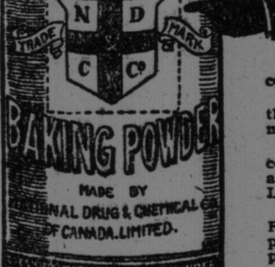

YESTERDAY IN PARLIAMENT

Timber Land Debate Still Being Continued--How Some Friends of the Government Got Rich--Big Blocks of Land Bought for a Song and Sold for High Prices.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—The debate on the timber limits was continued today by Mr. Boyce, of Algoma, who proceeded to give specific cases. In the Prince Albert district for fifty miles Herman Finger bid \$410 and William Anderson \$630. This limit went to the highest bidder. For second choice, a year later, in 1901, Finger bid \$5,000 and one McCracken, representing Anderson, bid \$5,670. Again the highest trader won. Finger tried again at a forty mile limit and thought he would bid high. He bid \$15,000. But Anderson bid \$15,000 and got the limit. Commenting on this Mr. Boyce said that he was not prepared to say that there was anything dishonest in the transaction, but it was at least peculiar that there should be such small differences between the tenders. For the first three limits mentioned Finger offered \$65,000 to Anderson, who had got them at \$12,000. Finger managed to get one limit for \$10,000 and Thomas MacKie, formerly member of parliament, got 25 miles for \$15,010. Mr. Boyce argued that these prices were vastly below the prospective value of the timber and that the increment in due time would go, not to the country, but to the speculator "sitting with map in hand and watching the railway."

He complained that the government should have allowed the debate to go on for three days without any member taking part in it. It was not, said Mr. Borden, Sir John Macdonald or Alexander MacKenzie that was on trial, it was the present government, so that there was no need to refer to what took place twenty-five years ago. He could not understand how any government would dispose of timber limits without first finding out the value. That was one way of doing away with the heritage of the country. Why should these limits be put in the hands of speculators when they were not required for settlement purposes? Why should only four weeks be given, when about four months were given in Ontario? The minister admitted that there was not sufficient time to permit of proper competition. The member for East Assiniboia told him he was not a detective, when it was suggested that collusion took place and that he should have been in a position to prevent this. Take the province of Ontario. In 1906 a tender was received for mines. It was \$1,000. The province did not accept it but called for new tenders. The government of Ontario took the ground that they were the trustees of the people and refused to accept the tender. New tenders were asked and \$178,500 plus 10 per cent royalty was obtained for the mine. The speculative value of timber limits would soon have a real value and without being properly advertised when offered for sale it was impossible to get competition. He condemned the practice of speculators holding timber limits for nothing but speculative purposes. Having said this he did not mean to condemn the policy of alienating timber lands when they were not required. It was madness to do so. Dealing with the opening of tenders he condemned the system which permitted an officer of the department to open and award the contract. The member for East Assiniboia talked of charges being formulated against him as a member of the house. Mr. Turiff has no more rights in this case than he would not a member. He was at that time an officer of the department and by accident since became a member of the house talked of Lib-eralism of the British school, but that was not the way they gave out contracts in Britain. Coming to the explanation of Mr. Fraser, the leader of the opposition wondered why it was that Mr. Fraser did not a member of the firm to put in the second tender instead of going to Montreal for Mr. Nolan, whose name was convenient for

this and it might be for other purposes. Mr. Borden ridiculed the idea that Mr. Lake had indulged in insinuations and defied Mr. Oliver to place his hand on any insinuation. He was not arguing for a sale that would raise the price of timber in the west, but what he did argue for was that limits should not be sold until they were required for settlement. In conclusion he said that there was no reason, private or otherwise, why the motion should not be carried. Mr. Sifton moved the adjournment of the debate.
