the showing is in every way most satisfactory. As there are yet several names which are not registered on our books, a similar result is looked for in connection with the present year, dependant in large measure upon the efforts of the individual members.

No. 5 — FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The statement submitted herewith shows a credit in favor of the Club of \$78 75 and when we consider that the deficit at the corresponding date last year was slightly under the figures in question, and that an expenditure was incurred in the way of additional books and other matters incidental to placing the Club upon a practically sound basis to enable its work to be performed in a desirable manner, we can view the result as very favourable and under a judicious administration there need be no further occasion for a deficit.

At the last Annual Meeting it was pointed out by the mover and seconder of the Resolution referring to a salary for the Secretary-Treasurer, that it had been misunderstood and was meant to apply only to the services rendered by the then retiring Secretary. Owing to this resolution having been erroneously taken down at the time, was due the fact of its having been considered in the Statement presented last year, the result shown, however, made no real difference to the finances.

On this occasion the same is properly omitted as it has been judged advisable to have that office made an honorary one.

No. 7.—CORRESPONDENCE.

The "Canadian Military Gazette" having changed hands during the course of the year, the new Editor and Proprietor very kindly offered to publish such matter as we desired should appear in its columns, including Communications, and so forth. This has not been taken advantage of to any great extent and members are invited to contribute to its pages with a view of preparing themselves for similar work when the Club is in a position to have an Official Organ devoted to and controlled by the Club

It may not be inappropriate to mention here that the Canadian Military Gazette has taken a very decided and favourable stand as regards the action of the authorities at Headquarters, in connection with the allotment of Commissions in the Permanent Militia. Although it was expected that under the administration of a new Minister of Militia and Defence, and with the support of the General Officer Commanding, that

Graduates would receive the consideration which they are entitled to ; it has been proved to be otherwise and the same system is in force at present in this respect as heretofore, whereby qualification and merit are considered inferior to personal and political influence. Any suggestions with a view of remedying the existing evil can only be considered problematical until such time as the former are viewed by the authorities as superior to the latter.

No 11—ONTARIO MEDICAL ASSOCIATION.

The following concession was granted to Graduates, by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario :

At a Meeting of the Council held in June, on motion of Dr. Fowler, it was resolved that Graduates from the Royal Military College be accepted as matriculants by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, providing that they proved identity and paid the customary fees.

We have endeavoured to ascertain through whose intervention this concession has been obtained, but have to date been unsuccessful in our efforts.

No 12—LAND SURVEYORS OF THE PROVINCE OF
QUEBEC.

The first concession obtained from the Government of the Province of Quebec, in favour of Graduates of the Royal Military College of Canada, was obtained through the instrumentality of the Club, and is now given in detail in order to make the members conversant with the same

On behalf of the Club, your Secretary addressed an application to the Hon. J. S. Hall, Provincial Treasurer, requesting that the Government of the Province of Quebec, grant similar concessions to Graduates as have already been granted by the Province of Ontario. Through the kindness of the Hon. Mr. TAILLON, Premier, the Hon. J. S. Hall, Treasurer and Mr. Justice WÜRTELE, who interested themselves on our behalf, the matter was carried to a successful issue. The Bill was introduced

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in the Legislative Assembly by the Hon. The Premier of the Province in the latter part of December and after receiving its third reading underwent a similar proceeding in the Legislative Council, and on the 8th of January 1894 the Bill was assented to, in Her Majesty's name by His Honor the Lieut. Governor, and comes into force from the latter date

The following will explain the nature of the concession :

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 149.

AN ACT TO AMEND ARTICLE 4124 OF THE REVISED STATUTES RESPECTING LAND SURVEYORS.

Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows :

Article 4124 of the Revised Statutes is amended by adding, after the words : "in order to be admitted as land surveyor", in the eighth line thereof, the following words : "or who has followed a complete course of study in the Royal Military College, in accordance with Chapter 42 of the Revised Statutes of Canada and its amendments".

