



Suggestions to Yachtsmen (Chatham World).

Every boat, especially every open boat, should have a sufficient number of buoyon ant articles on board to sustain the occupants for a reasonable time in the water, and cork cushions are the least likely to be stowed away or fastened down when they are needed.

Something of this kind would have been mighty convenient for the crew of the Fedora, when she was knocked over, filled and sank off Chatham some years ago, and her owner has always carried them ever since on his boats.

Most of the drownings that occur from the upsetting of boats would be prevented if boats of all kinds were furnished with buoyant articles that would come to the surface when the craft goes down.

When a boat upsets some people say she hasn't ballast enough, but it is very convenient for the occupants when there isn't enough ballast on board to sink her. Open boats should not carry ballast enough ballast on board to sink her cough to sink them. A decked boat, with enough ballast low down to right her in case of a knock down, is the safest craft, both for amateurs and experts. 


