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## Anniversaries of principal Events in the Late War with Russia.

1854—March 13. Great Britain proclaimed war against Russia.

September 14. The Royal Army landed at Eupatoria, Crimea.

September 20. Battle of Alma; defeat and route of the Russian Army.

September 23. Marched from Alma towards McKenzie's Heights.

September 26. Routed the Russians at McKenzie's Heights and Balaklava.

September 27. Marched upon the Heights of Sebastopol.

October 2. First sward of the Green Hill Works thrown up, on the night of this date.

October 17. Siege opened on the morning of this date.

October 25. Battle, and Grand charge of the British Cavalry, at Balaklava.

October 26. Skirmish on the Inkerman Heights.

November 5. Great Battle of Inkerman.

November 14. Great Hurricane.

1855—May 26. Kertch taken by a portion of the Allied Forces.

June 7. Storming of the Mamelon; and also the taking of the Quarries and Rifle Pits.

18. First attack on the Redan, and failure.

August 16. Battle of the Tchernaya, between the Russians, and French, Turks, the whole of the Sardinian army and a portion of the British Artillery and Cavalry.

September 9. Taking of the Malakoff, Storming of the Redan, and fall of Sebastopol.

October 17. Kinburn taken. The troops engaged, were those of the 1st Brigade, 4th Division—consisting of the 17th, 20th, 21st, 57th and 63d Regiments, with two Battalions of the Royal Marines—under the command of Brigadier the Hon. A. Spencer; they embarked at Kizatch on the 4th October. The results of that expedition were—1380 prisoners of war, including 1 General, and 40 inferior officers; killed and wounded, 120. The Brigade rejoined the main army on the 11th November, and took up their old Encampment.

1856—March 30th. The Terms of Peace were officially signed at Paris by the plenipotentiaries of the respective Governments.

**Morning and Evening Stars.**

Mercury will be a Morning Star until the 10th January; then an Evening Star until the 1st June; a Morning Star until the 10th September, and an Evening Star the remainder of the year.

Venus will be an Evening Star until 8th May; then a Morning Star the rest of the year.

Mars will be an Evening Star until 5th June; then Morning Star until the close of the year.

Jupiter will be an Evening Star until 12th April, then a Morning Star the rest of the year.

Saturn will be an Evening Star until 9th July, and a Morning Star until the end of the year.

**ECLIPSES.**

In the Year 1857 there will be two Eclipses, both of the Sun,—1. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, March 25th visible in parts of Australia, North and South Pacific, Western Districts of North America, Isthmus of Panama, N. W. Coast of South America, &c.

2. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, September 17, visible in parts of Africa and Asia, China, Indian Ocean, Australia, North Pacific, &c.

TRUE TIME.

Two kinds of time are used in Almanacs—*clock* or *mean-time* in some, and *apparent* or *sun-time* in others. *Clock-time* is always *right*, while *sun-time* *varies* every day. People generally suppose it is twelve o'clock when the sun is due south, or at a properly made noon-mark. But this is a mistake. The sun is seldom on the meridian at *twelve o'clock*; indeed, this is the case only on four days of the year: namely, April 15, June 15, Sep. 1, and Dec. 25. In this Almanac, as in most other Almanacs, the time used is *clock time*; and the difference in the time of the sun's coming on the meridian is given in the fifth column; this affords a ready means of obtaining correct time and for setting a clock by using a noon-mark, adding or subtracting as the sun is slow or fast.

Old-fashioned Almanacs, which use *apparent* time, give the rising and setting of the sun's *centre*, and make no allowance for the effect of refraction of the sun's rays by the atmosphere. The more modern and improved Almanacs, which use *clock-time*, give the rising and set-

The Congress of the United States consists of a Senate and House of Representatives, and must assemble at least once a year; on the first Monday of December, unless otherwise directed by law.

The Senate is composed of two members from each state, so that the regular number is now sixty-two. They are chosen by the Legislatures of the several states for the term of six years, one third being elected biennially. The Vice-President of the United States is President of the Senate, having the casting vote when the votes of the Senators are equally divided. In case of his absence or death, a President *pro tempore* is chosen by the Senators from their own body.