Article 4124, as amended reads :—

"Whosoever has followed during, at least two years, a regular course of studies in all the branches of the sciences required by law in order to be received as a land surveyor, who has attended the lectures of a university, college or polytechnic school, in this Province, where a complete course of theoretical and practical instruction is given in civil engineering, physics, geology, and all other branches of sciences required by law in order to be admitted as a land surveyor, or who has followed a complete course of study in the Royal Military College, in accordance with Chapter 42 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, and its amendments and who has received from such university, college, or polytechnic school, after a regular examination, his diploma or degree as a civil engineer or land surveyor, may be received as a student by any land surveyor in the Province, and shall only be bound to perform twelve months' active service as such : or, if he has obtained his degree or diploma in less than

two full years, then only such time of active service which, added to the time he has devoted to his course of studies, shall complete the period of three full years : and, at the expiration of such active service, such person, on complying with the other provisions of this section, has a right to present himself and undergo the examination required by law, and if qualified, to be admitted to practise as a land surveyor for the Province, as if he had served his three full years under indentures with a practising land surveyor, but, instead of paying forty dollars, he is obliged to pay fifty dollars as a fee for his license as land surveyor, 45, V., C. 16, s 40.

The following Articles are given for the information of those who are desirous of availing themselves of the Concession obtained :—

Article, 4111.—No person can be admitted to the study of land surveying without having previously passed an examination before the board of management as to his knowledge of the French or English language, according as the candidate is of French or English origin

In the first case, the board of management shall require of the candidate a knowledge of the elements and syntax of the French language and that he be able to translate English into French correctly.

In the second case that he knows the elements and syntax of the English language and is able to translate French into English correctly.

And in both cases the candidate should be able to write correctly his mother tongue from dictation

Article 4112 —Every candidate to be admitted as a student in land surveying shall undergo an examination, to the satisfaction of the board of management, on general geography, on that of Canada in particular, on the history of Canada, arithmetic, the elements of geometry, the use of logarithms, and lastly algebra as far as quadratic equations.

From the above it will be seen that the concession consists in the following :—

- 1st —Exemption from preliminary examination.
- 2nd.—Shortened term of apprenticeship.

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No 13—ONTARIO ASSOCIATION OF ARCHITECTS.

The President of the Club, Mr. R. W. Leonard, U. L., on behalf of the Club interviewed the Registrar of the above Association, with reference to Concessions in favour of Graduates of the Royal Military College of Canada, which was subsequently followed by an application to a similar effect from the Secretary

At the time of writing the matter is under consideration by the Council of the Association in question, being their first meeting since the interview and application referred to were held and sent respectively.

No. 14. - CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

Acting upon the resolution passed at the last Annual Meeting the Constitution and By-Laws have been fully and very carefully gone over and will be presented revised and amended, for approval and adoption at this meeting. Every effort was made to get as many of the members as possible to attend these meetings, held with a view of getting at the opinions of as many as could be had as we deemed it advisable so to do in the general interest and welfare of the Club.

In presenting the results of our labours we trust that the same will commend themselves to you.

No. 15—MILITARY INFORMATION.

Among the promotions promulgated by the War Office on the 3rd of January, was that of the following :—3rd Battalion, South Staffordshire Regiment, Supernumerary Captain S J. A Denison, to be Major Major Denison is the first Ex-Cadet who has obtained a majority, a fact well worthy of mention under the above heading.

Captain J. Irvine Lang, R. E, proceeded to the Gold Coast, in the latter part of January for the purpose of taking charge

of a preliminary survey of Railway routes and is still employed in that connection.

The Secretaries of State for War and India and His Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief have expressed their appreciation of the good services rendered by the Officers who were engaged on the survey for the proposed railway from Mombasa to Victoria Nyanza, among whom was Lieut. P. G. Twining, R. E., and who was subsequently employed at the War Office Intelligence Department. In recognition of his services he was made a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of England.

Successful torpedo experiments were carried out at Calcutta under the superintendence of Lieut. N. G. von Hugel, R. E., who was in charge of the sub-marine defences of Calcutta. The experiments were of a very interesting character, were witnessed by a large number of distinguished people and were most successful in every particular.

Major-General E. O. Hewett, C. M. G., R. E., late Commandant of the Royal Military College, of Canada, was selected for the position of Commandant of the School of Military Engineering, Chatham.

