Newark Observance New York, July 1—A noiseless but patriotic programme featured the celebration of Independence Day in New York. A salute of forty-five guns on Governor's Island, followed by a salute and the unfurling of the flag on the block house in Central Park formally opened a patriotic and athletic programme in which band concerts, folk dances and military drills took the place of the noise producers in other years. In public parks throughout the greater city these exercises were designed as an aid to recruiting for the national guard and the regular army. Many thousands who formerly left the city for the fourth were forced to remain at home today because it was said the sale of excursion tickets had been practically discontinued for the flag by railroads. At a celebration in Newark, N.J., of-ficial representatives of the British government took part in the programme. It was the first time an American city has had a British general and his staff with a British peer as the guest of honor on the anniversary of Independence Day. There Brigadier-General W. A. White, head of the British recruiting mission in this country, and Lord Aberdeen, former governor-general of Canada, were guests of the city of Newark.

DAYLIGHT SAVING

(Bangor Commercial.) Although the United States senate has ecided to wait until next year before instituting daylight saving as a federal measure, a number of communities will inaugurate the new system on their inaugurate the new system on their own initiative. Among these is Springfield, Mass., where the clocks were set ahead an hour on July 1. Other places in western Massachusetts are to follow the example of Springfield. The Springfield Republican says that very little local opposition to the change was manifested.

There are now twelve countries which the clocks have been set ahead one hour in the effort to conserve day-light. These are Great Britain, France, Germany, Austria, Italy, Holland, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Portugal and

As a step in national economy it has As a step in national economy it has proved a great saving in lighting and heating. The special committee appointed by the parliament of Great Britain to study the results of the system, reported that an average reduction of 20 per cent. for lighting purposes was given by the power companies; thirty-20 per cent. for lighting purposes was given by the power companies; thirtyone private companies estimated a reduction of 23 per cent., and sixty-four municipal plants reported a reduction of 18.3 per cent; the percentage in individual cases ranged from one to fifty-five. The general average saving in consumption of gas in Great Britain was nine per cent. Edinburgh reported a saving of eight per cent., or \$30,000. Not-tingham placed its saving at ten per cent. to 15 per cent. and Belfast at 5.25 per cent.

Ottawa, July 3—Parliament, today, entered upon the third week of debate upon the second reading of the conupon the second reading of the conscription bill. Despite the long discussion which has already taken place new aspects of the great issue before the country were presented by the eight speakers who addressed the house today. Mr. Sinclair, of Guysboro, in a well-reasoned, thoughtful speech at the afternoon sitting, supported the wisdom of trusting the people to decide the issue by granting the referendum, pointed to the administrative bungling and partisanship which had be-devilled the voluntary recruiting system and urged the ansing which had be-devined the voluntary recruiting system and urged the appeal to conciliation and strong leadership rather than the resort to force in solving the problem of getting more men for the front and of avoiding national discord and racial strife. He made two or three cond

He made two or three concrete suggestions looking to a further trial of the voluntary system. He believed that the millionaires and the war profiteers should be compelled to sacrifice their big incomes and the money thus obtained be devoted to increasing the pay of the money who fought. He urged national men who fought. He urged national prohibition, appealed for the culling out of all patronage and political favoritism in war administration, and he declared for the prompt suppression of every newspaper which fermented racial prejudice or talked against recruiting.