U. S. ARMY.—The authorized strength of the United States army is 17,867, officers and men; the actual strength, 15,752. The number of enlistments for the year ending Sept. 20, 10,546; loss by deaths, discharges, and desertions, 5,500. The whole territory of the United States is divided into 5 great departments in which there are 26 arsenals and 98 forts, most of which are garrisoned.

FLAVORING MATTERS.—One of the most remarkable and interesting achievements of modern chemistry has been the preparation of certain liquids possessing the flavors of various fruits. So close indeed is the resemblance that we are almost warranted in supposing the flavor of the fruits to be actually caused by the presence of a trace of the above liquids. Several of these articles are employed in confectionery, and are manufactured on a tolerably large scale. The acetate of amylic oxyd, when dissolved in six times its bulk of alcohol, emits a powerful and agreeable odor of pears, and is used in flavoring pear drops. The

alcohol, gives the scent and flavour of apples. Butyric-ether communicates the flavor of the pineapple, and is used in the preparation of various beverages.—Various other compounds of the so-called fatty acids, with the oxyd of amyle and ethyle, possess very pleasing odors.

TO COOK OLD POTATOES.—Pare the potatoes and put them to soak in cold water four hours, then drop into the water which should be boiling; a little salt added to the water improves them. Take them from the fire the moment they are done; pour off all the water and let them stand uncovered in the kettle over the fire till the water evaporates from the surface, and they are ready for the table.

RESUSCITATION OF DROWNED PERSONS.—Dr. Marshall Hall, an eminent physician of London, gives instructions for the resuscitation of persons apparently drowned, at variance with the methods now in use. He says:—There is one great impediment to the restoration of the function of respiration, which is the falling back of the tongue across the top of the glottis, or entrance into the windpipe. In order to remove this, the patient is to be placed upon his face and breast, and the body is to be turned slowly on to one side, and then returned slowly to its former position. This motion, whose effect is to cause a considerable amount of air in the lungs to be expelled and re-inspired, is to be kept up until breathing is restored, or all hopes of resuscitation from this source

BUTTER.—Salt is added to butter for two reasons. One is to assist in its preservation, the dairy-woman vainly thinking that plenty of salt will keep the butter sweet. Another set add salt with dishonest motives with the idea that all the salt put in butter is sold at the full price the butter brings. It is a great mistake. Every pound of salt put in butter over what is needed to give it flavor, instead of bringing a cash return to the butter-maker, proves a positive loss, because it reduces the value of every pound of butter so oversalted, frequently as much as three cents a pound. Butter is not preserved by salt.

It will keep just as long and just as sweet as olive oil, without salt, if no other substance is incorporated with it. It is the caseine of milk that spoils the butter, and unless free from that, no art can keep it sweet. Butter should be churned at sixty-five degrees, and immediately after reduced to forty degrees, and the less it is touched by human hands the better.

Gardens will be found to be greatly benefited by having them dug deeply in the autumn, and having the lower soil exposed to the frosts of winter. It is better than a dressing of manure. In the spring, when garden operations commence, the ground will be found in the mellowest condition, requiring only one half the labor, and probably producing twice the crop, than if left untouched in the autumn. Remember it cannot be dug too deeply. If the clay and virgin soil turn up, so much the better.

Cloth of any description may be rendered waterproof thus:—Take a quarter of an ounce of yellow soap and a gallon of rain water; boil it for twenty minutes; skim, and when cold put in the cloth; let it soak for twenty-four hours; take it out and hang it up to drain, and, when it is half dry, put it into a solution of half a pound of alum, quarter of a pound of sugar of lead, dis-

water (sugar of lead is a poison). When the cloth has been thoroughly soaked, hang it to dry. This will not alter the appearance of the cloth, and it will resist many hours of rain.