Lieut. H. P. du P. Casgrain, R. E., passed a brilliant examination in the Russian language, and was awarded a prize of £10 from the English Government.

Lieut. H. Cyril Thacker was gazetted to the Royal Canadian Artillery with effect from the 10th of October, 1893.

Club, due no doubt to various and sundry reasons, I would suggest as a means of facilitating the collection of the same, with convenience to the members which this refers to, that a printed form be procured, in the shape of an order upon their Army Agents. This form to be sent in duplicate to the Members, who will fill out the same, if it meets with their approval, and return to the Hon. Secretary-Treasurer, who will forward one to the representative of the sender. The form will be an authorization to accept an Annual Draft for the amount of the Annual Subscription, with exchange charge added, said amount to be charged to the account of the member signing the same. This system will enable the payment of dues to be made regularly and with no inconvenience to the Members who prefer this method, as the work will devolve upon the Hon. Secretary-Treasurer. Should this meet with your approval, the forms will be immediately prepared and mailed to the parties concerned and will no doubt result in an increase of members in good standing at the close of the year, as it is much to be regretted that the number so reported at this Meeting is far in excess of any reasonable cause for its present large number.

In order to properly conduct the business of the Club, which is increasing yearly, it is absolutely necessary that the question of revenue receives your closest attention. Promptness on the part of those who have been somewhat backward in the past will be much appreciated and will tend to the general advancement of the Club.

(b) Subscribing to a Military Paper.

I would recommend that the Club subscribe to some representative Service Journal, in order that the Hon. Secretary-Treasurer may be enabled to follow with greater advantage the constant changes going on in connection with the appointment, promotion and so forth of the Members in the Imperial Service. The additional expense involved in a subscription to a Service Journal will in all probability be repaid in the increased information which can be presented in future years. There are many other advantages which are self evident and need no further mention here.

To complete the suggestion contained herein, I would add that a subscription to the "Broad Arrow," would in my opinion meet with our requirements. To limit the Hon. Secretary-

Treasurer to the possibility of his seeing such a paper at a Club is not consistent with what it is intended the result should prove. There are many pieces which it is desirable to have to keep on record, and on the other hand that officer may not be resident in a city where such an institution is in existence and in the latter case unable to see such a paper.

In concluding the Annual Report it is sincerely hoped that it will in a measure meet with your approval and that the points touched upon will be the means of getting the Members more actively engaged in furthering the objects and welfare of the Club. The past year has been of sufficient importance to warrant united action for the future as well as individual work where the former cannot be obtained.

If your sincerity is equivalent to that which we are justly lead to believe should be evinced by those who have been trained at the R. M. C., of Canada, and energetic action is manifested for the future, it is not overculating to anticipate that the future of the Club will prove of greater advantage to its members than we can at present count upon.

“ Moved by Captain A. H. van Straubenzee, R. E., seconded
 “ by Captain Duncan MacPherson, R. L., that Messrs. L.
 “ Homfray Irving, Francis Joseph Dixon and Captain J. Chas.
 “ MacDougall, be a Committee with full power to adopt a
 “ distinctive badge, to be worn by the members.—Carried”.
 Beg leave to report :

That after holding many meetings and obtaining the opinion of members far and near, both verbal and written, your Committee unanimously decided that such an article should be selected as might be worn, in some way, by members, both in uniform and "mufti". Your Committee were in consequence much restricted in a choice. After discussing the suitability of many articles, it was felt that it would be desirable to select something that every Cadet and every Member was familiar with, so that it could be easily and readily recognized. Your Committee therefore selected an article of jewellery that may be worn as a scarf pin, cuff links, watch charm and studs. The College coat-of-arms or some modification of it naturally suggested itself for such an article. Your Committee therefore excised the center of the College coat-of-arms, and selected a badge which may be briefly described as follows :

For scarf pin, watch charm and studs "A dexter arm in " armour embowed in a hand holding three maple leaves ; " enamelled appropriately in black, leaving the studding of the " armoured arm in relief".

Cuff links "On one side the badge, the other being a twisted " bar of gold". All to be made of 14kt gold and hard enamel.