**TO PRESERVE SMALL FRUITS WITHOUT BEING COOKED.**—Strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, cherries and peaches, can be preserved in this manner:—Lay the ripe fruit in broad dishes, and sprinkle over it the same quantity of sugar used in cooking it. Set it in the sun, or in a moderately heated oven, until the juice forms a thick syrup with the sugar. Pack the fruit in tumblers, and pour the syrup over it. Paste-writing paper over the glasses, and set them in a cool, dry place. Preserved in this manner, the fruit retains much more of its natural flavour and healthfulness, than when cooked.—*New*

CRACKS AND CRANNIES.—

If you wish to save fuel, and always have your wife good-natured, stop all access for the wind about the underpinning of the house. It is difficult to keep warm rooms where the wind is allowed to sweep under any portion of the house. It works its way up between the ceilings, and

makes double the fuel necessary to secure a comfortable degree of warmth.

FATTING HOGS—

*November* is a good time for the pigs to grow and the hogs to fatten. Give them a warm, dry place, and just as much clean, nutritious food as they will eat with a good appetite, and no more. If any is left in the trough, take it at once away, dash in cold water and sweep it out; at the next feeding, be sure to give no more than will be greedily eaten. There ought to be this sentence printed in large letters and posted in every piggery in the land—*“Leave no swill in the trough.”* The annual money-loss in Massachusetts by this error, would purchase a good farm.

TO PRESERVE HERBS.—

All kinds of herbs should be gathered on a dry day, just before, or while in blossom. Tie them in bundles, and suspend them in a dry, airy place, with the blossoms downwards. When perfectly dry, wrap the medicinal ones in paper, and keep them from the air. Pick off the leaves of those which are to be used in cooking, pound and sift them fine, and keep the powder in bottles corked up tight.

Take a sieve, and cover the bottom with eggs; then pour boiling water upon them, sufficient to give them a thorough wetting, permitting the water to pass off through the sieve; take them out and dry them; then pack them in bran, the small ends down; and your eggs will keep forever.

PARAGUS.—As soon as the heavy frosts come to kill the tops, they should be cut and removed to the sty, or to the compost heap. The surface of the beds, which has become hard, and perhaps weedy, should now be thoroughly scarified with the hoe, or forked over, taking care not to injure the crowns. About the last of the month, spread in a heavy coating of stable manure, at least a half cord to every two square rods. The rains will carry down its fertilizing properties to the roots, and give them great strength and vigor for an early start in the Spring. If near the shores, where marsh-mud is accessible, a coating of this, one inch thick, in addition to the manure, will do good service. We have also found it an excellent plan to cover the beds with sea-weed or old hay during the winter. The roots kept active longer before the ground closes up; the ground does not freeze so deep, and starts sooner in the Spring. The muck of course needs to be removed as soon as the winter is over. Asparagus is a gross feeder, and can be had in its perfection only by high manuring. This, we believe, will pay, whether the bed has been thoroughly prepared or not.

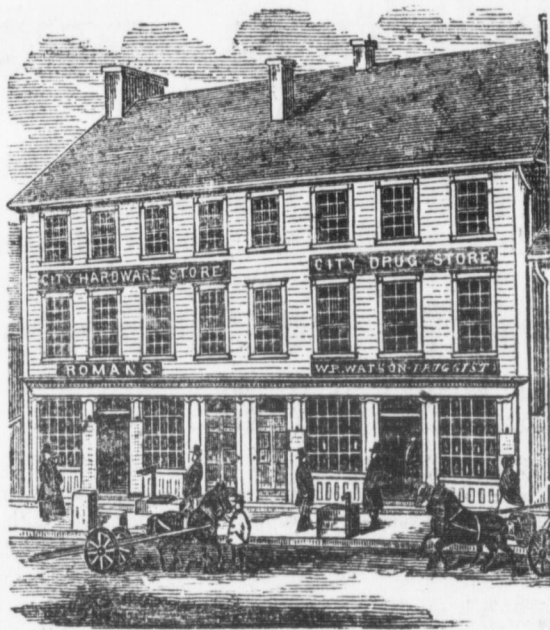
